Commissioner Jesup sent word asking to be excused on account of illness. George L. Rives and Albert B. Boardman, Counsel; George S. Rice, Chief Engineer, and Alfred Craven, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

The minutes of the meeting of November 30 were read and it was moved that they be approved.

Letters of the Auditor and Chief Engineer were read as follows:

NEW YORK, December 6, 1906.

Mr. BION L. BURROWS, Secretary, Rapid Transit Commission:

DEAR SIR—On December 15 of last year I submitted to the Board a schedule showing the amount of money required to provide for the administrative and general office expenditures during the year 1906, the amount being estimated at \$111,500, of which the sum of \$10,000 was an estimate for legal disbursements, \$15,000 for advertising and \$25,000 for contingencies. During the past year additional expenditures, covering disbursements and the advertising and fees of Commissioners appointed by the Supreme Court in the matter of proposed subway routes, were made, proving the original estimate to be inadequate to the extent of \$23,500.

In addition to this Mr. Rice reports that on account of increases in his staff occasioned by extra work in connection with the large number of additional rapid transit routes and the purchase of a correspondingly increased amount of engineering instruments and supplies, there will be necessary for his work an additional sum of \$42,500.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that a requisition be authorized on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an additional sum of \$66,000, which is necessary to cover the requirements of both offices to the end of the year.

Mr. BION L. BURROWS, Secretary, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—On December 15 of last year I submitted to the Board a schedule showing the amount of money required to provide for the expenditures of the Engineering Department during the year 1906, the total amount being estimated at \$408,000, of which the sum of \$440,000 was an estimate for the salaries to be paid the Engineering Staff and \$3,500 for engineering instruments and supplies to be used during the year.

During the past year it became necessary, however, to increase our engineering force on account of the additional work required in making surveys for new rapid transit routes, which work necessitated the establishment of a large number of additional parties in the field. This increase in the engineering staff, together with the fact that in order to retain the services of many of our engineers it became necessary to materially increase their salaries, has resulted in an expenditure greater than that originally estimated.

The estimate covering engineering instruments and supplies has also proved to be inadequate, due to the reason that, in order to equip the additional field parties employed in making surveys for the new routes, a large number of instruments and engineering supplies of various kinds was required.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that a requisition be drawn on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an additional sum of \$42,500, which is necessary to cover the requirements of this Department to the end of the year.

We feel that our two years' special study of the problem of the Eleventh avenue tracks, in co-operation with civic bodies like the Municipal Art Society and Committees of the Merchants' Association will be of some help in aiding the Rapid Transit Board to come to the correct solution.

DEAR SIR—Mr. Burrows has sent us, by direction of the Board, a copy of a letter from Mr. T. Campbell-Copeland, addressed to the Mayor, in which he suggests that an order be given that all doors on subway trains shall be opened "one minute after any stoppage, to let the occupants alight after two minutes, and, if a start is not made in five minutes, to have all occupants escorted to the nearest station." Mr. Campbell-Copeland makes other suggestions as to the way in which the Interborough trains shall be managed, but these appear to be ancillary to the main suggestion quoted above.

The powers of the Rapid Transit Board in reference to regulating the details of the operation of trains by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the contract of February 21, 1900, have been considered by counsel on several previous occasions. Therefore, without going into the subject in detail, we need only state our conclusion, which is that in our opinion the courts would not uphold the Rapid Transit Board if it should seek to make and enforce an order such as Mr. Campbell-Copeland suggests.

GENTLEMEN—Referring to communication dated October 11, 1906, addressed to your Board, concerning the Seventh and Eighth Avenue, Lexington Avenue and Jerome Avenue proposed additional rapid transit railroads, the Rapid Transit Board begs leave to inform you that it is the wish of the Board to have you consider also in this same connection the so-called West Farms and White Plains road route (Route No. 18). This route was determined and established by the Rapid Transit Board on June 1, 1905, approved by your Board on July 14, 1905, and by the Mayor on July 28, 1905. Necessary steps were taken immediately thereafter to ascertain the names of owners of property along this route, but it was found impossible, after protracted effort, to obtain the consents of a majority in value of the abutting property, whereupon an application was made, pursuant to law, to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners. These Commissioners have duly and favorably reported upon the said route, and the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court has confirmed their report by order dated October 23, 1906.

It is the opinion of this Board that the construction of the route above referred to should be undertaken at an early date.

This extension is designed to begin at East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, at West Farms road, at which a connection can be made with the present subway viaduct, and to extend thence by a two-track elevated road across the Bronx river, and thence by a three-track elevated road on West Farms road, Morris Park avenue, Bronx Park East and White Plains road to East Two Hundred and Forty-first street.

