The plan, as submitted, shows the following changes:
1st. To change the grade of Creston avenue, between East One Hundred and Ninetieth street and Kingsbridge road, and establish new grades in Morris avenue, from East One Hundred and Ninetieth creek to St. James place, and from East One Hundred and Ninety-bird street to Kingsbridge road. oth.
