FOREWORD.

The purpose of this presentation is to marshal in concise form the Constitutional provisions, legal enactments and court decisions which govern and determine the kind of debt which enters into and the kind of debt which must be excluded from a statement setting forth the Constitutional debt of the City within the debt limit.

Debt-incurred Power.

Considerable misunderstanding exists as to the real meaning of the term "debt-incurred power." Some think, and rightly, that this term is used to define the amount available against which the City may obligate itself for new commitments of a debt-contracting nature. There are many people, however, who seem to think that the term "debt-incurred power" means the limit to which the City, at the time, may be able to go into the market and borrow money.

The debt-incurred power of the City on January 1, 1917, is \$51,501,752.40, but, in addition to this, there are commitments, consisting of land and contract liability, which has already been charged against the City's Constitutional debt limit aggregating \$71,594,022.93. The total of these two amounts, viz., \$123,095,775.33, represents the amount which the City could legally borrow upon its bonds or other evidences of indebtedness before its borrowing power within the Constitutional debt limit would be exhausted.

Borrowing Versus Debt-incurred Power.

The differentiation between the City's right to borrow and its debt-incurred power may be illustrated in another way. As I have already said, and as may be noted from the statement, the City's Constitutional debt-incurred power (January 1, 1917) is \$51,501,752.40. This debt limit is reached after charging, in addition to the Constitutional funded debt, a further debt of \$71,594,022.93 for land liability, contract liability, and open market orders. This floating debt includes a net contract and land liability for rapid transit purposes of \$50,672,108.77, and additional contract liabilities of \$11,271,681.37 for various other City improvements, including the repaving of streets, building of sewers, and construction of public buildings, etc. The entire amount of the rapid transit contract liability cannot possibly be earned within the next twelve months, that is to say, the construction cannot all be completed and payments will not all be made within that time. This means that, viewed from the standpoint of financing, the City could borrow approximately \$70,000,000 to carry out these contracts and liquidate its land liabilities without decreasing by one dollar the legal debt limit of \$51,501,752.40. The borrowing for such purpose by means of issuing corporate stock (city bonds) would merely change the floating debt into a funded debt and would leave the debt-incurred power just as stated.

The Roman numerals prefixed to each element on the "Debt Limit" statement are for the purpose of correlating the respective amounts with the explanatory text similarly indicated, wherein the dates are given and the purposes stated of each Constitutional amendment, legal enactment and court decision by which the City's Constitutional debt-incurred power is determined. By these means the procedure by which the "debt limit," January 1, 1917 (as of any other date), is established will be clear and plain and the conclusions set forth therein will be manifest.

Statement—Reciting the Constitutional Provisions, Legal Enactments and Court Decisions, by Date and Title, which Govern and Determine the Kind of Debt which Enters Into and the Kind of Debt Which Must Be Excluded From Each Statement Setting Forth the Constitutional Debt of the City Within the Debt Limit.

I. The foundation upon which is erected the City's legal right to incur indebtedness is:

Ten (10) per centum of the assessed valuation of the Real Estate subject to taxation by the City, as it appears on the last assessment rolls prior to the incurring of such indebtedness.

The last assessment rolls of the City (for this purpose) are the rolls of and for the year 1916, as certified and transmitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Department of Taxes and Assessments on March 1, 1916.

The 1916 assessed valuation of taxable real estate aggregates..... \$8,207,822,361 00

viz. on property situated within:

"Real Estate," referred to in the State Constitution, as Defined by the Court of Appeals.

In its decision laying down the principles upon which the debt limit of the City of New York is to be determined, and describing the kinds of debt which enter into and which do not enter into the Constitutional indebtedness, the Court of Appeals, in the case of Levy vs. McClellan (196 N. Y. 178), in referring to the restriction of ten per cent. of the assessed valuation "of real estate," as contained in section 10 of article 8 of the Constitution, said:

"In computing the indebtedness of the City of New York this provision of the Constitution must be deemed to comprehend within the term 'real estate' all properties which the statute makes taxable as such. At common law, franchises partook of the nature of realty, and by the Tax Law special franchises are classified as real estate; hence they are properly included as part of the real estate which is valued for assessment purposes."

Ten (10) per centum of the foregoing grand aggregate of \$8,207,822,361 00, is \$820,782,236 10 and this is the amount which now measures the limit of the City's debt-incurred power within the Constitutional inhibition.

This provision of the State Constitution was adopted on November 4, 1884, to take effect on January 1, 1885. It was approved by the electorate on November 4, 1884, as an amendment to article VIII., section 11 of the Constitution.

II. The total funded debt of the City on January 1, 1917 (a. m.).... \$1,420,817,251 76

Amounts Which, Under the Provisions of Article VIII., Section 10, of the Constitution, Are Not to Be Included (Are to Be Exempted) in Ascertaining the City's Legal Right to Incur Further Indebtedness.

III. All bonds outstanding which were issued by the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

January 1, 1917. Total County Bonds outstanding aggregated..... \$17,712,618 51

All bonds of the counties within which the corporate limits of The City of New York were excluded from the City's legal right to incur debt by an amendment on November 7, 1899, to Article VIII., Section 10 of the Constitution of the State.

This amendment provides that—

"* * * When any city shall include within its boundaries more than one county, the power of any county wholly included within such city to become indebted shall cease, but the debt of the county, heretofore existing, shall not, for the purposes of this section, be reckoned as a part of the city debt."

IV. All debts incurred by The City of New York after the first day of January, 1904, to provide for the supply of water, shall not be included in ascertaining the City's legal right to incur further indebtedness.

This provision was embodied in the Constitution by an amendment on November 7, 1905, to Article VIII., Section 10. Under the provisions of this Constitutional amendment, which took effect January 1, 1906, all bonds issued by the City to provide for water supply since January 1, 1904, less the amount thereof which was used to liquidate debts incurred prior to January 1, 1904, are deducted from the total amount of the City's funded debt, as set forth in the statements showing the City's debt within the debt limit.

January 1, 1917. Net amount of bonds and corporate stock notes for Water Debt, issued from January 1, 1904..... \$192,600,100 38

V. Bonds issued for rapid transit construction. Bonds issued for dock improvements. At the election of November 2, 1909, Article VIII., Section 10, of the State Constitution, was amended by the addition of the following provisions:

"* * * Any debt hereafter incurred by The City of New York for a public improvement owned by the city which yields to the city current net revenue, after making any necessary allowance for repairs and maintenance for which the city is liable, in excess of the interest on said debt, and of the annual installments necessary for its amortization, may be excluded in ascertaining the power of said city to become otherwise indebted, provided that a sinking fund for its amortization shall have been established and maintained, * * *, and except further that any indebtedness heretofore incurred by The City of New York for any rapid transit or dock investment may be so excluded proportionately to the extent to which the current net revenue received by said city therefrom shall meet the interest and amortization installments thereof, provided that any increase in the debt-incurred power of The City of New York, which shall result from the exclusion of debts heretofore incurred, shall be available only for the acquisition or construction of properties to be used for rapid transit or dock purposes. The Legislature shall prescribe the method by which, and the terms and conditions under which the amount of any debt to be so excluded shall be determined, and no such debt shall be excluded except in accordance with the determination so prescribed. The Legislature may, in its discretion, confer appropriate jurisdiction upon the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the First Judicial Department, for the purpose of determining the amount of any debt to be so excluded."

In accordance with this amendment to the Constitution, the Legislature enacted, on May 11, 1910, chapter 276 Laws of 1910, which is framed for the purpose of enabling the Constitutional amendment of November 2, 1909, with respect to rapid transit and dock bonds, being carried into practical effect.

Three separate applications have been made to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court under the provisions of that part of the amendment to the Constitution referring to indebtedness incurred prior to 1910 by The City of New York for rapid transit and for dock investments. These applications were favorably acted upon by the Appellate Division and decisions handed down whereby the following bonds have been exempted from inclusion from within the Constitutional debt of the City:

July 5, 1910—Decision of Appellate Division of Supreme Court, whereby rapid transit bonds issued for the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx division of the rapid transit railroad were exempted in the sum total of.....	\$43,868,325 18
April 5, 1911—Decision of Appellate Division of Supreme Court, whereby rapid transit bonds issued for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan division of the rapid transit railroad were exempted in the sum total of.....	3,614,400 00
January 31, 1913—Decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, whereby certain dock bonds, aggregating.....	69,943,053 55

—were similarly exempted.

Deductions of New York City Bonds Held as Investments by Its Sinking Funds.

VI. On January 1, 1885, when the amendment of November 4, 1884, to article VIII., section 11, of the Constitution went into effect, restricting the debt-incurred power of the City to ten (10) per cent. of the assessed valuation of its taxable real estate, the question was submitted by Franklin Edson, then Mayor of the City, to E. Henry LaCombe, Corporation Counsel, with respect to whether the sum of \$35,479,579.33 of City bonds then held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were to be considered as indebtedness within the meaning of the Constitutional amendment, or whether they were to be deducted from the total amount of the funded debt outstanding on January 1, 1885. This question was carried to the Court of Appeals in the case of the Bank for Savings in New York vs. Wm. R. Grace, Mayor, and decided on April 30, 1886, reported in 102 N. Y., 313.

In its decision the Court said, in part, that the argument of the respondent was—"* * * that until the period of final payment arrives the stock (held by the sinking funds) remains a debt of the city in all respects as it was before. If that be so the sinking fund would seem to have been established for no purpose; that although many millions of money belonging to the City have been paid out of it in order that, according to the law of its creation, 'the redemption of the New York City stocks may be regularly progressing,' no progress has been made."

The court held—

"That the stock purchased (by the sinking fund) is not a debt against the city within the meaning of the Constitutional prohibition."

The decision of the Court of Appeals on October 22, 1909, in the case of Jefferson M. Levy vs. George A. McClellan, Mayor, upheld the principle as laid down by the court in the decision, Bank for Savings vs. Mayor Grace, with respect to excluding or deducting sinking fund holdings, consisting of City securities and cash, from the total funded debt, qualifying such, however, with respect to the obligations arising, consisting of the accrued amounts in sinking funds for the amortization or redemption of the water supply bonds exempted under the provisions of the Constitutional amendment of November 2, 1909. (Reported in 196 New York, Court of Appeals Reports, 178.)

Additional Deductions from Funded Debt, Consisting of the Amounts Provided in Tax Budgets for the Direct Redemption of Bonds, and by Appropriations of Annual Installments to Be Paid Into the Sinking Fund.

VII. Appropriations in the annual tax budget for redemption of funded debt maturing during the year current:

In the decision of October 22, 1909, of the Court of Appeals, in the matter of Levy vs. McClellan (196 N. Y. 178) the court decided, in questions 16 and 43, that bonds outstanding which were payable directly from the City's taxes, and for the redemption of which an appropriation was contained in the budget, but which bonds had not actually been redeemed, should be deducted from the indebtedness of the City in order to ascertain its power to become further indebted.

In other words, the amount of bonds maturing during a year, and for which appropriations are made in the annual tax budget, is to be deducted from the total funded debt of the City in order to ascertain the City's legal right to incur further debt. These deductions take effect, in accordance with the decision of the Court of Appeals, on and from January first of the year for which such appropriations are provided, irrespective of when such bonds mature during the year.

The budget for the year 1917 contains appropriations (other than for redemption of County Bonds), of \$4,896,470 for direct redemption by taxation of funded debt maturing during 1917.

January 1, 1917. Appropriations in budget of 1917 to provide for direct redemption by taxation, of funded debt maturing between

January 1, 1917, and December 31, 1917..... \$4,896,470 00

In accordance with the decision of the Court of Appeals in the case of Levy vs. McClellan (196 N. Y. 178), in the answers to questions 16 and 43, said amount of \$4,896,470 is to be deducted from the funded debt of the City in the statement showing the City's margin of debt limit as of January 1, 1917.

VIII. Budget appropriations to provide annual installments payable into the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

In accordance with the decision of the Court of Appeals in the case of Levy vs. McClellan, question No. 36, the annual installments, for amortization of the City's funded debt, or any portion thereof provided in the budget of the year current to be paid into the sinking fund, which have not been paid into the sinking fund at the time of computing the City's debt, shall be deducted from the amount of the City's indebtedness in ascertaining its power to become further indebted.

The budget of the City of New York for the year 1917 contains an appropriation of \$8,700,000, to provide the annual installment for 1917, to be paid into the Sinking Fund of the City of New York.

Bonds Which Are Not to Be Included in Ascertaining the City's Power to Become Further Indebted.

IX. Special revenue bonds which are issued in one year to be redeemed out of the tax levy for the year next succeeding their date of issue.

In accordance with the decision of the Court of Appeals in the case of Levy vs. McClellan (196 N. Y. 178), as contained in answers to questions Nos. 12, 13 and 14, such revenue bonds are not to be included and are not included in the Constitutional debt of the City.

X. Revenue bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes, including revenue bonds other than those issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes of the year in which they were issued.

In the Court of Appeals decision of October 22, 1909, *Levy vs. McClellan*, the court decided in question 15 that in accordance with article VIII, section 10, of the Constitution, revenue bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes, other than revenue bonds which are not retired within five years after their date of issue, shall not be included among the debts in ascertaining the power of the City to become further indebted.

In accordance with said decision of the Court of Appeals neither special revenue bonds nor revenue bonds are included in the "Debt Limit" statement of the City of New York.

XI. Bonds authorized by chapter 208 of the Laws of 1906, to provide for deficiencies in taxes but not actually issued.

In answer to question 29, the Court of Appeals decided that the bonds authorized to be issued under chapter 208 of the Laws of 1906, but which had not been actually issued, should not be considered or included as indebtedness under the Constitutional provision. In its decision with respect to the unissued bonds for this purpose, which had been authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Court said, in part:

"Moreover, no bond, no matter for what purpose authorized to be issued, can ever become indebtedness until actually issued." (*Levy vs. McClellan*, 196 N.Y. 178.)

Debts Other Than Funded Debts Which Shall Be Included in Ascertaining the City's Indebtedness Within the Constitutional Inhibition.

XII. Contract liability for work and labor to be performed or materials to be furnished under contracts for public improvements.

The decision of the Court of Appeals with respect to contract liability is that, when the Comptroller endorses thereon his certificate, as required by the Charter,

CITY DEBT LIMIT.

Defining the Sources of Its Expansion and the Causes of Its Contraction.

I. The Expansion of the City's Constitutional debt-incurring power, or Debt Limit, arises as follows:

(a) By the amount of appropriation provided in each year's tax budget as annual installments, payable into the sinking funds for the amortization of corporate stock (long term bonds); by the amount of the annual rental paid to the City by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company as Lessee of the Subway and which rentals are paid into the Sinking Fund for the amortization of rapid transit bonds, and by the amounts provided in recurring tax budgets for the direct redemption of long term bonds maturing within the year and payable from direct tax levy.

(b) By the amounts which, at different fiscal periods during each year, are paid into the sinking funds from the City Treasury (from tax levies and other revenues), as semi-annual interest on City stocks and bonds held as investments by the sinking funds. All of such revenues which increase the assets of the sinking funds available for the redemption of the City's funded debt correspondingly increase sinking fund holdings of cash or securities and similarly reduce the net funded debt within the meaning of the Constitutional inhibition.

(c) Bonds redeemed from special receipts, such as assessment bonds for street improvements; certain College Point water bonds, etc.

Relating to Funded Debt Table Preceding.

The table preceding of the City's funded debt as at December 31, 1916, is designed to first present the total outstanding amount of bonds which have been issued to finance undertakings that are largely or in part self-carrying. In the first group (Group "A") therefore are shown the total amounts of water bonds, rapid transit bonds, docks and ferries bonds, and assessment bonds payable from assessments. These make a combined total of \$532,666,025.25, of which the City's sinking funds hold \$73,641,900.74 and the public holds \$459,024,124.51.

Of the total amount of water bonds outstanding, there are probably from \$95,000,000 to \$100,000,000 which are self-carrying. The water revenues actually realized each year are probably sufficient to meet all administration, operation and maintenance charges of the Water Department per se, and to provide annual interest payments on and set aside a sum sufficient to amortize and ultimately redeem the principal of from \$95,000,000 to \$100,000,000 of these bonds. The remainder of the water bonds outstanding represent to a great extent the amount which has been expended in the Catskill aqueduct still in course of construction. It may be here stated that \$192,600,100.38 of water bonds and notes are exempted from the debt limit under the provisions of the State Constitution.

levied for certain improvements made, it follows that only a proportion of these assessment bonds is payable principal and interest from the proceeds of assessments laid for that purpose. A careful estimate of the proportion of assessment bonds on which interest and principal may ultimately require to be provided for by the City would place such as not exceeding fifteen per cent. of the total amount thereof shown in Group "A."

