SIR—704 deaths were registered in this office during the week ending at noon of Saturday, December 13, 1890, representing an annual death-rate of 22.21 per 1,000 on an estimated population of 1,653,698.

It was ordered to be placed on file. A request from the Librarian of Columbia College for copies of the CITY RECORD from October, 1884, to date was granted.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting held at the Comptroller's Office at 12 o'clock M. on Wednesday, December 17, 1890.

Present—Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller, and Thomas C. T. Crain, Chamberlain.

Absent—Walton Storm, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held on December 11, 1890, were read and approved.

The Mayor stated that the object of the meeting was to open the proposals received for furnishing materials and performing work in the erection and completion of the steam-heating, ventilation and elevator work required for the new Criminal Court Building now in course of erection, pursuant to chapter 371, Laws of 1889, for which notice has been published by the Comptroller as authorized and directed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on December 1, 1890.

The Commissioner of Public Works was present by invitation.

The estimate-box containing the proposals received was then opened by the Comptroller, and the names of the bidders and the amounts of their respective bids were read by the Secretary, as follows:

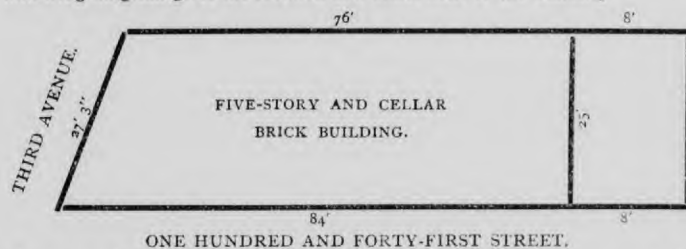
Hon. THEO. W. MYERS, Comptroller:

SIR—I think the building at the corner of One Hundred and Forty-first street and Third avenue is entirely suitable for the location of the offices of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards. It is a brick building, well built, five stories in height, with an ample cellar, and is offered at the rent of about \$3,000 per annum, with privilege of making whatever changes may be necessary to adapt it to the purposes required.

The rent is reasonable.

The street floor is ready for immediate occupation, the other floors will require entire remodeling, as they are now cut up into very small rooms, as flats.

The following diagram gives the location and dimensions of the building.



ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-FIRST STREET.

Similar changes to those required for this building would be necessary for any of the other locations offered.

This presents the advantages of a moderate rent and excellent location, as well as sufficient space.

The rent may be reduced to \$2,750 per annum, which is very reasonable.

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are directed by section 4 of chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, to procure suitable apartments for offices of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and have the same furnished for the uses and purposes of his said office; and

Whereas, A building on the corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Forty-first street, in the Twenty-third Ward, has been examined and reported upon by Mr. E. E. McLean, Engineer of the Finance Department, as a suitable building for such offices, when altered and repaired;

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and empowered to lease for the use of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, as offices, the building corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Forty-first street, for the term of five years, from the first day of January, 1891, at a rental not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per annum, with the condition that all repairs and alterations to fit the building for the uses and purposes of the offices of said Commissioner shall be made at the expense of the City, and such other covenants and conditions as may be necessary or advisable to secure the interest of the City; and the Counsel to the Corporation is hereby requested to prepare such lease, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Which were unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report upon the "Old Arsenal," and a resolution to authorize the leasing of the building:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of this Board held on the 11th instant, the Comptroller was requested to examine into the damage done the Old Arsenal, corner of Elm and White streets, by the fire that occurred on the 9th instant, and report an estimate of the cost necessary to repair the building and render it tenantable, and recommend what disposition of the property is considered most advisable.

The fire destroyed the roof and all the interior of the building, leaving only the walls standing. The area of the building is 84 feet 6 inches on Elm street, and 131 feet 3 inches on White street, and the walls are substantial, but as the building was erected for an arsenal, they are not adapted to the purpose of stores or shops without considerable expenditure.

The tenant of the ground floor, formerly used for storage, has submitted a proposal to repair the building at his own expense, on a lease of five years, and pay a rental at least equal to the amount heretofore received, the improvements to become the property of the City at the end of the term of the lease.

I consider this proposal an advantageous one for the interest of the City, and recommend its acceptance, and submit a resolution to authorize the Comptroller to take such measures as may be necessary to carry out the arrangement for repairing the building and to lease the premises for the term of five years, at public auction to the highest bidder, upon the above-named conditions.

Resolved, That the leasing of the premises known as the Old Arsenal, corner of Elm and White streets, be referred to the Comptroller, and that he be and is hereby authorized and empowered to take measures and make all necessary arrangements to lease said premises at public auction to the highest bidder for the term of five years; and the minimum or upset price is hereby appraised and fixed at the sum of three thousand five hundred (\$3,500) per annum, upon the condition that the successful bidder shall make all alterations and necessary repairs to the building at his own expense, in accordance with plans and specifications to be prepared by the Engineer of the Finance Department and approved by the Comptroller; and that the terms and conditions of sale of the lease shall otherwise be the same as are usual with leases of property belonging to the City, and as stated in the Comptroller's report.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Mr. Patrick Fox, agent for Mrs. Huyler, for leasing to the City the premises on the block between One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Twentieth streets, and Eighth and St. Nicholas avenues, an application for which, by the Commissioner of Public Works, was laid over on November 18, appeared before the Board and asked that action be taken to lease the premises as early as practicable.

After consideration of the matter and explanations by the Commissioner of Public Works, who was present, it was referred to the Comptroller for examination and report.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
