To the Honorable the Common Council:

The Comptroller, in his reply of the 18th inst. to your resolution of inquiry as to the condition of the City debt, has gone out of his way to attack my business transactions and character as a business man. This attack permit me to answer. In his reply the Comptroller states, judgments were given against the City of over \$100,000, for paving with my patent pavement New Church street and South Fifth avenue; but he omitted to state that I also obtained a judgment against the City on 2d October, 1873, for \$71,902, for paving First avenue. This latter claim was originally for \$63,103, and not a special contract (as the Comptroller terms the other two claims). The Courts declared all my claims legal, and my prices fair and lawful; still, after forcing me into expensive and useless legal, and my prices fair and lawful; still, after forcing me into expensive and useless litigations, the Comptroller was not content with the judgments of the Courts as to the legality of my contracts—he persisting in further litigation, which only resulted in increased costs and expense which only resulted in increased costs and expense to the City. The above three claims, amounting to \$185,000, by means of inexcusable litigation, had been raised \$14,468 beyond their original amount, and were running up at the rate of \$35 per day. It was only after the appeals which the Comptroller insisted upon taking had been dismissed, and the executions were about being placed in the hands of the Sheriff, that the Comptroller point has a sum of the sum of the product of the sheriff.

placed in the hands of the Sheriff, that the Comptroller paid the sums due upon the judgments, with the large accumulations of interests and costs, unnecessary burdens imposed by him upon the City.

In his reply above referred to, the Comptroller further states: "A bid for laying similar pavement in Newark was made by the same Guidet at \$4.07 per square yard." I have already answered this attack; also the one in reference to the validity of my letters patent, in my letter of September 5, 1873, to the late Mayor Havemeyer. It is suffithis attack; also the one in reference to the validity of my letters patent, in my letter of September 5, 1873, to the late Mayor Havemeyer. It is sufficient to say that the pavement referred to, was not similiar to that laid in South Fifth avenue, and that my bid for this paving was not \$4.07 per square yard, as stated by the Comptroller. In both of these particulars the Comptroller is entirely mistaken. As to the validity of my letters patent, I stated, in my letter of September 5, 1873, to the late Mayor Havemeyer, that a suit had been brought by me against an infringer in Newark. The suit was decided on December 30, 1873, by Judge Nixon, United States Circuit Court, District of New Jersey, in my favor, by a decree granting an injunction and an account. Since this decree I obtained judgment for damages against the infringer for nearly \$28,000.

In the Comptroller's reply to your Honorable Board, he uses, in reference to my pavement, the phrase "exorbitant price of \$6.00 per square yard." In reply, I venture to assert that any impartial business man, who understands anything about paving, and is aware of the cost of the stone blocks and the expense of laying them, to construct a solid pavement, will say that the price is fair and reasonable, and the

of the cost of the stone blocks and the expense of laying them, to construct a solid pavement, will say that the price is fair and reasonable, and the cheapest pavement in New York City, considering its durability and safety for draught horses. The lowest bid that I ever made for laying the Guidet Improved Stone Pavement, outside of New York City, was \$5,25; and my reasons for such lower price were, that in that instance I had facilities for doing the work, and, principally, that payments for the work would be promptly made. In New York City it is uncertain at what time pay-day will come, without tedious and expensive litigations to the contractor.

Commissioner of Public Works: SIR-I have the honor to make the following report relating to streets, avenues, and public places in the City of New York, wherein more than two wherem more than two railroad tracks are laid, viz.:

There is on Avenue A, between Twenty-second

which is a side track used by the Central Cross-town Railroad Company, and no particular im-pediment to public travel.

