BANKING COMMISSION.

New York, August 1, 1907.

The regular quarterly meeting of the officers to designate City depositories, in accordance with section 196, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, was held in the Mayor's office on Thursday, August 1, 1907.

Present—Hon. Patrick F. McGowan, Acting Mayor; Mr. James J. Martin, Chamberlain; Mr. John H. McCoey, Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller the present depositories were redesignated.

Affirmative—Acting Mayor, Deputy and Acting Comptroller and Chamberlain.

On motion of the Chamberlain the following banks were added to the list of present depositories:

New Netherland Bank, in place of the Thirty-fourth Street National Bank.
National Copper Bank.
National Bank of Jamaica.
Tottenville National Bank.
Beaver National Bank.

Affirmative—Acting Mayor, Deputy and Acting Comptroller and Chamberlain.

The Chamberlain stated that he had interviews with the officers of several of the prominent banking institutions doing business with the City in reference to the rate of interest to be charged on City deposits, and in this connection asked that the following letter, received by him from the officers of the National City Bank, the clearing house for the City's business, be entered in the minutes:

"The National City Bank of New York, }
New York, July 16, 1907."

"Hon. JAMES J. MARTIN, Chamberlain of The City of New York, New York City:
"Sir—We acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 13th inst., and would say that this bank will be pleased to pay interest at the rate of two per cent. per annum on daily balances on moneys of The City of New York for the three months ensuing August 1, 1907.

"We feel that this rate is as high as can be conservatively paid by a bank which maintains a strong cash reserve and which invests its depositors' money in a prudent manner. The moneys of the City are deposited repayable on demand without notice, and these funds should be used by City depositories in such a manner that withdrawals can be met with the greatest freedom. This, in our judgment, can only be accomplished by keeping at all times, in addition to 25 per cent. cash reserve, a large amount of demand loans on securities of the highest character, upon which a correspondingly low rate of interest is realized.

No. 404.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1907.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of ninety-six million seven hundred and ninety-one thousand five hundred and ninety-five dollars and fifty-five cents (\$96,791,595.55), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1907, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1907, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and thirty million four hundred and twenty-one thousand five hundred and five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$130,421,505.66), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$4,664,839.50), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of twenty-eight million nine hundred and sixty-five thousand and seventy dollars and sixty-one cents (\$28,965,070.61), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated June 1, 1907, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1907, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

Department of Finance—Comptroller's Office,
City of New York,
June 1, 1907.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this Act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the Municipal and Public Corporations, or parts of Municipal and Public Corporations, by this Act consolidated with the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenue of any such Sinking Funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the Municipal and Public Corporations by this Act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and other County charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State taxes, viz.: One hundred and twenty-two million seven hundred and fifty-six thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixteen cents (\$122,756,666.16); secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz.: Four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$4,664,839.50), and, thirdly, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1906, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz.: Three million dollars (\$3,000,000), amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and thirty million four hundred and twenty-one thousand five hundred and five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$130,421,505.66).

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

8. Where the City is paying 50 per cent. and upwards of the cost of maintenance of an institution the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requires representation in the board meetings of that institution, with the right of taking part in all business transactions. This representation shall be through the Comptroller, who may attend any meeting, either in person or through a representative appointed by him, of which appointment the Comptroller will give written notice to the board of the institution.

9. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will not pay for the maintenance of dependent and delinquent children in the same institution.

10. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 45
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week.....	2 25
For delinquent children, per annum.....	135 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum.....	135 00
For inmates in homes for unfortunate and friendless women, per annum.....	110 00

*For homeless mothers, nursing infants, per month.....	12 00
To hospitals for medical treatment, per day.....	70 00
To hospitals for surgical treatment, per day.....	90 00

For defective children in institutions, maintained exclusively for such, per day.....	60 00

For services of Custodian, first year, \$900; second year, \$1,050; thereafter \$1,200 per annum.

