COMMUNICATIONS FROM DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

The Public Administrator, pursuant to chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, chapter 7, section 242 of said act, herewith exhibits to the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, a statement on oath of the moneys received by him for commissions and expenses, and of the total amount of his receipts and expenditures in each case in which he took charge and collected any effects or on which he administered on any estate during the year 1888, with the name of deceased, his occupation, the place of his residence at the time of his death, where known, and the country or place from which he came, if he was not a resident of this State at the time of his death.

Storrs, Deputy Comptroller, transmitting copies of resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held 19th December, 1888, granting to Charles E. Appleby certain lands under water, between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-eighth streets, North river; approving plans of ferry structures to be erected by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, foot of Whitehall street, East river, and declining to approve of certain agreements made with different owners of certain wharf property, on the East and North rivers, were

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the Secretary directed to enter the resolutions in full in the minutes, as follows:

Whereas, An application has been made by Charles E. Appleby for a grant of certain lands now under water and below the original high-water line of the North or Hudson river, and in front of and adjoining upland which the said Charles E. Appleby now claims to own, between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-eighth streets;

And the Comptroller and Commissioner of Public Works having, by their report to this Board dated December 19, 1888, reported that they have examined and inquired into the facts in the matter of such application, and that in their judgment the sum which should be charged as consideration for a grant from the Corporation of the City of New York of said land under water and below the original line of high water as hereinafter described, to the said Charles E. Appleby as the owner of the adjacent upland, is the sum of one hundred and eighty thousand dollars; it is now, therefore,

Resolved, That a grant be made by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to the said Charles E. Appleby, for the land now under water and below original high-water mark of the North or Hudson river, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point on the original line of high water, fifty-five feet eleven inches north of the northerly line of Fifty-sixth street, distant one hundred and eight feet westerly from the westerly line of Eleventh avenue, and running thence in a northerly direction along the line of high water as it winds and turns to a point where said high-water line intersects the southerly line of Fifty-seventh street, distant two hundred and eighty-four feet westerly from the westerly line of Eleventh avenue; running thence westerly five hundred and sixteen feet along the southerly line of Fifty-seventh street to the easterly line of Twelfth avenue; thence southerly along the easterly line of Twelfth avenue, one hundred and forty-four feet eleven inches, to a point on said easterly line of Twelfth avenue, distant fifty-five feet eleven inches northerly from the northeasterly corner of Fifty-sixth street and Twelfth avenue; thence easterly and parallel with the northerly side of Fifty-sixth street, six hundred and ninety-two feet, to the point or place of beginning. Also, beginning at a point on the original line of high water on the northerly line of Fifty-seventh street, three hundred and twenty-six feet westerly from the westerly line of Eleventh avenue, and running thence in a northerly direction along the line of high water as it winds and turns to a point where said high-water line intersects the southerly line of Fifty-eighth street, distant three hundred and sixty-eight feet westerly from the westerly line of Eleventh avenue; running thence westerly four hundred and thirty-two feet along the southerly line of Fifty-eighth street to the easterly line of Twelfth avenue;

thence southerly along the easterly line of Twelfth avenue two hundred feet and ten inches to the northerly line of Fifty-seventh street; thence easterly along the northerly line of Fifty-seventh street four hundred and seventy-four feet, to the point or place of beginning.

Such grant to be approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation, and to contain the usual covenants and stipulations and to be executed by the grantee.

The said grantee to make, finish and maintain and keep in good order and repair Fifty-seventh street and the southerly one-half part of Fifty-eighth street from the line of original high water mark to the easterly side of Twelfth avenue.

The City, by the Department of Docks, to make, finish and maintain all streets, wharves and piers westerly from the easterly side of Twelfth avenue as the same are now or may hereafter be established according to law.

The said grant to contain a release by the said Appleby to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York of all such right, title, interest, property, possession, claim or demand, as he may have in or to the land covered with water lying westerly of the easterly line of Twelfth avenue, and between the southerly line of said grant and the centre line of Fifty-eighth street, extended westerly into the North river, and also the land and land covered with water in Fifty-seventh street, and in the southerly one-half part of Fifty-eighth street, between the line of original high-water mark and Twelfth avenue; also of all rights of pre-emption or purchase incident or appurtenant to the same or to any of the land or land under water hereby granted to him or to any of the adjacent land above high-water mark owned by him.

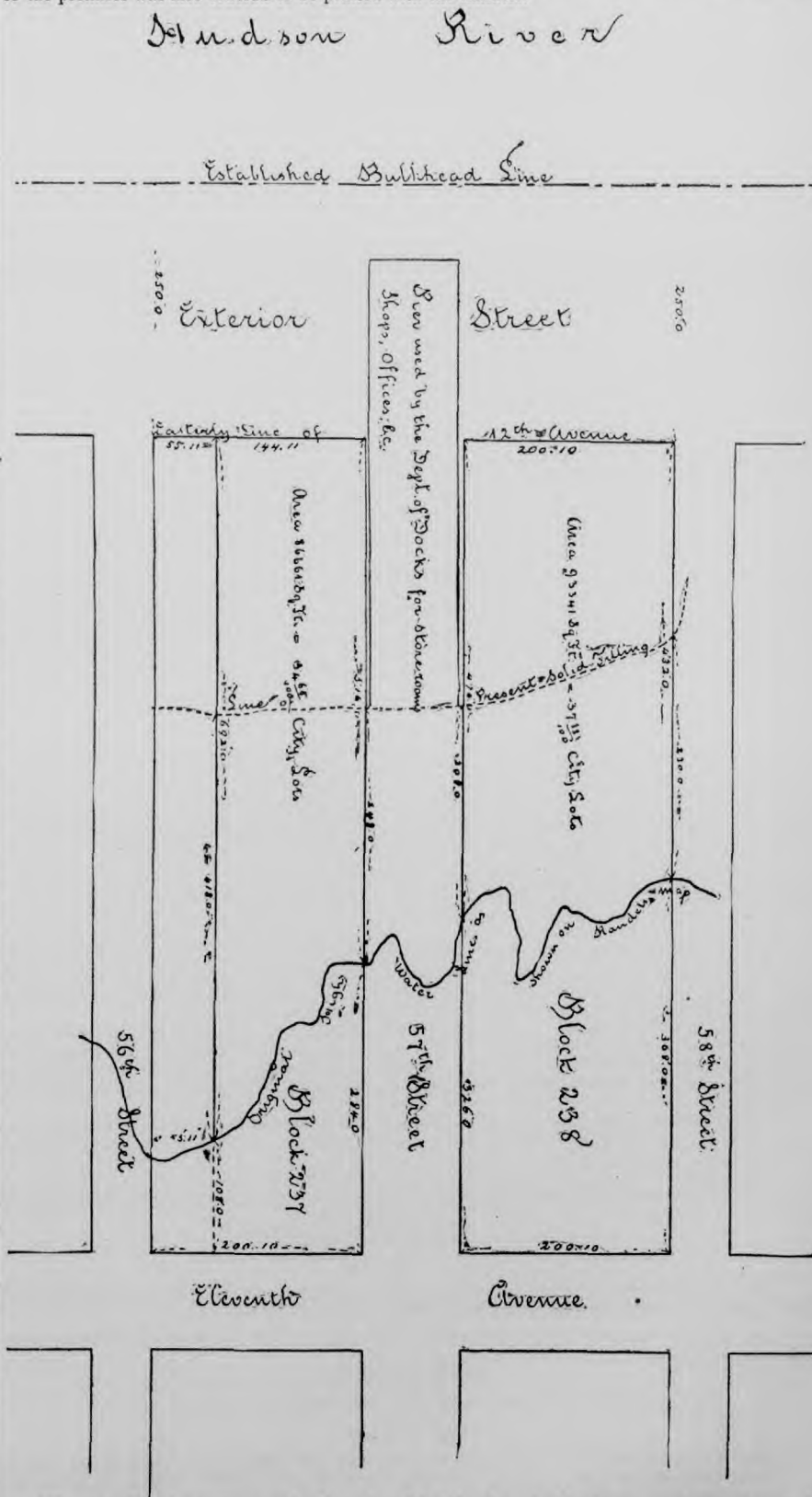
Also of, in and to all filling, wharves, structures, or erections of any kind now built or that may hereafter be built, upon any of the land or land covered with water hereinbefore described and intended to be released by the said Appleby; also the rents, profits, wharfage, cramage, advantages or emoluments of, or arising or to arise from any of the said land or lands covered with water so to be released by him and from said filling, structures and erections.

The City to agree to commence to build the bulkhead under the new plan of improvement in front of the premises so granted within six months from the date of the grant, and to proceed therewith with reasonable diligence to completion. The grantee to agree not to commence filling in the premises granted until permission shall be granted him by the Board of Docks.

