A communication was presented from the Commissioners of Accounts, dated August 5, requesting to be informed as to the eligibility of a number of persons employed in that Department for an increase in salary without examination. The letter was referred to the President for consideration.

The request of the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, under date of August 4, for authority to appoint provisionally to the position of Stationary Engineman pending the establishment of the new eligible list, was granted, and the Chief Examiner was instructed to hold a non-competitive examination for that purpose.

The leave of absence, without pay, from July 22 to September 10, granted Dr. Stanley H. McGillivray, Medical Inspector in the Department of Health, was approved, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the said leave of absence was granted because of illness.

The Assistant Secretary was instructed to arrange a public hearing on the proposed amendment in accordance with Civil Service Rule III., to be held on September 6 at 10 a. m.

A communication was presented from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, dated July 31, requesting that the reassignment to duty of Anthony Grogan, Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry, be approved as of June 1. The Assistant Secretary stated that Mr. Grogan had been granted a leave of absence without pay for three months from April 1, 1905, by the head of his Department, on account of illness, but that the approval of the Civil Service Commission was not obtained in accordance with Rule XIII.; that Mr. Grogan, having recovered from his illness, was reassigned to duty on June 1 by Superintendent Hopper, but that his pay-roll could not be passed when presented for the reason that the Commission had not approved such reassignment. A communication was presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated August 3, stating that one Edward T. Healy, of No. 324 Baltic street, Brooklyn, had been dismissed from the position of Attendant, for the reason that it had been discovered, upon investigation, that he had obtained his appointment in an irregular manner and by misrepresentations, he having impersonated John T. Second—Does the eligible list established as a result of said examination take precedence in any manner over the existing eligible list for Fireman in the Fire Department?

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Park Board, dated June 12, in answer to the request of the Commission for further information regarding the case of William Ward, a veteran, whom the Department desired to transfer from the position of Foreman of Laborers to Janitor. The communication stated that the duties of a Foreman of Laborers required greater activity than Mr. Ward at his advanced age and in his physical condition was equal to; that the indoor occupation of Janitor was one to which he was better suited in his present physical condition, and that the consideration to which the veteran laws entitle him and appreciation of his faithful services were the basis for the request. After a consideration of the statements made in the communication referred to, also a certificate from Dr. William H. Upton, Mr. Ward's physician, and a certificate of veteranship, the Commission granted the request.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Park Board, dated August 9, requesting, in the absence of an eligible list for Keeper of Menagerie, that the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, be authorized to make a provisional appointment to that position. The request was granted, and the Assistant Secretary was instructed to proceed with the holding of an open competitive examination for Keeper of Menagerie.

The leave of absence without pay granted Mr. James J. Munro, Examiner in the Department of Finance, for six months from June 1, was approved, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the same was granted because of illness.

Frederick Thompson, from the position of Rodman in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Timothy S. Hanley, from the position of Attendant in the Department of Docks and Ferries to a similar position in the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The recommendation of the Committee on Transfers was adopted.

After a careful consideration of the matter the Commission ruled that said increases were illegal, as they placed the employee, in each case, in the grade next higher than the one in which he was serving at the time of the increase, which, under the Civil Service rules, could only be allowed after a promotion examination.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, the increases in salary allowed the aforesaid employees being contrary to law, the Assistant Secretary is hereby instructed to communicate with the heads of their respective departments, stating that said persons must be put back in their proper grades, the salaries paid to them improperly at the end of July to be deducted from their August pay-rolls.

It further appearing that the transfer of Mr. John J. Corrigan from the position of Clerk with salary at \$1,500 per annum in the Department of Finance to a similar position in the Department of Bridges, which transfer was approved by the Commission on July 28, 1905, was illegal, for the reason that Mr. Corrigan was not entitled to an increase in salary to \$1,500 per annum at the time of his transfer, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the transfer of John J. Corrigan from the position of Clerk with salary at \$1,500 per annum, in the Department of Finance, to the position of Clerk, with salary at \$1,500 per annum, in the Department of Bridges, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

The President reported on the communication from the Commissioners of Accounts, dated August 5, which was referred to him for consideration at the meeting of August 11, that the following-named employees of that Department:

—were eligible to an increase in salary from \$1,800 to \$1,950, from \$1,500 to \$1,650, and from \$1,800 to \$1,950, respectively, without further examination, it appearing that in each case the candidate remained within the maximum salary attached to his present grade.