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

It is the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that all children should be fully surrendered by their parents or guardians to the institutions to which they may be committed, and the Commissioner of Charities is requested to secure such surrenders as far as possible.

Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the Courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a Court commitment.

* Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 45 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of immigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of one million four hundred and ninety-nine thousand six hundred and sixty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$1,499,667.50), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1907, included in the Budget, and the further sum of one hundred and fifty-two thousand seven hundred and sixty dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$152,760.78), paid during the year 1906, from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one million six hundred and fifty-two thousand four hundred and twenty-eight dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$1,652,428.28).

Sec. 4. In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.55321 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.55408 per centum.

III. In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.53397 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.53393 per centum.

IV. In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.56798 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.56884 per centum.

Sec. 8. In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of fifty-seven thousand two hundred and sixty-one dollars and forty-five cents (\$57,261.45), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land, in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of eight thousand two hundred and twenty-two dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$8,222.69), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successor; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of forty-eight thousand two hundred and ninety dollars and eighty-two cents (\$48,290.82), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush), in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the district of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, under authority of chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of thirty-six thousand two hundred and sixty dollars and six cents (\$36,260.06), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

The work of division has been simplified by reason of the fact that very few changes have been made in the lines of Senate districts from those laid down in the reapportionment of 1906.

Your Committee does not believe it wise to make changes unless absolutely necessary by reason of changes in the Senate district lines. It therefore has submitted in the within descriptions lines which involve changes in only such Assembly districts as are affected by or included in Senate districts, the lines of which have been changed by the Legislature.

The Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the plan of division into Assembly districts herewith submitted.

Second District—That portion of the Eleventh Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the East river and Whitehall street, thence along Whitehall street and Broadway to Beaver street, to William street, thence along William street and North William street to Park row, to East Broadway, to Catharine street, to Henry street, to Clinton street, to Grand street, to Gouverneur street, to Madison street, to Montgomery street, to Cherry street, to Clinton street, to the East river, thence along the East river to the place of beginning; 49,244 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That leave of absence be granted Dr. Polk for three months, beginning on the 20th of June, 1907.

A communication dated June 11 was received from Dr. William M. Polk, Attending Gynaecologist on the Second Medical Division, in reply to the letter from the Board asking for information concerning the visits of Dr. Jeffrey to Ward 23 of Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

A communication dated June 16 was received from Dr. R. H. Wylie acknowledging appointment as Attending Gynaecologist to the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

The minutes of the meeting of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board were received on June 12.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent confer with the Medical Board regarding the need of additional members of the house staff and report to the Board of Trustees.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of Bellevue Hospital for the meeting held on June 12 were received from Dr. Joseph B. Bissell, Secretary.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee, Dr. T. B. Barringer, Jr., be temporarily assigned to the outlying service at Bellevue Hospital, Dr. Coleman being away on his vacation and Dr. Norton being ill.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Tierney reported in favor of granting Mr. Louis C. Frees, General Inspector of Construction, a leave of absence of two weeks beginning on the 25th of June.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the application of Mr. Louis C. Frees, General Inspector of Construction, for leave of absence of two weeks, beginning on the 25th of June, be approved by the Board of Trustees.

The Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital recommended the appointment of the following physicians and surgeons, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That they be, upon the recommendation of the Medical Board and the Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital, appointed to the positions named:

Dr. W. B. Allen—Surgeon to Out-Patients; diseases of the eye.

Dr. Henry Scott—Surgeon to Out-Patients; Orthopedic Department.

Dr. T. J. Mulcahy—Assistant Physician to Out-Patients; diseases of the eye.

Dr. F. C. Heckel—Physician to Out-Patients and Assistant Attending Physician to Harlem Hospital.

Dr. A. M. Shady—Physician to Out-Patients, tuberculosis, and Assistant Attending Physician to Harlem Hospital.

Dr. A. L. Goodman—Physician to Out-Patients and Assistant Attending Physician to Harlem Hospital.

Dr. P. S. Boynton—Surgeon to Out-Patients and Assistant Attending Surgeon to Harlem Hospital.