The consideration to be paid by the said Appleby for the said grant shall be the sum of one hundred and eighty thousand dollars (\$180,000), which amount is hereby fixed upon as the value of the said land under water and below high-water mark so to be granted to him. The said consideration is to be paid in cash, or in the following manner, viz.: Forty per cent. thereof or the sum of seventy-two thousand dollars in cash upon the execution and delivery of the said grant; sixty per cent. thereof or one hundred and eight thousand dollars by the bond of the said Appleby, bearing even date with said grant, payable in five equal annual installments in one, two, three, four and five years from the date of the same, with six per cent. interest, and to contain the usual interest clause, and to be secured by a mortgage upon the said premises with the usual covenants and provisions.

The action brought by the said Charles E. Appleby against the City with respect to the said premises to be discontinued without costs to either party as against the other, and any judgment or judgments for costs heretofore entered therein to be satisfied. The two actions brought by the City against Charles E. Appleby and others, affecting the said premises are also to be discontinued without costs to either party as against the other; and provided, also, that all unpaid taxes, assessments and Croton water rents and all other liens that may exist and be due and payable upon the land so granted shall be paid by said Appleby on or before the delivery of said grant.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted, and an accompanying map of the premises was also ordered to be printed with the minutes.



Whereas, Certain agreements for the sale of bulkheads and wharf property have been made and entered into by the alleged owners thereof, or their legal representatives, with the Department of Docks, which have been submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their action thereon, as provided by section 715 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do not deem it advisable to approve of said agreements; therefore,

Resolved, That this Board do hereby consider it unadvisable to approve of certain agreements made and entered into by and between the Commissioners of the Department of Docks for the purchase of certain bulkheads and wharf property, and the alleged owners of said bulkheads and wharf property, for the sale thereof to the City; and the Comptroller, to whom said agreements were referred for investigation and report thereon, is discharged and relieved from further consideration thereof, described as follows, to wit:

Agreement with the executors of the estate of Moses Taylor, deceased, and others, for the sale of two hundred and twenty-four and one-half feet of bulkhead on South street, between Old Slip and Wall street, and interest in Piers 12 and 13, East river, submitted and referred December 28, 1886.

Agreement with Edmund H. Schermerhorn and others, for the sale of one hundred and eighty and one-half feet of bulkhead on South street, between Old Slip and Wall street, and interest in Piers 13 and 14, East river, submitted and referred December 28, 1886.

Agreement with the executors of the estate of William C. Chamberlain, deceased, and the heirs of George A. Phelps, for the sale of one hundred feet of bulkhead, between Beach and Hubert streets, North river, submitted and referred December 28, 1886.

Agreement with S. Charles Welsh, executor, etc., of George Welsh, deceased, for the sale of seventy-five feet of bulkhead on West street, next north of Harrison street, North river, submitted and referred December 28, 1886.

Agreement with Goldsborough Banyer, executor, etc., of estate of Harriet B. White, deceased, and by Ann White and others, of bulkhead on West street, fifty feet south of Morton street, North river, submitted and referred March 4, 1887.

Whereas, This Board, by a resolution adopted on the 12th day of July, 1888, granted permission to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, upon certain terms and conditions, to make certain alterations, repairs and extensions of ferry structures at the foot of Whitehall street, New York City; and

Whereas, On the 19th day of November, 1888, this Board, by a resolution adopted on that day, granted further permission for the erection of certain ferry buildings at the foot of said street; and

Whereas, It was intended by said last-named resolution that the said ferry buildings should be erected upon and subject to the same terms and conditions as those contained in the said resolution of July 12, 1888, and the agreement made pursuant thereto, between the Mayor, etc., of the City of New York and the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, dated August 4, 1888;

Now, therefore, Resolved, That the said resolution heretofore adopted on the said 19th day of November, 1888, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the action of the Board of Docks in granting permission to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company to erect a ferry-house and structures at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, shown upon a plan submitted to them, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of said Board of Docks, but this approval is given upon, and subject to, the same terms and conditions as those contained in the aforesaid resolution, adopted July 12, 1888, and the above-mentioned agreement, dated August 4, 1888.

The following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, On 31st October, 1888, the Board issued a permit to John A. Bouker to place scow No. 3, with a dumping-platform thereon, for the purpose of receiving cellar dirt, at the foot of Sixtieth street, East river; and

Whereas, On 8th December, 1888, the Dock Protective Association of the Nineteenth Ward petitioned the Board to remove said dumping-platform, which request was complied with at a meeting of the Board held 13th December, 1888; and

Whereas, In a communication dated 27th December, 1888, the said Dock Protective Association withdrew their objections to the said dumping-platform, and a petition was also received from certain business men in the vicinity of Sixtieth and Sixty-fourth streets, East river, petitioning the Board to allow the same to remain thereat; therefore

Resolved, That the action of the Board 13th December, 1888, revoking the permit issued to John A. Bouker on 31st October, 1888, to place scow No. 3, with a dumping-platform thereon, at the bulkhead foot of Sixtieth street, East river, be and hereby is rescinded and annulled, and the permit issued 31st October, 1888, be and hereby is continued in force.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief in reference to Pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, North river, and recommending that the Union Stock Yard and Market Company, lessee, be notified to vacate and surrender to the Department 87½ feet of the southerly side of said pier as provided for in the lease of said pier dated April 15, 1886, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, On the 15th April, 1886, the Board sold at public auction the right to collect and retain all wharfage which might arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation by vessels of more than five tons burthen of the Pier foot of West Fifty-eighth street, North river, to the Union Stock Yard and Market Company for a term of five years from May 1, 1886; and

Whereas, The lease, which was executed on 15th April, 1886, contains, among other things, the following:

And the said party of the second part does further covenant and agree that if at any time during the said term of five years the said parties of the first part shall decide to occupy for their own use all or any portion of the hereinbefore mentioned wharf property, or shall conclude to extend or project, or change the present bulkhead-line in accordance with provisions of law now existing, either municipal or State, or which may at any time hereafter during the continuance of said term be enacted, then and in such case the said party of the second part, upon being served with a notice in writing describing the wharf property, or portion thereof which the parties of the first part have so decided to occupy, or setting forth the extent of the change decided upon, and demanding the vacating of all or any portion of the said wharf property, shall and will vacate the said wharf property or the portion thereof so demanded without delay, and the party of the second part shall not claim, nor shall the parties of the first part be liable to pay any damages on account of such surrender and vacation of said wharf property or any portion thereof, nor on account of any structures or improvements that may have been erected or made by the party of the second part; and

Whereas, This Department has decided and do hereby decide to occupy for their own use 87½ feet of the inner end of the southerly side of Pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, North river, and have concluded to extend and project and change the present bulkhead-line, in pursuance of and in accordance with the said conditions and provisions of said lease and in pursuance to the statute in such cases made and provided;

Resolved, That the Union Stock Yard and Market Company, lessees, be and they are hereby notified, informed, directed and required, in accordance with the terms and conditions of said lease as aforesaid, to vacate and surrender without delay to this Department, about 87½ feet of the inner end of the southerly side of said Pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, North river, on or before the 1st February, 1889.

The partial report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 8420, in reference to building a new wooden pier, foot of Bank street, North river, and recommending that the Board make the necessary determination and terminate the lease to the Knickerbocker Ice Company of the bulkhead thereat, and also recommending that the said company be directed to remove the shafting and ice platform at the foot of Bank street, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following preambles and resolution adopted:

Whereas, On the 11th April, 1888, the Board sold at public auction, to the Knickerbocker Ice Company, all and singular the wharfage and crange which should arise, or accrue or become due for the use and occupation during the term of three years from the 1st May, 1888, of all that certain public wharf property known as the bulkhead at Bank street, North river; and

Whereas, The lease, which was executed on the 1st May, 1888, contains, among other things, the following:

And the said party of the second part further covenant and agree that if at any time during the term hereby created the said Board of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building, or rebuilding wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks, or slips, within a section or district of the water-front which shall include the wharf property hereinbefore described, according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, and if the said Board shall determine that, for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the party of the second part in the wharfage to arise, accrue or become due from the said wharf property, or from any part thereof, or if at any time during the term hereby created, the said Board of Docks shall determine that the said wharf property, or any part thereof shall be used for some other purpose than for the purpose of the collection of wharfage, and that it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the party of the second part in such wharfage, then, upon the receipt by the said party of the second part of written notice of a resolution of the said Board of Docks to that effect, describing the wharf property, or the part thereof affected thereby, the interest of said party of the second part in said wharfage and in the said wharf property or part thereof, shall be thereby terminated, and the rent thereby reserved shall cease from the date of the receipt of such notice, and no claim for damages or compensation in favor of said party of the second part by reason of the termination of such interest in said wharfage, or wharf property, or for damages or injury to any steam, or sailing vessel, or water craft moored thereto, or on, in or about the same, or to or on account of any structures or improvements that may have been erected or made by said party of the second part, shall at any time be made by the said party of the second part, or by any person or persons whomsoever; and