On motion, the Assistant Secretary was instructed to pass the pay-rolls of the aforesaid employees at the increased rate.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated August 11, stating that the rating in the examination for Superintendent of Ponds and Reservoirs had been completed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for the position of Superintendent of Ponds and Reservoirs be and the same is hereby established by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and the Secretary is hereby directed to certify from same in answer to requisitions for eligibles for appointment to that position.

A report was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated August 14, on the communication addressed to the Commission by Commissioner Woodbury with reference to the appointment of Henry Broh, a Driver in his Department. It appeared from the report of the Labor Clerk that said Henry Broh had been impersonated in the Department of Street Cleaning by another person who had obtained the appointment illegally through misrepresentations, and that the Commissioner of Street Cleaning was satisfied, after an investigation of the matter, that the said Broh was aware of such impersonation. After a consideration of the statements contained in the report of the Labor Clerk, on motion, it was

Resolved, That, it appearing to the satisfaction of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, from information supplied by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, that Henry Broh, applicant for the position of Driver, was aware of the fact that he was being impersonated in that Department, the Assistant Secretary is hereby instructed to communicate with the said Commissioner of Street Cleaning and request that the name of Henry Broh be immediately stricken from the roster of his Department.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated August 3, requesting approval of a leave of absence for three months, without pay, from July 1, 1905, granted John C. Weiler, Rodman, on account of ill health. The leave of absence was not approved for the reason that the certificate furnished was not satisfactory to the Commission.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated August 2, requesting approval of a leave of absence, without pay, from July 19 to September 1, 1905, granted Miss E. Althea Duke, Stenographer and Typewriter, on account of illness. It appearing from the certificate furnished that the leave of absence was granted because the said employee was suffering from illness, the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, dated August 4, in answer to a communication from the Commission, asking for a report on the complaint of the Civil Service Reform Association that Laborers in his Department were being assigned to Gardener's work. Commissioner Schrader stated in his communication that, upon investigation, he had found that it had been the custom of the Department to assign Laborers to assist the Gardeners in the performance of their duties, such work consisting of the necessary manual labor, such as digging holes for the planting of trees, shrubs and plants, and cleaning up after said planting; that such Laborers were formerly entitled "Assistant Gardeners," but that, on December 26, 1903, the Municipal Civil Service Commission changed the title of all Assistant Gardeners to that of "Park Laborer"; that among such employees were John McGrahan and Thomas Miller, the men mentioned in the communication from the Reform Association; that they are in no sense Gardeners, but perform the work of Park Laborers, as before indicated. The Commissioner's explanation being satisfactory to the Commission, the letter was ordered filed, and the Assistant Secretary was instructed to transmit a copy of same to the Civil Service Reform Association.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, dated August 10, in answer to the request of the Commission for a report on the complaint of the Civil Service Reform Association against the employment of one John F. Walsh, Jr., a Gardener, to perform the duties of Head Gardener. In his communication the Commissioner stated that at no time had Mr. Walsh performed the duties of a Head Gardener; that a vacancy existed in that position, and that it was his intention to request the Commission to hold an examination for promotion in order that same might be filled at some future date.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York, dated August 14, requesting authority to make a provisional appointment to the position of Office Boy, pending the establishment of the new eligible list. The request was granted, and the Chief Examiner was instructed to proceed with the necessary non-competitive examination to qualify the person nominated by the Department for employment until such time as a selection can be made from the eligible list.