The resignation of Dr. Sigmund Deutsch, Surgeon to Out-Patients, was accepted. Dr. Carl R. Keppler, Surgeon to Out-Patients in the Orthopedic Department, was re-appointed for the year 1907.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From June 9 to June 15, inclusive, 43 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 10 at Gouverneur Hospital, 4 at Harlem Hospital and 4 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

A statement showing the status of the several appropriations up to May 31 of the present year is herewith submitted. On Supplies and Contingencies there is a balance to be delivered on contract of \$255,138.86. This, with contingent supplies that are likely to be needed in the ensuing seven months, is likely to make this appropriation \$25,000 short. The appropriation for new ambulances, horses, etc., is likely to be inadequate unless increased toward the end of the year, although many of the items in it are estimates which may be reduced. If the present census continues and there are no extraordinary demands on the hospitals, it is believed that \$30,000 will cover any prospective deficit for the year, but it is recommended that the amount needed should not be asked for until the experience of the summer indicates whether further saving can be accomplished.

The General Superintendent of the Training Schools requests very necessary and important alterations in the Mills Training School. The only place in which the graduate women Nurses of the male wards can be lodged is on the third floor of the Male Training School, and on this floor it is necessary to lodge also a number of the employees. There are no facilities for bathing in the extension, and those who live in the annex have to go to the third floor to bathe. It is recommended that an entrance to the second floor be made, close to the lavatory, this floor being occupied by women only. A lavatory should be placed on the fourth floor so that the women Nurses may have a separate bathroom. These important changes can be accomplished for about \$500, and it is recommended that they be allowed.

It is recommended that specifications for potatoes for the balance of the year be prepared, 250,000 pounds being an estimate of the amount required.

There is quite an amount of old furniture at Fordham Hospital. As it is no longer suitable for use and as the value is insignificant, authority is requested to have it sold at auction.

The General Superintendent of the Training Schools recommends that the salary of a Hospital Helper, to act as housekeeper in the Mills Training School, be increased to \$600 a year. Also that the salary of the Nurse in charge of the admitting office be increased from \$480 to \$600 a year, and the Night Supervisor at Harlem Hospital from \$600 to \$720 a year. It is recommended that these increases be allowed.

From June 15 to June 22, inclusive, 51 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 8 at Gouverneur Hospital, 13 at Harlem Hospital and 7 at Fordham Hospital.

The Committee on the Prevention of Tuberculosis invites attention to the fact that the salary of Miss Genevieve Wilson, a Nurse who works half time for Bellevue Hospital and half time for the Committee, is but \$30. The Committee reports that she does her work very well and conscientiously and feels that she should receive \$75. The Committee is willing to pay half. Does the Board approve the increase to \$37.50?

It is reported that Dr. Tovey of the Out-Patient Department at Harlem Hospital has been in the habit of taking dressings, medicines, etc., away with him. The matter was reported to the Executive Committee and a meeting was held on June 24. Dr. Tovey acknowledged that he took such materials for the use of patients who had been discharged from the hospital. There is no authority for dressing discharged patients at their homes and it is believed that Dr. Tovey's conduct will seriously reflect on the institution.

It is recommended that the hour for closing the Central Office during the months of July and August be four o'clock if the work permits.

The General Superintendent of the Training Schools invites attention to the fact that there are six graduate nurses (men) of the Mills Training School who are receiving but \$480 a year. These young men feel that an invidious distinction is made against them as the graduate women nurses receive \$600 a year. She recommends that the salary of the male graduate nurses be increased to \$600 a year.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent obtain bids on the work of cutting an entrance to the second floor of the Mills Training School building and on the work of placing a bathroom in said building for the use of the women nurses, and submit them to the Board of Trustees for consideration.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That specifications be prepared and an advertisement be inserted in the City Record calling for bids on 250,000 pounds of potatoes.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That authority be given the General Medical Superintendent to have the old furniture at Fordham Hospital auctioned off, it being no longer suitable for use and the value being insignificant.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the General Superintendent of Training Schools and the General Medical Superintendent, the following increases in salaries be allowed: Nurse in charge of the admitting office from \$480 to \$600 a year; Night Supervisor at Harlem Hospital, from \$600 to \$720 a year; Visiting Nurse (tuberculosis) from \$360 to \$450 a year, and six graduate men Nurses from \$480 to

