This, in our judgment, can only be accomplished by keeping at all times, in addition to 25 per cent. cash reserve, a large amount of demand loans on securities of the highest character, upon which a correspondingly low rate of interest is realized.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and

for the year 1907.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section I. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of ninety-six million seven hundred and ninety-one thousand five hundred and ninety-five ninety-six million seven hundred and ninety-one thousand five hundred and ninety-five dollars and fifty-five cents (\$96,791,595.55), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1907, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1907, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and thirty million four hundred and twenty-one thousand five hundred and five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$130,421,505.66), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$130,421,505.66), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$4,664,830,50), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of twenty-eight million nine hundred and sixty-five thousand and seventy dollars and sixty-one cents (\$28,965.070.61), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated June 1, 1907, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1907, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen-Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as

follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this Act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the Municipal and Public Corporations, or parts of Municipal and Public Corporations, by this Act consolidated with the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenue of any such Sinking Funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the Municipal and Public Corporations by this Act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such addressions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and other County charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

It is the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that all childnen should be fully surrendered by their parents or guardians to the institutions to which they may be committed, and the Commissioner of Charities is requested to secure such surrenders as far as possible.

Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the Courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a Court commitment.

In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.56798 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.56884 per centum.

From June 9 to June 15, inclusive, 43 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 10 at Gouverneur Hospital, 4 at Harlem Hospital and 4 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

A statement showing the status of the several appropriations up to May 31 of the present year is herewith submitted. On Supplies and Contingencies there is a balance to be delivered on contract of \$255,138.86. This, with contingent supplies that are likely to be needed in the ensuing seven months, is likely to make this appropriation \$25,000 short. The appropriation for new ambulances, horses, etc., is likely to be inadequate unless increased toward the end of the year, although many of the items in it are estimates which may be reduced. If the present census continues and there are no extraordinary demands on the hospitals, it is believed that \$30,000 will cover are no extraordinary demands on the hospitals, it is believed that \$30,000 will cover any prospective deficit for the year, but it is recommended that the amount needed should not be asked for until the experience of the summer indicates whether further saving can be accomplished.

The General Superintendent of the Training Schools requests very necessary and important alterations in the Mills Training School. The only place in which the graduate women Nurses of the male wards can be lodged is on the third floor of the Male Training School, and on this floor it is necessary to lodge also a number of the employees. There are no facilities for bathing in the extension, and those who live in the annex have to go to the third floor to bathe. It is recommended that an entrance to the second floor be made, close to the lavatory, this floor being occupied by women only. A lavatory should be placed on the fourth floor so that the women Nurses may have a separate bathroom. These important changes can be accomplished for about \$500, and it is recommended that they be allowed.

It is recommended that specifications for potatoes for the balance of the year be prepared, 250,000 pounds being an estimate of the amount required.

There is quite an amount of old furniture at Fordham Hospital. As it is no longer

There is quite an amount of old furniture at Fordham Hospital. As it is no longer suitable for use and as the value is insignificant, authority is requested to have it rold

at auction.

The General Superintendent of the Training Schools recommends that the salary of a Hospital Helper, to act as housekeeper in the Mills Training School, be increased to \$600 a year. Also that the salary of the Nurse in charge of the admitting office be increased from \$480 to \$600 a year, and the Night Supervisor at Harlem Hospital from \$600 to \$720 a year. It is recommended that these increases be allowed.

From June 15 to June 22, inclusive, 51 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 8 at Gouverneur Hospital, 13 at Harlem Hospital and 7 at Fordham Hospital. The Committee on the Prevention of Tuberculosis invites attention to the fact that the salary of Miss Genevieve Wilson, a Nurse who works half time for Bellevue Hospital and half time for the Committee, is but \$30. The Committee reports that she does her work very well and conscientiously and feels that she should receive \$75. The Committee is willing to pay half. Does the Board approve the increase to \$37.50?

It is reported that Dr. Tovey of the Out-Patient Department at Harlem Hospital has been in the habit of taking dressings, medicines, etc., away with him. The matter was reported to the Executive Committee and a meeting was held on June 24. Dr. Tovey acknowledged that he took such materials for the use of patients who had been discharged from the hospital. MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Resolution adopted at a meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the headquarters of The New York City Fire Department, June 25, 1907, amending the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission.

Resolved, That section 20 of Part 9 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be repealed, and that section 19 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 10. A permit may be issued for the storage or leaving of calcium care.

cipal Explosives Commission be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 19. A permit may be issued for the storage or keeping of calcium carbide in hermetically sealed iron receptacles, and in quantity not exceeding one hundred and twenty pounds in the aggregate, provided it is stored or kept in isolated buildings of fire-proof construction, where it will not be a hazard to any adjoining property, and that the buildings are waterproof, well ventilated and drained, and with floors raised at least 12 inches above the grade upon which they stand.

If the building is used exclusively for the storage of calcium carbide, is not more than one story high, and has no basement or cellar, a permit may be granted by the Fire Commissioner for the storage of quantities in excess of one hundred and twenty pounds, and in such building no artificial light or fire shall be used. Provided, however, that in addition to all the above requirements such buildings must be detached from all other buildings not used for the storage of calcium carbide at least 5 feet for each hundred pounds of calcium carbide permitted to be stored therein up to five hundred pounds, and five feet in addition to 25 feet for each ton of calcium carbide permitted. But in no case shall more than 100 feet of clear feet of space be required. No wood or other inflammable material shall enter into the construction of such building, nor be permitted to be kept therein, except the wood used in casing the calcium

No wood or other inflammable material shall enter into the construction of such building, nor be permitted to be kept therein, except the wood used in casing the calcium carbide while actually in use as such casing.

No packages to be opened in such buildings.

All buildings in which calcium carbide in excess of 120 pounds is stored shall have a sign on all four sides of the building reading, in white letters at least 6 inches high and of a proportionate thickness, painted on a red background, "Calcium Carbide. Use No Water."
