Office of the Central Federated Union, University Settlement Building, No. 184 Eldridge Street, New York, March 20, 1906.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—By direction of the Central Federated Union, I transmit the following resolution which has been adopted unanimously.

"Whereas, It would be a great benefit and advantage to all those using street cars in this City that the lines now operated by the old-fashioned horse-power be changed so as to be operated by the modern electric power, as such change will result in the saving of much time in going to and coming from their work; and

"Whereas, The actual change of the tracks used by street car lines and the equipment of said lines with new and suitable cars would result in the giving of much work to a number of persons engaged in various trades; be it

"Resolved, By the Central Federated Union that the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York be and hereby is requested to pass a resolution calling on the proper street railroad companies to make the changes above referred to and to take such other steps as will result in the change from the old-fashioned horse car line to that of the modern electric lines; and be it further

"Resolved, That the attention of said Board of Aldermen be and hereby is especially directed to the following lines as being those on which the change should first be made in the Borough of Manhattan: The Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth Street Lines; the East and West Side Belt Lines, and the Dry Dock System."

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 28, 1906, in reference to the establishment of a station at about One Hundred and Twenty-second street and Broadway.

At One Hundred and Twenty-second street the Rapid Transit Railroad runs out of the subway construction into an open cut as it approaches the viaduct. It is impracticable to construct a station at this point without encroaching seriously upon the roadway of the street either side of the portal.

A station might be constructed at One Hundred and Twenty-first street under the street surface, or at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street over the roadway. In the former case, however, such station would be too near the One Hundred and Sixteenth street station, within four blocks, and in the latter case too near the present Manhattan station, within three blocks. One Hundred and Twenty-first street would also be particularly objectionable as a point for the location of a station, because the subway tracks are descending approximately on a 2 per cent. grade at this point; in consequence of this it would be difficult to stop and start the trains properly.

In conclusion therefore, in my opinion, it is impracticable to construct any additional subway station between the One Hundred and Sixteenth and Manhattan street stations.

Whereas, The Board of Education has requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to recommend to the Board of Aldermen its application for an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$1,050,000 to reimburse Corporate Stock account to the amount of \$550,000, and to provide for a possible deficiency of \$500,000 in the General Repairs Accounts of the Special School Fund, 1906; and

Whereas, A Select Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, have made examination into the facts concerning the said application of the Board of Education; and

Whereas, The said Select Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have requested the Corporation Counsel to prepare and cause to be introduced in the Legislature, in behalf of The City of New York, a bill to enable the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$1,050,000 for the purposes above specified; and

Whereas, There are now outstanding and unpaid claims against the City to the amount of \$80,000 for goods furnished and services rendered during the year 1905 by persons acting in good faith and at the request of the Board of Education; be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby requests the Board of Aldermen to adopt a resolution calling for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$80,000, to be applied to the payment of said claims for goods furnished and services rendered, as aforesaid, during the year 1905, but to the payment of no other indebtedness.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The undersigned, a Select Committee appointed by your Honorable Board at the meeting held on March 16, 1906, to consider the subject matter of a communication from the Board of Education requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to recommend to the Board of Aldermen an issue of Special Revenue Bonds for \$1,050,000, find that of the said amount \$550,000 is asked for to be applied in substitution for an issue of Corporate Stock for the same amount authorized by the Board of Aldermen January 17, 1905, and for the further purpose of anticipating a deficit in the Special School Fund, General Repairs Accounts, 1906, the estimate of the Board of Education for this item having been reduced \$500,000 in the allowance made in the annual Budget.

Your Committee have examined into the facts in connection with this situation and find that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in 1904, in considering the departmental estimates for Budget purposes, after a conference with representatives of the Board of Education, appropriated the full amount asked for by the Board of Education for repairs to school buildings, but, basing their action upon information to the effect that certain of the contemplated repairs might properly be regarded as permanent betterments, allowed \$550,000 of the amount in Corporate Stock (see section 47 of the Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904), the balance, \$641,126.40 being included in the annual tax Budget for the year 1905.

In November of 1905 a number of small claims for repair work, ranging from \$1 to \$500 in amount, were transmitted to the Finance Department for audit and payment. Upon examination of these claims by Mr. Francis R. Clair, Auditor of Accounts, it was found that the character of the work performed, as described in the bills accompanying the claims, was not such as should be charged to Corporate Stock, as directed by the Auditor of the Board of Education. Hon. Edward M. Grout, former Comptroller, then caused an examination to be made, the result of which is fully set forth in the report of the Investigations Division, Department of Finance, dated December 28, 1905, which was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the meeting held December 29, 1905. Copies of said report and subsequent correspondence had between the Comptroller and the Board of Education relating to the matter may be found attached to this report.

From the said report of December 28, 1905, it appears that the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in 1904 in making allowance for repairs to school buildings to be made during 1905 partly out of Appropriation Account and partly out of Corporate Stock Account, was in error, and probably based upon a misapprehension of the facts. As no question was raised as to the propriety of charging the cost of repairs of the character described to the Corporate Stock issue provided by the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment until November, 1905, similar action was taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with regard to the estimate of the Board of Education for general repairs for 1906, when the 1906 Budget was prepared in October, 1905.

Your Committee are of the opinion that the General Repairs Accounts of the Board of Education for 1905 should be reimbursed to the extent of \$550,000, so that the moneys thus far expended from Corporate Stock Account for these purposes may be ascertained and restitution made to the Corporate Stock Account to this amount, and, further, that an allowance should be made to the Board of Education for General Repairs, 1906, in whatever amount may appear to be necessary. To this end your Committee have requested the Corporation Counsel to prepare, in behalf of the City, a bill for presentation in the Legislature enabling the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount asked for, this issue to in no wise affect the provisions of section 188, subdivision 8 of the Charter, which places a limitation of \$2,000,000 upon the amount of Special Revenue Bonds to be issued in one year.

In the meantime, in order that the claims of contractors, builders and others who have rendered service to the Board of Education, accepting the orders of said Board in absolute good faith, may be liquidated, we hereby recommend that the Board of Aldermen be forthwith requested to pass a resolution favoring an issue of Special Revenue Bonds, as provided in section 188, subdivision 8, of the Charter, to the amount of \$80,000, a schedule of the unpaid claims of the Department of Education for General Repairs, 1905, submitted to the Comptroller on January 24, 1906, by Hon. Henry N. Tiff, President of the Board of Education, showing that approximately that amount is now due said contractors, builders and others.

We would respectfully urge that prompt action be taken in this matter in common justice to the parties who furnished material and rendered services to the City during 1905, many of whom have submitted evidences of the fact that they are on the verge of financial distress by reason of the withholding of the moneys due them.

Reports of Committee on Salaries and Offices—

No. 372—(G. O. 65).

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to whom was referred on March 6, 1906 (Minutes, page 943), the annexed resolution in favor of fixing salary of Male Probation Officer, Court of Special Sessions, at \$1,500 per annum, respectfully

REPORT:

That Magistrate Zeller appeared before the committee in support of the resolution and stated that it was the desire of the court to promote to the position as an employee of the City a gentleman who has heretofore acted as Probation Officer in that court as an employee of the Children's Aid Society. He stated that the position was an important one and the duties onerous and that better service would probably be secured if the Probation Officer of the court became a City employee. Mr. Culkin, the Clerk of the Court, in response to inquiries, advised the Committee that Mr. Graver was not a City pensioner and had never held a salaried office under the City government and would sever his connection with the Children's Aid Society and all other societies.

The Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the resolution.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held March 2, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

REPORT:

That the committee has considered the matters referred to in said introductory numbers and, believing that the same require no further consideration, the committee asks to be discharged therefrom, and that said matters be placed on file.

Whereas, Studebaker Brothers Company of New York, between the 30th day of April, 1904, and the 2d day of August, 1904, sold and delivered certain merchandise to the Department of Parks of The City of New York, Borough of The Bronx, without obtaining contract for same after competitive bidding; and

Whereas, It appears that said merchandise was furnished upon the verbal orders of William P. Schmidt, at that time Park Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx, and were in excess of the allowance made to such Commissioner by section 618 of the Charter of The City of New York; and

Whereas, The merchandise furnished was exactly as ordered, and was reasonably worth four hundred and twenty-five dollars and forty cents (\$425.40), and was duly received by the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Parks of the Borough of The Bronx be and hereby is authorized to pay to Studebaker Brothers Company of New York the said sum of four hundred and twenty-five dollars and forty cents (\$425.40), the reasonable value of the goods furnished as aforesaid to the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx.

Whereas, It is the policy of most of the large cities of this State and of the United States to exact by ordinance the payment of a license fee from every person conducting the business of a public auctioneer within their respective boundaries, including the agents and servants of such auctioneers who conduct such business for and in the place of such auctioneers, as instanced by the cities mentioned in the schedule hereto annexed; and

Whereas, Such policy is just and equitable in view of the privileges and immunities enjoyed by such public auctioneers; and

Whereas, The City of New York has no general ordinance requiring the payment of a license fee by persons conducting such business in said city; and

Whereas, It is desirable that ways and means should be provided for enabling the City government of The City of New York to meet its constantly increasing expenditures;

Resolved, That the Committee on Laws and Legislation is requested to consider with care the accompanying proposed ordinance and to report its conclusions to the Board with all convenient speed.

AN ORDINANCE for the licensing of public auctioneers in The City of New York, Amendatory of Article XXIII. of the Revised Ordinances, and title 1, section 1, of the General Ordinances.

Be it Ordained, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: That from on and after the 1st day of May, 1906, no person shall conduct the business of a public auctioneer at any place within The City of New York, nor shall the agents or servants of such auctioneers conduct such business for or on behalf of such auctioneers, or transact any such business, until they, and each of them, have procured a license, as hereinafter provided, to wit:

Every person conducting the business of a public auctioneer of goods, wares or merchandise (not including an auctioneer of real estate or any class of public vendors heretofore required to be licensed), shall procure a license, and pay therefor \$50, for the privilege of conducting such business for a period of one year thereafter.

Every auctioneer of real estate shall procure a license, and pay therefor \$25, for the privilege of conducting the business of a real estate auctioneer for a period of one year thereafter.

Every agent or servant of any such public auctioneer who shall conduct the business of a public auctioneer for and in the place of his principal or employer, shall procure a license, and pay therefor \$10, for the privilege of conducting such business as such agent or servant for the period of one year thereafter.

Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a penalty of \$10 for every such offense, to be sued for and recovered from the seller, auctioneer or his agent, severally and respectively.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of the foregoing section are hereby repealed.

Birmingham, Ala. 13—Auctioneer. Each resident auctioneer (merchants' license not included), \$100.

Mobile, Ala.—License for auctioneers engaged in a general business is \$75 per annum. For those engaged exclusively in the sale of real estate, \$25 per annum.

Montgomery, Ala.—Annual license for auctioneers is \$51.

Los Angeles, Cal.—For every person, firm or corporation who sells real estate, or any goods, wares, merchandise, or live stock, at public auction, per month, \$7.50, payable quarterly.

Oakland, Cal.—Auctioneer's license, per quarter, \$15. Intend to raise it to \$75 per annum.

Bridgeport, Conn.—Auctioneer's license, \$5.

Hartford, Conn.—No fee required.

New Haven, Conn.—Auctioneers who are resident—No fee required. Itinerant vendors must pay a license fee of \$25 and a deposit bond of \$5 with the State Treasurer.

Dover, Del.—State of Delaware requires a fee of \$10.50, which allows auctioneer to practise his profession in any town or city in the State.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on March 13, 1906 (Minutes, page 1032), the annexed ordinance amending section 721 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York of 1897, designating places at which firearms may be discharged, by adding thereto the grounds occupied by James A. Henderson, on the westerly side of Pelham Bay, 1,500 feet southerly of the new road dock, respectfully

REPORT:

That it has considered the matter, and believes that the grounds in question may properly be included among those designated in said section.

The attention of the committee has also been called to the resolution adopted by this Board March 22, 1906 (Minutes, page 1097), permitting clay pigeon shooting on the grounds of D. J. MacLeod, known as Greenfield Park, on Coney Island avenue and Avenue L, in the Thirty-first Ward, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

In view of the fact that certain grounds named in section 721 of said Revised Ordinances, namely, Jones Wood Coliseum, Lion Park, Jerome Park, Fleetwood Park, the grounds of Pilkington & Nagle, at Oak Point on the East river, and the grounds of the Metropolitan Baseball Park, corner of First avenue and One Hundred and Seventh street, are no longer used as shooting grounds, the committee has deemed it advisable that the said section be so amended as to omit the said places from its provisions.

The committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following substitute ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 721 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York of 1897, relating to the use of firearms.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 721 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York of 1897, relating to the firing of firearms, hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 721. No person shall fire off or discharge any gun, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm in The City of New York, under a penalty of ten dollars for each offense. The provisions of this section shall not apply to Washington Park, Hamilton Park, Bender's Schutzen Park, Bellevue Garden, Harlem River Park, Christ's Park, Kuntz's Elm Park, National Park, Kari Park, Hudson River Park, Brien's Undercliff Park, High Bridge; the dock at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North river; the land lying between One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, the Hudson river, One Hundred and Seventy-second street and the Kingsbridge road, while said property is used for the purpose of a rifle range by the Fort Washington Rifle Club, and no longer; Manhattan Park, situated in One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, two hundred feet west of Eighth avenue; Cosmopolitan Park, located on One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Tenth avenue, near High Bridge; Zeltner's Park, located at the northeast corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Seventieth street; St. Nicholas Park, located on One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, between Eighth and Columbus avenues; Fort George Park, located on Amsterdam avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Ninety-fourth and One Hundred and Ninety-seventh streets; Rifle Range, located on the east side of Amsterdam avenue, between One Hundred and Eighty-seventh and One Hundred and Eighty-eighth streets; Manhattan Field, on Eighth avenue, from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth to One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street; the premises of Tony Eiser, on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street and Amsterdam avenue; the Berkeley Oval, on Burnside avenue, between Sedgwick avenue and Macomb's Dam road; the premises of Henry Martens, No. 1151 Stebbins avenue, known as Pioneer Park; the premises of Theobald Noll (Morrisonia Schuetzen Park), No. 1390 Boston avenue; the premises of Morris Dietrich, situated on the East river, adjoining the premises of the Oak Point Yacht Club, in the Twenty-third Ward; the grounds of the Columbia College Gun Club, at Williamsbridge; the premises of the Washington Heights Club, One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Amsterdam avenue; the premises of the Country Club of Westchester County, situated on Eastchester Bay, in the late Town of Westchester, now New York City; the grounds of Mrs. M. W. Ditmar, in Baychester; the grounds of the Kingsbridge Gun Club; the premises at the corner of Willow avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, in The City of New York; the grounds of the Melrose Shooting Club at the end of Beretto's Point; the grounds of Frank Strassburg, Broadway and Myers road, Van Cortlandt, New York City; the premises of Frederick Lohbauer, known as Bay View Park, Pelham Bay, Throggs Neck, Westchester, in The City of New York; the premises known as Nunley's Railroad Hotel and Casino, on Seaside Boulevard, South Beach, Staten Island; the premises of David Crabb, Linoleumville, Staten Island; Madison Square Garden, New York City; the grounds occupied by the Transit Rod and Gun Club, located near Lafayette avenue and the Bronx river; the premises known as Manhattan Casino Park, situated on the north side of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, between Eighth avenue and Central avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan; the premises of the Craig Lea Rod and Gun Club, Pelham Bay, The Bronx Borough; grounds Fox Hills Gun Club, Vanderbilt avenue, Clifton, Fourth Ward, Richmond Borough; the grounds occupied by James A. Henderson on the westerly side of Pelham Bay, 1,500 feet southerly of the new road dock; the grounds of D. J. MacLeod, known as Greenfield Park, on Coney Island avenue and Avenue L, in the Thirty-first Ward, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Sec. 2. The provisions of this ordinance permitting the discharge of firearms on certain grounds and places shall apply with equal force to all the grounds and places named in section 1 hereof, in whatsoever borough situated.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That section 721 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York of 1897, relating to "The Firing of Firearms, etc., be and the same is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the words 'the grounds occupied by James A. Henderson, on the westerly side of Pelham Bay, 1,500 feet southerly of the new road dock.'

REPORT:

That Commissioner Walgrave appeared before your committee and urged the adoption of the resolution, and while the sum of \$433,000 had been asked for in last year's estimate, only \$246,450 had been allowed for maintenance. This sum is only \$1,500 more than in 1900, in spite of the increase in the Department in those six years. As set forth in the accompanying letter, and from the Commissioner's statement, the increase in the Bronx Park system, of which the entire City is justly proud, seems to warrant a large increase. The Department was allowed \$70,000 additional last year in Revenue Bonds, and the Commissioner states that this was not enough for six months, and that upon this basis, and taking into consideration the many improvements contemplated, including the restoration of the park which his predecessor used for laying out a horse race track, etc., he believes that the sum of \$200,000 is necessary.

Your committee make the same observation in this as in the Manhattan application with reference to compelling the issuance of Revenue Bonds to necessarily maintain City departments, but as this sum seems to be necessary, your committee report favorably upon the application.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the proceeds to be applied to meet the deficiency in the appropriation for Maintenance and Construction, Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx.

Common Shows.

Section 40. A common show shall be deemed to include a carousel, Ferris wheel, gravity steeplechase, chute, scenic cave, bicycle carousel, scenic railway, striking machines, switchbacks, merry-go-round, puppet show, ball game, *moving pictures* and all other shows of like character, but not to include games of baseball or to authorize gambling or any games of chance.

The department is conducting a most excellent work there in its policy of reforming youthful male misdemeanants into useful and intelligent men, and your Committee feel that this should be encouraged and aided by the Board of Aldermen as representatives of the people of this City.

The material to be purchased, besides being used for the instruction of the pupils, when made up is sold and the proceeds turned into the Sinking Fund.

The Budget allowance was \$360,907.90 less than was requested, and the Commissioner states that this \$200,000 is the least that will do in order to maintain the Manhattan and Richmond parks in any proper condition, and has, at the request of the Committee, submitted the annexed detailed statement showing the items of the maintenance account.

Upon such statements your Committee feels compelled, in the interests of our park service, to report favorably upon this application, but at the same time they question very much the advisability and economy of the alleged action of the last Board of Estimate and Apportionment in cutting from the Budget amounts which Commissioner Herrman states to be absolutely necessary for maintenance, and thereby necessitating an issue of Revenue Bonds, with its incidental high interest and expenses.

Your Committee favor the adoption of this resolution.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I beg to request that your Honorable Board will, pursuant to section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the proceeds to be applied to meet the deficiency between the sum actually required for the maintenance of the parks, parkways, playgrounds, etc., in the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and the amount allowed for that purpose in the Budget for the current year.

While this sum is considerably less than the deficit, as shown in detail by the Departmental estimate for the year 1906 (which was based on actual requirements of labor and materials calculated from existing conditions and rate of expenditure), I have in mind the fact that the demands upon this source of revenue and the finances of the City make necessary the best economy and distribution of the funds at your disposal under this section of the Charter.

Among the various and numerous items over which it will be necessary to distribute this amount to meet the needs of park maintenance work I have included the item of renovating the Central Park, or such portion thereof as may be reasonable to undertake during the coming season, by means of the application of top soil or mold, with manure and new planting. In the opinion of the experts, who have made a careful study of this subject, the treatment proposed is very necessary to preserve and maintain the park at its present and past standard.

This work is deemed to be more properly construed as maintenance, rather than work of the character ordinarily provided for by the issue of Corporate Stock.

With the sum herein asked for, and with a careful regulation of expenses and the elimination of such items of intended work as it may be possible to dispense with or otherwise adjust for the present year, I am of the opinion that a fairly creditable degree of maintenance may be attained.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