\$600 a year; also that the position of Hospital Helper at \$600 a year, to act as house-keeper to the Mills' Training School, be allowed.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be authorized to confer with the Executive Committee of Fordham Hospital and suggest that the house staff of that institution be increased to eight.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the employees of the Central Office be permitted to leave at four o'clock during the months of July and August.

Communications.

A communication dated June 19 was received from Messrs. Horgan & Slattery in reply to the letter of the Board of Trustees concerning the bill received from Messrs. William H. Wright & Son for extra work at Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That this matter be referred to the President.

A communication dated June 12 was received by Mr. Tierney from Messrs. John R. Sheehan & Co., builders, concerning the work on their contract at Gouverneur Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

A communication dated June 14 was received from the Empire State Surety Company concerning the unfinished work on the contract of Messrs. John R. Sheehan & Co. at Gouverneur Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was placed on file.

Reports were received from Mr. Louis C. Frees, Superintendent of Construction, on the work at the new Bellevue, Harlem and Fordham hospitals.

On motion, duly seconded, these reports were referred to the Chairman of the Building Committee. In the matter of the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital, a representative of Messrs. Luke A. Burke & Sons, contractors, appeared before the Trustees and assured them that all defective, incomplete or unsatisfactory items would receive immediate attention.

A communication dated June 24 was received from Messrs. Parish & Schroeder with a report from Mr. William E. Barton, Superintendent of Construction, on the progress of the work at the Bellevue Training School for Women Nurses.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication and report were placed on file.

A communication dated June 22 was received from Messrs. Luke A. Burke & Sons Company containing an explanation in regard to the additional time required in erecting the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the time for completing the work of the power house and ambulance station at the new Harlem Hospital, under the contract of Messrs. Luke A. Burke & Sons Company, be extended to December 30, 1906, in view of the reasons given by said company in its letter of June 22, 1907; and

Resolved, further, That the Board of Trustees accept the work and recommend the final payment of \$34,116.58.

A communication dated June 17 relative to a sanitary inspection of the immediate neighborhood of Fordham Hospital was received from the Department of Health and was on motion, duly seconded and carried, referred to the General Medical Superintendent with power.

A resolution was received from the Board of Aldermen on June 24 recommending that all employees of The City of New York who are exempt veteran firemen and delegates to the convention of the exempt Volunteer Firemen's Association of the State of New York be allowed four days' leave of absence with pay, (August 20 to August 23 inclusive) to attend the convention at Jamestown, N. Y.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was approved and the communication placed on file.

A communication dated June 14 was received from Dr. Frederick W. Gwyer resigning from the position of attending Surgeon to the Second Surgical Division.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the resignation of Dr. Frederick W. Gwyer, Attending Surgeon to the Second Surgical Division of Bellevue Hospital, be accepted.

A communication dated June 17 was received from Dr. A. A. Smith, Attending Physician to the Third Medical Division of Bellevue Hospital, applying for leave of absence from September 1 to September 20.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That leave of absence be granted to Dr. Smith from September 1 to September 20 inclusive.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That this matter be referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

A communication was received by Mr. Tierney from Mr. Evan T. Macdonald applying for the position of Superintendent of Construction.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Chairman of the Building Committee, Mr. Tierney.

A communication dated June 24 was received from Mr. Raymond F. Almiral in regard to an estimate for tennis courts at the new Fordham Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the Chairman of the Building Committee.

Unfinished Business.

