MINUTES, LOCAL BOARD OF MORRISANIA, TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Locating and laying out Cambreling avenue, from Grote street to East One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

Petition of Tremont Land Company, by Jacob Leitner, was read. No one appeared in opposition to the proposed improvement.

Laid over and referred to the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx for his estimate of the cost of the proposed work and a statement of the assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment.

#### No. 227.

Sewer and appurtenances, East One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, between Moravenue and Park avenue.

Petition of Philip Freudenmacher was read. The report of the Chief Engineer

was to the effect that this sewer would not accomplish the purpose the petitioner had in view; that is, the relieving of the intersection of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street and Morris avenue from the overflow of surface water, and recommending that

certain receiving-basins be constructed in that vicinity.

The petition for sewer was consequently denied. Matter of receiving-basins ordered advertised for meeting to be held September 18, 1902.

Regulating and grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences, where necessary, in Johnson avenue, from Spuyten Duyvil parkway to Spuyten Duyvil road, and in Spuyten Duyvil road, from Johnson avenue to West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, at Riverdale avenue. Petition of Estate of Isaac G. Johnson, by Elias N. Johnson, trustee, was read. Mr. Clarence C. Ferris appeared as attorney for B. J. Berrian, in opposition, stating that the owners of property were of the opinion that they should be compensated first for the land taken for said avenue. He also stated that he believed that West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street should also be graded at the same time as Johnson avenue and Spuyten Duyvil road, and also any other streets on the Spuyten Duyvil Hill that it might be practicable to grade at one time.

William Riley also appeared and stated that the owners believed that they should be paid their awards before the regulating and grading was undertaken.

Mr. John J. McKelvey appeared for the Johnson estate, in favor of the improvement, and stated that they owned a majority of the frontage along the line of the proposed improvement.

All walls running around pent house will be carried up to proper height.

Floors will be made of cement.

Wire glass will be used wherever glass is necessary.

Proper skylights will be provided.

Appeal No. 252 of 1902, Alteration No. 1250 of 1902, No. 39 Rutgers street, Manhattan, William B. Tuthill, Esq., architect and appellant.

It is intended to use the building as an industrial school, and permission is

asked to do this, although the building is somewhat more than the legal height,

The height of the third story (top floor) above ground is 29 feet, and although the legal height of the structure as it exists is 40 feet 6 inches, measured according to the Building Code, a large proportion of the excess is in an unusable roof space. The distance traveled by the scholars in getting out of the building is slight, and would not be varied by making the building fireproof. A school fire escape has already been provided, in accordance with a permit received from the Bureau of Buildings.

Mr. William B. Tuthill, architect, and Mrs. Weeks, representing the society, appeared before the Board.

appeared before the Board. On motion, laid over.

Appeal No. 253 of 1902, Alteration No. B369 of 1902, Bronx, Nos. 968, 970 and 972 Southern Boulevard, Herrm. Horenburger, Esq., architect and appellant.

It was intended to place one freight elevator, running from the floor of first story to the second story. Size of the freight elevator platform 7 feet 2½ inches by 4 feet 4 inches; carrying capacity, 1,500 pounds. Framing for hatchway in second story floor will consist of two spruce beams 3 inches by 12 inches, spiked together, thus forming the trimmers; the headers will consist of 3-inch by 12-inch spruce beams, also spiked together and to be hung in bridle irons, as required by law. The machinery under third tier of beams will be supported by suitable frame work.

The hatch in second foor will be provided with automatic self closing and opening hatchway covers.

ing hatchway covers.

Respectfully ask that the above form of construction be allowed, on the ground that it is equally as good and more desirable in this case than that required by law, in that the elevator is for connecting only the two floors, as stated, and not to extend all through the building, and is only to be used for transferring goods.

Mr. Horenburger appeared before the Board.

Appeal No. 254 of 1902, New Building No. 380 of 1902, One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, west of Third avenue, Bronx, Messrs. Hamilton & Mercereau, architects and appellants.

The building is 50 by 115, and under the technical reading of the law should

have three stairways.

We have two stairways arranged at the front of the building and these each have

we have two starways arranged at the front of the building and these each have a separate entrance or door to street.

The fire escape at the rear we have changed to make same virtually an exterior stairway, and the platforms are made four feet wide and take in two windows on each story, as indicated by the drawings. The stairs are two feet wide, have wide cast-iron treads and strings and railings, being placed at the outer edge of platforms and thus two feet away from wall, and stairs extended over the wire-glass glazed skylight to area wall of extension, to point where a light drop ladder will properly reach the ground at rear.

reach the ground at rear.

The exits are thus well scattered and fully provide for safety of the occupants of the building, and the sense and spirit of the law being thus complied with we respectfully ask that this fire escape as thus arranged be considered and approved as the third stairway.

Appeal No. 255 of 1902, New Building No. 463 of 1902, northeast corner University place and Eleventh street, Manhattan, G. Starrett, Esq., architect and appel-

lant.

The law requires four stairways in this building, but as each floor is to be rented as a whole, or in two sections, with no partitions to obstruct the free access to the stairs, we consider that the arrangement shown, together with the fire escapes, is sufficient in case of fire. We, therefore, ask to be allowed to put in three stairways, in accordance with the accompanying sketch, instead of four, as the fourth stairway would materially interfere with the purposes for which the building is to be used.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the rerson making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other persons be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless
