MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held on Monday, June 24, 1912, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling, Commissioner Keogh presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Civil Service Rules by striking from paragraph 2 of Rule 13 the following:

"Leave of absence without pay may be granted by an appointing officer, without conflict with such provisions, where such absence does not exceed thirty days, or, in case of sickness, six months; but the Commission, in exceptional cases, the circumstances of which shall be stated in its minutes and in its annual report, may extend such periods. Absence without leave for a period of five days, unless it be subsequently shown that such absence was unavoidable, shall be construed as a resignation."

Mr. Edward F. Cadley, representing the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and Mr. Stephen Kelly, representing the President of the Borough of Manhattan, appeared in opposition to the elimination of the last sentence of the clause. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants, as herein provided, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contracts or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties provided in the grant shall be as follows:
