DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

REPORT OF TRANSACTIONS NOVEMBER 9 TO 15, 1908.

Communications Received.

From the Mayor—Information asked for in regard to automobiles operated by the Department of Correction; cost, maker, number of chauffeurs, cost of maintenance, etc. Information furnished.

From the Board of Aldermen—City Clerk transmits certified copy of an ordinance adopted by the Board, which reads as follows:

An ordinance providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of two million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$2,250,000), to provide means for the erection of an administration building, men's and women's cell buildings, mess hall, central heating plant, shops and a bath building for the new Penitentiary on Rikers Island, under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Correction.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 2, 1908, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding two million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$2,250,000), to provide means for the erection of an administration building, men's and women's cell buildings, mess hall, central heating plant, shops and a bath building for the new Penitentiary on Rikers Island, under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Correction, and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding two million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$2,250,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 27, 1908, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

From the Comptroller—Inquiry in regard to voucher for \$30 in favor of Thomas C. Dunham, for brushes for Department of Correction. Deputy Comptroller asks if certificate of Warden of the Penitentiary permits the purchase in open market of articles manufactured at State Prisons. Goods purchased are not made at the Penitentiary or at any State Prison.

From State Commission of Prisons—Asking for catalogues of articles manufactured at the New York County Penitentiary, Blackwells Island, so that the Commission may refuse release in cases where the Department of Correction can furnish supplies to other City Departments. Secretary to comply with request.

From State Commission of Prisons—Secretary of State Prison Commission transmits copy of a report made by Messrs. Huntington and Solomon, Standing Committee, in regard to conditions on Harts Island, visit made by said committee on Election Day, November 3, 1908. Warden instructed to make full and detailed report at once.

In answer to the statements contained in report of Messrs. Huntington and Solomon, Warden states that inmates were idle because the day was a holiday. Half the force of Keepers and Orderlies had been permitted to go to their homes to vote in the morning, and half in the afternoon.

The Department of Water Supply has promised to improve supply by laying a larger Croton main to the island.

The Resident Physician was at dinner in a room in the hospital building when the Commissioners called. New ceilings had just been put in, which accounts for condition in which north dormitory was found. A certain number of ounces of bread is allowed each inmate, which has heretofore been given in one piece; hereafter it will be given in slices, as recommended. Copy of Warden's report and letters from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in regard to new Croton main for Harts Island sent to State Prison Commission, Albany, N. Y.

From Department of Docks and Ferries—Stating that orders have been issued for the construction of small dock on the eastern side of Blackwells Island. On file.

From State of New York, Commission of Immigration—Asking whether "in dealings with non-English speaking people" the Department uses interpreters; if so, how are these interpreters appointed, what are their qualifications, etc. No official interpreters employed in Department. Keepers with a knowledge of foreign languages are sometimes appointed, and some Keepers have acquired a working knowledge of languages by long intercourse with such foreigners as are inmates of the Department from time to time.

The public hearing on the petition of the Union Railway Company of New York City, for franchises to construct, maintain and operate two branches or extensions to its existing system, one from the intersection of Third and Pelham avenues, upon and along Pelham avenue to the Southern boulevard, Borough of The Bronx, and the other from the intersection of Sedgwick avenue and Fordham road, Borough of The Bronx, to and across University Heights Bridge and its approaches, to Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, was opened.

The public hearing was fixed for this day by resolution duly adopted October 2, 1908.

Affidavits of publication were received from the "New York Tribune," the "New York Sun" and the CITY RECORD.

Frederick Rosenkamm appeared in opposition to the Pelham Avenue Extension.

The following appeared in favor:

Henry A. Robinson, on behalf of F. W. Whitridge, Receiver for the Company;
Hon. William D. Peck, Col. Joseph A. Goulden, W. W. Niles, Paul Halpin.

No one else desiring to be heard, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Secretary presented the following:

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
DIVISION OF FRANCHISES, ROOM 801, NO. 277 BROADWAY,
October 27, 1908.

Mr. NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer:

SIR—The Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter referred to as the Union Company), under date of July 28, 1908, has petitioned the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the grant of two separate franchises to construct, maintain and operate double track street surface railways as extensions to its existing lines to be operated by the overhead system of electricity, in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan over the following routes:

1. Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track street surface railway on Third avenue, and running thence easterly along Pelham avenue to the Southern boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx.

2. Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the petitioner at the intersection of Fordham road and Sedgwick avenue, and running thence over and along Fordham road and West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street to the approach to the University Heights Bridge; thence over and along said bridge and the approaches thereto to West Two Hundred and Seventh street, Borough of Manhattan; thence westerly in, upon and along said West Two Hundred and Seventh street to the intersection thereof with Amsterdam avenue (Tenth avenue); thence in, upon and along said Amsterdam avenue to Emerson street; thence westerly in, upon and along said Emerson street to Broadway, and connecting with the existing tracks of the Kingsbridge Company in Broadway.

The above routes and connections are shown upon two maps or plans accompanying the petition and entitled, respectively:

1. "Map showing proposed railway of the Union Railway Co., in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908."

2. "Map showing proposed railway of the Union Railway Co., in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908."

—and signed by F. W. Whitridge, Receiver. T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, and Edward A. Maher, President.

Copies of these maps are attached hereto.

The approximate length of the Pelham avenue route is 3,000 feet, or 6,000 feet of single track, and of the Fordham road route 4,650 feet, or 9,300 feet of single track.

The petition was presented to the Board at the meeting of September 18, 1908, and referred to the Chief Engineer and also to the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

At a meeting of the Board held October 2, 1908, a resolution was adopted fixing October 30, 1908, as the date for the preliminary public hearing, and requesting the Mayor to designate two daily newspapers in which the notice of such application and hearing should be published, according to law. The "New York Sun" and "New York Tribune" were so designated.

The Union Company is at the present time in the hands of a Receiver, Mr. F. W. Whitridge, who was appointed by an order made in the United States Circuit Court by Judge Lacombe, March 31, 1908. The Third Avenue Railroad Company, which owns the entire capital stock of the Union Company, is also in the hands of the same Receiver.

On September 16, 1908, permission was granted to the Receiver by the above named Judge to inquire into the advisability of obtaining franchises for several extensions, among them being the two here under consideration. The order provided that before such franchises are accepted by the Receiver, their terms shall be submitted to the Central Trust Company, as Trustee of the Third Avenue Railroad Company, and to the bondholders committee for approval.

In reply to an inquiry from this Division, the attorney for the Receiver of the company, in a communication under date of September 29, 1908, states that some years ago consents were obtained for both of the above routes, sufficient to authorize the construction of the extensions, but that no computation has been made from the last assessment roll to ascertain if these consents represent the owners of one-half in value of the abutting property. I am advised by the attorney for the Receiver that cars will be operated over the Pelham avenue route from the existing north and south routes on Third avenue and Webster avenue, and that it is also intended in connection with the Fordham road route to establish a new crosstown line from Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, to the entrance to the Bronx Park, at the Southern boulevard, Borough of The Bronx. The cars of this new crosstown line will not operate over the existing Broadway route for the reason that the latter is equipped with the underground system, while it is proposed to operate the new route entirely by the overhead system of electricity. The effect of this will be to create a stub-end terminal at Emerson street and Broadway.

PELHAM AVENUE ROUTE.

The Union Company, as the successor of the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railroad Company, has heretofore claimed a franchise on Pelham avenue by virtue of authority granted by chapter 553 of the Laws of 1874, amending section 8 of chapter 361 of the Laws of 1863. The first-mentioned act granted the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Company the right to lay single or double tracks on certain streets, among others the following:

"Along College avenue, from Kingsbridge road to its intersection with the road known as Fordham and Pelham avenue, and through and along said last mentioned avenue to Pelham Bridge, in the town of Westchester * * *"

Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892, the Harlem Bridge Company, with three other street surface railway companies, on July 2, 1892, entered into an agreement of consolidation whereby the Union Company was formed.

Under date of May 7, 1908, an application was made by the Union Company to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for a permit to erect poles and string overhead wires thereon, on Pelham avenue, between Third avenue and the Southern boulevard, for the purpose of constructing a double track extension from its existing line on Third avenue to the Bronx Park entrance. This application was referred to the Corporation Counsel, with the request that he advise the said Commissioner if the documents submitted with the application showed sufficient proof of the company's right to construct this line, and if the permit requested might properly be issued.

The Corporation Counsel rendered an opinion in this matter reading in part as follows:

"The right to construct on Pelham avenue granted to the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railroad Company by chapter 553 of the Laws of 1874, expired under the provisions of section 47 of chapter 140 of the Laws of 1850, as amended by section 5 of chapter 582 of the Laws of 1864. Under this act as amended any corporation formed thereunder was compelled to begin the construction of its road and expend ten per cent. of the amount of its capital thereon within five years after its articles of association were filed, and to finish its road and put it in operation within seven years from date of filing the said articles of association, otherwise its corporate existence and powers were to cease. * * *

"In my opinion, therefore, the franchise to construct the railroad on Pelham avenue became void seven years after the passage of the said act of 1874, to wit, on May 22, 1881. * * *

"I therefore advise you the permit applied for on Pelham avenue must be refused by you, and if the Union Railway Company desires to construct and operate on the said avenue, it must secure a new franchise therefor from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

In a report of the Bureau of Franchises dated September 11, 1905, upon the application of the Union Company for various extensions, it was pointed out that this was a much needed extension and one that the company should be required to apply for in connection with certain of the extensions then asked for, in order that easy access might be afforded to the Bronx Park Zoological Gardens, from the Fordham station of the Harlem Railroad. This condition would still appear to apply, although the New York City Interborough Railway Company is operating a line on One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, one block south of Pelham avenue, from Third avenue to the Southern boulevard. The line of the Interborough Company was located on One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street by reason of the claim of the Union Company to the old franchise rights on Pelham avenue.

UNIVERSITY HEIGHTS BRIDGE ROUTE.

Two previous applications have been made to the Board for the right to construct a street surface railway on a portion of this route. The Union Company, by a petition dated May 31, 1905, and presented at the meeting of the Board held June 2, 1905, asked for the consent of the Board to twenty-two extensions, one of which was for a route from the proposed tracks to be constructed on Harlem river terrace over West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, the University Heights Bridge, West Two Hundred and Seventh street, Amsterdam avenue and Emerson street to Broadway.

At the meeting of the Board held June 30, 1905, a petition was received from the New York City Interborough Railway Company (hereinafter referred to as the Interborough Company) asking for thirteen extensions, among them being one from the existing tracks of the company on Aqueduct avenue, and thence over West One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street and Fordham road to West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, and thence along and over West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, the University Heights Bridge and West Two Hundred and Seventh street to Amsterdam avenue.

The Bureau of Franchises made reports to the Comptroller on each of these applications, and said reports were presented to the Board at its meetings of September 15 and September 29, 1905, respectively. These reports contained no suggestions as to the conditions which should be incorporated in any contracts between the City and the companies for the rights applied for, but were confined to a discussion of the routes and to the advisability of granting franchises in the streets petitioned for, or in other nearby streets, which would be better adapted to the purpose. Hearings were held upon both applications, and briefs filed by counsel to the companies for and against the construction of certain of the extensions, and at the meeting of the Board held December 15, 1905, the matter was referred to the Comptroller for conference with representatives of the companies and other interested parties, in order that existing differences might be adjusted, but owing to the consolidation of the two companies just subsequent to this time, the applications were not pressed.

The Interborough Company on July 6, 1906, filed an application for a change of route. The matter was thus reopened, and further conferences were had with representatives of the companies, as a result of which the Bureau of Franchises, at the meeting of February 1, 1907, presented a report to the Board, recommending certain changes and certain extensions in and to the lines of each of the companies, and said report was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of The Bronx. It was recommended in said report that the Interborough Company amend its previous application for the extension over the University Heights Bridge by applying for a route on Fordham road, between Aqueduct avenue and West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, to be operated over the tracks of the Union Company, and it was also suggested that a single track loop be added from Amsterdam avenue through Emerson street, Broadway, Isham street and Amsterdam avenue.

The report of the Bureau contained an agreement for the proposed alterations to the Interborough routes, and two forms of contract for the extensions to the Interborough and Union companies, respectively. The agreement for the proposed alterations was accepted by the Interborough Company and reported upon favorably by the Select Committee, and the consent of the City was given to such changes by a contract duly executed by the Mayor.

No action was taken by the Select Committee upon the proposed contract for the extensions to the Interborough and Union Companies until the meeting of the Board held February 14, 1908, when said Committee presented a report, stating that a number of property owners have requested the construction and operation of a railway across University Heights Bridge. This report recommended that the Chief Engineer be directed to prepare and submit a report upon the terms and conditions under which such a franchise should be granted.

At the meeting of March 6, 1908, a report and proposed form of contract were presented to the Board, and a resolution adopted requesting the Interborough Company to present a written application within thirty days for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway as an extension to its existing lines on the route as suggested in the report presented February 1, 1907.

The President of the Interborough Company, in a communication under date of March 17, 1908, presented at the meeting of April 3, 1908, stated that the company regretted its inability to apply for or accept the suggested franchise. At the request of the Comptroller the matter was referred to him, but no report thereon has yet been made.

The extension as now applied for by the Union Company will undoubtedly prove a very important connection between the existing surface lines in the Borough of The Bronx and the surface lines and subway system in the Borough of Manhattan.

At the meeting of the Board held October 2, 1908, a petition dated June 26, 1908, signed by about two hundred taxpayers and citizens was presented. This petition

recited that the construction of the University Heights Bridge extension, and the operation of a line of cars over said bridge would be a great convenience to a large number of people, residents of the upper part of the City, and would tend to increase the population of the surrounding territory.

Conditions for the Proposed Franchises.

Underground System—Inasmuch as all of the existing lines of the Union Company, in the Borough of The Bronx, are operated by the overhead system of electricity, it would not appear that there is any present necessity for the operation of these extensions by the underground system. I believe, however, that the Board may properly reserve the right to cause the removal of all wires from above the surface of the streets, and thus compel the adoption of the underground system at any time upon one year's notice to the company. I would therefore recommend that the clause heretofore used in regard to this be inserted in the contracts.

I have heretofore reported that it was my opinion that any street surface railway extensions in the Borough of Manhattan should be operated only by the underground system, but as the Board has not insisted upon this condition in the only recent franchise granted in that Borough, I have not inserted such a condition in the proposed form of contract attached hereto.

Paving of Streets—Pelham avenue has a roadway sixty feet in width, the centre portion of which for a width of thirty feet has been paved with asphalt block, thus leaving a strip fifteen feet wide on each side of the street, and adjacent to the curb line, unpaved.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx, in a communication under date of September 26, 1908, in reply to an inquiry from this division, requesting to be advised as to whether in his opinion there are any special conditions which should be imposed should the Board grant a franchise, states:

"The tracks, if laid on Pelham avenue, ought to be laid at either side of the present paved roadway (of thirty feet) so as not to interfere with the important through vehicular traffic on this highway. This avenue is the only crosstown connection of this part of the Borough, and has a roadway of sixty feet, and the tracks should be laid from ten to fifteen feet from the north and south curbs."

This would appear to be a condition which might properly be imposed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx at the time application is made for a departmental permit to open the street for the purpose of connecting the railway. It would seem, however, that before tracks are laid on this unpaved portion of the street some form of pavement should be put down between the tracks and outside thereof. I would therefore suggest that should the tracks be located on this unpaved portion of the street that the company be required to pave between its tracks and two feet on each side of the same, under the supervision of the Borough President, and that the character of such pavement be designated by him. A clause to this effect has been inserted in the proposed form of contract for this route.

A portion of Two Hundred and Seventh street, Borough of Manhattan, is also unpaved, and a similar clause has, therefore, been inserted in the form of contract for the University Heights Bridge route.

For the reasons suggested in the report of this Division to the Chief Engineer under date of September 14, 1908, on the application of the New York and North Shore Traction Company, I have inserted in the forms of contract herewith submitted the paving clause heretofore used, in place of the one recently proposed by the Corporation Counsel, allowing the City to make needed repairs, and charge the same to the company, without first giving the company notice that such repairs are necessary.

Protection of Structures—The Commissioner of Bridges, in a communication under date of September 29, 1908, in reply to an inquiry from this Division, transmitted a report of the Principal Assistant Engineer of that Department, in which it is stated:

The proposed extension will not interfere with any plans of the Department, and the right might be granted on condition that the bridge be strengthened by the Union Company wherever necessary to accommodate the concentrated load of its cars.

Clauses have been inserted in the forms of contract requiring the company, before commencing construction, to obtain permits from the President of the Borough, and from the Commissioners of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and Bridges, and allowing these officials to impose such conditions as they deem proper, not inconsistent with the contract for the protection of structures under their care. The contracts also provide that any alterations in the sewerage or drainage systems, or any subsurface or surface structures made necessary by the construction and operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the company in such manner as may be prescribed by the City officials having jurisdiction. A condition has also been inserted requiring the company to comply with the rules of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in regard to the prevention of electrolysis.

Term of Grant—At the present time the traction situation in The City of New York is greatly involved by reason of the separation of different companies from the interests formerly controlling and operating them, and by reason of a number of the larger operating companies, including the Union, being in the hands of Receivers. When this unsettled condition of affairs will be straightened out it is impossible to predict.

The future of the various street surface railway companies in this City is indefinite, both as to their financial standing and as to their relations with other companies. The Board, on the recommendations of the Select Committees to whom the matters were referred, has recently, in several instances in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, granted franchises solely on the terms and conditions imposed by the Railroad Law, and has not inserted any special provisions in the forms of contract for a more specific protection of the City's interests. This lenient action has been taken by the Board upon the recommendations of its Select Committees, who have stated that it is mainly because of the pressing demands of the public for better, or improved, transit facilities in these Boroughs, and the general disinclination of the companies to build either new roads or extensions. I believe, however, that when the existing traction difficulties have been overcome, and the various roads resume business on a normal basis, all franchise rights now owned or sought to be acquired by the street surface railways in this City will be greatly enhanced in value. Grants similar to those now applied for have in the past been held to be extremely valuable, and I see no reason why they should not again become so. I also believe that the City should take advantage of this condition, and, in making franchise grants to the street surface railway companies during the existing disturbed and unsettled condition of the affairs of the companies, protect its interests by limiting such grants to short terms, and not make such grants for the maximum of fifty years provided by the Charter.

The two extensions under consideration will greatly increase the earning value of the existing crosstown line with which they connect at either end. The Pelham avenue extension will have its easterly terminus at one of the main entrances to the Bronx Park Zoological Garden, and the University Heights Bridge route will make connections with the subway and the surface lines in the Borough of Manhattan. The existing crosstown line will thus be continued both easterly and westerly by the construction of these extensions, and will thereby acquire new terminals which will greatly enhance its value as a feeder to the present surface lines running northerly and southerly through the Borough of The Bronx.

I would therefore recommend that the grant of the rights applied for be made for a term of ten years, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of fifteen years upon a revaluation.

Compensation and Security Fund—A franchise to an existing company in order to comply with the Railroad Law requires the payment to the City of three per cent. of the gross receipts during the first five years, and five per cent. thereafter, calculated upon the proportion of the total receipts of the company that the length of the extension bears to the total length of line of the company.

For compensation for each of the franchises applied for, I would suggest that the initial sum be fixed at five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and as annual payments for the first ten years of the grant the minimum percentages of the gross receipts required by the Railroad Law. Minimum sums should be required to be paid annually, fixed upon the basis of the present earnings of the company and the length of the extension applied for calculated as outlined above. Upon this basis I have arrived at the following results:

The charge proposed for the use of the University Heights Bridge in the same as that heretofore fixed by the Board in all other contracts for the use of bridges over the Harlem River, to wit:

Four thousand dollars (\$4,000) annually during the first term of five years.
Four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) annually during the second term of five years.

Other Conditions—A clause has been inserted in each of the forms of contract reserving to the Board the right to grant a similar privilege to any individual or other corporation over the same route upon payment of an annual sum to the Union Company not exceeding the legal interest on the proportion of the total cost of construction and repairs as the number of cars operated by the company or individual bears to the number operated by the Union Company.

The other conditions inserted in the proposed forms of contract appended hereto, are those which have been employed in former grants to street surface railway companies, and need, therefore, no discussion.

In general, the proposed forms of contract have been drawn in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor September 14, 1903, granting a franchise to the company for a route over Macombs Dam Bridge, the form of which was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it is respectfully submitted that this form should be adhered to in any additional grants made to the Union Company.

ARREARS FOR PERCENTAGES OF GROSS RECEIPTS.

The charter of the Union Company, chapter 340, of the Laws of 1892, provides for the following payment of compensation to the City:

"Whenever such earnings shall during any period of six months exceed an average of seventeen hundred dollars per day, then and in that event the said Company shall thereafter annually on the first day of December pay into the treasury of the city of New York to the credit of the sinking fund of said city, a sum equalling in the aggregate one per cent. of its gross earnings, and an additional annual payment of one per cent. of such gross earnings shall be made by said company in like manner for each multiple of seventeen hundred dollars per day of such average gross earnings."

The Union Company failed to make a proper return to the City in 1904, and demand was made upon said Company by the Comptroller for the sum of seventeen thousand one hundred and seven dollars and fifty-nine cents, with interest thereon. The Company declined to pay this amount unless it should be deducted from the franchise tax then due and unpaid, and the Corporation Counsel was thereupon requested to bring suit for the recovery of the same.

Such suit was subsequently brought by the Corporation Counsel, and the Company demurred to the complaint, on the ground that it did not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action, and in such demurrer contended that the true interpretation of the above quoted provision of its charter was that if during any six months' period wholly within one fiscal year from June 30 to June 30, the daily receipts average thirty-four hundred dollars, then for that particular fiscal year the Company must pay a tax of two per cent. upon its gross earnings. The demurrer of the Company was overruled by Mr. Justice MacLean of the Supreme Court, who in an opinion as reported in the "New York Law Journal" of October 22, 1907, held:

"It is the direct obligation of the defendant itself, expressly so declared in the act irrespective of verified statements and detailed accounts, to pay into the treasury of the City a certain percentage of its gross earnings whenever its gross earnings shall during any period of six months exceed a certain average, and does not arise in consequence of any act, action or computation of the Comptroller to whom it must furnish evidence, statements and detailed accounts, subject, however, to further inquiry if need be as to 'the correctness of its report as to its gross earnings.' In a word, the Company becomes indebted and obligated by the act to pay a certain percentage of its actual gross earnings whenever the gross receipts exceed a certain daily average 'during any period of six months,' and not by virtue merely of its report thereof."

An appeal was taken by the Company from the above judgment overruling the demurrer to the complaint, and in March, 1908, a decision was handed down by the Appellate Division affirming the judgment appealed from, with leave to the defendant to withdraw said demurrer, and to answer the complaint on payment of costs in the two courts.

The Company is also in arrears for the percentages of its gross receipts for the year 1907. Judgment was obtained by the City for both of the above amounts with interest and costs in the respective sums of twenty thousand three hundred and eighty-five dollars and eight cents (\$20,385.08), and thirty-one thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$31,758.87), and said judgments were entered in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on February 3, 1908, but before they could be collected the Company went into the hands of a receiver. These judgments were subsequently proved before a Special Master for the receiver of the Company, and allowed in full by him on September 29, 1908, but have not yet been paid.

It would appear that before any further privileges are granted to the Company these arrears should be paid and that the City should not be obliged to sue for compensation legally due, and that the company should meet its obligations by the payment of the above amounts which are due in return for the valuable public utilities and privileges enjoyed by it under its charter.

Clauses have accordingly been inserted in each of the proposed forms of contract submitted herewith, requiring the payment of these amounts within thirty (30) days from the date on which these contracts are signed by the Mayor.

As has been before stated, the traction situation in New York City is at this time greatly involved and in an unsettled condition. The applicant company is in the hands of a receiver and by the order of the court appointing such receiver, transfer privileges between this company and other companies, with which it was formerly on intimate relations, have been discontinued. It has also been shown that this company is in arrears for percentages on its gross receipts amounting to over fifty thousand dollars.

I believe the Board should exercise great caution in making any grants during the existence of the conditions outlined above, and that, as has already been mentioned, such grants should be for limited periods and not for the maximum time allowed by the Charter, so that the City may, upon their termination, take advantage of the more favorable conditions which will probably then exist.

A form of proposed contract was drawn up, as outlined above, and submitted to the attorney for the receiver, examined by him, and subsequently was the basis of a conference between Mr. F. W. Whitridge, Receiver, Mr. Edward A. Maher, President of the Union Railway Company, and members of this Division.

As I have outlined in the report on the Bronx Traction Company, this day presented to the Board, the receiver set forth the crippled condition of the company at the present time, and felt that the only money that could be expended would be that sufficient to cover the cost of construction. However, after a lengthy discussion between Mr. Maher and myself, he finally agreed to recommend to the Receiver for his approval a modification of the two contracts proposed, substantially as follows:

The condition requiring the change of motive power to the underground system upon one year's notice to the company has, as a result of the conference, been omitted. It has been represented to me that with this condition in the franchise, it would be extremely difficult to finance the proposed extensions, particularly since the contract limits the term of grant to a period considerably shorter than that for which franchises have been recently granted. While I believe such a condition is important in giving the City control of the situation should it become desirable to remove the overhead wires, it is believed that the same result may be obtained by the exercise of the police power of the City, though possibly not without litigation. It is believed that a franchise which limits the term of grant to a short period is much more important than the retention of the conditions requiring the operation by the underground system, and in consequence this condition, which the Receiver declined absolutely to accept, has been omitted.

The payment of the judgments was agreed to, but the Receiver asked that he be allowed more than thirty (30) days, and suggested three (3) months for the 1904 arrears, and six (6) months for the other amount, and I have modified the proposed contract accordingly.

As stated in my reports on the Bronx Traction Company, I have agreed to recommend these reductions from those heretofore proposed, largely in view of the present situation in traction matters, and the desire of the property owners (of whom many have called at this office) to secure these additional transit lines.

When the contracts had been amended, in accordance with the terms agreed upon at the conference, they were again submitted to Mr. Maher, and by him to Mr. Whitridge, who, in a communication under date of October 26, 1908, states:

"As amended they are acceptable to me, and they will be executed in the form proposed."

The forms of contract submitted are such as have heretofore been approved by the Corporation Counsel, and are in the standard form which was recommended by the Law Department some two years ago.

I would therefore recommend that the Board tentatively approve the proposed forms of contract and forward the same to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this _____ day of _____, 190____ by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate an extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan, in The City of New York, upon the following route:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at or near the intersection of Sedgwick avenue and Fordham road, in the Borough of The Bronx, and running thence southwesterly in, upon and along said Fordham road and Hampden place to West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, and thence southwesterly and westerly in, upon and along said West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street to its intersection with the easterly approach to the University Heights Bridge, thence westerly upon and over said Bridge, and the easterly and westerly approaches thereto, to West Two Hundred and Seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and thence westerly in, upon and along said West Two Hundred and Seventh street to Amsterdam or Tenth avenue, thence southerly in, upon and along said Amsterdam or Tenth avenue to Emerson street, thence westerly in, upon and along said Emerson

street to Broadway, and connecting with the existing double track railway in said Broadway. The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed railway of the Union Railway Co. in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908."

—and signed by F. W. Whitridge, Receiver; T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, and Edward A. Maher, President, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained, the Company shall, within two months thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railroad ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty (20) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than that sum required to be paid during the last year of this original contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty (20) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate, and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) in cash, within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400).

During the third term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fifteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550), and which shall be equal to five per cent (5%) of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the line of the company in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the day on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(c) For the use of the University Heights Bridge during the first term of five years the annual sum of \$2,000, during the second term of five years the annual sum of \$2,250, and during the third term of five years the annual sum of \$2,500. The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date of the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the said Comptroller on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the matter of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract, shall be strictly complied with.

The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the Company, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchises hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the Company, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company, and within three (3) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to The City of New York the sum of twenty thousand three hundred and eighty-five dollars and eight cents (\$20,385.08) and within three (3) months thereafter the further sum of thirty-one thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$31,758.87); said amounts being due under the franchise of the Company granted to it by the Legislature by chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same is renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to

this contract, within the streets, avenues and highways and upon the bridge, shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual. If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board or its successors in authority) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of the tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways and the bridge shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the contract hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract: and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the rights of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the same streets, avenues, highways or bridge, hereinabove described in Section 1.

The use of said railway, which shall be constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures in public streets and avenues owned by the Company and used in connection therewith shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways, hereinabove described in Section 1, for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall not exceed the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railway and structures and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railway so used. Provided, however, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest of the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to pay for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage of the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if in its opinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Eighth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Ninth—The Company shall commence construction of the extension herein authorized within six (6) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained for such extension, or from the date of the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such extension ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction of the same within six (6) months from the same date, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, and all sums which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall be forfeited to the City. Provided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided further that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided in the Charter of the City.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the written direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon such railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract, all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City when such employees are in full uniform.

The rate for the carrying of property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Thirteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway; and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars.

Fourteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Seventeenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets, avenues or bridge, in or upon which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three times every twenty-four hours when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets, avenues and bridge, except when the width of such streets, avenues or bridge shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets, avenues and bridge in a satisfactory manner.

Eighteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues or highways and bridge upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—The Company shall cause to be paved that portion of the street between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, upon and along the streets, avenues and highways of the routes hereby authorized, which are now unpaved. The work of such paving shall be done under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, and such authorities shall designate the character of the pavement to be laid.

As long as the said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in the streets, avenues, highways or upon the bridge, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue, highway or bridge in which said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue, highway or upon the bridge, and in that event the Company, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavements in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route, written permits shall be obtained from the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and the Commissioners of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and Bridges, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which those officials may impose as a condition upon which such permit is granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which those officials have jurisdiction.

Twenty-third—The Company agrees to comply with any and all the rules which may be made by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of preventing the destruction of the pipes or structures in the street by electrolysis, which may be caused by the electric current used by the Company, whether such rules affect the method of the original construction of said railway or any reconstruction, maintenance or repairs upon such railway at any time during the term of this contract.

Twenty-fourth—It is agreed that the right hereby given to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets, or upon the bridge, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall at its own expense protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in a manner as directed by the President of the Borough in which said tracks are situated, or by the Commissioner of Bridges.

Twenty-fifth—Should the grades or lines of the streets in which franchises are herein granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets the Company shall take care of and protect the track and appurtenances at its own expense; all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough in which such change is made or work done.

Twenty-sixth—The Board may at any time require the Company to remove one track from the University Heights Bridge and approaches thereto, and to place the remaining track in the centre of the roadway of said bridge and operate the railway by means of said single track upon said bridge and its approaches.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, or at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-ninth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolu-

tion declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirtieth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets or of the bridge shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

Thirty-first—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-second—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street and bridge pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railroad; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same with interest from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its president, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-third—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Thirty-fourth—The word "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-fifth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This contract is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Synopsis of Provisions of Contract.

Section 1. Grant. Description of route and map referred to.

Sec. 2. Conditions of grant:

First—Consent of property owners must be obtained within six months or an appeal to the courts must be made within one month thereafter; otherwise rights to cease.

Second—Term of grant fifteen (15) years, and renewal of twenty (20) years upon revaluation.

Third—Compensation to the City. Such compensation not to be considered a tax.

Fourth—When rights cease, property to become City's.

Fifth—Annual charges to be maintained throughout the term of contract.

Sixth—Rights not to be assigned.

Seventh—Right not exclusive.

Eighth—Motive power.

Ninth—Commencement and completion of construction.

Tenth—Construction and operation to be under the control of the City authorities. Permission to construct to be obtained from administrative officers.

Eleventh—Railway to be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner.

Fifteenth—Fenders and wheel guards to be provided.

Sixteenth—Cars to be heated.

Seventeenth—Streets to be watered.

Eighteenth—Cars to be lighted.

Nineteenth—Snow and ice to be removed.

Twentieth—Company to pave between tracks.

Twenty-first—Company to keep in repair the pavement, and must pave between the tracks and two feet outside.

Twenty-second—Construction and operation not to interfere with any public work.

Twenty-third—Expense of alteration to sewers or drainage system to be borne by Company.

Twenty-fourth—Company to comply with rules to prevent electrolysis.

Twenty-fifth—Company to change railway if grades of streets are changed.

Twenty-sixth—Annual report to the Board.

Twenty-seventh—Company to keep accurate books of account and report to Comptroller.

Twenty-eighth—City may sue for forfeiture.

Twenty-ninth—Fine of \$100 for inefficient public service.

Thirtieth—Company to assume all liability of damages.

Thirty-first—Security deposit, \$3,500.

Thirty-second—Grant subject to right of abutting property owners.

Thirty-third—Definition of the words "notice" and "direction."

Thirty-fourth—If authority of Board or other officer is transferred, then such Board or officer shall act for City.

Sec. 3. Provisions of Railroad Law to be complied with.

Sec. 4. Company agrees to abide by all terms and conditions.

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract made this day of, 190, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track road of the Company in Third avenue at the intersection of said avenue with Pelham avenue, and running thence easterly in, upon and along said Pelham avenue to the Southern Boulevard. The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed railway of the Union Railway Co., in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908."

—and signed by F. W. Whitridge, Receiver, T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, and Edward A. Maher, President, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this right or privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within one month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty (20) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year of this original contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty (20) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate, and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than nine hundred dollars (\$900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the line of the company in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the day on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the said Comptroller on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the matter of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract shall be strictly complied with.

The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the Company, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchises hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the Company, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company, and within three (3) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to The City of New York the sum of twenty thousand three hundred and eighty-five dollars and eight cents (\$20,385.08) and within three (3) months thereafter the further sum of thirty-one thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$31,758.87), said amounts being due under the franchise of the Company granted to it by the Legislature by chapter 349 of the Laws of 1892.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same is renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets, avenues and highways shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of the tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets, avenues or highways, hereinabove described in section 1.

The use of said railway which shall be constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment or any structure in public streets and avenues owned by the Company and used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Company, to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways, hereinabove described in section 1, for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall not exceed the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railway so used. Provided, however, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest of the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to pay for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage of the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if in its opinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Eighth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission of the First District of the State of New York.

Ninth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized, within six months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six months from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall

such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall in writing consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City. Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route, written permits shall be obtained from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which those officials may impose as a condition upon which such permit is granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which those officials have jurisdiction.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon such railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized, during the term of this contract, all members of the Police and Fire Department of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

The rate for the carrying of property over the railway hereby authorized shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Thirteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway; and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars.

Fourteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway hereby authorized proper fenders and wheel guards in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Seventeenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in or upon which the said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three times every twenty-four hours, when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of said streets and avenues shall exceed 60 feet between the curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Eighteenth—All cars operated on said railways shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues and viaducts upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—The Company shall cause to be paved that portion of the street between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, upon and along the streets, avenues and highways of the routes hereby authorized, which are now unpaved. The work of such paving shall be done under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, and such authorities shall designate the character of the pavement to be laid.

Twenty-first—As long as the said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in the streets, avenues or highways, the Company shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue or highway, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public work in the streets, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall at its own expense protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in a manner as directed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Twenty-third—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-fourth—The Company agrees to comply with any and all the rules which may be made by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of preventing the destruction of the pipes or structures in the street by electrolysis, which may be caused by the electric current used by the Company, whether such rules affect the method of the original construction of said railway or any reconstruction, maintenance or repairs upon such railway at any time during the term of this contract.

Twenty-fifth—Should the grades or lines of the streets in which franchises are herein granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the track at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, or at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
 10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
 11. The total amount expended for same.
 12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
 13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
 14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
 15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
 16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
 17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
 18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.
- and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, total miles in operation and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-eighth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railroad constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contracts forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-ninth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Thirtieth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-first—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its president, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-second—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Thirty-third—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-fourth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This contract is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly

authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan moved that the matter be referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

Which motion was adopted.

Bronx Traction Company.

The public hearing on the petition of the Bronx Traction Company for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway as an extension to its existing system from the intersection of Clason's Point road and Westchester avenue, upon and along Clason's Point road to Long Island Sound, Borough of The Bronx, was opened.

The hearing was fixed for this day by resolution duly adopted October 2, 1908.

Affidavits of publication were received from the "New York Tribune," the "New York Sun" and the CITY RECORD.

No one appeared in opposition to the proposed grant.

The following appeared in favor:

Col. Joseph A. Goulden, and Henry A. Robinson, on behalf of F. W. Whitridge, receiver for the Union Railway Company.

No one else desiring to be heard the Chair declared the hearing closed.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
DIVISION OF FRANCHISES, ROOM 801, No. 277 BROADWAY,
October 27, 1908.

Mr. NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer:

SIR—The Bronx Traction Company (hereinafter referred to as the Traction Company), under date of July 28, 1908, has petitioned the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the grant of a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway, to be operated by the overhead system of electricity, as an extension to its existing routes in the Borough of The Bronx, beginning at and connecting with the existing double track railway on Westchester avenue at Clason's Point road, and running thence along and upon said Clason's Point road and the public place at the easterly terminus of said Clason's Point road, to Long Island Sound. The route and connections are shown upon a map and plan accompanying the petition, which map is entitled:

"Map showing proposed railway of the Bronx Traction Co. in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908,"
—signed by Edward A. Maher, President, and T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer.

The approximate length of the route applied for is 12,000 feet or 2.27 miles, equal to about 4.54 miles of single track.

The petition was presented to the Board at the meeting of September 18, 1908, and referred to the Chief Engineer and also to the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

At a meeting of the Board held October 2, 1908, a resolution was adopted fixing October 30, 1908, as the date for the preliminary public hearing, and the Mayor requested to designate two daily newspapers in which the notice of such application and hearing should be published according to law. The "New York Sun" and "New York Tribune" were so designated.

In reply to an inquiry from this Division, the attorney for the receiver of the Company in a communication under date of September 15, 1908, states that the consents of the owners of one-half in value of the abutting property have not yet been obtained, and that no certificate of extension has been filed. But I am advised that this matter will be attended to as soon as a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Company can be held. Such certificate should be filed prior to the time when the grant is made by the Board.

The construction of the proposed extension will enable the petitioner in connection with the Union Railway Company, hereinafter referred to as the "Union Company," which operates the lines of the Traction Company, to operate a continuous line of railway, by way of Third and Westchester avenues, from the Harlem River to Clason's Point, as well as connecting said point with the northerly portions of the Borough and the adjacent territory outside of the City limits.

Proceedings for opening Clasons Point road, from Westchester avenue to the East River, were initiated by the Board on April 14, 1905, and title vested August 1, 1906. The regulating and grading of the street was authorized June 15, 1906. The street has been graded for its entire width, and sidewalks laid and curbs set between the above named limits. It is at present an unpaved street.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx in a communication under date of September 26, 1908, states that the proposed extension will not interfere with any contemplated improvements and that property owners and citizens desire the immediate construction of this road.

HISTORY OF THE COMPANY.

The Bronx Traction Company was formed on May 12, 1904, by a consolidation agreement entered into between the directors of the Suburban Traction Company, the Van Nest, West Farms and Westchester Traction Company, the Wakefield and Westchester Traction Company, the West Farms and Westchester Traction Company and the Williamsbridge and Westchester Traction Company. This agreement was filed in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on May 16, 1904, and in the office of the Secretary of State on May 20, 1904. Each of the above named companies was a street surface railway corporation organized under the Railroad Law, and pursuant thereto each filed a certificate of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State on April 28, 1892, for the purpose of constructing and operating a street surface railway in what was then Westchester County, but is now embraced within the limits of the Borough of The Bronx.

The consolidation agreement recites that each of the said five corporations is the owner of one or more municipal consents and franchise rights to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway in and upon various streets; that the railways of two or more of said corporations have been actually constructed and are in operation on part of the streets named in the franchises owned by them, and that when railways shall have been constructed on all of the streets designated in said franchises, they will form a continuous or connected line. This agreement provided that the Traction Company was to accept and receive the property of the other corporations, subject to all the charges thereon, and the debts and liabilities incurred by each of said corporations, and that the Traction Company should have a capital stock of \$585,000, equivalent to the total capital stock of the five companies forming it. Of this amount \$58,100 has been paid in and is owned by the Union Company, whose stock is held by the Third Avenue Railway Company. The Traction Company claims to have constructed and leased to the Union Company over 14 miles of single track road. The presumption is, therefore, that the money for the construction of this road was furnished by the Union Company.

On June 7, 1892, the Town Board of the Town of Westchester granted permission to the several above named companies to construct and operate street surface railways over the following routes:

1. To the Suburban Traction Company on the Southern turnpike (now Westchester avenue) and Main street, in the Village of Westchester, from the Bronx River to Westchester Creek, with a branch on Clasons Point road, as then laid out, from the said Southern turnpike to the East River. The total length of this grant was about 4.75 miles of street. The only portion of this route on which a street surface railway has been constructed is along Westchester avenue, from West Farms to Westchester Village, a distance of about 2.5 miles.

Under date of June 16, 1896, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards issued a departmental permit to this company to open the Southern turnpike from the Bronx River to Main street, in Westchester Village, for the purpose of constructing a single track railway as an extension or branch of its existing railway, authorized as above, and to erect the necessary poles, wires and overhead construction for the proper operation of electric street surface cars on the said Southern turnpike.

2. To the Van Nest, West Farms and Westchester Traction Company, on West Farms road, Silver lane and Main street, from the Bronx River at West Farms to Westchester Creek, with a branch northerly along Bear Swamp road to what is now Morris Park avenue, and a second branch from said Morris Park avenue, along Unionport road, the Southern turnpike road and Avenue C to Second street, Unionport, approximately 4.2 miles of street in length. A street surface railway has been constructed on about two miles of this route.

3. To the Wakefield and Westchester Traction Company:
"Beginning at Fifteenth avenue and Third street, in the Village of Williamsbridge, thence along said Third street to White Plains road, thence along said White Plains road to Briggs avenue, thence along said Briggs avenue to the old Boston road, thence along said Boston road to the road leading from Williamsbridge to Westchester Village, thence along said road to Main street, in Westchester Village; thence along said Main street to the road to Fort Schuyler, thence along said road to the Eastern boulevard, thence along said boulevard to the new road on Long Island Sound, and thence along said new road to Long Island Sound."

This grant covered about six miles of street, and a street surface railway has been constructed on approximately two miles of the above described route.

4. To the West Farms and Westchester Traction Company, on West Farms road, from the Bronx River to Watsons lane (now Morris Park avenue), and thence along said last named street to Bear Swamp road, and thence along Bear Swamp road, West Farms road, Silver lane and Main street to Westchester Creek. Said grant covered about 2.5 miles of street, on approximately two miles of which a railway has been constructed.

5. To the Williamsbridge and Westchester Traction Company, from the Bronx River, in the Village of Williamsbridge, along Olin avenue, White Plains road, Bear Swamp road, West Farms road, Silver lane and Main street, to Westchester Creek, in the Village of Westchester, embracing approximately 3.75 miles of street. A street surface railway has been constructed on all of this route except the portion on Bear Swamp road, between Morris Park avenue and West Farms road. The constructed portion is about 3.3 miles in length.

Inasmuch as the companies forming the Traction company never made reports to the State Board of Railroad Commissioners and as all construction was apparently done prior to the formation of the Traction company in 1904, it was impossible to determine under the charter of which company the various portions as now in operation had been built. A request was, therefore, made of the attorney for the company for the desired information, who, in a reply thereto, states he finds it impossible to furnish the data, and that the permits under which the construction was done cannot be found, nor can it be ascertained to whom such permits were issued, but that the assumption is that they were issued in the name of the Union Company, and that such company did the work. Upon receipt of this information I requested the President of the Borough of The Bronx to cause a search to be made of the records of his office, and to furnish me with copies of any permits issued for the construction of the several routes.

Upon examination of the permits found as the result of such search, it appears that with the exception of the one to the Suburban Traction Company in 1896, said permits were all issued in the name of the Union Railway Company, and only covered a comparatively small portion of the routes of the Traction company. This would seem to bear out the statement made above, that the Union Company constructed the existing lines of the Traction company.

The search made in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx shows that the following permits were issued:

By the Commissioner of Highways, under dates of December 28, 1898, and May 10, 1899. The first of these was for the purpose of constructing a second track parallel to the existing single track on West Farms road from a point about two hundred and fifty feet west of Bronx Park avenue to a point about one hundred and fifty feet east of Morris Park avenue, and upon Morris Park avenue, from West Farms road to Bear Swamp road and Morris Park Racetrack, and upon Bear Swamp road for a distance of about two hundred feet northerly from Morris Park avenue. The second included Olin avenue, from Webster avenue to White Plains road.

Sectional permits Nos. 2549, 2576 and 3748 were issued on December 5, 1899, December 16, 1899, and December 11, 1901, under the provisions of a general permit issued by the Commissioner of Highways on December 1, 1899. The permit of December 5, 1899, allowed the company to open Westchester avenue, between the Unionport road and Clasons Point road, and that of December 16, 1899, was for the purpose of opening said Westchester avenue, from Clasons Point road to the easterly end of the approach to the bridge over the Bronx River.

