The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York met in the Mayor's Office, in the City Hall, on Thursday, July 7, 1887, at 2½ o'clock P. M., pursuant to the following call:

M., to consider the application of the New York and Long Island Bridge Company, under chapter 392 of Laws of 1885, for the consent of the Board, that the said bridge company enter upon and take possession of portions of certain streets, avenues and public places belonging to the City of New York, for its depot and works necessary for its connec-tion with the New York and Harlem Railroad in Fourth avenue, the matter of the Corlears Hook Park, and the unfinished business now before the Board. The reading of the minutes of the meeting of June 23, 1887, was, upon motion, dispensed with. Upon motion, in the absence of the Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen took the chair

The President of the Department of Public Parks offered the following resolution : Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York deem it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by laying out, opening and extending One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, of a uniform width of 60 feet between the lines of St. Ann's avenue and the Southern Boulevard, said street being more particularly bounded and described, as follows

Beginning at a point in the eastern line of St. Ann's avenue, distant 198.01 feet northerly from the intersection of the eastern line of St. Ann's avenue with the northern line of the Southern Boulevard ; 1st. Thence northeasterly along the eastern line of St. Ann's avenue for 60 feet ;

2d. Thence northeasterly deflecting 90 degrees to the right for 754.85 feet; 3d. Thence southwesterly along the northern line of Southern Boulevard for 125.12 feet; 4th. Thence northeasterly on a line forming an angle of 30 degrees 27 minutes I second to the right with the radius of the preceding course drawn through its southern extremity for 8.20 feet; 5th. Thence northwesterly deflecting 90 degrees to the left for 650 feet to the point of beginning. And that they propose to alter the map or plan of said City of New York by laying out, opening and extending said street aforesaid.

Resolved, That such proposed action of this Board be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD. The Secretary presented the following communication and petition in regard to the matter of small parks, under the act entitled "An act to provide for the location, acquisition, etc., of additional public parks in the City of New York, etc."

Hon. A. S. HEWITT, Mayor, City of New York :

DEAR SIR—Having read with much pleasure the articles in the daily papers in regard to small parks in the more crowded parts of the city, and particularly your letter of last week, in which you specify the ones at Beach, Duane and other streets, permit me to call your attention to a place that for years past has seemed admirably suited to this purpose. I refer to a plot of ground situated on east side of Hudson street, from Clarkson to Leroy, which has many old trees and other natural advantages

It is part garden, part grass and part graveyard, the latter belonging, I believe, to Trinity Church corporation. The section facing Hudson street was offered for sale some little time ago, and it seems that if the City is going to purchase any property for this purpose this would be a choice spot.

I may add that I do not own any property nor houses in this or any part of New York, nor do I live within two miles of the neighborhood. Trusting this suggestion may be of some benefit to our crowded city and those having need of these parks, I have the honor to be

The Chairman then declared the hearing of the New York and Long Island Bridge matter in order. Mr. James R. Cuming, who appeared as counsel for the bridge company, read section 10 of the act of incorporation, which section was passed as an amendment by the Legislature of 1885. It was under this section they asked for the desired permission. It provided that the proposed bridge should not obstruct either navigation on the river or travel on the streets; that no street should be closed nor property taken without compensation. It also provided how much money would be annually spent.

closed nor property taken without compensation. It also provided how much money would be annually spent. The company, he said, had complied with the provisions of the act requiring the plans to be filed for three months in the offices of the Department of Public Works and the Register. They now made formal application for their approach on Fourth avenue. They had determined to build their approach to the avenue over private property, between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, from Fourth avenue to the East river. They had determined to purchase this property and at the proper time would ask the Commissioner of Public Works for permission to span the avenues, over which it would cross. He would not deny that the Board of Street Openings had control of the whole subject, but the Fourth avenue portion they would only discuss now. Dr. Rainey would, he said, explain the structure and the manner in which it was desired to be built.

Dr. Thomas Rainey then read a letter, a copy of which he had forwarded to the Commissioner of Public Works and is hereunto annexed.

NEW YORK, July 4, 1887.

Hon. JOHN NEWTON, Commissioner of Public Works : DEAR SIR—In reply to your letter of 2d instant, wishing a description of the streets, avenues and public places necessary to the connection of the approaches of the New York and Long Island Bridge Company with the Harlem Railroad, in and upon Fourth avenue, I beg to state that we do not wish to close, or "enter upon, or take possession of" any street, avenue or public place in the City of New York, or to close any crossing, or remove any bridge, but to enter upon and take pos-session of only a narrow strip of seven feet width on the east side, and another varying from one to seven feet width on the west side of Fourth avenue, commencing, as shown in our detailed plan No. I, at or near Fifty-fourth street, and ending on the south side of Forty-ninth street, in the yard of the Grand Central Depot, and such other places as may be necessary for posts for crossing the streets, and any turn-out that may be necessary under the roadway of Fourth avenue. The New York approach will occupy the southern half of the block between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, from the East river to Lexington avenue ; and thence, by a curve north and south, into Fourth avenue ; these comprising a strip of land from 40 to 50 feet wide. The whole of this land from the East river will be acquired by purchase, or by condemnation of law, as made and provided.

provided.

provided. As we do not wish to enter upon or occupy any portion of a street or avenue between the East river and Fourth avenue, we will have simply to ask you, in due time, the usual permits for the works for overhead crossings of the streets and avenues. The southern curve of this approach will reach the centre of Fourth avenue at Sixty-second street at a height of 20 feet above street grade, and will decline rapidly to 12 feet height at Fifty-sixth street, where the open cut commences, from which point it will rapidly descend to the grade of the Harlem railroad ; the bridge tracks swinging out each side from the centre of the avenue whenever necessary for head-room, and running within the lines indicated on the plan mentioned into the yard. into the yard.

The curve northward will reach the centre of Fourth avenue a little north of Sixty-sixth street, at a height of 15 feet 6 inches from the storet grade to the bottom of the rail. From that point the elevated structure will descend to street grade at Sixty-seventh street. From the northern side of this street the open heading will commence for entering the tunnel under Sixty-eighth street, reaching

this street the open heading will commence for entering the tunnel under Sixty-eighth street, reaching grade of Harlem Railroad at about Seventieth street. The two descending arms which will be from 20 to 24 feet wide, according to style of structure, will run along the centre of Fourth avenue; the two bridge tracks lying centrally over the four tracks of the Harlem Railroad. While our two tracks swing out for head-room on the southern arm, within the walls indicated by the red lines on the plan, on the northern arm they will swing out only to the present rapid transit side-tracks of the Harlem Railroad, and will run vertically down into them. Thus, our tracks, on leaving Sixty-seventh street, will not require for the heading to the tunnel more space than that now enclosed within the iron railing. Our structure will be about 9 feet high in front of the great portal of the Seventh Regiment Armory, half-way between Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh street. We can close the tunnel opening at that point and build a curved roadway down from Sixty-seventh street, under the bridge, and back on the opposite side ; so that when the gates on Sixty-seventh street are closed for passing trains, the detour made by carriages would be less than one hundred feet from the direct line. As the columns supporting these approaches will require no further space on Fourth avenue than such as may be necessary for columns or posts, at the curb-line, where the structure crosses into the avenue.

avenue than such as may be necessary for columns or posts, at the curb-line, where the structure crosses into the avenue. You will thus see that after removing these retaining walls of the Harlem Railroad out the few feet indicated, still leave the sidewalk, as at present, 15 feet wide, and the roadway from 18 to 22 feet wide on each side of Fourth avenue and at a point where, for many good reasons, there is very little carriage traffic ; at the same time that the six tracks will be wholly within the retaining walls, where alone all crossings are now, and perhaps ever will be made in open daylight. Permit me, General, to call your attention to the fact that Fourth avenue rises, between Sixty-sixth and Sixty-eighth streets, nearly twenty feet ; which, with a high descending grade on our tracks, makes our entry into the tunnel short, quick and easy. We select this point not only for this reason but in obedience to another controling fact : that at Sixty-fourth street our two river spans are only 8 to feet long ; whereas, below that point, they would be each from eleven to twelve hundred feet long, with nearly impossible conditions of foundations as well as of private property and right of way. and right of way.

Dr. Rainey continued: That as the crossings would be made in the daylight, there would be absolutely no danger. The damage to private property would be very slight, and property-owners would be paid for any damage done. The speaker said that he had authority not only for making this statement but for carrying it out. He denied the charge that there was to be a carriageway on the bridge; the structure is not to be a two-story one. "If I get the consent of this board," said Dr. Rainey, "I say that the money is ready to commence the building of the bridge to-morrow. We should look to the vast interests to be benefited by this work, and not to the objection of half-a-dozen property-owners."

The Twelfth Ward shows a more rapid growth and greater building activity than any other

ward in the city. Whole blocks of buildings are in process of erection, and are rented as fast as they can be made ready. In many instances the work goes on day and night. The demand for contractors and work-men is far greater than the supply, and the aggregate of building is limited not by the demand for

ses but by the ability of the contractors to meet an unfilled demand. Solid rows of substantial dwelling-houses, large apartment buildings and stores are now to be solid rows of substantial dwelling-houses, large apartment buildings and stores are now to be seen, where but a short while ago there were only vacant lots and squatters' shanties ; and the most conservative real estate authorities agree that in but a few years, unless the City exercises its authority to prevent, there will be the same density of population which prevails down town, and which con-dition caused the passage by the last Legislature of the bill to provide for additional public parks. There is no public place or park nearer than the Morningside Park at One Hundred and Twen-tieth street, which is too remote to be healthful or convenient to the population of the large tract of land from One Hundred and Thirtieth to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street. The premises in question are situated upon the line of the cable road, and are, therefore.

The premises in question are situated upon the line of the cable road, and are, therefore, peculiarly accessible not only to those residing in the neighborhood but to the vast throng of people who, on Sundays and holidays, leave the lower parts of the city to enjoy the cooler atmosphere of the more elevated part of the island and the trip in the elevated and cable roads. They are in the immediate vicinity of the Hamilton homestead, and it would be a pleasing tribute to his memory to have there a Hamilton Park in which there could be raised a statue in his honor.

There are many large forest trees upon the proposed plot, and it could, with but little expense, be converted into a suitable park.

Real estate values are rising with a regularity and strength, proportionate to the building activity; and it would be far sighted and economical for the City to at once select and locate the said premises, and take title thereto, and not to await that development which will surely and soon come, but which will bring with it largely increased prices.

A protest was received from the Union Theological Seminary against the structure. When this was handed in, Dr. Rainey remarked that the residents of this portion of the avenue had withdrawn their opposition when the plans were explained to them.

W. H. PALMER, Captain, I. R. P., and Secretary. Mr. Everett P. Wheeler, representing property-owners affected, appeared in opposition to the scheme. He said that "the present plans were not a whit better than the old ones." The plan to have an elevated and surface road approach each other without turning out was absurd. He doubted the responsibility of the corporation asking for this consent, and requested that they be made furnish documentary evidence that it was a bona fide organization, as he understood several of the original directors had died. Continuing, he said that the faith of the City of New York was pledged to keep this avenue for residential purposes, and that they had spent \$6,000,000 in sinking the tracks, building parks, and otherwise improving it. The City is now asked to violate that pledge, and to sink the money expended on improvements. The speaker submitted a map showing the increase in real estate valuations, due to the fact that the City had given this pledge. Mr. Wheeler suggested that the railroad company should take a curve at the bulkhead at Avenue A and continue their tracks northward to the Harlem river, where they could make connec-tions in the large open space there. They could also run a branch to the elevated railroad station at Second avenue and Sixty-fifth street, which would give accommodation to passengers wishing to go down town. Sanutary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending

July 2, 1887 : The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,230. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,33. During the past week 464 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port of the Port.

revaccinations. There were seized and condemned, 13,095 pounds of meat, and 16,300 pounds of fish, 22 crates of cucumbers, 13 boxes of oranges, 52 boxes of lemons, 46 bunches of bananas, 795 melons and 3,000

pineapples. The number of specimens of milk examined was 79, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 64, and the number of arrests made was 4.

The certificates of 614 births, 60 still-births, 275 marriages, and 1,024 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 2, 1887. This shows an increase of 12 births, 35 marriages and 236 deaths, and a decrease of 5 still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was a decrease of 3 births and 5 still-births, and an increase of 23 marriages and 272 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; measles, 1; diphtheria, 1; croup, 5; whooping cough, 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 3; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; aneurism, 1; convulsions, 10; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; surgical operations, 2; drowning, 3; while the deaths from eryspelas increased 3; diarrheeal diseases, 109; manition, 8; alcoholism, 1; bronchitts, 2; pneumonia, 6; heart diseases, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 15; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 11; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 31; premature and preternatural births, 17; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from scarlatina, puerperal diseases and direct effect of solar heat was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.
