

The 864 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.15, against 23.05 for the previous week and 24.56 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases increased very slightly, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 128, 76, 192, 7, 33 and 4, against 112, 79, 182, 10, 45 and 3 for the previous week, a total of 440 against 431. The increase of diphtheria was chiefly in the Seventh, Eighth, Sixteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards, while there was a noticeable decrease in the Ninth and Nineteenth Wards. There was a slight increase of measles in the Ninth, Twelfth, Thirteenth and Twenty-first Wards, more than offset, however, by the decrease in the Eighth, Eleventh and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was most marked in the Tenth, Eleventh, Nineteenth, Twenty-second and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth and Seventeenth Wards. Typhus fever decreased, but the cases were reported from a wide area, 14 of the 33 cases being below Fourteenth street, 9 between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets, and the remaining 10 above Fortieth street.