The opinion of the Corporation Counsel in the matter of rules governing the admission of patients having been received, it was on motion, duly seconded,

Resolved, That the following rules be adopted by the Board of Trustees:

A. All emergency cases shall be admitted and receive prompt treatment and care.

B. Every other applicant who is, in the opinion of the admitting physician or other person acting as admitting officer, after examination and personal inquiry, poor and needy and entitled to indoor medical relief from The City of New York, shall be admitted.

C. Every other applicant, in regard to whose ability to pay for indoor medical relief the admitting physician or other admitting officer is in doubt, shall be investigated where practicable, either by a society organized for that purpose, or by an employee of the Board of Trustees, such applicant, when deemed necessary, to be admitted for treatment pending investigation. No applicant for treatment shall be denied admission to the hospital by reason of an intended investigation.

Persons able to pay for treatment shall be referred to a private hospital for that purpose. Patients able to pay, who are admitted on emergency, are expected to reimburse the City one dollar and a half for each day's treatment.

D. A suitable record shall be kept in each case.

On motion, duly seconded, it was further

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent inform the admitting physician and other persons acting as admitting officers of these rules and have them enforced in a humane manner.

The opinion of the Corporation Counsel in the matter of the bids on a vacuum cleaning plant for pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital having been received, it was on motion, duly seconded,

Resolved, That the bid of the Vacuum Cleaner Company at \$5,450 be accepted, it being the lower of the two bids received (the third bid, that of J. P. Sousa, Jr., being declared informal by the Corporation Counsel) and that the contract for the installation of a vacuum cleaning plant in pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital be and the same is hereby awarded to the Vacuum Cleaner Company of No. 427 Fifth Avenue, subject to the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in accordance with the provision of section 420, chapter 10, of the Greater New York Charter.

Dr. Brannan reported that, in accordance with the resolution of the previous meeting, he had signed a special order for the hung ceiling on the fifth floor, the

estimate of the John H. Parker Company on this work amounting to \$3,065, and on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the action of the President in this matter be approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That Dr. William P. Healy be promoted from Surgeon to Out-Patients and Assistant Attending Surgeon to Fordham Hospital to Attending Surgeon to Fordham Hospital for the remainder of the year 1907 to take the place of Dr. Jackson R. Campbell.

New Business.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of making use of motor ambulances and other vehicles in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals be referred to a special committee of the Board to be appointed by the President, the President to be Chairman of said Committee.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That in the absence of Dr. Brannan the Board appoint Mr. Tierney as President.

The President appointed the following committees for the month of July:

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:
From June 23 to July 6, inclusive, 67 operations were performed at Bellevue, 15 at Gouverneur, 27 at Harlem, and 21 at Fordham Hospital, at all but one of which (an extreme emergency) the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

During the month of June the hospitals of the Department were properly covered by the attending staff as required by the rules.

Attention is invited to the direction of the Fire Department that the fence about Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital be moved south of the roadway so that the engines of the Department may have access to all parts of the grounds. You directed the John H. Parker Company to move the fence last winter when it was contemplated to build an employees' dormitory, and they replied that it would delay the completion of the building as the space afforded their only docking facility. It is recommended that they be directed to move this fence south of the roadway line in order to comply with the recommendation of the Fire Department and also to allow proper access of air to the isolation and tuberculosis wards.

It is recommended that the attention of the John H. Parker Company be called to the fact that it is necessary that Pavilions A and B be completed within the contract time.

One estimate has been received on the work of fitting up the pathological laboratory at Gouverneur Hospital from P. Behan at \$270, and it is recommended that it be accepted.

Estimates have been received on instruments for Fordham Hospital and the lowest is that of Kny-Scheerer Company at \$750. It is recommended that it be accepted.

Dr. Chetwood of the Fourth Genito-Urinary Division has addressed a request to the Trustees for a number of special instruments for his division which would cost \$572.75. It is recommended that these instruments be not allowed because there are other instruments in the hospital that will take their place. It should be a rule of the Trustees that the purchase of expensive instruments for the use of any one division be prohibited; that such instruments must be kept in a general stock and when occasion arises for their use they may be used in any division.