On Bowery there are three tracks from Catharine to Pell street, and three tracks from Grand to Broome street, and four tracks from Broome street to Sixth street. Public travel will require all the tracks now laid in the Bowery (from Broome street to Sixth street) during the continuation of freight cars running over the road. Canal Street-

On Canal street there are two centre tracks from On Canal street there are two centre tracks from Broadway to Hudson street, and one single track from Wooster street to West Broadway (on south side), and also a single track on the north side of Canal street from Church to Sullivan street. The side track should be removed, and the cars of the Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad could run upon the centre track of the Sixth and Eighth avenue railroads. These side tracks in Canal street seriously immede public travel.

street seriously impede public travel. Christopher Street-

On Christopher street, near West street, there are three single tracks; two of them are used by the Christopher and Tenth Street Railroad Com-pany, and the other by the Central Cross-town Railroad Company.

Centre Street-

On Centre street, from Tryon Row to Duane street, there are four tracks; and from Duane to Franklin street there are three tracks; also, be-tween Franklin and White streets there are

whiches or turn-outs.

All the tracks exceeding two, in this street, should be removed for the convenience of public

City Hall Square-

On City Hall square (opposite the Register's Office), there are eight tracks, covering nearly the

hole square from curb to curb.

The following lines of cars pass over these

tracks: Third avenue to Harlem.

Fourth avenue to Grand Central Depot.

Avenue B, Dry Dock and East Broadway.
Avenue D.

Eighth Avenue-

Eighth Avenue—
On Eighth avenue, from Forty-eighth to Fiftyfirst street, there are three tracks and twenty
switches or turn-outs to the depot and stable on each
side of said avenue. These tracks, turn-outs, and
switches are used exclusively by the Eighth Avenue Railroad Company. There is also a single
track in Fiftieth street, west of Eighth avenue,
used by said Company.

There is also a single unused track on Eighth
avenue, from Horatio street to Fourteenth street,
which should be removed.

which should be removed.

Fourth Avenue-

On Fourth avenue, from Fourteenth street to Twenty-third street, there are four tracks; from Twenty-sixth to Thirty-second street there are three tracks; and from Thirty-third to Thirty-fourth street there are four tracks. In front of the depot of the Fourth Avenue Railroad Company on Fourth avenue, between Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets, there are laid six switches or turn-outs.

All tracks in excess of two on the avenue

should be removed. Forty-second Street-

On Forty-second street, between Lexington and Fourth avenues, there are three tracks, one of which should be removed.

Fourteenth Street-

On Fourteenth street, between Avenues A and B, there are six tracks and eight turn-outs and switches, used by the Dry Dock and East Broadway Railroad Company.

Franklin Square-

In Franklin square (in Pearl street) there are three tracks from Oak street to Peck slip; also, three tracks on Peck slip, from Pearl to South

Grand Street-

On Grand street, between Tompkins and East streets, there are eleven tracks; b and Tompkins streets there are seven tracks tween Mangin and Goerick streets there are four

The following lines of cars pass over this street: Grand, Vestry, and Desbrosses street. Grand and Forty-second street.

Grand and Courtlandt street.

Madison Avenue-

On Madison avenue, from Seventy-second to Seventy-fourth street, there are three tracks (two tracks and a side track); the side track is not used, and should be removed from the avenue.

On Ninth avenue, between Fifty-third and Fifty-fifth streets, there are three tracks, and used exclusively by the Ninth Avenue Railroad Com-pany. There is also on said avenue five turn-outs or switches to depot, and also a track from Eighth avenue eastwardly on Fifty-fourth street.

On Park Row, from Frankfort to Spruce street, here is on Avenue A, between Twenty-second Twenty-third streets, three tracks, one of New York Times and Tribune offices; there are

four tracks between Spruce and Beekman streets, and four tracks below Beekman street, and in front of the New Post-office, and eleven tracks from New Post-office to Ann street; one track is laid on or near the cross-walk in front of the New York Herald Building, and its use in its present location, impedes public travel, is dangerous to life and limb, and a nuisance generally, and should be immediately removed.