A communication was presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated August 7, with reference to the complaint of the Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic, Borough of Brooklyn, to the effect that Mr. Franklin Ryder, a veteran, who is employed as a Watchman in the Borough Hall, is obliged to perform the duties of a Cleaner. The Acting President stated in his communication that Mr. Ryder was not required to perform duties other than those which an ordinary Watchman should be willing to do without complaint; that he is required, as are the other Watchmen, to occasionally close the windows in the evening to avoid any possible damage to the building or its contents as a result of a sudden rainfall during the night, etc.; that, as a survivor of the War of the Rebellion, the Department has desired to show every consideration to Mr. Ryder, and that, according to the best information it is able to secure, he had not been directed or requested to perform any duties inconsistent with the ordinary requirements of a Watchman. After a consideration of the matter, the Assistant Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn and state that the Commission entirely agreed with his construction of the duties of a Watchman, and that it considered the complaint of the Secretary of the Grand Army of the Republic entirely without merit.

A communication was presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated August 7, requesting approval of his action in rescinding the dismissal of Mr. H. B. Wingrove from the position of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, on December 8, 1904. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated August 12, transmitting a report from his Superintendent of Sewers in answer to the complaint of the Civil Service Reform Association against the employment of Mr. James DuBois as Foreman Dockbuilder in the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn. The report of the Superintendent of Sewers stated that a sewer was being constructed at the foot of Seventy-ninth street, Brooklyn, upon which work James DuBois was employed as a Foreman of Dockbuilders; that the nature of the work was sheet piling and bearing piles wherein and whereupon a sewer was to be supported; that the employment of a competent Dockbuilder upon that class of work was entirely necessary, as the same called for expert knowledge of a special kind rather than that possessed by Inspectors of Sewer Construction. The Assistant Secretary was instructed to forward a copy of the said report to the Civil Service Reform Association, with the statement that the Commission considered the employment of Mr. DuBois in no way a violation of the Civil Service rules.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated August 4, transmitting a report of the Superintendent of Highways on the com-

plaint of Reinhard Deibel, a veteran, to the effect that he had been discriminated against in the matter of employment. The report of the Superintendent stated that the records of his office showed that from March 12 to the present time, Mr. Deibel had been employed steadily, with the exception of a few days which were lost by all the men in the same Department because of the inclemency of the weather; that his orders to all Inspectors and Foremen in charge of the men in his Department were that all veterans must be given preference and kept at work whenever there is any reason for laying off only part of the gang. The Assistant Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Deibel, and state that the Commission was of the opinion that his protest was without merit.

A communication was presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond, dated August 11, requesting that an examination for promotion from Driver to Messenger in his department be held. The request was granted, and the Chief Examiner was instructed to proceed with same in due course, notifying all drivers who had served as such in the department for a period of three years that they are eligible to compete.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the Fire Department, dated August 8, requesting authority to appoint four Architectural Draughtsmen for a period of three months, there being a temporary need for such services in that department. The Assistant Secretary stated that he had certified the names remaining on the eligible list for Architectural Draughtsman, and that no person was willing to accept a temporary appointment. He was instructed to request the Chief Examiner to conduct a non-competitive examination to qualify four persons nominated by the Fire Department for temporary employment as Architectural Draughtsmen in said department.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated August 7, transmitting a communication from Dr. Leo Jacobi, formerly a Medical Inspector in that department, requesting that his name be restored to the eligible list for Medical Inspector, he having resigned under the misapprehension that his name would remain on said list. The Assistant Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Secretary of the Department of Health, and state that there is no provision in the Civil Service Rules allowing the name of a person who has resigned from the City service to be restored to the eligible list from which he was appointed.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, requesting that Mr. John Delson be given a non-competitive examination to qualify him for a provisional appointment to the position of Apothecary, pending the establishment of an eligible list for that position. The Assistant Secretary was instructed to communicate with Secretary Scheffer, and state that as Mr. Delson had just completed a provisional appointment of sixty days in his department under the title "Laboratory Attendant," he could not again be certified for a provisional appointment within the next three months.