In order to make proper provision for representation at the allied hospitals it is recommended that in the absence of the Supervising Nurse the Head Nurse in charge of the Training School shall act as Supervising Nurse of the hospital.

In order to simplify the question of leave of absence it is recommended that leave be granted for continuous service only.

The Finance Department reported to the Board of Trustees that there was a premium of \$3,710.22 on bonds issued for the completion of Gouverneur Hospital, and that there were premiums of \$11,249.21 for bonds issued for the construction of Harlem Hospital. It is desirable to know whether these funds are available for use by the Department, and it is recommended that inquiry be addressed to the Finance Department in this regard.

On motion, duly seconded, it was
Resolved, That the John H. Parker Company be directed to move the fence about Pavilions A and B south of the roadway in order to comply with the recommendation of the Fire Department, and also to allow proper access of air to the isolation and tuberculosis wards.

On motion, duly seconded, it was
Resolved, That the John H. Parker Company be urged to complete the construction of Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital within the time specified by contract, namely January 24, 1908.

On motion, duly seconded, it was
Resolved, That the estimate of P. Behan on fitting up the pathological laboratory at Gouverneur Hospital for \$270, and the estimate of Kny-Scheerer Company on instruments for Fordham Hospital at \$750, be approved and accepted.

On motion, duly seconded, it was
Resolved, That the requisition of Dr. Chetwood for instruments for the Fourth Genito-Urinary Division of Bellevue Hospital be referred back to the General Medical Superintendent for further information and report.

On motion, duly seconded, it was
Resolved, That in the absence of the Supervising Nurses of the allied hospitals the Head Nurse in charge of the Training School shall act as Supervising Nurse.

Resolved, That leaves of absence be granted for continuous service only.

Resolved, That application be made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for an extension of the water main so that proper connections can be made with the new training school building.

A communication dated July 2 was received from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, architects, complaining of the delay in the work of the contractors for the plumbing in Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was
Resolved, That this matter be referred to the Acting President with power.

A communication dated July 1 was received from Messrs. Parish & Schroeder, architects, with reports on the progress of the work at the new Bellevue Training School for the weeks ending June 29 and July 6.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, these reports were placed on file.

Specifications for the furnishing and setting of the lighting fixtures in Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital were received from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, architects.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Resolution adopted at a meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the headquarters of The New York City Fire Department, June 25, 1907, amending the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission.

Resolved, That section 20 of Part 9 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be repealed, and that section 19 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 19. A permit may be issued for the storage or keeping of calcium carbide in hermetically sealed iron receptacles, and in quantity not exceeding one hundred and twenty pounds in the aggregate, provided it is stored or kept in isolated buildings of fire-proof construction, where it will not be a hazard to any adjoining property, and that the buildings are waterproof, well ventilated and drained, and with floors raised at least 12 inches above the grade upon which they stand.

If the building is used exclusively for the storage of calcium carbide, is not more than one story high, and has no basement or cellar, a permit may be granted by the Fire Commissioner for the storage of quantities in excess of one hundred and twenty pounds, and in such building no artificial light or fire shall be used. Provided, however, that in addition to all the above requirements such buildings must be detached from all other buildings not used for the storage of calcium carbide at least 5 feet for each hundred pounds of calcium carbide permitted to be stored therein up to five hundred pounds, and five feet in addition to 25 feet for each ton of calcium carbide permitted. But in no case shall more than 100 feet of clear feet of space be required. No wood or other inflammable material shall enter into the construction of such building, nor be permitted to be kept therein, except the wood used in casing the calcium carbide while actually in use as such casing.

No packages to be opened in such buildings.
All buildings in which calcium carbide in excess of 120 pounds is stored shall have a sign on all four sides of the building reading, in white letters at least 6 inches high and of a proportionate thickness, painted on a red background, "Calcium Carbide. Use No Water."

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be received or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