Seventh Avenue-On Seventh avenue, between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, there are two tracks and thirteen turnouts or switches, used exclusively by the Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company; also, a track running from Seventh avenue eastwardly on Fifty-first street to Depot.

Sixth Avenue

On Sixth avenue, between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, there are three tracks used by the Sixth Avenue Railroad Company; also, a track from Sixth avenue, on Forty-third street, with eight switches, to depot; and a track on Forty-fourth street, with five switches, to depot.

Second Avenue—
There are now laid upon Second avenue, between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, three tracks; and between Sixty-second and Sixty-fourth streets, four tracks; and between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, three tracks. There are six switches or turn-outs (from Sixty-first to Sixty-fifth street) on the west side of said avenue; and five switches or turn-outs on the east side of said avenue. All of said tracks, switches, or turn-outs are used exclusively by the Second Avenue Railroad Company. The Company have also a side track on Sixty-fourth street. Second Avenueroad Company. The Com track on Sixty-fourth street.

Tenth Avenue

Tenth Avenue—
On Tenth avenue and Fifty-fourth street there are two tracks and eight turn-outs or switches used by the Central Park, North and East River Railroad Company. Across Tenth avenue, between Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, there are eight tracks used by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company; also, on Tenth avenue, between Twenty-seventh and Thirtieth streets, there are three tracks. The side tracks could be disposed of without injury to the road owning the same. to the road owning the same. Third Avenue

There are on Third avenue, from Sixty-fifth to

There are on Third avenue, from Sixty-fifth to Sixty-sixth street, three tracks and thirteen switches or turn-outs to depot, used by Third Avenue Railroad Company; also, a track or turn-out from Third avenue along Sixty-sixth street; also, two turn-outs near Sixty-seventh street.

Thirty-fourth Street—
There are on Thirty-fourth street, near East river, seven railway tracks, and four switches or turn-outs, and are used by the Avenue D, Fourth avenue, and Twenty-third street lines.

Whitehall Street—

Whitehall Street-On Whitehall street, from Front to South street, there are seven railroad tracks, and are used by the Central Park, North and East River Railroad, Eastern and Western Division, and South Street

On West street, from Christopher to West Tenth street, there are four tracks; and from West Tenth to West Eleventh street, there are three tracks. Two tracks on this street are sufficient for

By Alderman Lysaght— An Ordinance to Regulate Permits for Streetstands, Show-cases, Signs, Stairways, Hoist-ways, Exhibition of Goods, and Coal-boxes. Sec. 1. All power and authority heretofore

exercised by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Comexercised by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, or by the Street Commissioner, or the Department of Public Works, in granting permits for signs, banners, show-cases, exhibition of goods, coal-boxes, barbers' poles, stair-ways, or hoist-ways, and stands for the sale of newspapers, fruits, small wares, or things whatever, is hereby vested in the Mayor. Provided that each application for such permit shall be approved by an Alderman of the district in which the privilege is to be located. Sec. 2. The Mayor shall have power, at all times, to revoke any permit granted, if satisfactory proof of just complaint is made to him against the use or continuance of the privilege conferred.

use or continuance of the privilege conferred.

Sec. 3. No permits for banners, signs extending or projecting beyond the stoop line, wood, or canvas side awning, or canvas awning curtains, shall be granted in Broadway, Fifth avenue, and Madison avenue.

Sec. 4. Every grantee of a privilege under this ordinance shall pay a fee for the same, as follows:

For banner of canvas cloth or open net-work,

For each sign, from \$1 to \$3, according to the size and location.

For stands, from \$1 to \$3, according to the size and location. All stands shall have the written consent of the occupant of the premises in front of which they are to be located, annexed to the

application.

For exhibition of goods, which in no case can extend beyond the stoop line, \$5.

For stairways and hoistways, which must be

inside the stoop line, \$5.

For each show-case, which must be inside of stoop line, \$2 to \$5, according to the size.

For each coal-box, which must be inside of

stoop line, \$1.

