WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases:

The number of inspections and reinspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 144,363, classified as follows:

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 386 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 141 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 35 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds; and 38 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

The deaths for the quarter numbered 11,458, 1,244 more than for the corresponding quarter of 1891, and 386 more than in 1890, when the first pronounced epidemic of influenza occurred. The average death-rate of this quarter for the past five years, however (based upon the recent State census), was 25.42, while the rate for 1892 was only 25.40.

This increase over 1891 of 1,244 deaths was quite generally distributed over the whole list of diseases, although most noticeable in the zymotic diseases, diseases of the nervous system and diseases of the digestive and respiratory organs. It is quite evident that the influenza, which appeared for the third time in epidemic form in December, 1891, has not yet left us.

The deaths from the contagious and infectious diseases for the past quarter, as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1891, were as follows: diphtheria, 407, against 353; typhoid fever, 57, against 42; measles, 174, against 235 (showing a decrease); scarlet fever, 417, against 303; smallpox, 10, against 1; and whooping cough, 59, against 131 (also a decrease). Influenza was given as the cause of 440 deaths, against 46 in 1891. These diseases account for 453 of the total excess of 1,244.

Deaths from diseases of the nervous system were 963, against 853 for 1891, an increase of 110.

Deaths from diseases of the respiratory organs were as follows: bronchitis, 606, against 496; pneumonia, 1,942, against 1,626, and others, 482, against 451, an increase of 457 over 1891.

Deaths from diseases of the digestive organs were 613, against 530, an increase of 83 over 1891. The causes just enumerated account for 1,103 out of the total excess of 1,244, the remainder being well distributed.

The deaths of children under 5 years of age were 4,271, against 3,882, an increase of 389 over 1891, and the deaths of persons 65 years of age and over were 1,307, against 1,118 for 1891, an excess of 189.

There were 3,862 marriages and 12,614 births reported, against 3,656 marriages and 10,676 births for the corresponding quarter of 1891, an increase of 206 and 1,938 respectively.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending March 31, 1892, the number of notices issued by the Board was 4,974. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents, to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