The permit of December 11, 1901, authorized the company to open the streets for the purpose of laying tracks from the terminus of existing tracks at Main street and Westchester avenue to and along the Fort Schuyler road to the Eastern boulevard, and specifically stated that no permission was given to lay tracks across the three bridges crossing Westchester Creek.

On November 2, 1904, the Bronx Traction Company entered into an agreement with the Union Company by which the last named company was granted the right to use for the operation of its cars the tracks, structures and appliances of the Traction company, then constructed or to be constructed, and to receive for its own use all compensation for carrying passengers, freight or mail over said tracks, and was given permission to generally extend and transact its business as a common carrier over such tracks and with the appliances of the Traction company at all times and for all purposes, provided that in the joint use of the tracks, etc., the cars of the Traction company should at all times have right of way over those of the Union Company.

The consideration of the contract was fixed at six thousand dollars per annum, and the Union Company agreed to keep the tracks, etc., in repair, and to remove snow and ice therefrom, and to fulfill all statutory requirements as to the repair of the streets lying between and two feet outside of such of the tracks of the Traction Company, as should be used. This agreement was by its terms retroactive in force and effect, so as to govern the relations of the parties thereto, from the date of the formation of the Traction Company on May 12, 1904, and may be terminated on thirty days' notice by either party. Under this agreement, the Union Company has since the above named date operated the constructed lines acquired by the Traction Com-

pany from the several companies consolidated to form it. The lines thus operated are as follows:

On West Farms road, from the Bronx River to Westchester Creek; on Westchester avenue, from the Bronx River to Westchester Village; on Fort Schuyler road, from Main street to the Eastern boulevard, and on Bear Swamp road, Morris Park avenue and White Plains road, from West Farms to Williamsbridge.

Under date of February 24, 1908, a petition was presented to the Public Service Commission for the First District, requesting an increase of service by the Union Company on Fort Schuyler road, and that the Commission order said company to extend its tracks on the Eastern boulevard, from Fort Schuyler road to Pelham Park. The Commission held a number of hearings on the petition and as a result thereof on May 8, 1908, issued an order directing the Union Company to construct this extension and the matter was thus brought to my attention.

In a report to the Chief Engineer of the Board under date of June 8, 1908, this Division discussed the above orders of the Commission and pointed out that although the Traction Company might claim an old franchise on the route in question under the grant to the Wakefield and Westchester Traction Company in 1892, it would appear that such rights had been forfeited by reason of the failure to construct the road within the time specified in the Railroad Law. This report also called attention to the doubt existing as to the location of the "new road on Long Island Sound," and that while the order of the Commission was given to the Union Company there seemed to be a question as to whether or not such order should not have been made to the Traction Company.

The matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to the points outlined above, and in an opinion dated July 21, 1908, and addressed to the Board, it was held that all rights to the route in question had been lost by the failure of the company to construct its road and expend thereon 10 per cent. of its capital within five years from the date of filing its certificate of incorporation. In relation to the location of the route the opinion held that the road known as Town Dock road was the one intended to be described in the original grant to the company.

The Public Service Commission was furnished with a copy of the Corporation Counsel's opinion and the matter is now held in abeyance.

CONDITIONS FOR THE PROPOSED FRANCHISE.

Underground System—The company states in its petition that it proposes to operate the extension by the overhead system of electricity similar in all respects to that now in use on the other lines of its roads.

There appears to be no necessity at the present time for the operation of this road by the underground system, such construction in the section through which the road is to run would be uncalled for, and involve an unnecessary expense. I believe, however, that the Board may properly reserve the right to cause the removal of all wires from above the surface of the streets, thus compelling the adoption of the underground system at any time upon six months' notice, during the term of the contract, when such construction seems advisable and necessary. I, therefore, would recommend that a clause similar to that which was inserted in the grant to the New York City Interborough Railway Company be inserted in the contract, to wit, that upon one year's notice the company shall remove all overhead wires and operate by the underground system.

Paving of Streets—Clason's Point road is at present an unpaved street. Before a street surface railway operates thereon, there should be some form of pavement laid between the tracks and outside thereof. I would, therefore, suggest that the street be paved by the railway company, between its tracks and two feet on each side of the same, under the supervision of the Borough President, and that the character of the pavement be designated by him. Such a clause has been inserted in the proposed form of contract. A condition should also be made to require the company to bear its share of the cost of pavement when new pavement is laid on any portion of the route.

Wires and Conduits—Inasmuch as practically all of the abutting property on Clason's Point road is undeveloped, it does not seem necessary to require the company to place feed wires in conduits at present. It is recommended, however, that a clause be inserted in the contract reserving to the Board the authority to require the company upon six months' notice to remove any or all of its feed or other wires used in the operation of the railway, with the exception of the overhead trolley wires, and place the same in conduits underneath or alongside the railway tracks.

Tracks in Public Place—The easterly end of Clason's Point road terminates in a public place extending from where said road will be intersected by Bronx River avenue and Betts avenue, when such streets are opened, to the bulkhead line. The proposed extension has its easterly terminus within the lines of this public place, where it is proposed to construct a single track loop having at its easterly end a short piece of second track to be used as a car stand. A bulkhead has been constructed around the public place, but on both sides of such public place where streets have been laid out on the city maps, but which have not been opened, there is at present open water. While the proposed loop must, under the existing conditions, be located in the public place, it may be that, with the future development of the adjacent land, the presence of the tracks therein may become objectionable. I would, therefore, suggest that a clause be inserted in the form of contract reserving to the Board the right, upon one year's notice to the company, to cause the removal of the tracks from within the lines of the public place, and the company to apply for a franchise over some of the adjacent streets.

Loop Not to be Used for the Storage of Cars—The property in the neighborhood of the above mentioned public place is at the present time but little built up. It is impossible, however, at this writing, to say what this property will eventually become. It would seem advisable, therefore, to provide that the tracks within the public place shall not be used for the storage of cars, and a clause to this effect has been inserted in the form of contract herewith submitted.

Term of Grant—For the reasons adduced in the report on the applications of the Union Railway Company this day presented to the Board, I do not believe that at the present time any long term grants should be made to companies involved in the existing traction difficulties. It will probably be several years before the Clasons Point road extension becomes a profitable one to the company, both by reason of the undeveloped territory through which it will run, and that the bulk of its business during the early years of its operation will be derived from the patrons of the hotels and bathing pavilions, etc., at its easterly terminus.

It would therefore appear that the grant to this company should be for a longer term than that recommended for the Union Railway Company in the report presented this day upon the applications of said last named company.

In view of the above, I would recommend that this grant be made for a term of fifteen years, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of twenty years upon a revaluation.

COMPENSATION.

The several consents of the Town Board of Westchester to the companies consolidated to form the Traction Company, each contain the following provision: That the consent of the Board is given upon the express condition that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law pertinent thereto, shall be complied with.

As has already been stated, these franchises have all been acquired by the Bronx Traction Company, which is leased to and operated by the Union Company.

I am informed at the office of the Collector of City Revenue that the statements of gross receipts made by the Union Company include the receipts from the lines of the Traction Company, and that payment is made thereon as provided in the special charter of the Union Company, to wit: chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

It would seem, therefore, that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law were not being complied with in this particular, and that the percentage of gross receipts paid on the lines of the Traction Company should be 3 per cent. during the first five years and 5 per cent. thereafter, instead of the percentages named in the charter of the Union Company.

A franchise to an existing company, in order to comply with the Railroad Law, requires the payment to the City of 3 per cent. of the gross receipts during the first five years, and 5 per cent. thereafter, calculated upon the proportion of the total receipts of the company as the length of the extension bears to the total length of line of the company.

As has been previously shown, the lines of the Traction Company have been operated by the Union Company since the formation of the first named, and by the

terms of the operating agreement, the Union Company has received for its own use all compensation for carrying passengers, freight or mail over such tracks. Inasmuch as the reports of the Union Company to the State Board of Railroad Commissioners and to the Public Service Commission do not show the gross earnings of individual lines, it has been necessary in determining the minimum annual sums to be paid for this extension, to assume that the earnings of that company are proportional for all parts of the system, and also to assume that the earnings on the lines of the Traction Company are the same proportion of the total gross earnings of the Union Company as the length of line in operation belonging to the Traction Company is to the total length of line operated by the Union Company.

Upon the basis of a thirty-five year grant, I would suggest that the compensation be fixed at the following:

Initial payment \$5,000 00

Annual payments of 3 per cent. of the gross receipts for the first five years, and 5 per cent. thereafter, with minimum amounts to be paid each year based upon the present earnings of the Union Company, unless the Traction Company shall keep separate accounts and make separate reports, which has not heretofore been done.

Security deposit \$10,000 00

Other Conditions—The other conditions which have been incorporated in the form of contract hereto appended, including those for the maintenance of street pavement, the protection of structures in the street, and the prevention of electrolysis are in the form used in former grants to street surface railway companies, and approved by the Corporation Counsel, and need, therefore, no discussion.

As has been shown, the applicant company is controlled by the same interests as the Union Company. This last named company is in arrears to the City for payments upon the percentages of gross receipts provided for in its charter amounting to over \$50,000. As the Union Company is the sponsor for the Traction Company, I do not believe any grant should be made by the Board to the latter until such time as the former shall have met and discharged all of its obligations. The only income of the Traction Company is the \$6,000 a year received from the Union under the before mentioned operating agreement. It would seem questionable, therefore, as to whether the Traction Company is in a satisfactory financial position to assume a grant of this nature.

When a proposed form of contract had been prepared in the form outlined above, the counsel for the company was advised of this fact, and as a result, conferences were had between Mr. F. W. Whitridge, Receiver of the Union Railway Company; Mr. Edward A. Maher, President of the company, and representatives of this division, when the proposed terms and conditions were discussed, clause by clause.

Mr. Whitridge, speaking generally, stated that on account of the demands of the public for this extension, the company was anxious to construct the same, but did not consider that it would be a paying proposition for several years, with possibly the exception of the summer months, when the travel to the amusement places at Clasons Point would be greatest. He further stated that the company at the present time is not in a position to expend any large sums of money other than those used for construction and improvements, and on this account objected strongly to any security deposit being made, and also to the initial payment and compensation, as proposed, but finally stated in relation to the security deposit that he would be willing to make one, if the amount was reduced.

Mr. Whitridge also stated that on account of the present attitude of the public in regard to street railway investments, that it is particularly hard to finance railway projects at this time, and that any franchise to be accepted by the company would on that account have to be particularly attractive in form.

I thereupon asked the representatives of the company what they would be willing to pay for the grant, and after negotiations, Mr. Maher tentatively agreed to the following terms, subject to the approval of the Receiver.

That the initial payment be fixed at thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500); the annual compensation at three hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$375), six hundred and eighty-seven dollars (\$687) and seven hundred and fifty-six dollars (\$756) for the first, second and third terms of five years, respectively, and that the security deposit be reduced to six thousand dollars (\$6,000). The original minimum annual amounts to be paid as compensation by the company were calculated on a basis of the reports made by the Union Company, which includes the receipts from the operation of the Traction Company. Mr. Maher, however, stated that in the future the Traction Company would keep separate books of account, and make separate returns, in order that the percentages required by the Railroad Law may be paid on the gross receipts which will accrue from this extension. In consideration of this, I agreed to recommend these payments. Mr. Maher further objected to the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as liquidated damages for failure to give efficient public service on the ground that such sum was out of proportion to the other conditions of the contract, and in order that an agreement might be reached, I consented to recommend one hundred dollars (\$100).

Mr. Maher stated if the clauses reserving to the Board the right to require the company to operate by the underground system, and to place its feed wires in conduits were retained, he would recommend that the Receiver refuse to accept the grant. I thereupon offered as a substitute for the clause requiring underground construction, a provision that such construction should not be required until one of the other lines of the company, which connected with this proposed extension, should be so equipped. In reply to this, Mr. Maher stated that if these conditions were retained, it would be practically impossible for the company to finance the undertaking. In consequence of the objection, these clauses have been omitted.

While I am still of the opinion that this franchise is worth the sums originally proposed, and which I consider moderate, still, in view of the attitude of the company and their expressed determination not to construct this extension if such conditions were retained on account of the difficulty in financing the proposition, and in view of the urgent need of transit facilities in the territory to be served, I believe that the terms and conditions as now proposed may properly be approved by the Board.

After the form of contract had been amended to agree with the changes made as a result of the conferences, it was sent to Mr. Maher, in order that he might submit it to Mr. Whitridge for his approval. In a communication under date of October 26, 1908, returning the contract as amended, Mr. Whitridge says that it is acceptable to him, and will be executed in the present form, if passed by the Board.

The proposed form of contract should be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for approval as to form, and to advise the Board as to the question raised in the report as to granting a franchise to the Bronx Traction Company.

Synopsis of Provisions of Contract.

Section 1. Grant.

Sec. 2. Conditions of grant:

First—Property owners' consents to be obtained within six months or application must be made to the Court within one month thereafter; otherwise rights to cease and determine.

Second—Term of grant fifteen (15) years; with privilege of renewal for twenty (20) years upon revaluation.

Third—Compensation to the City, such compensation not to be considered a tax.

Fourth—When rights cease, property to become City's.

Fifth—Annual charges to be maintained throughout the term of contract.

Sixth—Rights not to be assigned.

Seventh—Right not exclusive.

Eighth—Motive power.

Ninth—Commencement and completion of construction.

Tenth—Construction and operation to be under the control of City authorities.

Eleventh—Railway to be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner.

Twelfth—Rate of fare not to exceed five cents on railway or any line or branch operated in connection therewith within the City.

Thirteenth—No freight cars to be operated. Tracks not to be used for storage of cars.

Fourteenth—Headway of cars.

Fifteenth—Fenders and wheel guards to be provided.

Sixteenth—Cars to be heated.

Seventeenth—Streets to be watered.

Eighteenth—Cars to be lighted.

Nineteenth—Snow and ice to be removed.

Twentieth—Company to keep in repair the pavement and must pave between tracks and two feet outside.

Twenty-first—Expense of alteration to sewerage or drainage system to be borne by Company.

Twenty-second—Permission to construct to be obtained from administrative officers.

Twenty-third—Company to comply with rules to prevent electrolysis.

Twenty-fourth—Construction or operation not to interfere with any public work.

Twenty-fifth—Company to change railway if grades of streets are changed.

Twenty-sixth—Tracks to be removed from public place.

Twenty-seventh—Annual reports to the Board.

Twenty-eighth—Company to keep accurate books of account. Reports to Comptroller.

Twenty-ninth—City may sue for forfeiture.

Thirtieth—Fine of \$100 for inefficient public service.

Thirty-first—Company to assume all liability of damages.

Thirty-second—Security deposit, \$6,000.

Thirty-third—Grant subject to rights of abutting property owners.

Thirty-fourth—Definition of words "Notice" and "Direction."

Thirty-fifth—If authority of Board or other officer is transferred, then such other Board or officer shall act for City.

Sec. 3. Provisions of Railroad Law to be complied with.

Sec. 4. Company agrees to abide by all terms and conditions.

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this _____ day of _____, 190____, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Bronx Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment for the purpose of conveying passengers in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, upon the following route:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track street surface railway on Westchester avenue at the intersection of said avenue with Clasons Point road, and running thence easterly in, upon and along said Clasons Point road to the public place at the easterly terminus thereof, and running thence with a loop in, upon and along said public place. The said route with turnouts, switches and cross-overs hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed railway of Bronx Traction Co. in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908."

—and signed by Edward A. Maher, President, and T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed; provided, that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within one month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty (20) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty (20) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

The sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), in cash, within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

During the first term of five years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than three hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$375), and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$375).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than six hundred and eighty-seven dollars (\$687), and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of six hundred and eighty-seven dollars (\$687).

During the third term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven hundred and fifty-six dollars (\$756), and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven hundred and fifty-six dollars (\$756).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the line in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the said Comptroller on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the matter of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract, shall be strictly complied with.

The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the Company, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchises hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the Company, its successors or assigns of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then, at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets, avenues and highways shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets, avenues or highways herein above described in section 1.

The use of said railway which shall be constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures in public streets and avenues owned by the Company and used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways herein above described in section 1, for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall be equal to the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railway and structures and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railway so used. Provided, however, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest of the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to pay for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage of the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if in its opinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Eighth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission of the First District of the State of New York.

Ninth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within six months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within one year from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing,

consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon such railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

The rate for the carrying of property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Thirteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway; and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars.

Fourteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the terms of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Seventeenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three times every twenty-four hours when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Eighteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues or highways upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of 2 feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—The Company shall cause to be paved that portion of the street between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks upon and along the streets, avenues and highways of the routes hereby authorized, which are now either unpaved or paved with macadam. The work of such paving shall be done under the supervision of the Municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters. Such authorities shall designate the character of the pavement to be laid.

As long as the said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in the street, avenue or highway, the Company shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue or highway, and in that event the Company, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewal or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route, written permits shall be obtained from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which those officials may impose, as a condition upon which such permit is granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which those officials have jurisdiction.

Twenty-third—The Company agrees to comply with any and all the rules which may be made by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of preventing the destruction of the pipes or structures in the street by electrolysis, which may be caused by the electric current used by the Company, whether such rules affect the method of the original construction of said railway or any reconstruction, maintenance or repairs upon such railway at any time during the term of this contract.

Twenty-fourth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in a manner as directed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Twenty-fifth—Should the grades or lines of the streets in which franchises are herein granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the track at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Twenty-sixth—Upon one year's notice from the Board, the Company shall make application to said Board for the right or privilege to lay its tracks upon other streets hereafter to be opened, adjacent to the Public Place at the easterly terminus of Clason's Point road, the same to be in substitution for the loop terminal hereby authorized in the Public Place, and within six months after such right or privilege is obtained, shall, at its own expense, remove all of its tracks and appurtenances from said Public Place.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, or at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.

6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross earnings from all railway lines owned or operated by the Company, the total miles owned by the Company and in operation and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-ninth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirtieth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

Thirty-first—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-second—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its President, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of six thousand dollars (\$6,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-third—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Thirty-fourth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-fifth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This contract is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith statement in detail showing the amounts necessary to be included in the Budget for 1909 for the payment of the principal of and interest on the City Debt, which, compared with the appropriations for the same purposes for the year 1908, are as follows:

Accompanying the same is a statement showing all bonds maturing during the year 1909, payable from the Sinking Fund or from Assessments, and also, item for item, the detail in which the Sinking Fund instalments have been calculated.

A statement is also herewith submitted showing the condition of the Fund for Street and Park Openings on September 30, 1908. The excess of the liability over the cash balance was three million six hundred and nine thousand two hundred and forty-four dollars and nine cents (\$3,609,244.09), and the amount of Corporate Stock authorized to be issued to reimburse the fund and remaining unissued, is two million six hundred and eighty-nine thousand and seventy-four dollars and fifty-five cents (\$2,689,074.55).

Section 174 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 70 of the Laws of 1905, as amended, authorizes the Comptroller to issue Street and Park Opening Assessment Bonds to replenish the Fund for Street and Park Openings to the extent of the uncollected assessments, which are liens on property benefited, and the assessments to be imposed in proceedings in which the awards only have been confirmed.

The Secretary presented the departmental estimates for the year 1909, also printed copies thereof bound and indexed, which were ordered printed in separate volumes of the minutes.

The Chair submitted a communication from the International Children's School Farm League in reference to the Budget, which was ordered on file.

The Chair announced that on page 87 of the Budget, Supreme Court, First Department, the salaries of Justices' Clerks had been figured at \$3,500, instead of \$2,500, and that the total of the appropriation for said Court should be less by \$34,000, and that, without objection, the change would be made.

There being no objection, the change was made.

The following resolution and Budget was submitted by the Comptroller:

BUDGET FOR 1909.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz.: One hundred and forty-eight million four hundred and forty-six thousand nine hundred and four dollars and eighty-three cents (\$148,446,904.83); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz.: Five million one hundred and seventy-five thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$5,175,796.23), and, third, the amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1908, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz.: Two million nine hundred and twenty-two thousand four hundred and forty-seven dollars and eight cents (\$2,922,447.08).

Be it further Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles "Salaries" or "Salaries and Wages," in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County governments in the schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages" for monthly payrolls in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County governments.

Second—(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages," and (b) set forth on said payrolls the monthly, weekly or daily pro rata expenditures of said appropriations and the total amounts expended up to the time of and including said monthly and weekly payrolls, and (c) the unexpended balance of each appropriation against which said payrolls are chargeable.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payments for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amounts so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child of four years of age and over receiving such instruction during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no-proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioners of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.

10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the

hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randalls Island.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

The appropriations in this Budget are made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts and records of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show all receipts, disbursements and population in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller. Records must show the addresses of parents, guardians or nearest relatives of inmates and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to make provision for dependents in the institutions.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys and all their books of record and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to the visitation, inspection and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Finance and at all proper times the Department of Public Charities shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall in his discretion suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon the per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges upon the City. Except in emergency cases in hospitals, the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals. *The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.*

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

9. Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a court commitment.

10. The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

11. In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges (see Rule 5) the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the service actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the

treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections.

12. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City Institution at Randall's Island.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

SIR—There was transmitted by the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Comptroller for consideration and report, a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated August 25, 1908, requesting the transfer of certain sums from various accounts under the jurisdiction of the Borough President, among which were the following:

These matters were referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, and as a result of the examination therein made, I beg to report as follows:

In an interview with your Examiner, Mr. L. L. Tribus, Commissioner of Public Works, stated the reason for a balance in the salary account for the Bureau of Highways is the vacancy in the position of Assistant Superintendent, the money for which was granted in the Budget for 1908.

In regard to the account Bureau of Highways, Incidentals, a surplus is shown for the reason that the Department claims it could not estimate the necessary expenditures for such purposes four months before the beginning of a year as well as it can within four months from its close. A surplus in the account Bureau of Sewers, Hired Teams, is accounted for by the fact that an extensive addition to the Borough sewer systems, which were to be finished early in the year, have remained in the care of the contractors.

I would respectfully suggest that the Comptroller recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the approval of the requests of the President of the Borough of Richmond for the transfer of funds herein previously referred to.

DEAR SIR—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at its meeting held on April 29, decided to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the transfer of \$9,000 from the appropriation for Salaries and Wages, Fordham Hospital, to the appropriation for Supplies. Of this amount, \$3,000 is to be used for Mechanical Buildings and Grounds, and \$6,000 for Stables and Ambulances, in both of which accounts there is at present a deficit. As we require new ambulances, and numerous repairs are necessary to the old ambulances, and as there are many purchases chargeable against Mechanical Buildings and Grounds, we trust that your Board may authorize this transfer at an early date. We have been enabled to effect a considerable saving in the Salaries and Wages account of Fordham Hospital by the employment of Nurses seeking a post graduate course, while in both of the other accounts we have found it necessary to exceed the amount appropriated.

The owner now offers this property to The City of New York for the sum of \$18,500, which price is considered a fair and reasonable one, and has been approved by the Corporation Counsel, and also by this office. Transfer from the appropriation of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices known as Maintenance of Buildings and Offices, Repairs, 1908, \$20,000, and from the appropriation of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices known as Maintenance of Buildings and Offices, Equipment and Renewal Supplies, \$5,000, to the appropriation known as Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Maintenance of Buildings—Salaries and Wages.

No. 2. From the appropriation known as Bureau of Sewers, Cleaning Large Brick and Concrete Sewers, Hired Teams, Horses and Carts, 1908, \$16,000, to the appropriation known as Bureau of Sewers, Repairing and Cleaning Sewers, Salaries and Wages, 1908.

No. 3. From the appropriation known as Bureau of Sewers, Twenty-sixth Ward Disposal Works, Equipments, Repairs, Renewals and Supplies, \$3,950, to the appropriation known as Bureau of Sewers, Thirty-first Ward, Sewerage Districts Nos. 1 and 3, Salaries and Wages.

No. 4. From the appropriation known as Bureau of Sewers, Repairing and Cleaning Sewers, Contracts at Public Letting, \$11,650, of which to be transferred to the Bureau of Sewers, Thirty-first Ward, Sewerage Districts Nos. 1 and 3, Equipment, Repairs, Renewals and Supplies, \$2,650 of which to be transferred to the Bureau of Sewers, Twenty-sixth Ward Disposal Works, Salaries and Wages, \$5,000 of which to be transferred to the Bureau of Sewers, Repairing and Cleaning Sewers, Equipment, Repairs, Renewals and Supplies.

I forward to you herewith forms of resolution for adoption in connection therewith.

The Comptroller's report submitted to the Board at the meeting on Friday, October 16, states that the failure of the Board to make the requested transfers may result in rendering public buildings unsafe or unclean to such an extent as to subject the City to criticism. This is true, and it is likewise true that it may result in the unjust dismissal from employment of more than five hundred men and women whose services are needed at this time to prevent the public buildings from becoming unclean or unsafe. The objection of the Comptroller to the transfer is based generally upon a criticism of transfers of appropriations made in the annual Budget from one account to another, and specifically upon objection to such a transfer in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, because of the lack of what he calls "administrative justification therefor."

I endeavored in the communication on this subject sent to the Board on October 10 to show that there was administrative justification for these transfers, and the Comptroller has not yet presented to the Board any specific criticism of the administration of the Bureau to sustain his contention upon this point. It is too well known to every member of this Board to admit of question that there was not in the cases of the Borough Presidents a scientific preparation of the Budget for 1908. It is a

fact that the report of the Comptroller's Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics was not even submitted to the members of this Board before they voted upon the appropriation for 1908. There were analyses of the departmental estimates of the other City departments, and after the demands of these departments had been satisfied a certain sum was set aside for division among the five Borough Presidents who were members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, and who were supposed to look after their own interests because of their membership in both such Boards. This office had attempted to have the amounts allowed to the Borough Presidents scientifically apportioned, but those efforts resulted in failure. As to the Borough Presidents, there was an open understanding discussed among the members of the Board that their membership in the two financial Boards of the City gave them an opportunity to seek relief from the conditions imposed by a shortage in their various appropriations.

This office acted in accordance with that understanding and with the administrative practice of all the departments of The City of New York. At the outset it stated plainly, in a communication to the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, the situation with regard particularly to the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices and the Bureau of Sewers, and in this letter, dated in November of 1907, the statement was plainly made in so many words that a failure to piece out the appropriations would necessarily result in the closing before the year ended of some of the public buildings.

On May 23 I wrote to the Board of Aldermen requesting the authorization of a Special Revenue Bond issue of \$40,000, the proceeds to be used in the maintenance and care of the public buildings of this Borough. The failure of the resolution of authorization to pass the Board of Aldermen for four months was due to the refusal of the members of the Board politically allied with the Comptroller to vote for that resolution. It was not until matters had reached a crisis that I was able to get the resolution through the Board of Aldermen at the meeting held on Tuesday, October 13. Meanwhile, in order to meet the deficit which was inevitable in the account for the Maintenance of Buildings and Offices, Salaries and Wages, I limited the expenditure chargeable against the appropriations for the Maintenance of Buildings and Offices, Repairs, and the Maintenance of Buildings and Offices, Equipment and Renewal Supplies, in order to save a sufficient amount out of that account to enable me, by the system of transfers so long the established practice of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to carry on the operation of the public buildings affected. This was justifiable, as I pointed out in my last letter, because the employment of plasterers, plumbers and other tradesmen to do work previously given out by contract and chargeable against the two accounts I have mentioned, became necessarily a payroll charge against the Salaries and Wages account. This meant a saving to the City, but it meant the loading of the Salaries and Wages account with nearly \$20,000 worth of work which, had it been given out under contract, would have been a charge against the Repairs and Equipment, Renewal and Supplies accounts.

The delay in the adoption of the Revenue Bond resolution by the Board of Aldermen caused me to request on September 30 the transfer of \$25,000 referred to in the foregoing part of this communication, as on September 15 I had requested from the Board transfers in the Sewer Bureau items, the reasons for which were fully and clearly set forth in a report of the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Sewers, which has been transmitted to your Board, and the wisdom of which is shown in the communication addressed to me by the Superintendent of Sewers, a copy of which I forward to you herewith, this last communication showing that if the transfers in the Sewer Bureau are not made damage suits involving an amount far in excess of the sum of money involved in the present controversy will be instituted against the City.

The Comptroller has had three weeks in which to investigate the conditions out of which the transfers requested grew. He has had three weeks for the examination of the payrolls of this Department and for the preparation and statement to this Board of any criticism, ground for which he may be able to find. He has not yet shown to the Board a single instance of maladministration. He has not shown a single instance of payment for work not honestly performed. He has simply said to the Board that transfers are bad in principle and that the reform of a practice of which he disapproves should begin with the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

It is quite evident that the purpose of the Comptroller is not to serve the City's interest, but to cause public dissatisfaction which might result in political injury to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and which might be of assistance to the Commissioners of Accounts in their effort to discredit my administration. That Board's principal allies in this Borough with whom the Comptroller thus associates himself are Michael O'Sullivan, a contractor who is probably known to every member of this Board; William Cox, a former Corporation Inspector who was dismissed by this office; and Mrs. Anne O'Neill, who formerly used as a private workshop one of the rooms in the Municipal Building and resents her eviction therefrom by the present Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices.

As I said at the last meeting of the Board, I am perfectly willing to meet in the proper place any charge of maladministration that the Comptroller or the Commissioners of Accounts may prefer against me, but I am unwilling that their disposition toward me personally should interfere with the transaction of public business to such an extent as to close public buildings or render them, in the words of the Comptroller, "unsafe for the use of the public or unclean to such an extent as to subject the City to criticism." I therefore again request of the Board immediate action upon the transfers so badly needed in the Borough of Brooklyn.

DEAR MR. COLER—It is imperative that all the men employed in this Bureau be kept on full time, otherwise we will not be able to attend to the imperative wants of the people of the Borough. We have several jobs now awaiting relief, which, if not attended to immediately, will cost the City large sums of money in damage suits. Will you please notify his Honor the Mayor, who might send some representative to whom we can show the need of keeping our full force of men at work?

We have, in other accounts of this Bureau, money which we will not use, and which might be transferred to the Salary Account in this emergency and which would help us until the first of the year. I attach a report of J. E. Klinge, Foreman of Repairs of this Bureau, for your earliest consideration.

SIR—In the matter of the request of the Borough President of Brooklyn for a transfer from the appropriation of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, known as Maintenance of Buildings and Offices, Repairs, \$20,000, and from the appropriation of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, known as Maintenance of Buildings and Offices, Equipment and Renewal Supplies, \$5,000, to the appropriation known as the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Maintenance of Buildings, Salaries and Wages, I beg to report as follows:

An analysis of payrolls of the Borough President of Brooklyn, chargeable to appropriation Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Maintenance of Buildings and Offices, for the year 1908, shows that although the Budget allowance of this account in the Budget for the present year was \$260,021.75, the Borough President continued a force of employees during the month of January which represented an increased annual rate above the Budget of \$28,190.41. He continued to increase the payroll cost of this division of his work during the year until on September 30 his annual rate cost was on a basis of \$327,009.66, as against the Budget allowance previously referred to of \$260,021.75—approximately an annual rate cost in excess of the Budget of \$67,000.

The actual cash disbursed out of the fund in the interval to the employees, added to the force, or those to whom wage increases were granted subsequent to January 1, was approximately \$28,000.

The unexpended balance in this account, as shown by the books of the Finance Department on September 24, 1908, was \$25,766.82. On a basis of the September payroll cost the appropriation required for October, November and December for this

account would be \$81,908.49, as against an unexpended balance of \$25,766.82, or a deficiency of \$56,141.67.

In view of the fact that the cost of operation of this Department for the most part represents a fixed weekly or monthly cost for the entire year for the maintenance and care of public buildings, it would appear that the Borough President displayed extraordinary lack of foresight in the administration of his appropriation.

There might have been some justification if the disbursements represented the meeting of extraordinary emergencies, or if the maintenance cost was one which varied greatly during the year, but such is not the case, as indicated by the following totals of payroll amounts for the nine months under consideration, which are as follows:

There is no variation from one month to another showing the meeting of extraordinary conditions, but a gradual and practically uniform increase in payroll cost from January to September.

The Charter requires that Department heads shall not exceed the appropriations granted to them by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and while the Borough President has technically not exceeded his appropriation, still having an unexpended balance, he would seem to have more seriously violated the spirit of the Charter in the fact that he has exceeded, in less than ten months, an appropriation given to him properly to care for the public buildings of the Borough of Brooklyn for the year.

The problem at once presents itself as to whether or not the Borough should be compelled to suffer because of the fact that the Borough President has exceeded his appropriation. There is no doubt that serious conditions will ensue with the approaching cold weather unless some plan is adopted for operating the public buildings of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Borough President has requested an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$40,000 to replenish this account, which request has been approved by the Board of Aldermen, and, your Examiner understands, has been transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and I am informed by the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough that it would be possible to administer this account for the remainder of the year with said sum.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that no action be taken on the request of transfer as it would seem that the whole question could be better considered in connection with the authorization of Special Revenue Bonds, the requested amount of the transfer being far from adequate to in any way correct the conditions which have grown out of the deficiency in the fund.

SIR—In the matter of the request of the Borough President of Brooklyn for a transfer of various accounts in the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, I beg to report as follows:

It has been impossible for your Examiner to make the same investigation of the payrolls and accounts in this Bureau as were made in accounts of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

It would seem also that the same principle of administration was not violated in the depletion of these accounts as in the instance of the depletion of the accounts of Public Buildings and Offices previously referred to.

In setting up the Budget for The City of New York the Board of Estimate has generally recognized a distinction between the amounts of money to be allowed for salaries and wages and the amounts to be allowed for supplies and materials—probably on the assumption that the tendency in public office was to increase payrolls at the expense of materials and supplies where discretion was permitted in the premises.