The report of the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class in the Department of Health, dated August 1, was approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated August 11, requesting that, in view of the fact that the Board of Health is composed of three members, and that the Secretary is authorized to keep an official record of the proceedings of the Board and make official announcements of same, all communications transmitted to the Commission over his signature be considered of as much force as though signed by the President or either of the other members. The Assistant Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Scheffer and inform him that his request was granted.

A communication was presented from the Queens Borough Library, dated August 14, requesting that the Commission hold an open competitive examination for Junior Assistant Librarian. There being but one name on the eligible list for that position, the Assistant Secretary was instructed to proceed with open competitive examination for the same.

A communication was presented from the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, dated August 8, requesting that an examination for promotion from the third to the fourth grade be held for Clerks in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears, the duties of the Clerks in that bureau being dissimilar from those of any other bureau in the Department of Finance. On motion, the President was requested to communicate with the Corporation Counsel and ask his opinion as to whether the Commission had the power to limit a promotion examination to one bureau in a department.

A communication was presented from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated July 20, requesting that the eligible list for promotion to Assistant Engineer, announced on July 17, 1905, be divided into bureau lists. The matter was laid over, pending the receipt of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Correction, dated August 14, asking approval of his action in rescinding the dismissal of James A. Divers from the position of Keeper on April 3, 1905. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, requesting approval of a bill for services rendered by a temporary Engineman employed by him from June 24 to July 25. It appearing that there was an eligible list in the office of the Commission from which an appointment should have been made, the request was denied for lack of power.

The request of Henry J. Brown, No. 323 East Forty-fifth street, for a special examination for Patrolman, on the ground that he did not receive the notice sent him for the general examination, was denied, it appearing from the records of the office that a notice was mailed to Mr. Brown and that the same was not returned to the Commission's office by the Post Office authorities.

The request of Boris Levitt, No. 637 St. Ann's avenue, under date of July 25, that he be restored to eligibility for appointment to the position of Transitman in the Aqueduct Commission, was granted, it appearing that he had been appointed on June 20, 1905, but was unable to accept the position owing to serious illness in his family, and his appointment was cancelled by the Department.

A communication was presented from J. M. Saulpaugh, No. 706 East Twelfth street, under date of August 4, with reference to Frank Von Diezelski, Jr., candidate for Patrolman, alleging that the candidate had been dismissed from his service for unsatisfactory character. The Assistant Secretary was directed to communicate with Mr. Saulpaugh and request that he furnish the Commission with more specific information in the matter if the same was in his possession.

The appeal of Isaac Streep, M. D., candidate for Medical Clerk, under date of August 7, for a rerating of his examination papers, was denied on the recommendation of the Chief Examiner, it appearing that the said appeal did not come within the provisions of Civil Service Rule IX.

A communication was presented from William Muschel, No. 104 East Fourth street, dated August 5, requesting the Commission to reconsider its action of August 2 in declining to restore him to eligibility for appointment to the position of Rodman in the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission at a salary of \$960 per annum, and explaining that his reason for declining to accept the appointment at that salary on June 13, 1905, was because the services were to be performed on the tunnel under the East river, where the atmospheric pressure was excessive and his health would not permit of his accepting the position. In view of the statement made by Mr. Muschel, his request was granted.

A communication was presented from Isadore Gluck, Rodman in the Bureau of Highways, Richmond, dated July 31, requesting that his name be placed on the eligible list for promotion to Leveler in that bureau. It appeared that the candidate was permitted to enter the examination, but was subsequently informed that his name could not be placed on the eligible list for the reason that he had not been six months in the grade of Rodman at the time of the examination. It appearing, however, that the list was not promulgated until July 17, 1905, at which time the candidate had been seven months in the grade of Rodman, the request was granted.

