

GENTLEMEN—On December 31, 1894, the attorney of the Road Commissioners of Carmel called here to represent that the traffic between Carmel and Lake Mahopac would be interrupted in case of a freshet, and to claim that in such an emergency a temporary road should be provided by the Aqueduct Commissioners.

Aqueduct Commissioners.

There is no question that such an interruption may occur, as you well know.

If you think it advisable to favorably consider the claim of the local authorities, the remedy should be applied without delay, and I immediately asked the Division Engineer to make a preliminary investigation. From it, it results that if a temporary road were built on the line recommended by the attorney, it would cost about \$1,000 and would require four or five weeks for its completion. Another and, I think, better arrangement could probably be made by turning the traffic over the top of the auxiliary dam, erecting on the latter a temporary fence and building a short spur of road. The cost of this improvement would be less than the former plan, and as it could be completed in a comparatively short time, I think it would be preferable.