Whereas, This Department has determined and does hereby determine to proceed with the work of building a new wooden Pier at the foot of Bank street, North river, which includes the wharf property hereinbefore described; and has determined and does hereby determine, in pursuance of and in accordance with the said conditions and provisions of said lease, and pursuant to the statute in such cases made and provided, that for the purpose of building said pier, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the Knickerbocker Ice Company in and to the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due from the said bulkhead or from any part thereof;

Resolved, That the said Knickerbocker Ice Company be and they are hereby notified, informed, directed and required, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the said lease as aforesaid, to vacate and surrender without delay to this Department the bulkhead at Bank street, North river, on or before the 1st February, 1889;

Resolved, That the permit issued 3d May, 1888, authorizing the said Knickerbocker Ice Company to erect and maintain an ice-bridge, engine-house and scale-house on the bulkhead at Bank street, North river, be and hereby is revoked and the said company be and hereby are notified, required and directed to remove the said ice-bridge, engine-house and scale-house from the said bulkhead, on or before the 1st February, 1889; and be it further

Resolved, That the Knickerbocker Ice Company be and they are hereby notified, required and directed to remove the line of shafting running across the bulkhead at Bank street, North river, and along the bulkhead above and below said street, in order that free access may be had to the proposed new pier:

The following resolution was,

On motion, adopted:

Resolved, That this Board deems it advisable to change the width and location of the new Pier at Coenties Slip, East river, to be known as Pier, new 7, East river, from the width and location thereof, as laid down on the plans determined by the Board April 13, 1871, and adopted and certified to by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 27, 1871, as follows: The width of the pier to be 50 feet instead of 60 feet as shown on the plans aforesaid; the longitudinal axis of the pier to be in a line making an angle of 91° 29' 45" with the northerly side line of South street, as it is just easterly of Coenties Slip, and to intersect the said side-line extended westerly at a point 24.72 feet westerly of the northeasterly corner of South street and Coenties Slip; all as shown on a plan submitted in duplicate by the Engineer-in-Chief and hereby approved by the Board.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are requested to consent to and approve of the change in the width and location in the new Pier at Coenties Slip, East river, to be known as Pier, new 7, East river.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

From Curtis & Blaisdell—Requesting permission to dredge north side of East Fifty-sixth street. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From Graham & Conway—Requesting permission to run waste-pipe from hydrant through bulkhead between Piers 5 and 6, East river, and enclosing consent of the lessees. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From Old Dominion Steamship Company—Requesting four mooring cleats on the bulkhead south of Pier, new 26, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to place the cleats thereat, as soon as the bulkhead wall is ready to receive them, was approved.

From Peter C. Spence, Chairman—Requesting leave of absence to January 15, 1889. Leave of absence granted without compensation.

From Union Ferry Company—Requesting a general permit to repair their racks and premises at Fulton, South, Hamilton avenue, Catharine and Wall street ferries. The action of the President in issuing a permit for the ensuing three months, under the usual conditions, was approved.

The communication from Jabez A. Bostwick, requesting the Board to assign lease of Pier, new 36, East river, to the New England Terminal Company, was,
On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following preambles and resolution adopted :
Whereas, Application has been made by Jabez A. Bostwick for permission to transfer and assign to the New England Terminal Company the lease of the wharf property known as Pier, new number 36, at the foot of Jefferson street, East river, dated New York, December 31, 1888, subject to the rents, covenants, and conditions of the lease above referred to ; and

Whereas, The sureties of the lease mentioned in the foregoing application have agreed to the assignment of the said lease as hereinabove applied for, without in any wise affecting their liabilities as sureties under the said lease ;

And that said Board proposes to alter the map or plan of said city by closing and discontinuing said streets, roads and avenues, and portions thereof, as aforesaid.

And that such proposed action of said Board has been duly laid before the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, August 2, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 219. In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,
NEW YORK, January 31, 1888.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

Each estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above-mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be enclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the Estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same, within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REJECT ALL BIDS RECEIVED FOR ANY PARTICULAR WORK IF HE DEEMS IT FOR THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CITY.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * *

"The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents."

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum. DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