A conservative approximation, therefore, of the total amount of self-carrying bonds contained in Group "A," based on actual figures and careful estimates, would

indicate that there are from \$237,000,000 to \$240,000,000 of these which can be so regarded.

The succeeding classifications in Groups "B" and "C" consist of bonds issued for schools and sites, libraries and sites, City parks and places, bridges, streets, public buildings—including hospitals, charities, health, fire, police, correction, etc.; streets, highways; to cover deficiencies in tax collections, etc. The interest on these is provided for by annual tax levy together with the annual installments required to amortize and ultimately redeem the principal of such bonds.

Whereas, Our country is on the verge of a break in the peaceful relations it has maintained with the great powers of Germany and Austria-Hungary ever since the establishment of its national independence; and

Whereas, Our hands have welcomed and our homes have been opened to a multitude of the sons and daughters of these great motherlands who have taken up the duties of citizenship with intelligent and zealous industry, and with their sons and daughters have become an intimate part of the daily life of our great Republic; and

Whereas, It is at this time that the sincerity of our national pledges is to be

tested, and the most faithful and single-hearted allegiance required toward our central government; be it

Resolved, That we, the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, confident that our intimate acquaintance and friendship with all the elements that unite in making up the population of this greatest of cosmopolitan cities gives us the power and knowledge to speak for all of our constituency, hereby assure the President of the United States that our city and its citizens are with him to the fullest degree in his stand to preserve the honor and repute of our beloved country.

Preamble and Resolution Authorizing Appointment of a Special Committee to Be Known as the Home Defense Committee.

By Alderman Bent—

Whereas, The President of the United States, in his wisdom has recalled our representative at Berlin; and

Whereas, Such recall may be construed by some irresponsible persons as of a nature that might possibly result in turbulent conditions in this, as well as other cities; and

Whereas, New York being the city most likely to suffer from such acts of irresponsible persons; and

Whereas, Some means of home defense should be provided for in addition to the Police and other peace officers, thus relieving the fighting force that might be subject to the call of the President, in the shape of the National Guard and the Naval Militia, in order that the President might use this latter force for National defense in case of war; and

Whereas, The Home Defense League has been organized but is only in a formative and not in a perfected condition; and

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen realizes that much good work can be accomplished in the event of the above emergency by the Home Defense League; therefore be it

Resolved, That a Special Committee of the Board of Aldermen be appointed, to be known as the Home Defense Committee, having for its object the assisting in every way possible the further formation and perfection of said Home Defense League and proper supervision for its activities in case of need.

Conference of Organized Labor on Industrial Education—Request to the Board of Aldermen to Hold Hearings and to Invite the Board of Education and City Officials to Answer Why the Demands for Better Educational Facilities Have Not Been Respected.

Conference of Organized Labor on Industrial Education of the City of New York, New York, February 6, 1917.

Hon. FRANK DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—For some time past the trades unionists in this City have been endeavoring to secure the establishment of proper facilities for the education of all public school children, both from the Board of Education and from the City officials, and have not been successful up to the present time.

On April 24 we announced the following programme for the improvement of the public schools:

"As our firm conviction is that a sound policy of elementary education is the foundation of our civilization, especially in a city like New York, a vast melting pot in which we transform the timid illiterate emigrant accustomed to repressive forms of government into the courageous literate citizen of our great republic, we, the representatives of organized labor, respectfully submit the following outlines of what we conceive to be a very sound educational policy: That in as much as there is no democratic institution superior to the public school for training our children in the ideals of our nation, and in as much as only a small percentage of our children reach the high schools and the free colleges supported by our City, that we are justified in saying that the elementary school is the real university of the people, and as such its needs and interests are paramount to those of any other type of educational agency supported by public funds.

"We believe that any readjustment of conditions should represent the consensus of opinion of the majority of the citizens of the City as expressed in terms of parents' associations, mothers' clubs, local school boards, employers of labor, organized labor and professional educators. No readjustment should be predicated on the assumption of a relatively novel type of school developed in a little Western town, created by the fiat of the United States Steel Corporation, as the best and only type solution of our present educational difficulties.

"We believe that educational policies should be free from both the control of politics and also the sinister influence of those great foundations created as a result of ill gotten wealth. Instead of the Board of Education being subservient to the City administration, we favor a small elective board, with financial independence. Moreover, it should be evident that expert professional advice, such as we may reasonably expect from the City Superintendent and his associates, Superintendents, District Superintendents, Principals, Teachers, etc., supplemented by the best advice obtainable from parents and other agencies already indicated, should be the basis of our educational policy, rather than the unsupported opinion of untrained laymen or imported experts employed at exorbitant salary by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. That both in terms of intent and financial ability, the people of our City are able to provide funds for educational purposes which will enable our educational authorities to provide the type of schooling which the parents and properly qualified experts deem best for our children to have. No peal of economy can possibly justify the deplorable conditions such as exist in our schools to-day. Despite gross extravagance in other fields of municipal government, the present City administration has deliberately refused to appropriate money demanded by the Teachers, Principals, District Superintendents and Associate Superintendents and the Board of Education, although the said demands were based upon a full and accurate knowledge of the needs of the situation. The chaotic

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nal, but as a juvenile offender, or as one in need of the care and protection of the State.

The eight years from 1902 to 1910 may be regarded in a certain sense as the first formative period in the development of the Children's Court of New York City. But although the progress made during that time was very real and substantial, the conditions as they existed could hardly be regarded as satisfactory. In the first place, the Court of Special Sessions of those days was composed of six justices in New York County and six in Brooklyn. Each Judge took his term in the Children's Court by rotation, so that in New York County six men sat for two months a year each in the Children's Court, while the same practice obtained in Brooklyn.

Furthermore, the courts had no probation officers at any time. Whenever a child was placed upon probation (or as it was then called, "parole"), if certain work was to be done it was handled entirely either through volunteers from various social agencies of religious organizations or through the officers of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, who made investigations when requested by the Courts. Six weeks was about the average length of the "parole," at that time.

Statute of 1910—"The Page Inferior Criminal Court Act"; The Creation of the Queens and Richmond Courts.

In 1908, the conditions not only in the Children's Courts, but also in the Courts of Special Sessions and the Magistrates' Courts having been brought to the attention of the Legislature, a commission was appointed to consider any possible improvements, and to draw up the necessary remedial legislation. This commission held sessions extending over a year and finally presented recommendations to the Legislature which resulted in the passage of what is generally known as the Page Inferior Criminal Court Act (Chap. 639 of the Laws of 1910). In so far as this measure related to the Children's Courts, it provided many improvements in the methods and systems then prevailing. Among the various reforms which were thus brought about was the consolidation of the two divisions of the Court of Special Sessions in The City of New York into one body with a jurisdiction extending over all the counties comprised within the greater city; the establishment of Children's Courts or parts in the counties of Queens and Richmond (Staten Island), which, up to that time, had been without provisions of any sort for the handling of children's cases; and lastly the creation of the position of Chief Justice for the whole court, with full power to assign Justices for such services as he saw fit. The effect of these reforms, viewed as a whole, was to provide for the first time one central system binding together the Children's Courts in the various counties of the city. Among the features of the bill were the provisions for the establishment of a probation system and for the continuity of service by the Justices in the Children's Courts. This latter recommendation, however, was not in mandatory form.

In pursuance of the provisions of this Act, the Courts of Special Sessions were consolidated on the 1st of July, 1910, and in September of that year Children's Courts were opened in the Counties of Queens and Richmond. In 1911, a start was made towards the establishment of a probation system by the appointment of several officers in the Court of Special Sessions and the assignment of one to the Manhattan (or New York County) Children's Court. About this time, however, a dispute arose as to the method of appointing these officers, some contending that the Board of Justices had the right to make their own selections, while others argued that the appointees should be taken from the competitive civil service lists. The matter was then taken into the courts and it was decided early in 1912 by the Court of Appeals that all such appointments should be made directly from the competitive lists.

Reforms of 1912.

In 1912, however, certain great advances were made in improving the administration of the Children's Courts, and it can be said that these reforms in reality paved the way for the establishment in New York of the Children's Court as it exists to-day.

Assignment of Special Justices.

Up to this time no attempt had been made to achieve continuity of service in the Children's Courts nor to assign special Justices to these courts, because of their individual qualifications or interest in the work. Four ten years the old method of assigning criminal Judges to the courts by rotation had prevailed, and in consequence not only had the courts suffered by reason of a constant change of authority, but the Justices themselves had been denied the opportunity of making an intensive study of the courts, methods and needs. It was hardly to be expected that any man could come to the court for one or two months during the year and on the strength of such a limited service qualify himself as an expert in Children's Court matters. In consequence of the criticisms of this existing system which were then being made and in response to a plea made by those most deeply interested in the court's welfare to end an intolerable situation, the Chief Justice of Special Sessions early in 1912 selected from the court four justices and, relieving them from all duty in the criminal court, assigned them for exclusive service in the four Children's Courts of the greater city. This practice he continued without a break until the creation of the new court in 1915.

Establishment of the Probation System.

The year 1912 was also noteworthy in that it marked the establishment of the probation system. The Court of Appeals, as already noted, having decided that the probation officers in the Court of Special Sessions should be appointed from the competitive civil Service lists, an application was made by the court for their certification and a number of officers were appointed, of which 18 were immediately assigned to duty in the Children's Courts. This number was gradually increased from time to time, until in July, 1915, the date of the separation of the courts, 38 probation officers, salaried employees of the City, were devoting their entire service to work in these courts.

The Creation of the Bronx Court.

From 1912 to 1915, no great changes were made, except that it is important to note the opening of a fifth Children's Court in the County of The Bronx on the 1st of January, 1914, that county having been divided off from New York County on that date.

The Act of 1915 Creating a New Children's Court for the City of New York.

Although much had been accomplished in improving the conditions and the administration of the Children's Courts through the Act of 1910 and the reforms of 1912, it was realized by all interested in the work that another step was necessary in order to strengthen its efficiency and perfect its organization. After the assignment of the four Justices for exclusive service in these courts in 1912 an anomalous situation arose. These four men were regarded in a sense as responsible for the administration of the Children's Courts. It is true that they had complete charge of and responsibility for the conduct of such cases as fell under their jurisdiction, yet on the other hand they did not possess the slightest authority or control over the officials of the courts or over their general method of administration save, of course, as their votes in the Board of Justices of Special Sessions might influence the deliberations of that Board. Every appointment, every complaint, every matter of policy had to be referred to this Board, which consisted of 15 Justices from the five counties in the City, some of whom had scarcely ever sat in the Children's Courts. The clerical force was under the direction of the Chief Clerk of Special Sessions and the Probation Department was directed and controlled by the Chief Probation Officer of the same court. Administratively speaking, the Children's Courts were simply appendages of the Court of Special Sessions—a tribunal for the trial of adult offenders. It required but little argument to prove that the continuance of such a condition would render impossible all real progress in the Children's Court and that the only solution would be to divorce it from the Court of Special Sessions and to endue it with a complete administrative entity of its own. This solution was not only urged by the Justices then assigned to the Children's Court, but was favored in the end by the other Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, who appreciated the necessity and wisdom of making the change.

A bill which had been introduced in the Legislature at the instance of the Criminal Courts Committee of the Charity Organization Society contained among other matters affecting the inferior criminal courts, complete provisions for this very purpose, and accordingly an appeal was made by all interested with the result that an act was passed (Chapter 531 of the Laws of 1915) creating and establishing for the first time a separate and independent Children's Court for the City of New York.

The enactment of this statute might be said to mark the end of the second formative period in the development of the court. The five years between 1910 and 1915 brought about great changes: the consolidation of the courts as a whole, the opening of new parts in Queens, Richmond and The Bronx, the creation of a probation system, the assignment of special Justices and finally the establishment of the court as a separate entity. It can be justly said that it is due to the creative work carried on during this second period that the court has been reorganized on its present basis and that it has been invested at the opening of this new era with full

power and responsibility for all of its actions as well as with freer opportunity for achievement and progress.

THE NEW CHILDREN'S COURT—ITS COMPOSITION AND JURISDICTION.

Date of Organization.

By virtue of the act above cited the new Children's Court came into being on the 1st day of July, 1915.

Appointment of Justices.

Pursuant to the provisions of that statute the Mayor of the City of New York on that day appointed as Justices of the Children's Court five Justices from the Court of Special Sessions and designated one of that number to act as Presiding Justice of the new court. The terms of service were arranged so that one would expire with each year but after 1915 all appointments of Justices to the Children's Court have been and will be for a term of five years.

Assignment of Officials and Employees.

All officials and employees of the Court of Special Sessions serving in the various Children's Courts or parts on the 1st day of July, 1915, were transferred by the direction of the statute to the new Children's Court and have continued since that date to serve as officials and members of the new organization.

New Offices Created.

During the past year and a half the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen have created a number of new positions and have authorized the appointment of the following new officials to carry out the provisions of the statute: A chief clerk, a chief probation officer (both of which positions were specifically created by statute referred to), one male and one female deputy chief probation officer, one senior probation officer, a secretary to the Presiding Justice, three physicians (for the mental examination of defective children), besides a number of new probation officers, stenographers and clerks.

The Composition of the Present Court.

The composition of the court as constituted and provided for on the first day of January, 1917, is as follows:

The Administrative and Clerical Force—The Presiding Justice, four Associate Justices, the Chief Clerk, five Clerks of the Court (one in each county), three Deputy Clerks of the Court (one each in New York, Kings and Bronx Counties), two Assistant Court Clerks (one each in New York and Kings Counties), five Clerks, four Court Stenographers, one Stenographer and Typist, four Interpreters, thirteen Court Attendants, two Telephone Operators (one each for New York and Kings Counties), a Secretary to the Presiding Justice.

The Probation Bureau—The Chief Probation Officer, one Deputy Chief Probation Officer (Male), one Deputy Chief Probation Officer (Female), one Senior Probation Officer, fifty-one Probation Officers, four Stenographers, two Clerks.

The Clinic—Three Physicians, one Stenographer.

Powers and Duties (a) of the Board of Justices.
The control of the court is vested in the Board of Justices, who meet at least once a month or more often if necessary to consider the requirements of the court. This board makes all appointments, hears all complaints, has the power of dismissal of all employees after they have been given a proper hearing, establishes rules for the court procedure and for the conduct of the probation bureau and assigns all employees to their respective duties.

(b) Of the Presiding Justice.

The Presiding Justice is charged with the duty of assigning the Justices to the various parts of the court during each successive year and is also directed by the statute to supervise the business of the court and to preside at all meetings. He prescribes the hours for the opening of the several parts and for the attendance of the Justices, clerks and employees. He is responsible for the establishment and supervision of a system for keeping the records of the court and in addition to his other duties is ex-officio a member of all the court's committees.

(c) Of the Chief Clerk.

The Chief Clerk is also Secretary of the Board of Justices of the Children's Court. He is the representative of the Presiding Justice and of the Board of Justices in the capacity of fiscal agent and general administrative officer of the court. His jurisdiction extends over the six parts of the court. The law provides that he "shall cause to be kept a complete and accurate record of all the proceedings in said court and of all moneys received and fines imposed." He must report to the Presiding Justice each month as to the business of the various parts of the court and as to their hours of opening and closing. It is also his duty to prepare an annual report of the business transacted by the court and its various parts and to transmit the same to the Presiding Justice on or before the 20th day of January following the close of each calendar year, which report, upon the approval of the Presiding Justice, must be filed on or before the first day of February with the Secretary of State and with the Mayor, the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York. He has general supervision over the preparation of court calendars in the several parts of the court. In addition to the foregoing duties the law makes it incumbent upon the Chief Clerk to maintain a Bureau of Information in his principal office.

(d) Of the Clerk of the Court and of the Deputy Clerk in Each County.

The clerks of the Court in each County, and in their absence the Deputy Clerks of the Court have a large measure of administrative supervision over the various parts of the court to which they are respectively assigned. They are in part the representatives of the Chief Clerk. They are required by statute to keep a complete and accurate record concerning every child brought before the court. This record must, in addition to the names and addresses of all such children, contain also the dates and places of birth, their race, religion and previous court records, the names and addresses of parents and of guardians, if any, and such other and further data as may be required by the court. It is their duty to keep an accurate record of all fines imposed and to make proper returns of the same.

An important part of the duties of a clerk is the signing of commitments, which duty is conferred upon them by the statute.

(e) Of the Chief Probation Officer.

The Chief Probation Officer is the administrative head of the Probation Bureau. It is his duty to direct and supervise all employees assigned to the Bureau and to promote uniform and effective probation work in the various parts of the court. It is incumbent upon him to encourage and maintain co-operation between probation officers and other courts, schools, religious, charitable and kindred co-operative agencies. He reports monthly to the Presiding Justice as to the amount of work performed by each Probation Officer and the manner in which they perform their respective duties. He renders an annual statistical report, a copy of which will be found in the succeeding pages. It is also his duty to study the interests of the Probation Bureau and to make recommendations to the Board of Justices for its improvement.

(f) Of the Deputy Chief Probation Officer.

For the purpose of administration the Probation Bureau is organized into three divisions, covering certain parts of the court. Each division is supervised by a Deputy Chief Probation Officer. They direct the work and are responsible for the proper performance of duty and conduct of the employees in the Probation Bureau under their jurisdiction. They confer weekly with the Chief Probation Officer and render monthly reports of the work of their division. They review investigation reports before submission to the court. All active case histories are reviewed and endorsed by them monthly. They also render such field visitation with their officers as may be necessary.

Parts of the Court.

The Children's Court of the whole city is divided into six parts, Parts I and II being held in New York County, Part III in Brooklyn, or Kings County, Part IV in The Bronx, Part V in Queens County and Part VI in Staten Island, or Richmond County. All the parts are open for the reception of complaints and the transaction of clerical work during every business day throughout the year. Court is actually held in New York County and in Brooklyn every day in the week (save, of course, holidays and Sundays); in the Bronx on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays; in Queens on Tuesdays and Fridays, and in Richmond on Wednesdays. In New York County two justices sit each day, except in July and August, when only one justice presides. The method of holding the dual court in New York County will be described in detail under the subject of "Buildings."

The Spirit and Purpose in the Assignment of Justices.

The law of 1915 directed that the Presiding Justice in making his assignments of the Justices to hold court in the various parts should arrange his schedule so that one Justice should sit for at least six months of the year in New York County and one for six months also in Brooklyn (Sec. 34g, supra). The Presiding Justice has

not only endeavored to comply with the letter of the law but has carried its spirit even further than the requirements of the statute. He has assigned one Justice to sit for eight months in the County of New York alone and has placed another for nine months a year in Brooklyn. He has also given a third Justice the preponderating assignment of more than six months in each of the Counties of Queens, Richmond and The Bronx. Furthermore, he has provided the two other Justices who sit in New York County with assignments of over six months each. The advantage of this system is that it enables each Justice to follow his own cases from their first hearing to their final discharge and also to become familiar, not only with local conditions, but with the various co-operating agencies and the particular problems of his own court.

Jurisdiction of the Court.

The jurisdiction of the Children's Court of The City of New York is most sweeping. Any child arrested for any offense, with the single exception of murder, must be brought before this court, which has the sole and exclusive jurisdiction to try children under the age of 16.* Every child under the age of 16 who is without proper guardianship or who has been neglected or exposed to physical or moral danger must also be brought before the Children's Court for disposition. While the legal procedure of the Children's Court is anything but satisfactory—a situation which will call for further comment under the subject "Needs of the Court"—no fault can be found with its jurisdiction over offending children, which is much more complete than in many other juvenile courts of the country.

THE NEW CLINIC FOR THE EXAMINATION OF MENTALLY DEFICIENT CHILDREN.

In 1913 an act was passed by the Legislature providing for the appointment of three physicians to be attached to the Children's Court for the purpose of examining such children as might appear to be mentally deficient (Chap. 691, Laws of 1913). Pursuant to this act the then Mayor of New York named three physicians, but it was held later on that these appointments should have been made after the holding of competitive civil service tests and that they were therefore void. A year later these examinations were held and proper civil service lists were promulgated, but the entire matter was held up pending the consideration by the city authorities of a plan to establish some central city board for the purpose of dealing with the whole mental defective problem. During the past year, after several conferences of the city officials interested in this matter, it was determined that, whatever plan should be ultimately adopted for the whole city, it was highly advisable in any event to have these three appointments made for the Children's Court. Accordingly the Mayor on the 19th day of December, 1916, appointed from the civil service list three physicians for this purpose, two men and one woman.

The establishment of this clinic is an event of the first importance to the Children's Court and will mark another milestone in its progress. Not only will it permit the court to have examinations of mentally defective children made more readily and conveniently than before, but it will permit a far more intensive study to be made of the whole problem than was possible under former conditions.

Among the tables submitted by the Probation Department will be found one dealing with the results of the examination of mentally defective children during the year 1916. This table is necessarily incomplete, because of the fact that there was no central clinic for the examination of such children under the control of the Children's Court. In the past few years the court has made free use of various existing clinics for the purpose of mental examinations—notably that of the New York Post-Graduate Hospital and that of Bellevue Hospital through the Department of Charities. These clinics have rendered a valuable service, but in availing ourselves of their generous facilities it was impossible, of course, to keep any complete record of our own in regard to such examinations. In the future, however, by reason of the establishment of our own clinic, we shall be able to compile and analyze the results of these court examinations directly, and we therefore trust in another year to present some interesting tables and valuable information regarding the work of the new psychopathic clinic of the Children's Court.

With the attainment of these improved provisions for our own immediate needs we still expect to avail ourselves of the services of those agencies which have helped us so much in the past and we count on their future co-operation and assistance in the treatment of some of our more complex problems.[†]

BUILDINGS AND COURT ROOMS.

The New Buildings in Manhattan (New York County).

"For every child let truth spring from earth and justice and mercy look down from heaven"—thus reads the inscription on the cornerstone of the new Children's Court building in Manhattan, and in every detail this court house embodies the spirit of hope and kindliness thereby so wonderfully expressed.

It was in 1909 that the first appropriation was made for this building, in the amount of \$150,000. At that time it was the intention of the city authorities to rebuild on the site of the old Children's Court structure at 11th Street and Third Avenue; but later on it was determined to seek a new and more appropriate location and to make provision for an ideal building which would answer all the needs of the court. Accordingly a plot at 137 East 22d Street, with a frontage of 100 feet, was transferred by the Trustees of the College of the City of New York for this purpose and the city finally allowed \$262,000 for the erection of the new court house. The structure, which was actually begun in 1913, was first occupied for the purpose of the court in the summer of 1915, and was finally dedicated and turned over to the uses of the court as a completed building on the 25th day of January, 1916. It is most satisfactory to note in this connection that although the total appropriations for this building of \$262,000 were not originally planned to cover the cost of equipment and that it was thought that an extra appropriation would have to be asked for that purpose, yet the whole structure, including furniture and equipment, was completed for about \$240,000, leaving an unexpended balance of over \$20,000 to be returned to the city.[‡]

The Old Building.

To those of us who can remember the conditions of the old building at 11th Street, the contrast is extraordinary. There, a noisy, ill-ventilated, unsanitary structure without conveniences or facilities of any kind made the institution of ideal methods of procedure an impossibility. The old court room, of extremely unattractive appearance, in which were gathered together all the children, the complainants, the witnesses, the officers and the public in one general mass, presented an insoluble problem to those who were seeking to improve the physical handling of the court's cases or to impress the children with the dignity and kindliness of justice.

Description of the New Building.

In the new building New York now has accommodations for a Children's Court which may well serve as a model for other cities and which is a physical embodiment of court ideals of the day. Unfortunately it is impossible for lack of space to describe in detail all of the facilities therein provided, but a few of its features are too important to be passed over without specific mention.

As it has been well said: "It is as sanitary as modern science can make it. It is large enough to accommodate the demands likely to be made on it. In it there will not be the over-crowding, dirt and foul air which for years have seemed to be the necessary concomitants to the correction of delinquents."

The Waiting Room.

Instead of having all those who are interested in various cases gathered together at one time in the court room, they are provided with a waiting place, a beautiful

*In 1894 an act was passed reducing felony charge (except murder) against children under the age of fourteen to misdemeanors. The statute of 1902 (chap. 103) raised the age limit in this respect to sixteen, and by virtue of chapter 478 of the Laws of 1890 all children under the age of sixteen years who commit any offense (except murder) are not to be deemed guilty of any crime, but of juvenile delinquency only.

[†]Mental examinations were first made in the New York Children's Court in 1910. In that year Dr. Max G. Schlapp volunteered his services and has continued since that time to examine a great number of children at the request of the court. The Children's Court owes a debt both to him and his associates at the Post-Graduate Hospital for their services in this respect.

[‡]For this accomplishment the thanks of the City are due to the two Borough Presidents of Manhattan, under whose administrations the building was erected, Hon. George McAneny and Hon. Marcus M. Marks, and also to the architects, Messrs. Crow, Lewis and Wickenhoefer, who have devoted themselves to the project with such marked ability and zeal. The maintenance of the building is under the jurisdiction of the Borough President and his Superintendent of Buildings, to whose services is due in large measure the satisfactory condition of the structure.

large sunny room of white marble where they remain until those interested in the case which is being heard are called into the court room itself. By this arrangement, the child defendant is not subjected during the trial to the curious eyes of rows of strangers as in many other courts, and it is thus saved the unnecessary shame of telling his or her story to any but those whom it concerns.

The Mothers' Rest Room.

Attached and next to the waiting room is a retiring or rest room furnished with settees, chairs and all necessary facilities, designed primarily for the reception of mothers, invalids and very young children. This room is in charge of a special woman attendant.

Rooms for Probation and Clerical Work.

Down stairs there are rooms set apart for consultation and meetings between the children and the probation officers, both for the purpose of making investigations and of reporting while on probation.

In various parts of the building there are accommodations for the probation department and clerical staff of the court.

The Clinic.

The medical clinic and department for the examination of defective children, which has already been described, has rooms set apart for its use on the third floor of the building.

Detention Rooms.

The Children's Court of New York City, unlike some other Juvenile Courts, does not provide for the detention of children over night or during periods of remand for investigation. All services of this kind are performed by the various Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children in the Greater City. On the other hand, the court provides rooms for the detention of such children as remain in custody during the day while their cases appear on its calendar for disposition.

For this purpose the court building contains large, sunny, attractive rooms for both the boys and the girls which come under its care. In providing these accommodations, the Board of Justices felt that they had fulfilled every possible requirement for the physical well-being of their charges.

Provisions for Useful Occupation in the Detention Rooms.

On the other hand, they were not satisfied that the problem of interesting and directing the occupation of such children had been met in a satisfactory manner. Accordingly, at the direction of the Board, the Presiding Justice appointed a committee consisting of representatives of the various volunteer agencies interested in the court and of the probation department to consider this question. Suggestions were offered advising the appointment of a teacher from the Department of Education to conduct regular classes in the detention rooms, but on account of the great differences of age of the various children in custody and because their confinement was of such transitory nature, the plan was not approved. In its place the committee has provided games, books and other diversions for all children. In addition, sewing and embroidery lessons are given to the older girls during the few hours that they remain in the building, while a class has been arranged to occupy the attention of the boys along the lines of scout training under the direction of a competent instructor. Map study, discussion of current events and story recitals have also been included. This plan, while it has only been in operation a short time, seems to be meeting with very great success.

The New Plan of Dual Hearings in Court Cases.

Altogether it can be said that the occupancy of this building has permitted the introduction of new methods and arrangements which will greatly increase the efficiency of the court's work. But the chief and most important of these is the new plan of dual hearings which has been instituted since the establishment of the new Children's Court.

This plan of procedure is entirely novel. It has been in operation for more than a year and the results obtained since its inauguration have been extremely satisfactory. Its introduction has apparently solved the problem of ideal court procedure as far as New York City is concerned at least, and the justices of the Children's Court offer it as a model or standard not only for other Juvenile Courts but for the consideration of all tribunals where children or less hardened offenders are concerned.

Beginning with the first of January, 1915, a system was inaugurated of having two justices sit at the same time, with the result that twice as much consideration could be given by the judge to each case than was possible under the old conditions. One of the worst features of the old Manhattan court was the congestion of its business, and this, we trust, has been done away with completely. Under the new system we are using two rooms for the hearing of cases. The main court room, the larger of the two, is the place where all new cases, with a few possible exceptions, receive their first hearing. All continued cases, however, such as those put over for investigation and decision, as well as for probation, come before the judge in the smaller court room, which is really a part of the justices' chambers. By having the two justices alternate each day, it is possible for each case to come before the same judge. Thus, the judge who is assigned to hold court in the main room for the hearing of new cases on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, occupies the small court on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, for the purpose of considering his continued cases. The other justice simply reverses the schedule, holding his hearings for new cases in the man court room on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, and for his continued cases in the smaller room on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. While the chief purpose of this plan is to provide facilities for operating two courts at the same time and to give more consideration to each hearing, it also has another purpose in view, which seems to improve the method of treatment in all cases and to secure the most effective and beneficial results.

The main court room is not large; the judge's bench is simple, and the child and those interested are brought, physically, very near the judge. The room is one of singular beauty and dignity. It cannot fail to impress all who enter. Here the judge who sits wears his gown. The formality of the proceedings carried on in this room is designed to be of a kindly sort. Under no circumstances is the child in the least bit frightened, nor is anything done to suggest the likeness to a criminal trial. Even in this room the hearings are strictly private. But there is just that touch of solemnity to the whole proceeding which makes it plain to the child and its parents that they are before a court or tribunal whose decisions and advice must be respected and followed.

The other room—the smaller court—is also architecturally fine. But there all formality is laid aside, and the judge, sitting before a small table without his gown, meets the child, its parents, the probation officers, or representatives directly interested, in a quiet, friendly conference. In that room the case of the individual child is considered from every aspect, and the judge acts as a kindly advisor and endeavors to straighten out the tangles of each case in what he considers to be the wisest and most effective way.

The effect of this new method should be obvious. The first hearing in the main court room, we believe, impresses the fact upon the child and its parents that the rights of the community must be respected—that each child, as well as his parents, owes an obligation to society which cannot be overlooked, and that in each case there must be considered not only the welfare of the child itself, but the effect of his act upon others. In the second hearing, because of its informality and intimacy, less emphasis is laid upon these aspects of the case and the interest of the court in the individual is brought into even stronger relief.

There are, of course, many trivial cases which never require a second hearing, and which are discharged once and for all in the main court room. But all those needing investigation, such as for example, offenses involving moral turpitude or neglect, are handled in the way which has been described.

Not for one moment should it be supposed that the court, even at the first hearing, assumes an unsympathetic attitude or over-awes the child in any way. The first hearing in the main court room is in every way as private as those to follow. The same spirit and purpose prevail in both instances. But the arrangements of this building permit us, fortunately, to work out a balance in emphasizing the rights of the community and of the individual which is lacking in certain other courts.

That the court should be kindly and sympathetic goes without saying. That it must deal with each case individually and not collectively is also obvious. But we believe that it should never lose sight of the fact that every child is a part of the community as a whole and that the court owes to both the child and the community the duty of maintaining its own self-respect and dignity.

The foregoing is but a brief review of some of the most important features of

the new Children's Court building in Manhattan. It serves its purpose admirably and stands unique in serviceability, in dignity and in simple beauty.

As to the other buildings of the court, unfortunately it is not possible to say the same.

The Brooklyn Court Building.

In Brooklyn a similar situation has arisen to that which occurred in Manhattan in 1909. There the old structure, which has been used since 1903, has been found entirely inadequate for the needs of the court and an appropriation has been recently made by the city of \$175,000 to provide for a plot and building to house a new court in this Borough. In view of this action it would be profitless for us to dwell on the existing conditions which handicap and interfere with the development of this court. It suffices to say that the justices of the court appreciate deeply the recognition by the city authorities of the desirability of providing adequate facilities for this court in the future and that we trust that the new building will fulfill its purpose to the same extent and in the same measure as the court house in Manhattan.

The Bronx Court Building.

The Bronx Court was opened in 1914, as has already been stated. A building was leased at that time in 137th Street under a five-year contract and, with a few alterations which were made towards the end of 1916, has answered in a way for the purposes of the court in that Borough. It will be necessary, however, before that lease expires, to consider the advisability of providing for a new court house in that district. The Bronx is rapidly increasing in population and it is only a matter of time when the court will have to hold sessions there every day in the week. The present court house is entirely inadequate for its future needs and is most inconveniently located at the extreme southern end of the county. Before the expiration of this lease, therefore, the question should be carefully considered of making proper provision for its extension and activities in the years to come.

The Queens Court Building.

In the County of Queens we have a serviceable building remodeled for the purposes of the court, under lease to the city. There have been objections to certain features of the structure, such as the inadequacy of its heating plant, plumbing and other defects. The plan of the general court, however, is good. Lately the court room has been divided off so that the waiting room is separated from the smaller room in which the judge hears his cases, and this has improved conditions considerably. If the building is to be provided by its landlords with all necessary repairs and facilities, it will serve the purposes of the court for a time.

It must be remembered, however, that the County of Queens is the largest separate territory in all of Greater New York. The question of the advisability of establishing a separate Children's Court in Long Island City has already been agitated and it seems almost certain that in a short time the Borough or County of Queens will have to be divided into two districts for the purposes of our administration.

The Richmond Court Building.

In Richmond County, or Staten Island, the court has used, since its creation in 1910, the third floor of an old structure which is shortly to be torn down by the city. We have every assurance, however, that when that comes to pass we shall be accorded accommodations in the Borough Hall Building by the courtesy of the President of this Borough. These rooms are now being used by the County Court and, with possibly a few alterations, they will answer admirably all the needs of the Children's Court in the near future.

THE VOLUNTEER SOCIETIES.

For many years the Children's Court has received invaluable assistance from the volunteer societies, such as the organization of the various religious faiths in the different boroughs, the Catholic Protective Society, "Big Brother and Big Sister," and others who render such service as their names imply, in supervising many of the court cases and in furnishing facilities for the disposition of a number of its most difficult problems. Indeed, in past years they were often the only instruments through which the court could follow up the care and direction of certain classes of children.

With the development of the Probation System and the increase in the number of its officers, however, it has now become possible for the court itself to supervise officially each and every case coming within its jurisdiction. At the time of its creation in 1915, the new court was able to utilize the services of its probation officers only to cover the cases of juvenile delinquency and a few instances of neglect or improper guardianship. During 1915 this service was extended so as to include all cases both of juvenile delinquency and of neglect in Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and all cases of delinquency in The Bronx and Manhattan. Beginning with the first part of this year, we now propose to add probation supervision to all cases of improper guardianship, thus rounding out for the first time the probation system so as to include court cases of every description.

Of course, there will always arise certain cases which, for various reasons, will not require court supervision; such cases will be turned over to the proper society or social agency by the court in the first instance.

This extension of the court's supervision must not be understood as superseding or interfering in the slightest degree with the activities of the various religious or volunteer agencies connected with the court. In reality it should promote the efficiency and interests of both.

The True Aim and Purpose of Their Work.

It stands to reason that the work of these volunteer societies should not be regarded as limited to a review of court cases. If service of this kind were their sole contribution to the welfare of the children of our community, there would be little justification for their continued existence.

Their real work, however, is infinitely broader than that:

First, to receive cases before they come to court and to use every possible preventative measure for improvement, so that these children may, if possible, be kept out of court altogether.

Secondly, to assist and co-operate with the court while cases are under its official supervision and to furnish means and facilities for improvement and rehabilitation which the court alone cannot provide.

Thirdly, to continue their interest and kindly supervision after these cases have been discharged from court care. It must always be remembered that the court's probation or supervision is necessarily brief, while the after-care given by these organizations can be continued indefinitely.

Under these circumstances we believe and trust that the connection between the court and these societies will be closer than ever and that in the future, now that the lines of demarcation in our respective fields have been made clearer, we may obtain more effective co-operation than ever before.

To these agencies we have owed a great deal in the past for their services, not only in aid of the court itself, but in assisting the children coming under its care. We feel sure that they will contribute their aid and assistance in the same full measure of devotion in the years to come.

THE SOCIETIES FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN.

It is quite impossible in a report of this character to recite in detail the activities of the Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children in connection with their assistance to the Children's Court in matters of investigation and supervision. To do so would require the issuance of another long supplementary report. It suffices to say that ever since the establishment of the original court in 1902, in addition to their duties, as defined by statute, they have never failed to re-investigate and report to the court upon a case as often as requested by the court. The co-operation they bring to the court-to-day is untiring, as efficient and as helpful as it was in the early days of its existence. Mention has already been made of the fact that all children in temporary detention are cared for through these agencies. This is, however, only one of their activities, and constitutes but one of the great debts which is owed to them by the entire city. Their work in preventing neglect and abuse of children, in the initiation of criminal proceedings against those responsible for juvenile delinquency and crimes against children, and their investigation of all complaints presented by various individuals and agencies, are of supreme importance not only to the court and the city, but to the State at large. The Children's Court trusts that their co-operation and assistance may help and assist the court as much in the future as it has done in the past.

THE CO-OPERATIVE CITY DEPARTMENTS.

The Children's Court is necessarily brought into close contact with certain of the city departments whose activities and endeavors are somewhat analogous to our own. With these departments our relations have been intimate and cordial. To them we owe a debt for the assistance which they have always been willing to render us,

not only in the handling of specific cases, but also along the lines of reconstructive and preventative service.

Especially is this true of the Department of Education, the Department of Charities, the Police Department and the District Attorney's office.

The Department of Education.

The Department of Education has a representative present during all court sessions. This official is directly connected with the Bureau of Compulsory Attendance, a division of the Department which has the most intimate relations with the Children's Court. The work of this particular bureau is already winning deserved recognition for its efforts in handling the subject of truancy and we of the Children's Court can also testify as to the efficiency of its work. In addition, it is very pleasing to note the support which we have received from the principals of all the schools of the city. Our problems in a large number of instances are their problems and their assistance and help have been of the greatest aid to us in reaching a proper understanding of many of our cases.

The Department of Charities.

The Department of Charities has also a representative each day in court. By this arrangement many cases which properly belong under the jurisdiction of the department instead of that of the Children's Court have been satisfactorily adjusted. The services of this department in dealing with the provision and care of the feeble-minded have been of material aid to the court.

The Police Department.

The Police Department has contributed its share of assistance in handling cases of juvenile delinquency. The falling off of arrests and arraignments before the court must be ascribed in a certain measure to the work of this department. Two reasons may possibly serve to explain this situation; in the first place, it is apparent that each individual officer has been striving of late to adjust trivial offences as far as possible without invoking the aid of the court, and, secondly, that the whole force seems to be imbued with the spirit of preventative service which the Commissioner himself has been so consistently seeking to encourage. In this kind of work the court wishes the department every possible success.

The District Attorney.

The District Attorney has also an assistant in the court and in many respects his services have been invaluable. Not only has he been of great aid in furnishing the court with information regarding the children themselves, but he also initiated prosecutions against those responsible for juvenile delinquency with marked success.

THE OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE COURT.

In commenting upon the work of other agencies connected with the court, we feel that the faithful services performed by its own officials and employees should not be passed over without special mention. On this subject it suffices to say that each member of the court has performed his or her share of duty with fidelity and devotion. Whatever success we have been able to achieve in our work has been due in a large measure to the loyalty and the untiring efforts of our whole staff.

THE PURPOSE OF THE PRESENT REPORT.

Future Study.

This report cannot attempt to deal with all the phases of the court's activities nor can it include at present any analysis of the causes which tend to contribute towards the neglect of children and the existence of juvenile delinquency.

Deductions of this character can only be of value when they are based upon accurate statistics and the records of experience.

Inasmuch as the new court has only been in existence a short time we feel that this is not the occasion for an intensive discussion of these subjects.

In the preparation of our tables and data we have borne in mind, however, the desirability of keeping certain records which may enable us in succeeding years to compare results and to draw from them conclusions which will shed some real light on these vital questions.

The purpose of this, our first extensive report, is threefold: First, to outline the history of the Children's Court; secondly, to tell of its present conditions; and thirdly, to call attention to some of its immediate needs.

We hope, however, that we shall be in a position in another year or two to analyze the result of our work and to furnish to the community some reliable deductions and observations regarding the whole subject of neglect and delinquency among children.

THE NEEDS OF THE CHILDREN'S COURT.

The Probation Bureau—Increase of the Probation Bureau.
In discussing the needs of the Children's Court, perhaps it is best to begin with the one part of our administrative detail in which we feel that the court is insufficiently equipped, and that is our Probation Bureau.

We now have 51 probation officers, three deputies and one chief probation officer in the Children's Court covering five counties. Although this number may seem fairly large at a glance, a thorough analysis of the situation shows that more are required. The average number of children to each officer for supervision is altogether too large for satisfactory service according to the opinions of the best experts in probation work. Some of our probation officers have over one hundred children under supervision, although to perform real and effective work an officer should not be required to look after more than fifty. But in addition to that fact, there must be considered the necessity of lengthening the period of probation so that the best results may be obtained. For example, let us say that our average period of supervision of all cases is six months. Although a supervision of six months or even of a shorter time may suffice in many instances, it is probable that as a general proposition an average supervision period of a year would be preferable. Yet under existing circumstances that would be impossible unless our probation force should be doubled, for although one probation officer can handle 100 cases for two six-month periods, he could only handle 50 for one year.

The Results of the Probation System.

The results of the inauguration of the probation system have been most gratifying. In 1911, the year before any such officers had been accorded to the Children's Court, the commitments to various institutions were 3,682.

In 1912, after the 12 probation officers had been serving about eight months, the commitments were 3,650.

In 1913, with a small increase of probation officers, the commitments were 3,419.

In 1914, with the same staff, the commitments were 3,505.

In 1915, with the addition of three probation officers, the commitments were 3,107.

In 1916, with the same staff, the commitments were 2,893.

Decrease of Commitments.

This steady decrease in the number of court commitments is of course not entirely due to the probation system alone. The greater number of hearings and its more intensive study of individual cases by the court itself, the co-operation of volunteer societies and other social agencies, the great extension of preventive work in the past few years, contribute to solve and adjust difficult problem cases without requiring commitment. But probably probation is the principal factor operating to reduce constantly the number of cases which used to be accorded institutional treatment in former years.

Saving in Cost to the City.

Apart entirely from the vast good accomplished by the probation system in correcting children without reformatory sentences, these figures seem to show that it has resulted in saving large amounts of money to the city. If, for example, we take \$2.50 a week as the average amount paid by the city to the institutions for each child committed (in many instances it is larger than that), and assume that each child only remains for one year in the institution (although many remain for vastly longer periods), we find that the city is saving more and more each year in this way.

As a matter of fact, in 1911 the commitments made by the court were much smaller in proportion to the population than they were some years before. Indeed,

if commitments were being made to-day in the same proportion as they were twenty-five or thirty years ago, we would be sending to institutions probably upwards of five thousand children yearly at the present time, instead of 2,893, as was done in 1916.

Certain Cases Must Always Require Institutional Treatment.

In calling attention to this great falling off in the number of commitments, it must not be understood that the court underestimates the need of institutional discipline and training in many kinds of cases. Certain offenses call for instant correction and it would be a serious error for the court to refuse to place a child in a training school, where the child's habits are such that restraint is necessary or where the child's acts may endanger the safety or morals of other children.

A weak sentimentalism which prevents commitments in serious cases can work just as much harm to the community as a system of placing children in institutions by the wholesale, where other less drastic means of correction are at hand.

What the court seeks to do in every case is to correct by removing the existing error or fault; if a commitment is definitely required, it will be made, but if it is not absolutely necessary the court will endeavor to save the child through probation or other effective methods.

The Proposed Constitutional Amendment.

One of the handicaps which retards the Children's Court's development at present is the impossibility of obtaining a comprehensive method of legal procedure under constitutional conditions. The court should have broader powers, and the present system of trials in children's cases should be done away with. It savors too much of the strict, narrow, criminal trial. If chancery or equity powers could be conferred on the court, it would be possible to inquire into the facts and circumstances of each case at the first hearing to see whether the child is in need of the care and protection of the State, without first having to make a technical finding of Juvenile Delinquency. In the proposed constitution, rejected in the fall of 1915, there was a very admirable paragraph which read as follows:

"The legislature may establish children's courts, and courts of domestic relations, as separate courts, or parts of existing courts or courts hereafter to be created, and may confer upon them such equity and other jurisdiction as may be necessary for the correction, protection, guardianship and disposition of delinquent, neglected or dependent minors, and for the punishment and correction of adults responsible for or contributing to such delinquency, neglect or dependency."

Had this been passed, the Children's Court would have been provided with an ideal system of procedure. What we must do now is to ask that this amendment be submitted separately to the voters of the State, for until it becomes a part of our organic law, the work of this court can never be brought to a state of perfection.

Reforms of Procedure. The Children's Code.

After the passage of this proposed amendment it will be possible to bring about certain reforms and improvements which are not practicable at present. Not only will it permit a method of procedure to be adopted which will fit in with the development of the court's ideals, but it will make possible a thorough revision of existing laws relating to the protection and correction of children. There is a great need at present for a codification of these statutes, which, as it has been said, "are scattered about without systematic arrangement, a condition which could hardly be avoided owing to sporadic amendment and spasmodic constructive legislation." Because of constitutional prohibitions, it would not be wise to attempt any changes in this respect at present, but if this amendment is ultimately passed, it should be possible to obtain the enactment of a wise and comprehensive "Children's Code."

Raising the Age Limit of the Court's Jurisdiction.

At that time or in the near future the question must be seriously considered of giving the court increased jurisdiction over children of older years. The court can now keep a child on probation for three years after the offense, even though this period should continue after its sixteenth birthday, but it cannot assume original jurisdiction after that date. It would seem advisable that, as the court's facilities continue to grow, it should be vested with power to handle all children of at least sixteen or seventeen years of age, if not older. This is especially true in respect to the cases of wayward girls.

Need for Improved Institutional and Other Facilities.

One of the needs which the court feels most seriously is that of better and larger facilities of all kinds for the treatment of neglected and delinquent children. Perhaps it is wrong to call this a need of the court, as it really is a need of the whole community. You may have a Children's Court perfect in every respect, but its work will amount to nothing if outside agencies and institutions are lacking which can properly care for the children. Literally, thousands of cases come before the court every year, which cannot be handled as they should be, because of the want of proper places to which the children may be sent.

Private or Family Homes for Neglected Children.

There ought to be more private homes for neglected children. It has been the consistent policy of the Children's Court to place all children whose environment must be changed, in homes of relatives, friends and private families just as far as possible instead of committing them to institutions. On the other hand, there are certain cases which need institutional care, as, for example, those where the habits of the children or the actions of the parents are such that special protection must be given.

The Children's Court in seeking to work out solutions for many of these cases amid normal surroundings should have better facilities than exist at present, to find homes of the right type.

The adoption of the Constitutional amendment already referred to would remove one difficulty which the Court often encounters in this connection. It would enable the court to appoint legal guardians for children in need, a power which at present it does not possess. This lack of authority to confer absolute guardianship oftentimes prevents relatives and private persons from accepting the charge of children because of fear of their parents or inconvenience which might arise from their actions.

Places for Temporary Commitment.

We should have institutions or observation stations for those whom the court desires to hold and study for temporary periods without making a full and final commitment.

At present, especially in cases of delinquent children, the court has no alternative between short remand to the detention rooms of the Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and a full commitment to some institution or reformatory lasting upwards from one to two years.

The Children's Societies, as has been stated, are rendering invaluable service in holding children for a few days while the court is investigating their cases, but they have no facilities for long detentions nor should they be called upon to do this kind of work.

It stands to reason that in many instances the court may want to send a child to some institution for several weeks or months, either for the purposes of observation or of discipline, yet there is no institution today which will accept children under such conditions. These remands should not be considered as definite punitive commitments for short periods. No one would favor any practice of that sort. But as an assistance to the court in perfecting its probation system and in arriving at a solution of some of its most difficult problems, it must have some place where it can send children for observation until they can be allowed to return again to their homes on an extended probation.

This matter has already been most ably considered by the Mayor's Commissioner of Accounts, who a little over a year ago issued his report in printed form strongly urging the need of facilities of this sort for the court.

We hope and trust that this question may receive the attention of the city authorities, for it is without doubt one of our most vital needs.

Provisions for the Mentally Defective.

There should be graded institutions for the mentally unfit and better facilities of all kinds for dealing with this problem.

It would be obviously impossible in a report such as this to discuss the whole question of feeble-mindedness. There is just one aspect of the situation, however, which should be mentioned. Wretched as are the existing facilities for the care of idiots and imbeciles, they are even worse for the high grade case and psychopathic problem. In fact they can hardly be said to exist at all.

Some institutions are refusing to accept or keep psychopathic cases of any description, and there is literally no place to which they can be sent. The same is true of the high grade moron. It is practically impossible to provide for these types

at Randall's Island or Letchworth Village under present conditions or to keep them there even if they are sent.

This whole question must be met by the state if we are to provide proper custodial care for some of these difficult and often dangerous cases.

Small Schools for Exceptional Cases.

We also need small training schools for the exceptional child, the problem case and cases of immorality.

It is wholly wrong to put children of these types in large institutions. It is unfair to the children inasmuch as they cannot get the individual observation and study which their condition demands. It is unfair to the institution because they are disturbing factors and result often in interfering with the training of the other children.

In all instances where these kinds of cases have been handled in small groups the results have been very much more effective than when treated in congregate masses. If we only had more homes of this character, our problems in disposing of such cases would be greatly simplified.

Other Needs.

In writing of the needs of the court a vast number of subjects instantly suggest themselves to the mind.

The need of greater recreational opportunities for the children and of a better direction in their activities, so that something healthier and finer may be offered to them in place of their pitiful strivings for play and pleasure, which under existing conditions so often lead them into trouble. The need of greater efficiency on the part of those societies, organizations and agencies which seek to do preventive work, and to save the child before its habits have become hardened, or before it has fallen a victim to corrupting influences. The need of more intense activity on the part of the parents, the church, the school and all others directly concerned with the youth of our country. And so the list might be continued indefinitely. These are the problems and subjects in which the court is vitally interested, because the success of its work must necessarily depend on the provisions made by society as a whole for the welfare of its children. As it has been said, however, these are the needs of the whole community, and they affect the Children's Court only in the same fashion and in the same measure as they affect every other agency which is engaged in the work of child saving and child training.

After all, the Children's Court is only one of the many existing social institutions and agencies engaged in preventative and correctional work. It is not a cure-all for the evils which afflict the children of the community, and, by its very nature, it must deal with the cases which come before it, one by one, specifically and individually. It is as it should be, a tribunal of last resort, and if the faults of the children can be cured without bringing them before it, so much the better, both for the children and the court. Like the physician, it will treat every case in which its assistance is invoked, for the purpose of removing the cause of the disease or disorder, and of restoring its patient to perfect normal health. In doing its share, however, it appeals to the community for the proper means of treatment, as well as for the exercise of every preventative measure, so that in the care of its patients, it may achieve permanent and successful results. Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$200, to Meet Increases in Pay of Housesmiths.

City of New York, Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, Municipal Building, 10th Floor, January 29th, 1917.
Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—Request is hereby made for an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$200, the proceeds to be used for increasing the pay of housesmiths in this department from \$5.30 to \$5.50 per day.

In connection with this request you are advised that in the budget for 1917, schedule No. 1121, Wages, Temporary Employees, Care of Parks and Boulevards, provision was made for 1,000 housesmith days, with pay at the rate of \$5.30 per day.

On January 19th, 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution in which the heads of City departments were requested to provide for the compensation of these employees with pay at the rate of \$5.50 per day.

As the estimate for the mechanical and laboring force in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, was based on the exact necessities of the department for this year, it will be necessary that revenue bonds be issued to the amount requested, so that I may pay the prevailing rate of wages.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

No. 1247 (Ord. No. 223).

Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Transmitting an Ordinance to Amend Section 43 of Article 2 of Chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Operators of Motion Picture Machines.

The City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York, January 31, 1917.
Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—The department, in its desire to secure to the City all revenue which may properly be derived from its activities, again submits to you for consideration a proposed ordinance to provide for reasonable fees in connection with the issuance of licenses to operators of moving picture apparatus. This is, we submit, a legitimate means of increasing the City's revenues. If our recom-

mendations are followed, an approximate revenue of \$5,000 per annum will be produced and the service which we are now performing in examining applicants with reference to their fitness will become practically self-supporting. A considerable majority of the licensed operators of this City are in favor of the passage of such an ordinance as we now recommend.

The inclosed draft shows in brackets matter which may properly be eliminated from the present ordinance on the ground that it is already covered by the statute.

I append copy of the rules and regulations under which this department examines licenses and controls moving picture operators.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 43 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to operators of motion-picture machines.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 43 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "operators of motion-picture machines," is hereby amended to read as follows:

[§43. Operators of motion-picture machines.

1. Licenses required. No person shall operate any motion-picture apparatus or any connection thereof, unless he shall have been duly licensed as hereinafter provided. (Charter, § 529a.)

2. Application for license. Any person desiring to act as a motion-picture operator shall make application for a license as such to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, who shall furnish to each applicant blank forms of application which he shall fill out and file with the Commissioner. (Charter, § 529a.)

3. Examinations. The Commissioner shall make rules and regulations governing the examination of applicants and the issuance of licenses and certificates; provided that each applicant shall be given a practical examination, under the direction of the Commissioner. (Charter, § 529a.)

4. Issue of license and certificate. If, on such examination, the applicant is found to be competent to operate motion-picture apparatus and its connections, he shall receive the license for which he has applied, within six (6) days after his examination; which license shall continue in force for one (1) year from the date of issue, unless sooner revoked or suspended. With every license granted there shall be issued to the person obtaining such license a certificate, made by the Commissioner or such other officer as the Commissioner may designate, setting forth that the person named therein is duly authorized to operate motion-picture apparatus and its connections. (Charter, § 529a.)

5. Posting certificate. The certificate shall be displayed in a conspicuous place in the room in which the licensee operates a motion-picture apparatus and its connections. (Charter, § 529a.)

6. Discipline. The license and certificate may be revoked or suspended at any time by the Commissioner, in his discretion, for cause. (Charter, § 529a.)

7. Renewal of License. Every license, unless revoked or suspended, as herein provided, may, at the end of a year from the date of issue thereof, be renewed by the Commissioner in his discretion, upon application and with or without further examination, as he may direct, but every application for renewal of license must be made within thirty (30) days previous to the expiration of such license. (Charter, § 529a.)

8. Unlicensed Operators. No person, not licensed as provided in this section, shall be employed to operate or be permitted to operate any motion-picture apparatus, or any connections thereof in any motion-picture theatre, open-air motion-picture theatre or other place where motion-pictures are exhibited, to which the public is admitted, with or without charge for admission. (Charter, § 529a.)

§43. Fees to be paid by applicants for a license to operate moving-picture apparatus.

1. Each applicant for a license to operate moving-picture apparatus and its connections shall at the time of his first application for an examination pay to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity an examination fee of One Dollar (\$1.00), but no other or further examination fee shall be exacted. Upon the issuance of a license, there shall be paid an additional fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00), and upon each renewal of a license there shall be paid a further fee of One Dollar (\$1.00).

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Note—Matter to be omitted in brackets; new matter in *italics*.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Rules and Regulations.

(1) For the examination and licensing of Applicants to operate moving picture apparatus.

(2) For the conduct of licensed operators.

1. Applicants for a license to operate moving picture apparatus must fill out the prescribed blank form of application, copies of which may be obtained at Room 2518, Municipal Building, Chambers Street (telephone, "Worth 4320"). Any false statement as to a matter deemed material by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity (hereinafter termed the Commissioner) will result in the revocation of any license issued to the person making such false statement.

2. Applicants who have complied with the provisions of the foregoing section will thereafter receive notice of the time, when they shall appear for examination and later a written notice of the result of the examination.

3. The examination shall be both written and oral and shall relate to the following subjects:

(a) The handling of the head, lamp, appliances and wiring.

(b) Wire sizes and insulations and the various house wiring systems, with particular reference to the requirements of § 418 and § 438 of the Code of Ordinances (Electrical Code).

(c) Testing for voltage and for electrical defects in lamp and wiring.

(d) The use of the various safety appliances, mechanical and electrical.

(e) General precautions to be observed in operating moving-picture apparatus and its connections.

(f) Projection.

Only those applicants who have secured a mark of at least 70 per cent. in the written examination shall be eligible for the oral examination.

4. In cases where the Commissioner is satisfied that an applicant's knowledge of the English language is insufficient to enable him to write his answers the questions pertaining to the written examination and his answers thereto will be taken down in shorthand and transcribed of record.

5. An applicant who has failed in either the written or the oral part of his first examination shall not be eligible for re-examination in such part until after one month from the date of such failure. An applicant who has failed twice or more in either the written or the oral part of his examination shall not be further eligible for re-examination in such part until after six months from the date of such second or subsequent failure.

6. Every application for a renewal of a license must be made within the thirty days preceding the expiration of such license.

7. The following rules and regulations shall be observed by all licensed operators; for violation of any of them their license may be suspended or revoked:

1. The operator's certificate and a copy of these rules and regulations shall be displayed in a conspicuous place in the booth while the public is on or has access to the premises.

2. No operator shall conduct an exhibition except where to his knowledge a permit or a license of the Department of Licenses is exhibited on the premises.

3. The apparatus and its connections shall be tested by the operator prior to each performance. No defective apparatus or apparatus of a type not approved by this department shall be operated. No apparatus with lamp served with oxyhydrogen or acetylene gas shall be operated.

4. It is forbidden to overfuse (see Electrical Code, § 418 of chapter 9 of the Code of Ordinances) or to make any electrical connection not sanctioned by the aforesaid chapter (see § 438).

5. The operator shall report promptly every defect in the apparatus or its connections, the correction of which he is unable to secure.

6. Badly torn films shall not be used and their presence in the booth shall be reported as soon as practicable.

8. The door of the booth shall be kept closed while the public is on or has access to the premises.

9. No person shall be allowed within the booth except the owner or manager of the premises, the licensed operator, a person specially authorized by the Commissioner in writing or any duly accredited officer of the City.

10. The interior of the booth shall remain readily accessible to the persons mentioned in the foregoing section. The door shall not be latched on the inside nor the handle removed from the outside, nor shall any signalling device be permitted which is operated from the front of the house.

11. No film other than that on the projecting machine or on the rewinder shall be exposed in the booth at any time.

12. No smoking is permitted in the booth at any time.

13. No match, fire or open light is permitted in the booth while the public is on or has access to the premises.

14. Every film fire, together with the apparent cause thereof, shall be reported promptly.

15. Advance report shall be made of the installation of moving-picture apparatus for a one-night exhibition.

16. The apparatus while in operation shall at all times be in charge of a licensed operator.

17. It is forbidden to operate while under the influence of liquor or drug, or to read while operating.

18. Certificates shall not be loaned or transferred.

8. All reports contemplated to be made by these rules shall be made either (a) in writing to the "Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Municipal Building, New York City," or (b) in person or by telephone ("Worth 4320") to the Electrical Engineer, or to the Inspector in Charge of Licensing Moving Picture Operators in said building.

Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Request for Authority to Enter Into Contract for the Purchase of Recorders for Water Meters Without Public Letting.

The City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York, January 31, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—To determine the pressures, velocity and quantity of water drawn from the Catskill pressure tunnel at different points into the distribution system in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx Venturi meters with recorders are installed. At the present time there are twenty-two of these apparatus in use and three more are required at points known as Shafts 18, 19 and 20. There are only two concerns in this country which manufacture these apparatus. Those now in use were purchased under contract from the Builders Iron Foundry, Providence, Rhode Island. The other manufacturer is the Simplex Valve and Meter Company of Philadelphia. It would be a great advantage to the department if all these recording apparatus were of one design. This would result in the establishment of uniform methods of recording the pressures and velocity of the water and at the same time lessen the expense of maintenance. The total expense of the three tubes with appurtenances is \$5,381. In December, 1916, the department solicited bids from the two above named manufacturers for these additional tubes. The bid of the Builders Iron Foundry was \$369 less than that of the other company, exclusive of \$25, which is the estimated expense for cartage which the City would have to assume.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting January 26, 1917, authorized the expenditure of this money. I now respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen authorize me to enter into an agreement with the Builders Iron Foundry of Providence, Rhode Island, for the purchase of these supplies without public letting. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 2nd, 1917, the NEW YORK CITY DEPARTMENT OF THE UNITED STATES VOLUNTEER LIFE SAVING CORPS requested modification of Code 1790 for the year 1917. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Purpose—To abolish an existing position of General Mechanic at \$840 and to use \$600 of the available funds to create a new position of Junior Typist, allowing \$200 to increase the salary of the Superintendent from \$1,300 to \$1,500, the remaining \$40 to increase an Inspector from \$1,040 to \$1,080 and to change the title of Inspector to General Mechanic.

"Reason—To provide salary increases and an Assistant for office work.

"Finding—As there is considerable clerical work to be done it is necessary for the Superintendent to devote much of his time to the office. It is intended to appoint a Junior Typist so that the Superintendent may be relieved for outside work. The necessity for the new position is apparent and the rate, being the minimum of grade 1 of the Typist Group, is proper. The abolishing of a position of General Mechanic at \$840 will necessitate the assumption by the Superintendent and Inspector of additional duties and the requested increase of \$200 for the Superintendent to \$1,500, the minimum of Grade 3 of the Recreation Instructor Group in which his duties fall, is proper. The minimum of Grade 1 of the Miscellaneous Skilled Worker Group, in which the duties of the General Mechanic for whom an increase of \$40 is asked, is \$1,200, and the request is likewise proper."

Recommendation—In view of the above report the Committee recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the establishment in the office of the New York City Department of the United States Volunteer Life Saving Corps the Grade of the Positions of Superintendent at \$1,500, Junior Typist at \$600 and General Mechanic at \$1,080, for one incumbent each.

"The District Council has submitted to this Board a list of 1,028 employers who, it is claimed, pay the rate of \$5 per diem to Painters. This trade is conducted to a large extent by jobbers. It is obvious from the number of names presented that a large proportion of those men do their own work, with the assistance of a limited number of journeymen employed from time to time.

"An effort was made to reach 63 out of the 1,028 employers on the lists sent to this Board as concerns paying the \$5 rate. Thirty firms gave information to the Examiner, as follows:

"Belnord Apartments, West 86th street—
 "We employ on the average five Painters, at \$5, \$4 and less per diem."
 "Frank P. Bloodgood, West 34th street—
 "I do not employ Painters."
 "Columbia University, Morningside Heights—
 "We employ five or six men on the average the year around, and pay them \$4 per diem."
 "Central Brewing Company, 68th street—
 "We employ two or three Painters on the average, and pay them \$5 a day."
 "I. Green, East 9th street—
 "I pay Painters \$5 a day."
 "The Secretary of the Independent Union stated that he supplied Painters to Mr. Green at \$4 per diem.
 "J. B. Greenhut Company, 18th street—
 "We employ five men, and pay them \$5 a day."
 "Hendrick Hudson Apartments, 110th street—
 "We pay Painters \$5 a day. Could not give average number employed.
 "New York Times, 42d street—
 "We employ three Painters, and pay them \$5 per diem."
 "J. J. O'Connell, East 34th street—
 "I employ four or five Painters the year around. I pay \$5 and \$4 a day."
 "Oregon Apartments, West 52d street—
 "We do not employ Painters. We have our work done by contract."
 "Riverside Painting and Decorating Company, West 98th street—
 "We employ three men on the average the year around. We pay Painters \$2.50 to \$3.50 a day, according to ability."
 "Stern Brothers, West 42d street—
 "We employ one man, and pay him \$3 per diem."
 "Singer Building, Broadway—
 "We employ four Painters the year around and pay them \$4 a day. When additional men are taken on we pay them \$5 a day, the Union rate."
 "St. Regis Hotel, 55th street—
 "We pay Painters \$5 a day, and employ about six men."
 "Wanamaker store, 9th street—
 "We employ about six men, and pay them \$5 per diem."
 "Clarendon Hotel, East 58th street—
 "We employ Painters only between July and September, and pay them \$5 a day."
 "J. Burns, West 51st street—
 "I do the work myself, though at times I employ one man."
 "Carr & Steele, 5th avenue—
 "The number of Painters we employ varies. We pay the men \$5 a day."
 "J. I. Downey, West 34th street—
 "I employ on the average 22 men, and pay Painters \$5 a day."
 "J. M. Davis, West 31st street—
 "My work consists mostly of designing. I employ from two to six Painters, and pay \$5 per diem."
 "F. B. Essig, John street—
 "My work is mostly bronzing radiators and striping. I pay Painters \$5 a day."
 "H. P. Frear, East 54th street—
 "My work is all out of town, and I pay \$5 a day."
 "Samuel Aronoff, Willis avenue—
 "I employ six Painters on the average, and pay \$5 a day."
 "Metropolitan Life Insurance Building, Madison avenue—
 "We employ seven men the year around, and at times additional men. We pay the Union rate of \$5 per diem."
 "A. Aronowitz, Madison street—
 "I pay Painters \$5 a day, and employ two or three on the average the year around."
 "L. Alavoine & Company, Fifth avenue—
 "We employ 20 to 25 Painters, and pay \$5 a day."
 "William E. Baumgarten, Fifth avenue—
 "I pay \$5 a day, and employ 70 to 80 men."
 "H. Dichter, Amsterdam avenue—
 "I employ from 30 to 40 Painters on the average during the year, and pay \$5 a day."
 "Philip DeYoung, Seventh avenue—
 "I pay \$5 a day, and employ eight or ten Painters on the average."
 "Waldorf-Astoria Hotel Company—
 "We pay all our Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers Union wages."
 "Employers not on the list stated as follows:
 "Manager, Plaza Hotel—
 "During June, July and August 40 Painters are employed at the Plaza at the rate of \$4 a day.
 "Superintendent, New York Life Insurance Building—
 "We employ two Painters, and pay them \$75 a month, with a week's vacation."
 "Superintendent, Woolworth Building—
 "We employ no Painters. We have such work done by contract."
 "Engineer, Transit Development Company, Brooklyn—
 "We pay structure Painters, in five grades, from 25 to 34 cents an hour; car Painters 22½ to 30 cents an hour. Our present forces of Painters consist of about 70 men on structures and 200 men on cars."
 "Conceding that the employers on the list have signed the agreement, an affirmative reply might be anticipated from the large majority of others not interrogated. Of the above 30 employers, taken at random from the list handed in by the Brotherhood, six admit that they pay less than \$5 per diem. If this proportion held good for the total, it would show that about 20 per cent. of the 1,028 employers do not pay the \$5 rate.
 "Mr. Harold Haber, Secretary of the Association of Master Painters, stated as follows:
 "There are 47 or 48 employers in our Association. We have agreed with the Brotherhood to pay 62½ cents an hour, or \$5 for an eight-hour day. This rate covers Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond. Our members do alteration work as well as new work. We employ about 4,000 members of the Brotherhood, who average about eight months a year. Other employers in the Building Trades Association have about 1,000 additional Painters.
 "Our Association has determined that only competent workmen shall be

retained, and the man who cannot earn \$5 a day is dropped. Under the agreement we have the absolute right of discharge. Men are frequently dropped to go elsewhere. If we have decorating to do, the man must be a decorator. At other work he must be a qualified Painter and do a fair day's work.

"It has been stated that, despite the fact that a \$5 rate has been fixed by the Brotherhood, many of its members offer to work for \$4. This may be taken advantage of by some employers, but our Association tries to prevent the reduction below \$5, wherever possible, for self-protection.

"Employers figure that there are 25,000 Painters in Manhattan and The Bronx. If we allow for 15,000 in the other Boroughs, a round total of Painters in the Greater City would be 40,000.

"The Master Painters of Brooklyn have been requested by the Brotherhood to pay the \$5 rate, but to what extent that rate has been established I am unable to say. I understand that there are 13 or 14 employers in the Brooklyn Master Painters' Association. The Brotherhood rate for Painters in Queens Borough is \$4 per diem."

"In competition with the Association of Master Painters is the United Painters and General Contractors' Association, stated to have 84 members. The United Painters have addressed a communication to real estate owners, managers of property and builders, disapproving of the demand of the Brotherhood for the \$5 rate for Painters.

"On June 23, 1916, the United Painters' and General Contractors' Association addressed a communication to the Comptroller, stating that its members had entered into an agreement with the Independent Painters, Paperhangers and Decorators' Union to furnish skilled Painters at the rate of 50 cents an hour, or \$4 per diem; that several of their members were engaged to do the painting on schools and other public buildings.

"Mr. A. Weissman, Secretary of the District Council of the Brotherhood, exhibited an agreement with the Master Painters' Association to pay \$5 per diem. He stated as follows:

"We have 12,000 men in good standing in the Brotherhood, of whom 6,000 or 7,000 are working at the present time. The employers all signed the agreement to pay \$5 per diem, which rate is paid to our members. Our rates were formerly \$4 for Painters and Varnishers, and \$4.50 for Decorators. We found that Decorators were being paid at the \$4 rate for Painters, and the Brotherhood decided to demand a uniform rate of \$5 per diem for Painters of all classes, regardless of the skill of specialists.

"The men average eight to nine months' work during the year. There are probably 1,000 Painters unorganized in Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, the jurisdiction of this Council.

"The District Council of Painters in Brooklyn also made a demand for the \$5 rate, and employers have signed the agreement to pay that rate.

"The Independent Painters' Union does not amount to anything, and is composed mostly of men expelled from the Brotherhood. They ask for \$4 a day, and have 200 to 250 members."

"Mr. McCall, Secretary of the Brooklyn District Council, stated as follows:

"The Brotherhood membership in Brooklyn is 3,200. About 2,000 of our men are working at this time. About 350 employers in the Borough have signed the agreement to pay the \$5 a day rate. We admit that there are employers who avoid paying that rate, if they can. In such cases we take action against them, and try to enforce the Union rate. I estimate that the number of Painters unorganized in the Borough is not above 2,000."

"Charles Meyer, Secretary of the Independent Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers' Union, stated as follows:

"Our Union was incorporated in September, 1914. Its paid up membership on August 1, 1916, was 2,329. No employers are members of the Union. Our rates are \$4 a day for Painters and \$4.50 for Decorators. These rates are generally paid to the membership, although we are aware that in some cases men have been forced to accept less than \$4 a day, or lose their jobs.

"Only a small percentage of the Painters in New York are employed by the Master Painters' Association affiliated with the Building Trades Employers Association, as they are mostly on new work.

"According to estimates for repair work done for real estate agents, the charges are no higher now than before the \$5 rate was demanded by the Brotherhood, which would indicate that the \$5 rate is not paid to any great extent."

"The Brotherhood orders strikes for \$5 a day and makes settlements at a much lower rate, sometimes at \$3.50. In one shop that I know of, where 15 men are employed on the average, two men receive \$5 a day. An employer who has signed up with the Brotherhood at \$5 has asked the men to work for \$3.50 and \$4 a day. Still another employer, who had a contract for painting sixteen blocks of the new subway, signed with the Brotherhood to pay the \$5 rate, then subtlet the job to a contractor who is paying the Painters \$2.50 a day.

"In April, 1915, the President of the Brotherhood stated that there were over 20,000 Painters in Manhattan and The Bronx, and between 40,000 and 50,000 in Greater New York; that there were about 6,000 men in the Brotherhood in Manhattan and The Bronx; that in another organization, known as the Painters' Alteration Union, there were 5,000 members. Since April, 1915, probably 3,000 members of the Painters' Alteration Union have been taken into the Brotherhood, and hundreds of its members have joined our organization.

"There are 20,000 Painters unorganized in Greater New York. Thousands of these men, when they can find work, are employed in the harbor, the subways, hotels, big apartment houses and stores. They receive rates varying from \$2.75 to \$3.50 a day.

"Painters work on the average seven or eight months a year. The average rate paid to all Painters in the Greater City is \$18 to \$20 a week."

"The Secretary of the Independent Union exhibited a copy of an agreement signed by 84 employers with the union on the basis of \$4 per diem. He also gave the number of painters employed on the average by 54 of those employers as 1,110.

"The Brotherhood makes a demand for a uniform rate of \$5 per diem for Painters, Decorators, Varnishers, Letterers and Stripers. Heretofore the Brotherhood has maintained that for the specialties of Decorator, Letterer and Stripper an advance of 50 cents per diem should be paid over the rate of \$4 for Painter. The City has recognized the distinction as fair, and has paid a rate of \$4.50 for specialists in the departments, while Painters and Varnishers receive \$4 per diem.

"The Secretary of the District Council of the Brotherhood stated that, owing to the difficulty of enforcing a higher rate for Decorators, the uniform rate for all Painters was demanded.

"If statements as to the number of Painters of all classes in Greater New York were accepted, it would appear that a majority in the trade did not receive \$5 per diem in July, 1916.

"Final action by this Board having been deferred for several months, representatives of the Brotherhood requested that further investigation be made, which would reveal the changed conditions in the interim as to rates paid to Painters in Greater New York. They also desired to controvert speculative statements made as to the number of Painters in Greater New York.

"On January 15, 1917, the Business Representative of the Brotherhood submitted communications from 35 employers dated in December, 1916, showing rates paid and number of men, as follows:

"Frank P. Bloodgood, West 34th street—

"I pay my Painters, without exception, the full Union rate of \$5 per diem. I employ on the average eight or ten men."

"William Kallies, East 42d street—

"I employ about 15 Painters, and pay \$5 a day to each and every man."

"Watson & Collin, East 32d street—

"I pay Painters \$5 a day. I employed an average of 35 men during 1916."

"John Hartell & Co., Park avenue—

"I employ from 10 to 60 Painters, according to the seasons. All my Painters receive the prevailing rate of wages."

"Hiram P. Frear, East 54th street—

"I employ on an average of four Painters during the entire year at the daily rate of \$5."

"Racquet and Tennis Club, West 43d street—

"We pay Painters \$5 a day, and employ on an average four Painters."

"Mack, Jenney & Tyler, West 38th street—
"We employ on an average of 30 men throughout the year at the rate of \$5 a day."

"S. McCullough, East 32d street—

"I pay the Union rate of \$5 a day and employ five men on the average.
"John H. Huffaff, Park avenue—

"I have employed on the average 10 Painters and Decorators for the past year. Their average wage has been \$5.10 a day."

"Borea Contracting Company, Broadway—

"This is to certify we employ Union Painters to the average of 75 men the year round. We pay \$5 a day for eight hours."

"D. S. Hess, East 40th street—

"We employ on an average 20 men in our paint department, who receive the Union wage of \$5 a day."

"N. B. Smyth, East 34th street—

"We pay the Union rate of \$5 a day, and employ from 20 to 50 Painters throughout the year, more or less."

"Cohen & Siegel, Second avenue—

"We certify that we employ an average of 20 Painters, and pay them the Union wage of \$5 a day."

"John P. Bengston, East 42d street—

"I employ about 20 men at the regular rate of \$5 a day."

"Anton Sattler, West 46th street—

"I pay Painters \$5 a day, and employ on an average about 35 men."

"The Hester Decorating Company, Fifth avenue, Manhattan—

"We employ on an average 15 men, and pay the Union scale of \$5 a day."

"C. F. Stromeyer Company, East Ninth Street, Manhattan—

"The average number of Painters in our employ for the past 52 weeks was 19."

"N. J. Mathieu, West 39th Street—

"I pay all Painters in my employ \$5 a day, and chargemen \$5.50. I employ on an average 25 men."

"Henry F. Dabelstein & Sons, West 99th Street—

"We employ on an average 18 or 20 Painters. We pay all the men \$5 a day."

"A. Kimbel & Son, West 40th Street—

"We pay \$5 a day for eight hours, and employ on an average about 10 Painters during the year."

"Carr & Steele, Eighth Avenue—

"We employed the past year an average of about 20 Painters. We pay \$5 and \$5.50 per diem."

"H. F. Huber & Co., East 40th Street—

"We have 15 Painters employed during the year. The number varies. We pay them \$5 a day."

"A. J. Ferguson, West 26th Street—

"We employ 25 to 85 Painters, according to the season, at the recognized wage of \$5 for an eight-hour day."

"O. H. Bauer, East 40th Street—

"My force varies from five to 50 men, as the season requires. I pay Painters \$5 a day, without exception."

"Nathaniel B. Beam's Sons, Madison Avenue—

"Our wage scale is \$5 a day of eight hours. We employ on an average 25 Painters."

"H. H. Upham & Co., West Broadway—

"We employ on the average 18 Painters. The wage paid at present is 62½ cents an hour."

"Rambusch Decorating Company, West 45th Street—

"We pay all our Painters \$5 or more a day, and employ between 30 and 40 men throughout the year."

"William Baumgarten & Co., Fifth Avenue—

"We employ an average of about 35 men at the rate of \$5 a day throughout."

"Theo. Hofstatter & Co., Fifth Avenue—

"We employ about 25 Painters on the average. All of these men receive \$5 per day of eight hours."

"L. Alavoine & Co., Fifth Avenue—

"The number of Painters we employ varies, the average being 50 men or more, at \$5 a day for plain Painters, \$5.50 for men in charge, and more for specialist Decorators."

"Albert D. Howlett Company, Fifth Avenue—

"We employ on the average 150 to 200 Painters during the period of about ten months out of the year. We pay all of our men 62½ cents an hour, or \$5 a day."

"P. W. French & Co., East 56th Street—

"We pay the union wage and employ an average of 20 Painters."

"Amsterdam Building Company, West 42d Street—

"We are employing at the present time three or four Painters and pay the prevailing rate of wages of \$5 a day."

"Andrew Neumann West 42d Street—

"This is to certify that I employ 35 Painters on the average the entire year, at the union scale of wages."

"Barney Phillips Company, Forty-fifth Street, Manhattan—

"We pay not less than \$5 a day to Painters and employ an average of about 25 men during the year."

"The Barker Painting Company, West 26th Street—

"We employ from 150 to 250 Painters, or an average of about 200, for ten months out of the year. We pay all of our Painters in Greater New York 62½ cents an hour, or \$5 a day."

"About 1,250 men are employed by the above firms. Three employers quoted made different statements when questioned in July, owing no doubt to seasonal changes of force. The other 32 are additional to those employers interviewed in July, 1916."

"Application was made by the Brotherhood of Painters to this Board on June 20, 1916, for an increase in rate for all Painters from \$4 to \$5 per diem. Investigation made in the following month by the Bureau of Personal Service resulted in denial of the request. The application was made at the time the Brotherhood was endeavoring to generally enforce the new rate. Conditions as to rates paid have evidently changed."

"The District Council of Painters on January 15, 1917, submitted certified copies of daily reports of business agents of the Council during the period from August 24 to December 21, 1916. These agents visited 1,900 painting jobs in Manhattan and The Bronx, including a small percentage visited a second time. The location of the job, name of the contractor, number of Painters employed thereon, and whether Union or Non-Union men, are given."

"The reports show that about 9,100 men, with Union cards and about 300 without cards were employed on the jobs. It was difficult to obtain information from contractors employing men without cards, which would probably increase the number of men on those jobs visited to 600. On account of duplication of visits, the figures given do not show the exact number employed. The object of the Brotherhood is to show the proportion of Union to non-Union men on the jobs."

"Protest is now made by the Brotherhood against the inclusion of men called Painters, many of whom are unable to pass the examination required by the Civil Service Commission for City employees. These had been included in the computation to discover the rates paid to a majority of men in the trade, and militated against the Painters in a conclusion as to what constituted a majority."

"The Brotherhood insists that the number of qualified Painters in Manhattan and The Bronx receiving less than \$5 per diem is not above 1,000. These two, Boroughs employ a majority of all the Painters in Greater New York. The representative asserts that statements made that there are 30,000 to 40,000 Painters in Greater New York are mere guesses and include the host of small employers; that the total in all the Boroughs is not much in excess of 20,000 journeymen Painters. The hundreds of jobbing employers are not members of the Union, and are not permitted to handle a brush on a Union job. It is also claimed that hundreds of so-called Painters in hotels and apartment houses are handy men, who repair pipes, paint radiators, etc."

"Explanation is made by the representative that the condition of the trade

as to rates paid in July was different from that of November or December. The former examination by the Bureau of Personal Service was made soon after the inauguration of the attempt to enforce the \$5 rate. The reports by the business agents for the period August to December show a larger proportion of men with Union cards in the latter month."

"The representative exhibited figures of membership for November, 1916, in the several locals in Manhattan and The Bronx represented in the District Council, showing a total of 11,332 journeymen Painters, who, it is claimed, receive \$5 per diem when employed. There are also about 3,500 members in the Brooklyn locals of Painters. An effort to enforce a \$5 rate in Queens has just been inaugurated."

"From the additional facts presented, it would appear that a majority of the qualified Painters in Greater New York are now paid a rate of \$5 per diem."

"In view of the above facts, we recommend that the attached resolutions, approving the \$5 per diem rate for Painters, and requesting the heads of City departments to provide for the increase, be adopted. Respectfully,

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to dealers in second-hand articles.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Paragraph 1, section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Dealers in Second-hand Articles, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 44. Restrictions.

1. Place, expired licenses. No dealer in second-hand articles shall carry on business without a license, or at any other place than the one designated in his license, [nor shall he continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired,] except that any dealer in old clothes shall have the right to purchase old clothes from house to house, and if he has no store, his home

shall be designated as his place of business; but no such dealer shall purchase clothes from a person or persons on the streets, nor except as herein provided purchase and deal in second-hand clothing and other articles in public or other places not licensed as second-hand business places; and such dealer of old clothes while soliciting business from house to house shall wear a badge to be supplied by the Commissioner of Licenses in such form and design as the Commissioner of Licenses shall prescribe. No dealer in second-hand articles shall continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

SIRS—In accordance with the Charter provisions, I hereby request your approval of the selection of the following sites for refuse destructors in the Borough of Queens, surveys, as shown on blueprints, of which are transmitted herewith. The sites are located in Flushing, Jamaica and Arvene.

The site at Flushing is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point at the intersection of the Westerly line of Eastport Street and the Northerly line of Connerton Avenue, as said street and avenue are laid down upon a map establishing the lines and grades of that portion of the Third Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, and bounded by Uhland Avenue, White-stone Avenue, Jackson Avenue, Tallman Avenue and Fork Street and of Wakefield Street from Uhland Avenue to the old Village Line, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 13th day of June, 1912, and filed at Jamaica on August 21, 1912.