Will you kindly, therefore, consider this route also in connection with the others mentioned above?

DEAR SIR—I beg to be advised whether the Board desires that I should make provision for galleries in formulating the plans for the new subways. Section 6 of the Rapid Transit act, as you are aware, provides that "the said Board may, in its discretion, include in said plans provision for galleries, subways, etc., etc." On many of the routes provision for such galleries will, of course, add somewhat to the expense of construction of the new subways, for the reason that it will necessitate going to a greater depth than would otherwise be necessary.

As my studies for the plans have reached a point where I am now ready to make the final drawings, it is important for me to know the wishes of the Board in this respect, and I would therefore respectfully ask that I be advised on this subject at as early a date as possible.

The word "provision," above italicized, I understand, simply means that our construction will be such that the proper space to include these galleries shall be provided for, leaving the question of actual construction for the future.

GENTLEMEN—I have your favor of the 19th inst., and have noted that the Interborough Rapid Transit Company refuse to run trains over the Westchester avenue spur for fear that the extra trains put on thereby would cripple the service.

That they should make this excuse is quite natural, but I think your Commission could investigate with profit the soundness of such a reason. I am sure you will find that the present headway under which the Third avenue trains are run would amply permit the interjection of additional trains.

I say the above from observation at the One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street station, at the One Hundred and Sixteenth street station, and at the Fifty-ninth street station on the Third avenue line. It is, however, unnecessary to run a full train the entire length of Third avenue. A shuttle train consisting of one or two cars operating between Jackson avenue and One Hundred and Forty-ninth street would amply meet the needs of the public, and would remove the source of inconvenience referred to in my last letter.

This shuttle train can be operated without interfering in the least with the regular Third avenue schedule, and I am quite sure with less expense than is now being incurred by the Company in issuing transfers under the present system.

I shall be glad to hear what action your Commission proposes to take on the above suggestion, and I am,

This, owing to the close interval of the trains on our Third avenue line, would not be practicable, for the reason that it would cause congestion and serious delay at the point in question, besides delay along the entire route.

Mr. Rives presented draft of agreement between the City, the Interborough Company, the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company and the No. 111 Broadway Company, providing for an entrance from the Wall street station to the United States Realty Building.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the officers of this Board be and they hereby are authorized to execute agreement in form substantially as follows:

This agreement, made the day of , 1906, by and between Number One Hundred and Eleven Broadway, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, hereinafter called the Building Company, party of the first part, Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, hereinafter called the Construction Company, party of the second part, Interborough Rapid Transit Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, hereinafter called the Interborough Company, party of the third part, and The City of New York, acting by its Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, hereinafter called the City, party of the fourth part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The Construction Company by contract with the City, dated July 21, 1902, undertook to construct and operate a rapid transit railroad in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, and thereafter by instrument dated August 10, 1905, duly assigned the lease or operating part of said contract to the Interborough Company, which company is operating as lessee under said assignment a portion of said railroad and maintaining a station on lower Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, known variously as the Rector street or Wall street station; and

Whereas, A passageway has been constructed under the sidewalk of Broadway pursuant to a contract, dated February 2, 1905, between the corporation known as One Hundred and Eleven Broadway, Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company and The City of New York, connecting the building at the southwest corner of Broadway and Thames street, known as the Trinity Building, with the platform of the said station; and

Whereas, The Building Company claims to be owner in fee of the premises at the northwest corner of Broadway and Thames street, and desires a passageway to be constructed under Thames street and the sidewalk of Broadway leading from the aforesaid Trinity Building passageway to a connection with said premises of the Building Company at the northwest corner of Broadway and Thames street, upon which a new building is being erected; and

Whereas, The Construction Company, the Interborough Company and the City deem it expedient and convenient and to the interest of the traveling public that such a passageway be constructed upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual promises, covenants and conditions hereinafter set forth, the parties hereto agree with each other as follows:

First—The Construction Company agrees to construct or cause to be constructed a passageway as shown on the plan hereto attached, issued by the Board of Rapid

Transit Railroad Commissioners, numbered 786 and designated "Proposed New Connection with United States Realty Building and Trinity Building Passage to Wall Street Station," said passageway to be constructed according to the portion of the specifications applicable to Rector street station included in the contract for the construction and operation of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad entered into between The City of New York and the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, and dated July 21, 1902, and the Building Company agrees to pay to the Construction Company the entire expense of such construction immediately upon its completion.