For each barber's pole, which must be inside

of stoop line, S1.

A return, with detailed report of all moneys received in Permit Bureau, shall be made weekly to the Comptroller.

Sec. 5. All privileges granted under the pro-visions of this ordinance, shall continue in force until the first day of May next ensuing, unless

sooner revoked by the Mayor.

Sec. 6. Any person exercising any of the privileges before mentioned, without a permit, shall be fined \$10 for each offense, to be sued for and re-Sec. 7. The Mayor shall cause to be provided

Sec. 7. The Mayor shall cause to be provided a record where a full copy of the permits granted under this ordinance shall be recorded; such book, as well as all other books, kept in the Permit Bureau, to be open to the inspection of the pub-

Sec. 8. The Permit Bureau shall be under the Sec. 8. The Permit Bureau shall be under the charge and management of a Chief Clerk, called the Registrar of Permits, who will be appointed by the Mayor, and hold office during the pleasure of the Mayor. The Mayor shall also appoint such clerical force as may be necessary to the performance of the duties of the Bureau.

Sec. 9. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Your Committee deeply sympathize with the unemployed and suffering mechanics and laborers, and would gladly ameliorate their condition, did their ability in any degree equal their inclinations to serve them. They are, however, in consequence of existing State laws imposing disabilities upon the corporate authorities of this City, reluctantly compelled to state these humiliating facts, and to ask that your Committee be discharged from the further consideration of a sub-ject over which the Common Council have no

AN ACT in relation to cleaning the streets of the City of New York.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as

Section 1. Section first of chapter 677 of the Laws of 1872 is hereby amended so as to read as

Laws of 1872 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
§ 1. The Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, as it shall be, from time to time, constituted, shall have full and exclusive power and authority, and is hereby charged with the duty of cleaning all public streets and avenues, lanes, alleys, gutters, wharves, piers, and heads of slips in said City to be thoroughly cleaned, from time to time, and kept at all times thoroughly cleaned, and to remove daily, and as often as may be necessary, all ashes, garbage and rubbish, dirt and sweepings, the result of cleaning the streets, and all dead horses result of cleaning the streets, and all dead horses and other dead animals, blood, offal, and other re-fuse matter of dead animals, and all bones, fish, birds, and poultry in condition unfit for human food, and all manure, and all diseased, tainted, or unmature or impure meats, fish, fowl, eggs, nd also all other matter or nuisances of a similar kind, which the Board of Health may order to be removed. All matter and materials herein, above required to be removed, shall be disposed of, sold, or deposited in such places, and in such manner, that they shall not be offensive or injurious to the public health.

Sec. 2. Section fifth of chapter 677 of the Laws of 1872 is hereby amended so as to read as fol-

§ 5. The said Board of Police is hereby authorized to contract for the sale of street manure, dirt, sweepings, ashes, and garbage, or either of them, to any person or persons, for such price or prices as to them shall seem beneficial to the City, on condition that the same be promptly removed, and so disposed of as not to be offensive nor detrimental to public health; and also to enter into contracts with responsible parties, either in separate districts, or for the entire City, for cleaning the streets, and collecting and removing to

And said Board of Police shall also have power, on like specifications, stipulations, and conditions, to enter into a contract or contracts with responsible persons to remove the whole or, any portion of the sons to remove the whole or any portion of the product of street cleaning from the dumps of the Department, and to dispose of and place the same when, where, and so stipulated and agreed between the parties to the contract, which contracts shall be for a period not longer than one year, and shall contain conditions as above stated for the abrogation of same in manner and with like effect as above provided. All moneys received under this section shall be paid over to the Chamberlain, and copies of all contracts made under this section shall be filed in the Finance

Department of the City.

Sec. 3. The Board of Police shall be authorized to expend in removing snow and ice or either of them in their discretion such sum of money or any part of such sum of money as shall by com-

any part of such sum of money as shall by competent authority and in pursuance of law be assessed, levied, raised, and appropriated for the removal of snow and ice, or either of them, and no greater or other sum of money.