An Ordinance to Amend Article 4 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Classification of Buildings.

By the Vice-Chairman—

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 4 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to classification of buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Article 4 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to classification of buildings, is hereby amended by adding thereto, after section 73, a new section to be numbered 74, to read as follows:

§74. Existing buildings. 1. The provisions of paragraphs a and g of subdivision 1 of section 72, of article 4 of this chapter, relating to fireproof construction of hospitals, garages and other buildings therein specified, hereafter erected, shall not apply to existing non-fireproof buildings not exceeding 3 stories or 40 feet in height and not exceeding 7,500 square feet in area, erected prior to January 1st, 1917.

The superintendent of buildings shall approve the occupancy of such existing buildings, or parts thereof, for the purposes specified in paragraphs a and g of subdivision 1 of section 72 and shall issue the certificates of occupancy provided for in section 5 of article 1 of this chapter, provided that the construction of said existing buildings, or such parts thereof occupied for the purposes specified, complies with the following requirements:

2. All ceilings and both sides of all partitions and walls erected of combustible material shall be covered with plaster boards $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch in thickness and No. 26 gauge sheet metal, or wire lath or expanded metal and not less than $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch in thickness of cement plaster, or a double thickness of asbestos boards not less than $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch in thickness, or such other fireproof, fire-retarding or fire-resistant material as may be approved by the superintendent of buildings or the board of standards and appeals.

3. The floors of combustible materials of said existing buildings, or such parts thereof occupied for the purposes specified, to be covered with not less than 3 inches in thickness of concrete or a mixture complying with the requirements of subdivision 6 of section 351 of article 17 of this chapter, or such other fireproof, fire-retarding or fire-resistant materials as may be approved by the superintendent of buildings or the board of standards and appeals.

The existing non-fireproof buildings included in the provisions of this section shall not be enlarged in area or increased in height, unless the construction of such extensions complies with the provisions of subdivision 2 of section 72 of article 4 of this chapter, and said existing buildings or parts thereof shall not be occupied for the purposes specified, and the superintendent of buildings shall not issue the certificate of occupancy therefor, unless the buildings comply in all other respects with the requirements of this chapter and other laws and ordinances governing the construction, means of exit, light and ventilation, plumbing and drainage, and restrictions as to area, height and use of buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 31 of article 3 of chapter 26 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to coal and coke, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Sec. 2. Article 3 of chapter 26 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section 31, to read as follows:

§ 31. Coal.

1. To be sold by weight.

Coal shall be sold by avordupois weight, as hereinafter provided. A person, firm or corporation shall not attempt to sell or deliver less than two thousand pounds by weight to the ton of coal or a proper proportion thereof in quantities less than a ton and shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding \$50, provided that in all cases thirty pounds to a ton shall be allowed for the variation in scales and wastage.

2. Scales, designation of.

There shall be designated by the commissioner stationary scales, suitable for the purpose of weighing coal, the owners of which may tender the same for public use in different parts of the city in such number and locality as shall be deemed necessary, on which the coal, or the vehicle, with or without coal, may be weighed. The scales so designated shall be provided at the expense of the owners thereof, with test weights, and shall be subject at all times to the inspection and supervision of the commissioner or an inspector of weights and measures, who shall inspect such scales at least once in each month. Such scales shall also be provided by the owner thereof with a competent weighmaster. The owner of such scales shall be entitled to charge for weighing coal, and vehicles containing coal at such scales, a fee of not exceeding fifteen cents per ton; empty vehicles returning to such scale and after delivery of coal contained therein shall be reweighed without further charge.

3. Owner of scales to give bond.

The owner of such scales so designated shall enter into a bond with the city in

which such scales are situated in the sum of five hundred dollars with two sufficient sureties, conditioned that such scales shall be kept in such condition as at all times to properly register the weight of coal and that the person weighing coal thereat shall perform his duties faithfully, and furnish like certificates to all persons having coal, or coal vehicles weighing at such scales. The amount of such bond shall be recoverable at the suit of the city on proof that any conditions thereof have not been complied with.

4. Delivery tickets.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation delivering coal to deliver, or cause to be delivered, any quantity or quantities of coal which shall have been sold by weight without each such delivery being accompanied by a delivery ticket and a duplicate thereof, on each of which shall be in ink, or other indelible substance, distinctly expressed in pounds, the quantity or quantities of coal contained in a car, wagon or other vehicle used in such delivery, with the name of the purchaser thereof and the name of the dealer from whom purchased. One of such tickets shall be delivered to the purchaser of the coal specified thereon and the other of such tickets shall be retained by the seller of the coal. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding fifty dollars.

5. Provision as to delivery of entire cargo.

The preceding section shall not apply to coal delivered by the entire cargo direct from the vessel containing the same to one destination and accepted by the purchaser on the original bill of lading as proof of weight; but with every such delivery of an entire cargo of coal in the city there shall be delivered to the purchaser thereof one of the original bills of lading, issued by the person, firm or corporation by whom the coal was loaded into the vessel from which such coal is delivered to the purchaser of the entire cargo thereof, on each of which bills of lading there shall be in ink or other indelible substance distinctly expressed the date and place of loading such cargo and the number of pounds contained thereon. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding fifty dollars.

6. Right of purchaser to have coal reweighed.

It shall be the right of every purchaser of coal before accepting delivery of same to have any of the delivery of such coal weighed at his expense at any of the scales designated under the provisions of the preceding sections, provided such scales are within one-half mile of the place of loading or the place of delivery of the coal, and for this purpose to require that any vehicle containing coal purchased by him shall be taken by the driver or other person in charge thereof to such scales for the purpose of having the same weighed, and after the delivery of the coal, to require that the vehicle from which such coal so purchased shall have been delivered shall be taken by the driver thereof, or any other person in charge thereof, to such scales to be weighed at the expense of the purchaser thereof and a certificate of the weight of such coal so weighed as aforesaid shall thereupon be furnished to the purchaser of such coal by the owners of scales by which such coal is so weighed.

7. Penalty for refusal to permit coal to be reweighed.

The refusal of any person, firm or corporation to permit coal purchased from him to be reweighed at the request of the purchaser thereof, as aforesaid, or an inspector of weights and measures, or any driver or other person in charge of a vehicle containing coal from which coal has been delivered, to take the same at the request of the purchaser or an inspector of weights and measures to such scales for the purpose of having the same weighed, provided, however, that the purchaser of such coal shall have first paid the owners of the scales or the seller of such coal, or the driver or other person in charge of the vehicle containing such coal an amount sufficient to meet the charges for weighing such coal shall render the person, firm or corporation selling the coal liable to a penalty not to exceed one hundred dollars.

8. Penalty for fraudulent weighing.

Any owner of such scales or any agent or representative of his, or any weighmaster employed by him thereat who shall be concerned in any manner in any fraudulent weighing of coal at such scales, or false entry of such weighings, shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of one hundred dollars.

9. Owner of scales to keep memorandum book.

Every owner of such scale shall keep a book in which shall be entered in ink a memorandum of every load of coal weighed at such scales showing the name of the person, firm or corporation delivering such coal, the net weight thereof, as shown by the delivery ticket thereof, of such person, firm or corporation, the name of the purchaser thereof, the gross and net weight of the coal so weighed and the date of weighing. Such book shall be the book of original entries and all certificates delivered by the owner of such scales shall be copies of the entries contained therein, and such book shall at all reasonable hours be open to the inspection of any citizen. Such book shall be furnished by the commissioner and when such book of entries is completed such book shall be delivered to the commissioner and filed as a public record.

10. Bills-of-lading; penalty for altering.

A person guilty of altering, with intent to defraud, any original bill of lading issued by the person, firm or corporation by whom the coal was loaded into the vessel in which such coal is transported or of uttering any such bill of lading so altered, or who is guilty of making, preparing or subscribing or uttering false or fraudulent manifest, invoice or bill of lading thereof, or removing any part of such cargo of coal without having the amount thereof certified to in writing on such original bill of lading, by the person, firm or corporation receiving the coal so removed, and by the captain of the vessel containing such cargo, shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of one hundred dollars.

11. Markings of bags and baskets.

All coal sold or offered for sale in baskets, bags or other receptacles used for the delivery of such coal must have the weight of the contents plainly marked on the outside thereof in solid roman capital letters at least one inch in height. Any person, firm or corporation delivering coal as aforesaid in violation of this section shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of fifty dollars.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Rules, to which was referred on January 23, 1917 (Minutes, page 195), the annexed resolution protesting against passage by the Legislature of resolution proposing amendment to Constitution in relation to qualification of voters, respectfully reports:

The Committee on Rules gave a public hearing upon this resolution at which three speakers appeared in opposition, one of whom represented a secret and mysterious society known as "The Guardians of Liberty;" the other two presented their

individual views. A large number of supporters of the resolution representing various societies and activities were heard.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State curtailing manhood suffrage is a step backward instead of forward in representative government. Many intelligent and excellent citizens exercise the franchise now who are unable to read or write the English language, and the imposition of this qualification on future citizens should be strenuously resisted. Under existing naturalization laws candidates for admission to citizenship are subjected to a rigid examination by the courts, and our system of State education and the laws enacted for its enforcement have reduced illiteracy to such a negligible quantity that the proposed amendment to the Constitution is absolutely unnecessary and should be defeated. Nearly fifty years ago the Government of the United States opened the door of citizenship to the freed man of the Southern planter, debased and demoralized by generations of slavery, and it will not be contended now that a democratic system of government which so successfully withstood the shock to the electorate caused by that act of enfranchisement following emancipation is in any danger from the man who may be possessed of more than average learning, but who may be unable to express his thoughts in English. The proposed Constitutional amendment applies not only to the illiterate, but to all not versed in the English language, regardless of ability, learning and intelligence.

Your Committee believes that far more danger exists in the discharge of the duties of citizenship, from the evasions of refinement than in the alleged ignorance of those citizens who cultivate the paths of honest industry and contribute their brawn and muscle to the development of the resources of our common country.

The Committee therefore earnestly recommends the adoption of the resolution.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby enters earnest protest against the passage, by the Legislature of the Resolution, Senate No. 54, Int. 54, proposing an amendment to section one of article two of the Constitution, in relation to the qualification of voters, the same being too drastic in its application, out of keeping with the spirit of the Declaration of Independence and wholly contrary to the principles intended by the founders of the Nation, most particularly as expressed in the words contained in said resolution, reading as follows:

"No person shall become entitled to vote by attaining majority, by naturalization or otherwise, unless such person is also able, except for physical disability, to read and write English."

Resolved, further, that a copy hereof be transmitted to the Senate, to the Assembly and to the Governor.

Report of the Committee on Finance in Favor of Adopting a Resolution Authorizing an Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$92,260.30, for the Purchase of Fire Hose—Fire Department.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on November 21, 1916, and December 26, 1916 (Minutes, pages 642, 868), the annexed requests of the Fire Commissioner for special revenue bonds, \$92,260.30, for the purchase of fire hose, respectfully

REPORTS:

That after hearing Commissioner Adamson and Chief Kenlon in favor of this request and Mr. Saunders of the Bureau of Contract Supervision in opposition, the Committee is inclined to accept the statements of the Fire Commissioner and Fire Chief, and, not wishing to accept the responsibility of what might occur if it followed the recommendation of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, it recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of ninety-two thousand two hundred and sixty dollars and thirty cents (\$92,260.30), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Fire Commissioner for the purpose of the purchase of fire hose. All obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Sir—I wish to call your attention to the urgency of early action upon my request of November 15, 1916, for a revenue bond issue of \$92,260.30 for new hose for this department. This hose is badly needed to carry us through the winter season, and I feel that the Board of Aldermen should rely upon the statements of this department that the hose is needed and not rely upon statements from any other source. We feel that we are in position to know the needs of the department, and you are aware of the vital necessity of keeping this department supplied with a sufficient quantity of reliable hose so as to be able to meet all emergencies. Fire companies without available hose can not do their work. I am just in receipt to-day of a report from Captain McKenna, of Engine 13, asking for an increased allowance of hose for his company.

The situation is such that we must have the hose contemplated in the request now pending before your Board if we are to supply the companies with all the hose that is necessary. The winter months impose a severe test upon the department and it is necessary that the companies have a sufficient quantity of hose to meet the severe test which they are called upon to face during this period. Fire Department, City of New York, November 15, 1916.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Sir—On May 29, 1916, I requested an issue of revenue bonds in the sum of \$152,976 for the purchase of 208,336 feet of fire hose of various sizes, and stated that this quantity of hose was necessary to provide the proper quota for each company and to retire hose no longer fit for service, but which was still being used by some engine companies.

Acting upon this request, the Board of Aldermen granted only \$75,000 for hose, although both myself and Chief Kenlon stated to the committee as earnestly and emphatically as possible that the full amount was needed. The Bureau of Contract Supervision, in its report made to the Finance Committee of your body, recommended that my request be cut to \$75,000 and this recommendation was based upon the assumption that all hose in the department under eight years of age was reliable hose and should not be replaced. I stated to the Finance Committee at the time that this was not the fact and that we had considerable hose under eight years of age which the officers of the Fire Department who handle it do not regard as sufficiently strong and reliable for active use.

The present condition as to hose in the Fire Department is as follows:

The established quota of the various sizes of hose necessary properly to equip the different fireboats and fire companies is 67,600 feet of 1½-inch hose, 428,500 feet of 2½-inch hose, 99,150 feet of 3-inch hose and 45,250 feet of 3½-inch hose.

Of 1½-inch hose we have on hand 40,000 feet, which is 27,600 feet below the quota fixed by the Fire Chief as necessary for the department, and we have 3,250 feet of 1½-inch hose which is over eight years old. This makes a total deficit of 30,850 feet, but this amount will be reduced in a few weeks by the delivery of 10,000 feet of 1½-inch hose which is due on contract, leaving a total deficit of 20,850 feet of 1½-inch hose.

Of 2½-inch hose we have on hand 432,650 feet, which is 4,150 feet more than the fixed quota, but, as 91,500 feet of this hose is over eight years old, we have a total deficit of 87,350 feet. This will be reduced within a few weeks by the delivery of 36,500 feet of new 2½-inch hose which is due on contract, leaving a total deficit of 50,850 feet of 2½-inch hose.

Of 3-inch hose we have on hand 111,050 feet, a surplus of 11,900 feet, as compared with the fixed quota, but, as 54,350 feet of this hose is more than eight years old, we have a total deficit of 42,450 feet. Since we have 20,000 feet of 3-inch hose due on contracts, this deficit is reduced to 22,450 feet.

Of 3½-inch hose, we have on hand 36,650 feet, which is 8,600 feet less than our quota calls for, and since 11,500 feet of this hose is over eight years old, we have a total deficit of 20,100 feet. This will shortly be reduced by the delivery of 9,300 feet, leaving a total deficit of 10,800 feet.

The cost of the various sizes of hose necessary to bring our supply of hose under eight years old up to our fixed quota is estimated as follows:

I, therefore, respectfully, but urgently, renew my request made on May 29th, 1916, for revenue bonds, which request I beg to increase by the amount of hose which since that time has either burst at fires or has passed the eight year age limit. I, therefore, request an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$92,260.30.

The quantity of hose on hand in the department over eight years old is constantly being reduced by bursting at fires. Unless we are able to replace this hose with new hose, the quantity of hose bursting at fires is certain to increase, and the consequence of this happening at fires might be a great increase in the loss of property and even might result in the loss of life. Of course, the members of your Board realize the necessity of keeping the Fire Department supplied with a sufficient quantity of sound and reliable hose, and I earnestly urge your Board to take favorable action as early as possible upon this request. No allowance is made in the budget for hose, as it was understood at the time, as it has been for several years, that the appropriation for hose for this department be made in the form of revenue bonds. I again ask that the Board give this request favorable attention and as early as date as possible. Very truly yours, ROBERT ADAMSON, Fire Commissioner.

No. 995. Fire Commissioner—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$92,260.30, for the Purchase of Fire Hose.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—On May 29, 1916, the Fire Commissioner requested an issue of \$152,976 for the purchase of 208,336 feet of fire hose of various sizes. On July 27, 1916, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the issue of \$75,000 in special revenue bonds for this purpose, as requested by the Board of Aldermen on July 7, 1916.

The action of the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate in approving an appropriation of \$75,000 instead of for the total amount requested was in accordance with the recommendations in a report by the Bureau of Contract Supervision which reads in part as follows:

"It is believed that an allowance of \$75,000 will provide for the normal yearly loss of hose and at the same time provide an adequate margin for replacing such hose as will burst during the annual hose test, which because of the reputed shortage has been postponed until funds can be obtained to replace the breakage.