Second—The Building Company further agrees at its own expense daily during the life of this contract between 7 o'clock in the morning and 7 o'clock in the evening, except Sundays and legal holidays, to keep an entrance and exit to said passageway open and free for use of passengers of the rapid transit railroad in going to and from the station platform at Rector street, and at such times also to keep said entrance and exit unobstructed, in a clean and suitable condition for the use of passengers, and brilliantly lighted with electricity whenever artificial light is necessary.

Third—The Building Company agrees to make provision at its own expense for the sale of tickets at some suitable place on its own premises at or convenient to said stairway and entrance; also to pay to the Interborough Company on the execution and delivery of this contract the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) on account of the expense of the Interborough Company in maintaining and keeping the said passageway lighted and in good repair.

Fourth—So long as the Building Company shall faithfully perform the conditions imposed upon it by the terms of this contract, the Interborough Company hereby agrees that it will maintain and keep the passageway lighted and in good repair, as above provided, and will allow the said passageway to be utilized by the passengers of said railroad as a means of entrance to and exit from the said Rector street station.

Fifth—It is agreed that this contract shall be operative until the period appointed for the termination of the aforesaid contract of July 21, 1902, and it is hereby further agreed that if the Interborough Company shall procure a renewal of said contract or of so much thereof as provides for the use, maintenance and operation of said rapid transit railroad, then this agreement shall be deemed to be extended over said renewal period; but this agreement may be terminated at any time by The City of New York, upon giving notice in writing to the then owner of said premises at the northwest corner of Broadway and Thames street, where said entrance is situated, and to the said Interborough Company or its successors or assigns.

Sixth—The City hereby consents to this agreement and hereby releases the Construction Company and the Interborough Company of and from any and all obligations heretofore assumed to build and maintain the aforesaid Rector street station and its platforms and approaches in any manner inconsistent with the construction of the passageway herein described.

Seventh—This agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto, their successors and assigns.

Eighth—This agreement shall bind the Building Company, its successors, assigns and grantees, as a covenant running with the land.

In witness whereof this agreement has been executed for The City of New York by its Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners under and by virtue of a resolution duly adopted by the said Board, and the seal of the said Board has been hereto affixed and these presents signed by the President and Secretary of the said Board, and the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company, Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company and Number One Hundred and Eleven Broadway have caused their respective corporate seals to be hereunto affixed and attested by their respective Presidents, the day and year first above written.

Mr. Rives also reported the trial on the 4th of December of the suit by the City against the Interborough Company in the matter of selling electric power to an outside company by the Interborough Company. Counsel to submit briefs.

The Chief Engineer presented drawings showing locations of stations on certain proposed subway routes. The matter was referred to the Committee on Plans and Contracts.

The Comptroller presented report of Assistant Engineer Harry P. Nichols, as follows, and the same was referred to the Committee on Plans and Contracts:

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
December 5, 1906.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—In reply to your request to furnish you with information in regard to the method of fixing compensation employed by this Bureau for railroad rights, I would state as follows:

As you are aware, the Railroad Law provides that three per cent. of the gross receipts during the first five years, and five per cent. thereafter shall be paid by street surface railroads as minimum amounts, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has seen fit, in view of the great value of the rights conferred upon public service corporations, to require much higher percentages than the minimum provided in the Railroad Law.

As an instance, as far back as 1899, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment fixed the percentages for a new street surface railroad on the upper end of Manhattan Island at the following amounts:

Four per cent. during the first five years.

Six per cent. during the second five years.

Eight per cent. during the third five years.

Ten per cent. during the remaining ten years of the original grant of twenty-five years.

The grant was accepted and the road is now operating, from which it will be seen that even the percentages fixed did not look too large to the company.

It would seem that in fixing compensation for a road operating entirely within the City of New York, whether it be elevated, surface or subway, the basis of compensation should be upon a percentage of the gross receipts with fixed minimums. These minimums can only be determined after a study of the particular case, and an investigation to show the amount of money necessarily required for the construction, maintenance and operation of the road and estimate of the probable gross receipts and net earnings of the company.

In other cases where the City had been at large expense to open new avenues for railroad traffic, a portion of the cost of such expense was provided to be paid by the company operating on such street.

In addition the Board has adopted a policy of requiring a substantial initial payment from all public service corporations desiring the use of the streets, such payment to be determined in each case upon the estimated value of the right asked for. The



sums proposed by this Bureau have varied from \$5,000—in the case of a refrigerating company operating in a limited section of the Borough of Brooklyn—to the sum of \$250,000, in the case of a telephone company desiring to operate in all the boroughs.

Where a company is partly within and partly without the city, rates have been fixed on the basis of the number of linear feet of track laid, and at such rate per foot as would produce sufficient amount to not only reimburse the City for increased expense on account of location and operation of the road, but also to include a revenue to the City for the right conferred.