Sec. 4. Contracts made in pursuance of this act shall be awarded to the lowest bidder, who shall be, in the judgment of the Board of Police. competent and responsible for the performance and fulfillment of such contracts; and in all cases notices for sealed proposal for such contracts shall be advertised for ten days in the CITY RECORD and five other daily papers; which proposals shall be publicly opened before the full Board, and the contracts shall only be awarded by the Board, by the unanimous vote of all the members thereof, to be taken by ayes and nayes, and re-

corded in the minutes.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

ordinance are hereby repealed.

ing charge of each house or other building, or lot or lots of ground in the City of New York, shall, within the first four hours after every fall of snow, or hail, or rain, which shall freeze on the sideor half, or rain, which shall neeze on the stde-walks and in the gutters, cause the same to be removed entirely from off the sidewalks opposite such house, building, lot, or land, under the pen-alty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be any of three donars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, occupant, or person having charge, severally and respectively.

"§ 16. In case the ice or snow shall be so congealed that it cannot be removed without injury

gealed that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, the owner, occupant, or person having charge of any building, lot, or land as aforesaid, shall, within the first four hours after every fall thereof, cause the sidewalks opposite his, her, or their premises to be strewed with ashes or sand, under the penalty of one dollar, to be paid by the owner or occupant, or person hav-ing charge thereof, severally and respectively."

OPINION OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION.

The recent constitutional amendment (section rt of article 8) providing, among other things, that no city shall give any money in aid of any corporation, does not prohibit the payment by the City to the Metropolitan Museum of Art of such sums as may be appropriated for the keeping, preservation, and exhibition to the public of the collections contained in the Library of Art and in the Museum

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, New York, February 19, 1875.

Hon, Andrew H. Green, Comptroller:

SIR-I have received and considered your letter of the 16th instant, inclosing a resolution of the Department of Public Parks making requisition for the sum of \$15,000 for the keeping, preservation, and exhibition of collections during the year 1875, to be applied for those purposes by the Metropolitan Museum of Art. The Museum being a body corporate, created by statute, and the collections contained in the Museum and Library of Art being the property of such body corporate, and not of the City, the question is submitted by you whether the payment of this sum is prohibited by section 11 of article 8 of the Constitution, as recently amended.

The section referred to provides, among other things, that no city shall give any money in aid of any corporation. It is true that the collections mentioned by you are the property of the corporation known as the Metropolitan Museum of Art. It appears, however, that the City and the public have a special interest in the keeping, preservation, and exhibition of these collections quite irrespective of the property and interest of the Museum.

By referring to chapter 756, of the Laws of 1873, and to the Act of 1871 (chapter 290), providing for the erection of buildings in the Central Park wherein these collections are to be ultimately kept and established, it appears that public buildings are now in process of erection for the City in which the collections of this museum are to be permanently exhibited for the benefit of the public under such rules and regulations as the Department of Public Parks shall prescribe. To provide in part for their preservation and exhibition in the meantime, the Legislature, by the Act of 1873, has directed, that the City shall, through the Department of Public Parks, and in their discretion, appropriate not to exceed \$30,000 a year for the keeping, preservation, and exhibition of the collections of this Museum and others which are to be placed in the buildings provided for by the former act. Whatever incidental advantage it may be to the Metropolitan Museum of of Art itself, that these collections should be preserved, it is clear that the public have a substantial and independent interest in their keeping, preservation, and exhibition. The expense of such keeping, preservation, and exhibition is provided for by law and by the appropriation made by the Commissioners of Public Parks, whose resolution is before me.

This statement and discrimination of the facts conducts to the true answer to the inquiry which I am called upon to consider. The appropriation is public in its nature, object, and effect, and clearly, in my opinion, it is not prohibited nor embarrassed by the provision of the Amended Constitution which you have cited.