A communication was presented from W. H. Messenger, No. 23 West One Hundred and Nineteenth street, dated August 7, requesting that he be again certified to the Aqueduct Commission for appointment to the position of Transitman and Computer at \$1,500 per annum. It appearing from his communication that when he declined appointment at that sum it was not so much on the score of the salary offered as that the services were to be rendered at Katonah, N. Y., where he would be obliged to reside, the request was granted.

A communication was presented from Mr. Conrad T. Rosell, Roundsman, Eighty-first Precinct, Police Department, asking for information regarding the qualifications to be required in the coming examination for promotion to Sergeant. The Assistant

Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Rosell and state that all conditions of the examination will be announced when the date for same is set.

The request of William J. Coyle, No. 244 Gold street, Brooklyn, that his name be transferred from the eligible list for Court Attendant, Borough of The Bronx, to that for the Borough of Brooklyn, was granted, it appearing from his communication that he had changed his address from No. 888 Prospect avenue, Borough of The Bronx, to No. 244 Gold street, Borough of Brooklyn.

A communication was presented from Joseph B. Mullin, No. 498 Herkimer street, Brooklyn, dated August 1, stating that his notice of examination for the position of Inspector of Light and Ventilation was not received, and requesting, in view of that fact, that he be granted a special examination. It appearing that the notice was mailed by the Record Clerk and that the same was never returned to the office by the postoffice authorities, the request was denied.

The request of Henri Monrouval, Wardwell and Leonard avenues, Prohibition Park, Staten Island, that he be restored to eligibility for appointment to the position of Transitman at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, was denied, it appearing that the candidate declined appointment in the Borough of Richmond at that salary on February 15, 1905, on the score of "insufficient compensation."

The request of J. J. Tobin, No. 14 Moffatt street, Brooklyn, under date of August 7, for a rerating of his examination for Inspector of Light and Ventilation was denied on the recommendation of the Chief Examiner, it appearing that Mr. Tobin's appeal did not come within the provisions of Civil Service Rule IX.

A communication was presented from Mr. Franklyn E. Gedney, No. 290 Grand street, Brooklyn, dated August 11, stating that he was prevented from attending the examination for Inspector of Incumbrances because of illness in his family, and requesting a special examination. The request was denied for lack of power.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, under date of August 15, requesting the Commission to co-operate with that association in calling the attention of civil employees to the stringent provisions of the Civil Service Law in regard to political assessments or requests for contributions to be used for political purposes. The letter was ordered filed, and the Assistant Secretary was instructed to post a copy of the said provisions in the Commission's office.

An affidavit was presented from Henry C. Muller, Stapleton, New York, under date of August 3, setting forth that his name, as it appeared on his application for Laborer was incorrect, and requesting that he be permitted to correct the same. The request was granted.

The Commission then adjourned, subject to the call of the President.

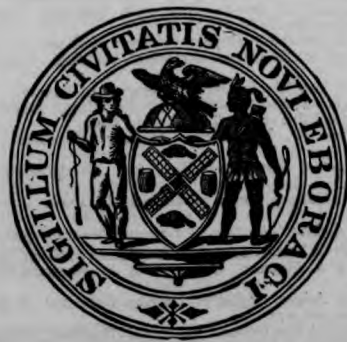

TAXPAYERS WHO DESIRE TO OBTAIN their bills promptly should make immediate written requisition (blanks may be procured in the borough offices), stating their property by Section or Ward, Block and Lot or Map number, making copy of same from their bills of last year.

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Avenue M and distant 100 feet easterly of the easterly side of East Nineteenth street; running thence southerly with East Nineteenth street 100 feet; running thence westerly and parallel with Avenue M to the centre line of the block between East Eighteenth street and East Nineteenth street; running thence northerly and along the centre line of the blocks between East Eighteenth street and East Nineteenth street to a point distant 100 feet northerly of the northerly side of Foster avenue; running thence northeasterly and parallel with Foster avenue to a line drawn parallel with East Nineteenth street and distant 100 feet easterly therefrom; running thence southerly parallel with East Nineteenth street and distant 100 feet easterly therefrom to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 4th day of December, 1905, at the opening of the Court on that day.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