In any case we now try to secure the prospectus of the company with all the detailed information possible as to probable earnings.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From November 11 to November 17 thirty-two operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, eight at Gouverneur, twelve at Harlem and four at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

The Consolidated Fire Alarm Company entered into a contract with this Department October 2, 1903, to install an alarm box and make connections with the City fire service at Gouverneur Hospital at a charge of \$50 a year for three years. The contract expires this year and the company wishes to renew it. The Fire Department will not install in public buildings fire boxes connected with the central system, and in the Department of Education it is the custom to install a fire alarm box in public schools and make the necessary connections with the system of the Fire Department. An estimate has been obtained on this work at Gouverneur Hospital and a fire alarm signal box of the regular type, with the necessary underground and conduit construction, cable, etc., to connect with the Fire Department's wire, will cost \$235. It is recommended that such a connection be made instead of renewing the lease of the Fire Alarm Company.

The work of the Nurse in charge of the welfare of convalescent patients and those about to be discharged from Bellevue Hospital, or who are under treatment in

the hospital, has proved to be extremely useful and has accomplished much good. It is impossible, however, for one nurse to attend to all the work that has developed, and authority is requested to employ an Assistant in this most useful and beneficent plan at a salary not to exceed fifty dollars a month and maintenance.

The Nurses in ward 44 (prison ward) and wards 30 and 34 (the noisy wards) are on duty twelve hours each under considerable strain. It is recommended that in each of these wards an additional Nurse be authorized at a salary of \$50 a month and maintenance so that there may be proper relief.

The Superintendent of the Male Training School invites attention to the fact that the laundry work of that institution is very heavy, the Laundresses being overworked and doing a certain amount of work on Sunday. Six Laundresses are allowed and they must do the work for eighty-two people, washing an average of 2,477 pieces a week. It is evident that these employees are overworked and it is recommended that an additional Laundress be allowed.

In the matter of the equipment of the new hospitals, supplies of various kinds should be purchased in the open market, such as surgical, electrical and laboratory instruments, carpets and certain articles of ward furniture. It is recommended that the Board of Aldermen be requested to authorize the purchase in the open market of such articles to the amount of \$12,000 for Gouverneur Hospital, \$23,000 for Fordham Hospital and \$15,000 for Harlem Hospital.

It is recommended that the bid of Arthur E. McLean (\$435) for installing shower baths in the dormitories of Bellevue Hospital be accepted, it being the lowest received.

It is recommended that the Trustees inform Mr. William Horn, who has the contract for placing shelving in the drug room of Harlem Hospital, that he complete at once the work at Harlem Hospital.

Mounted plans showing the electric and plumbing work at the new Harlem Hospital should be kept in the office of the Supervising Engineer. This will involve an outlay of \$250, as the original plans will have to be traced and the alterations and additional improvements marked on them. Mounted plans showing the heating and ventilating lines should also be kept in that office for reference.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent, a fire alarm signal box of the regular type, with the necessary underground and conduit construction, cable, etc., connecting with the Fire Department's wire, be installed at Gouverneur Hospital at a cost not to exceed \$235, instead of again entering into a contract with the Consolidated Fire Alarm Company, provided it is not too late to change the contract for this year.

Resolved, That the appointment of an assistant to the Nurse in charge of the welfare work be allowed at a salary of \$50 a month and maintenance, the appointment of three additional Nurses for wards 44, 30 and 34, at \$50 a month and maintenance, and an additional Laundress for the Male Training School.

Resolved, That the articles needed for the equipment of the new Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals be purchased as heretofore on contract following advertisement.

Resolved, That the estimate of Arthur E. McLean on installing shower baths in the dormitories of Bellevue Hospital, be accepted, his bid of \$435 being the lowest received.

First—That we have completed our supplemental and amended estimate of assessment, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, and having objections thereto, do present their said objections in writing, duly verified, to us at our office, No. 252 Jackson avenue, in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, on or before the 26th day of December, 1906, and that

we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on the 28th day of December, 1906, at 3 o'clock p. m.

Second—That the abstracts of our said supplemental and amended estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, No. 252 Jackson avenue, in the Borough of Queens, in said City, there to remain until the 27th day of December, 1906.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.:

Fifth—In case, however, objections are filed to either of said abstracts of estimate and assessment, the notice of motion to confirm our final report herein will stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified, and of which notice will be given to all those who have theretofore appeared in this proceeding, as well as by publication in the CITY RECORD, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

##### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the bid or estimate, made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