"Upon completion of the annual hose test a further study of the need for fire hose can be made and if deemed necessary, an additional amount may be provided in the annual budget for 1917 for this purpose."

No appropriation was made in the budget for 1917 for the reason that no hose test was made to determine the amount which should be replaced.

Contracts for the purchase of hose to the full extent of the July authorization of \$75,000 have been entered into. Some of this hose has been delivered, but it has not been accepted, because the tests are not completed.

The present request of the Fire Commissioner is based on providing the amount of hose necessary to furnish each company with the quantity fixed as standard equipment by the Chief of the Fire Department and also to provide for the replacement of all hose now in service which is over eight years of age.

There is nothing in the records of the Fire Department to indicate that hose becomes unreliable after eight years of service. Some is damaged and becomes unreliable much sooner than this and on the other hand there is in service in the Fire Department hose of all ages up to sixteen years. This hose would have been condemned in annual hose tests long ago, if it had been defective or weak at eight years of age.

The amount of hose considered by the Chief to be necessary for the proper equipment of a fire company is usually more than twice as much as the hose wagons carry when fully loaded and in some instances considerably more than twice.

In a report dated January 5, 1907, Deputy Commissioner Hugh Bonner recommended that an appropriation of \$100,000 be made in order to equip each company with 2,000 feet of hose. Only \$75,000 was approved by the Board of Aldermen.

The present standard of equipment is based upon supplying single companies with from 2,250 to 3,750 feet and double companies with 4,500 to 4,750 feet of hose.

It does not appear that the department has ever been supplied with the amount of hose which was considered sufficient by the Chief of Department.

In January and April, 1908, the Board of Fire Underwriters reported the shortage as 194,050 feet.

The Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics of the Department of Finance reported the shortage in June, 1909, as 109,450 feet.

In 1912 the Fire Commissioner stated in his annual report that the shortage was 179,250 feet and requested an appropriation of \$309,680. The Board of Aldermen granted \$100,000.

There is no apparent evidence that the department has ever been handicapped in fighting fires because of lack of hose.

At the present time, from the Commissioner's statement in the request, the amount of hose on hand is 20,150 feet below the theoretical standard. This deficit will be more than made up by 75,800 feet of hose due to be delivered on contracts.

In addition to the deficits of 20,150 feet the Commissioner wishes to replace 160,600 feet of hose which is over eight years of age and which may or may not be defective.

I recommend that no appropriation of special revenue bonds be approved at this time, but that the Fire Commissioner be requested to test all hose over eight years of age, at as early a date as possible, weather permitting, after the full delivery of hose on present contracts is in service.

After April 1, 1917, it will be possible to transfer salary and wage accruals to provide sufficient funds to replace hose which fails in the suggested test.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Sir—At the hearing on Monday before your Committee on my request for \$92,260.30 for the replacement of hose, you asked me to submit in writing my reply to the report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, which recommends that the request be denied pending a test of all hose more than eight years in service. I respectfully urge your Committee not to adopt the recommendation of the Bureau of Contract Supervision for the following reasons:

First—A test such as is proposed, namely, a test confined to hose over eight years old, would be wholly incomplete as it would not eliminate all unfit hose from service. This is shown by the fact that out of 1,429 lengths of hose which burst in service last year, 958 lengths were under eight years old and only 471 lengths were over eight years old.

I presume that the suggestion of the Bureau to limit the test to hose over eight years old arose from the fact that my request for funds was based on replacing hose eight years or more in service. Long experience has shown that the most accurate basis which can be determined for replacement of hose is the eight year service limit. This, obviously, however, cannot be applied literally, as the figures just quoted show. It has been our constant experience here that a large quantity of hose less than eight years in service bursts at fires and is condemned. On the other hand, a considerable percentage of hose more than eight years in service will survive a test, and consequently the estimate of eight years as the average life of hose has been found to be approximately correct.

The contract guarantee for hose is three years. The present Mayor, when Commissioner of Accounts, recommended that "all hose over six years of age should be

condemned and turned over to other City departments in which reliability under pressure is not the first essential." He subsequently modified this view by approving the use of hose over six years old in outlying residential districts, where the pressure used is relatively low.

It is the judgment of this department that all hose more than five years in service should be subjected to test. If such a test were held at the present time it is certain that the quantity of hose which would burst would equal the amount asked for in my request.

Second—In view of the large amount of hose we have in service more than eight years old, neither I nor the Chief of Department is willing to assume responsibility for such a test as I have outlined until the department is provided with a supply sufficient to replace all hose which is certain to burst as the result of the test. To undertake a test without a supply on hand for replacement would be unwise and would result in reducing the fixed allotment of hose in fire companies below the point regarded as safe. To each engine company is assigned a fixed amount of hose. This allowance was last revised June 1, 1915, when a total reduction of 53,000 feet in the departmental allowance was made. This allowance cannot be further reduced. When all hose now under contract is delivered we will still have in service, as a part of our active complement, 104,900 feet of hose more than eight years old. The request now pending before you is for funds to replace this quantity of hose.

I might point out that fire companies are now carrying as part of their allowance hose which officers know to be weak or defective, and which they do not use because they are unwilling to take the risk of having it burst at fires.

We ask you to accept the carefully considered judgment of this department that the hose asked for in my request is actually needed in order properly to equip the various fire companies.

Finally, may I call attention to the fact that purchases of hose during the past three years have averaged only 56,098 feet per year, as against 90,541 feet per year for the six years preceding. No part of the equipment of the fire fighting force is so vital as a proper supply of good hose, because if the hose fails the firemen are helpless no matter how strong their equipment otherwise. Failure of a few lengths of hose at a critical time at a fire might easily result in a great increase in the fire loss as well as in endangering human life. Recollection of what happened at the Parker Building fire in 1907 should be sufficient to prevent a refusal to the firemen of a sufficient quantity of good and reliable hose to enable them properly to perform their work. Report of the Committee on Finance in Favor of Adopting a Resolution Amending Corporate Stock Issue for the Acquisition of a Site and Construction of a Building for a Women's Court, Etc.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on January 9, 1917 (Minutes, page 67), the annexed resolution amending corporate stock issue for the acquisition of a site and construction of a building for a Women's Court, Women's Jail and place of detention for women in the Borough of Manhattan, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, while the Committee is in full accord with the purposes for which this money was authorized, nevertheless since the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has under the "pay as you go" policy, appropriated other funds for these purposes under different arrangements; the Comptroller stated to the Committee "that under no circumstances can this money be used now for the original intention, but perhaps in a year or two when financial strain on the City will be eased, then, if there will be need for such a building, funds can be authorized." It feels it would be unwise to disapprove the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of a large amount of money at a time when the demands on the City finances are so great.

The Committee, therefore, agrees with the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following amended resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a stated meeting held December 28, 1916.

Resolved, That, subject to the concurrence herewith by the Board of Aldermen, the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 26, 1913, and concurred in by the Board of Aldermen July 15, 1913, which authorized an issue of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000) in corporate stock of The City of New York to provide means for the acquisition of a site and the construction of a building for a Women's Court, Women's Jail and Place of Detention for Women in the Borough of Manhattan under the jurisdiction of the Department of Correction, be and the same is hereby amended by making the amount therein authorized read "eighty-two thousand dollars (\$82,000)," thereby rescinding the sum of three hundred sixty-eight thousand dollars (\$368,000) in the fund C.P.M. 53.

City of New York, City Magistrates' Courts, 300 Mulberry Street, February 5, 1917.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

My Dear Sir—Owing to the sickness of several Magistrates I am compelled to remain here to-day in connection with the Traffic Court. It would be impossible for me to attend your meeting, as I would very much like to do. If you consider it important enough, and there is an adjournment, I would have to ask that it go over for two weeks from to-day, because of a multitude of engagements for practically every day until that time.

If this is impossible then I beg to say, briefly, that I am opposed to the passage of the resolution before Your Honorable Body for these reasons:

1. This money was originally appropriated for the building of a courtroom and proper house of detention for women. The Law of 191—specifically says that the city should provide such a place in connection with the Night Court for Women, where the less hardened women could be separated from those who are incorrigible.

2. The present Night Court and the attendant prison do not meet the requirements of the law. The locality is bad; the physical conditions severely handicap the proper work of the court; the noise from the elevated trains and the cars makes it impossible, especially on warm nights when the windows are open, to hear the evidence given by the witnesses. The place attracts a morbid crowd of curiosity seekers. It would be hard to find a worse situation for such a court.

3. The plans submitted for this court were the result of suggestions and criticisms from various parties. It was intended to make it so that no woman arrested in Manhattan and The Bronx should go to a stationhouse or to any city prison, including the Tombs. This required a very large and important structure. The object in view was highly desirable and would have been of great benefit to the community, but the amount appropriated was far short of that given in the bids. It was then proposed to either ask the city authorities to appropriate the additional amount or modify the plans to make it within the appropriation already existing. The proposition therefore now is:

4. Let this appropriation stand and we can readily construct within its limits a building for a Women's Court and Detention House, where the law will be complied with, and the woman arrested for the first time saved from the disgrace of a night either in a stationhouse or a city prison, so destructive of her self-respect and such a grievous injury, especially in the cases of those who are afterwards proved to be innocent.

A proper, sanitary building with detention rooms and cells can be located on the site selected on West 30th street, the Night Court removed from its present wretched situation and day sessions held instead of those at night. If the city authorities will give this building, and discretion is lodged in me by law I will at once make the experiment of doing away with the Night Court for Women, with its opportunities for loungers, loafers and undesirable people who patronize it at night, and take it out into the day. I am absolutely confident it would be an immense improvement on existing conditions and make for public betterment in every way.

If the building cannot be built for the money already appropriated, so far as I am concerned the City will not be asked to add another dollar. If the prices now are too high for building materials we can wait, the same as any private individual would do who contemplated the erection of a building.

M. I am Chairman of the Committee appointed by the New York Probation and Protective Association to take up this matter of the House of Detention. This Association is very deeply interested in the matter, and is also strongly opposed to the transfer of the appropriation made.

Just now I am engaged in the trial of a very important case in the United States District Court (United States against Malvin), which has been going on for about a week, which is still in progress and which will not be terminated, I expect, before the close of the coming week. I am writing, therefore, to ask that the hearing before the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, set for Monday next at two thirty o'clock in the afternoon, be adjourned for one week so that I may have an opportunity to appear before the Finance Committee and, on behalf of the New York Probation and Protective Association, present arguments in opposition to this action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. I very earnestly hope that you will grant this adjournment.

No. 1223—Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond, Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$2,600, for installation of Lighting Plants in Recreation Centers.

Sir—On February 1, 1917, you transmitted the above matter to the Bureau of Contract Supervision for investigation.

Investigation of the request has developed the following facts:

The department wishes to provide electric lighting facilities at the various playgrounds mentioned in their request, in order that they may be used at night.

At present none of the playgrounds in Manhattan, under the jurisdiction of the Park Department, are illuminated at night, and this is also true of the other boroughs. If funds are appropriated for this purpose now, a precedent will be established whereby the night lighting of many playgrounds throughout the City may be consistently urged. I am informed that the department is now preparing a scheme for illuminating the tennis courts in Central Park in order to permit playing tennis at night. The installation of this equipment would cost from \$7,000 to \$8,000, and there would be in addition the annual operation cost. Your Board will probably have to consider this matter also in the near future.

The department did not include this matter of night lighting in the 1917 departmental estimates, although the subject had been discussed within the department months before the 1917 budget was signed. It appears, therefore, that it was not urgent enough to include in the budget estimates, and there appears to have arisen no subsequent emergency demanding an issue of special revenue bonds at this time.

The department has recently purchased twelve 1,000 watt electric flood lights, which are used in Central Park for lighting the lakes during the skating period. Instead of this equipment remaining idle for the greater part of the year, it is suggested that these lights be used for playground illumination as an experiment at least.

In regard to the personal service to operate these playgrounds at night, the department states that it will use the existing force, adjusting the hours of the employees to meet the new conditions. Very truly yours,

This request for authority to contract for the construction of a comfort station at Pelham Bay Park, without public letting was advocated by Commissioner Whittle who stated that a number of bids were received on August the 10th, 1916, and that the lowest bids exceeded the appropriation. Sir—As the result of an accident, collision with an elevated column, the aerial hook and ladder truck assigned to Hook and Ladder Company No. 132, in Brooklyn, had the power plant wrecked, and the apparatus is now out of service.

A complete six-cylinder power plant, costing \$1,450, is required to get this apparatus back in service.

If proposals to furnish this power plant were advertised for, there could be only one bidder, and the City would be put to the expense of printing specifications, advertising in the CITY RECORD, and the contractor would unquestionably add the cost of security bond and disbursements to his bid, and probably take all the time allowed by the contract to make delivery, while a delivery will be made within ten days on an open market order. It is requested, therefore, that you grant permission to make this purchase in the open market without public letting, this being for the best interests of the City.

This aerial truck is now in the shops occupying valuable floor space and would hamper to some extent the work in the shops if a considerable number of apparatus came in for repairs at the same time, which frequently occurs at this season of the year. The importance of getting this piece of apparatus out of the shops and back in service at the earliest possible moment cannot be overstated. REPORTS:

That, in accordance with a message from the Mayor, this matter was recommended and a public hearing held, at which appeared Commissioner Wallstein, Deputy Commissioner Fay, Chief of Bureau of Combustibles, Mr. Hayes, and many representatives of Real Estate Associations and Motorcycle dealers. It was shown to the Committee that what appeared a too drastic provision would not be as harmful as supposed, and it was agreed to modify subdivision "d" of section 192 so as to permit a discretionary power in the matter. In consideration of this modification, the Committee recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance be adopted.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter ten of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting

§190. Permit.

Except upon premises for which a permit has been issued under this article, no person shall conduct a repair shop for motor cycles, nor store, house or keep, nor receive for storage, housing or keeping, more than four motor cycles containing gasoline in their fuel tanks; provided, however, that such a permit shall not be required for premises used as a garage under a permit duly issued therefor, nor for premises used for the storage or repair of motor cycles owned and operated by members of but one family.

§191. Restrictions.

1. Storage of Oil. Such permit shall state the amount of kerosene and lubricating oils which may be stored on such premises, which amount shall not be exceeded.

2. Basement Premises. No permit shall be granted for premises below the grade story of any building.

3. Tenement Houses, etc. No permit shall be issued for any premises situated in any tenement house, hotel or frame building, or in any non-fireproof building in which there is a factory or place of public assemblage, unless:

(a) The compartment enclosing such premises is of fire retarding material throughout, including doors and windows, and

(b) All doors and windows opening from each compartment into other portions of the building are self-closing.

§192. Fire Prevention.

In all premises for which a permit is issued under this article, the following regulations shall be complied with:

(a) No gasoline, except that in the fuel tanks of motor cycles, shall be permitted on the premises and such fuel tanks shall not be opened, drawn from or filled on the premises.

(b) No coal or oil burning stove shall be used.

(c) No motor cycle or part thereof shall, under any circumstances, be cleaned by the use of gasoline.

(d) Only electric lights shall be used, the bulbs of which shall be enclosed in wire cages or otherwise properly protected in a manner approved by the Fire Commissioner. Except under special authority from the Fire Commissioner, no gas or open flame shall be used for heating, lighting, or repair purposes.

(e) Fire pails, filled with sand, approved fire extinguishers and "no smoking" signs shall be provided in such number as the Fire Commissioner may require.

§2. Section forty-three of such chapter is hereby amended by inserting therein a new subdivision, to be numbered twenty-six-a, and to read as follows:

26-a. Motor cycle repair shop or storage place, or both. \$5.00

§3. This ordinance shall take effect on January first, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

It was explained to the Committee that this improvement will benefit the property owner by eliminating a useless and expensive requirement. AN ORDINANCE to amend section 601 of article 29 of chapter 5 of the Code of

Ordinances, relating to shut-off valves.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Article 29 of chapter 5, section 601, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Every building hereafter erected and also every existing building, other than residence buildings occupied exclusively by one or two families and having not more than 15 sleeping rooms, which may be supplied from some outside source with gas, vapor or fluid, except potable waters, shall have a conveniently accessible stopcock or other suitable device fixed to the supply pipes leading into the building at a place outside of the building, so arranged as to allow the supply to be shut off. Such stopcock or other device shall be so marked as to indicate either the contents and purpose of the supply pipe to which it is attached, or the company to which the device belongs. (B. C. §141; amended by order effective April 6, 1915.)

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.