To the extent that the transfers requested herein are from salaries to salaries, or their equivalents, or from supplies to supplies, I would respectfully recommend their approval.

On this basis I recommend the approval of the transfer from Bureau of Sewers, Cleaning Large Brick and Concrete Sewers, Hired Teams and Horses and Carts, 1908, \$16,000, to the appropriation known as Bureau of Sewers, Repairing and Cleaning Sewers, Salaries and Wages, 1908, \$16,000; also the transfer from the appropriation known as Bureau of Sewers, Repairing and Cleaning Sewers, Contracts at Public Letting, \$9,000, \$4,000 of which to be transferred to the Bureau of Sewers, Thirty-first Ward, Sewerage Districts Nos. 1 and 3, Equipment Repairs, Renewals and Supplies, \$5,000 of which to be transferred to the Bureau of Sewers, Repairing and Cleaning Sewers, Equipment Repairs, Renewals and Supplies.

As the date of appointment of the Laborer appointed to fill the vacancy created by the promotion of the former incumbent to the position of Expert Laborer, namely, July 21, 1908, will leave 164 days at \$3 per day, or a total amount of \$492 to be pro-

vided for, I respectfully recommend the adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the resolution hereunto attached.

The above resolution having been considered and laid over at the meeting held October 16, 1908, is not an original resolution within the meaning of section 226 of the Charter, and was accordingly adopted by a majority vote, as above set forth.

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller recommending an issue of \$24,500 Special Revenue Bonds (subdivision 8, of section 188, of the Charter), for expenses incurred by the Department of Street Cleaning in cleaning certain streets in the Borough of Manhattan heretofore cleaned by the Department of Parks. (On September 18, 1908, a resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting this issue was referred to the Comptroller.)

The resolution authorizing the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, as recommended by the Comptroller, failed of adoption, receiving the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—14.

Negative—The President of the Borough of Brooklyn—2.

Subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, under which Special Revenue Bonds for this purpose are authorized, requiring the unanimous vote of the Board.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller recommending the issue of \$150,000 Special Revenue Bonds as a final allowance (on account of requisition dated December 3, 1907, for an appropriation of \$1,095,000), for the expenses and the compensation of the employees of the Public Service Commission during the year ending December 31, 1908.

At various meetings the Board has authorized in the aggregate the sum of \$850,000 for this purpose.

SIR—Regarding the application addressed to the Comptroller by Commissioner Bassett on behalf of the Public Service Commission of the First District for the appropriation by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the balance of its annual requisition to provide for the payment of its expenses during the remainder of the year, said balance amounting to \$245,000, I beg to report as follows:

As stated in the Commissioner's communication, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has already appropriated for the expenses of the Commission during the present year the sum of \$850,000. Of this sum a balance of \$107,500 remains unexpended, which it is expected will be sufficient to carry the Commission to the latter part of November.

The monthly payrolls for November and December, however, which are paid at the end of the month and amount to about \$123,000, must also be provided for, in addition to which, weekly payrolls aggregating \$11,200, special and expert services estimated at \$16,000, advertising at \$5,000 and some \$25,000 of miscellaneous bills, will bring the Commission's expenses for the remainder of the year up to about \$250,000. Deducting from this sum the balance of \$107,500, referred to, leaves less than \$150,000, and it would thus appear that the amount requested by the Commission is somewhat in excess of actual requirements.

It is therefore respectfully recommended that the application of the Commission for a further issue of bonds to provide for its expenses during the remainder of the year be approved to the extent of \$150,000, thus making the total issues for the current year for this purpose \$1,000,000.

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller certifying claim of Matthew J. Cahill in the sum of \$175 (pursuant to the provisions of chapter 601, Laws of 1907) for services rendered in unloading and moving furniture belonging to the City from the railroad cars at St. George, Borough of Richmond, and delivering same to various fire houses in the First and Third Wards of said Borough.

Which was laid over.

(On January 24, 1908, the above claim was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller recommending an issue of \$20,000 Special Revenue Bonds (subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter) to meet a deficit in the appropriation made to the President of the Borough of Richmond for the year 1908, entitled Bureau of Engineering-Construction Division—Salaries and Wages.

(On September 18, 1908, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting the above issue was referred to the Comptroller.)

On October 2, 1908, the resolution authorizing the issue of \$20,000 Special Revenue Bonds for this purpose (subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter) failed of adoption, not receiving the unanimous vote of the Board. The vote was then reconsidered and the matter laid over.

On October 16, 1908, the President of the Borough of Richmond stated that \$15,000 would be sufficient for said purpose, and a resolution authorizing the issue of \$15,000 Special Revenue Bonds (subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter) failed of adoption, not receiving the unanimous vote of the Board.

The resolution presented at this meeting authorizing the issue of \$15,000 Special Revenue Bonds failed of adoption, receiving the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—14.

Negative—The President of the Borough of Brooklyn—2.

Subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, under which Special Revenue Bonds for this purpose are authorized, requiring the unanimous vote of the Board.

The Secretary presented the following communication from Alfred J. Boulton (former Register of Kings County), requesting an appropriation of \$2,500, as the third payment of compensation due him and his assistants for services rendered after the expiration of his term of office, together with report of the Comptroller (to whom this matter was referred on October 2, 1908), recommending an issue of \$2,500 Special Revenue Bonds for this purpose, provided that, as a condition precedent to receiving such third instalment, said former Register shall agree to accept in full payment for the entire work an amount not exceeding \$10,083.26, being eleven-twelfths of the sum fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 24, 1908, as the annual compensation for said services, viz., \$11,000.

In accordance with recommendations contained in a report of this Bureau, dated April 20, 1908, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on April 24, 1908, adopted a resolution determining the rate of compensation to Mr. Boulton and assistants for said services at \$11,000 per annum and authorizing an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to provide for the payment of \$2,500 on account for services rendered up to March 31.

In said report it was also recommended that similar payments on account be authorized as the work progressed, and in pursuance of this recommendation and of a supplementary report stating that the work was progressing satisfactorily a second payment of \$2,500 was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 26, 1908.

The present application is for a third instalment and investigation now shows that the previous rate of progress is being maintained and that the entire work should be finished by December 1, 1908, the date set by the ex-Register in his original communication.

It is therefore respectfully recommended that Mr. Boulton's request for an appropriation to provide for a third payment on account be granted, and that an issue of Special Revenue Bonds be now authorized in the amount of \$2,500 for this purpose, provided that as a condition precedent to receiving such third instalment the former Register shall agree to accept in full payment for the entire work an amount not to exceed eleven-twelfths of the sum fixed as the annual compensation of himself and his assistants, viz., \$10,083.26.

SIR—The Public Service Commission in a communication dated October 26, 1908, requests that the Comptroller of The City of New York be directed to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$157,790, to provide means for the purchase of certain real property or interests therein or in a certain award as set forth in the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the requisition.

The resolution which is attached to the communication states in substance as follows:

That in the opinion of the Public Service Commission it becomes necessary to acquire in fee simple certain real property situated on the northwest corner of Canal and Centre streets, City of New York, known as Nos. 239 and 241 Canal street and Nos. 157 to 163 (inclusive) Centre street, for the purpose of constructing and operating a part of the proposed Brooklyn loop lines of the Rapid Transit Railroad to be constructed by the Cranford Company, in pursuance of a contract heretofore made between it and The City of New York; that the Corporation Counsel under the direction of the Commission duly instituted legal proceedings to condemn said property; that such proceedings were duly had and title to said real property in fee simple became vested in The City of New York on July 22, 1908; that the Commission is about to enter into a contract with the executors and trustees under the will of Peter Lorillard, who was the owner, to purchase all their right, title and interest in and to said property and in and to any award which may be made in the proceedings, for the sum of \$155,000, and to pay in addition the sum of \$2,790 interest thereon from the 22d day of August, 1908, to the 10th day of December, 1908, at which time it is supposed that the money herein to be authorized will be available, amounting in all to the sum of \$157,790.

The Corporation Counsel in charge of the proceedings for the acquisition of this property has already in a communication to the Public Service Commission approved of the price which the Public Service Commission proposes to pay.

After consultation with the Corporation Counsel in charge of the proceedings, and after an investigation by this office, we believe that the City will be saving money by the acquisition thereof at private sale, as requested by the Public Service Commission.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$160,000, of which amount \$155,000 is the amount agreed upon to be paid as the value of the property and \$2,790 the interest thereon, making a total of \$157,790, and that the additional sum of money, namely, \$2,210, is for the payment of title company bills accrued in the acquisition of this and other properties heretofore authorized to be acquired, for which no appropriation has been heretofore made for the payment of the bills.

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held November 23, 1906, adopted a resolution authorizing the acquisition of the fee of lands selected by the Commissioner of the Department of Bridges as an approach to the Manhattan Bridge, lying between Monroe street and the Bowery, in the Borough of Manhattan, more particularly shown on a map filed by the Commissioner of the Department of Bridges in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York on the 20th day of February, 1905.

The title to the approach to the said bridge included within the area of the block bounded by Forsyth street, Canal street, Chrystie street and Bayard street, vested in The City of New York pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 1, 1908. Among the parcels lying within the area so laid out and shown on the map so filed were two parcels, one known as No. 17 Forsyth street and the other known as No. 112 Canal street, both of which are included in the approach to the said bridge.

The property No. 112 Canal street, in the Borough of Manhattan, is a five-story brick building, having a frontage of 24.25 feet on Canal street, with a depth of 76.58 feet, having a total area of 1,861 square feet.

The property is now offered to the City for the sum of \$57,500, together with interest at 6 per cent. per annum from the date of vesting of title. Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Forsyth street distant 152 feet southerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Canal street with the westerly side of Forsyth street; thence westerly and parallel with Canal street 100.11 feet; thence southerly and parallel with Forsyth street 24.91 feet, and thence easterly and again parallel with Canal street 100.19 feet to the westerly side of Forsyth street, and thence northerly along the westerly side of Forsyth street 24.91 feet to the point or place of beginning, the said premises being known by the number 17 Forsyth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and also on the land map of the County of New York as Lot No. 24 in Block 291, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof, and also together with all the right, title and interest in and to any awards that may be made by the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal in the proceedings now pending for the acquisition of said property.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt two resolutions, one authorizing the acquisition of property No. 112 Canal street, Borough of Manhattan, for the sum of \$57,500, together with interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum from June 1, 1908, and the other authorizing the acquisition of property No. 17 Forsyth street, Borough of Manhattan, for the sum of \$38,000, together with interest at 6 per cent. per annum from July 1, 1908.

SIR—This office is in receipt of a communication from the Corporation Counsel dated October 22, in the matter of the action of The City of New York against Claus Doscher. The communication transmits a stipulation that the City, in addition to paying the original sum, viz.: \$36,100, was to pay \$924, which represents the carrying charges for the taxes for the years 1905, 1906 and 1907, pursuant to the amount of such bills for taxes to be established, either by the original receipted bills or by a certificate of the Deputy Collector of Taxes for the Borough of Brooklyn, and recommends that the stipulation be agreed to and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the same and authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock in the sum of \$924, in addition to the sum of \$36,100 already authorized.

For the knowledge of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I give a little history of the circumstances which necessitate the payment of this additional fund:

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held July 14, 1905, said Board approved of the acquisition by the City of a parcel of land fronting on Dumont avenue, between Bradford and Miller avenues, in the East New York section of the Borough of Brooklyn, being 200 feet on Dumont avenue, 280 feet on Miller avenue and 280 feet on Bradford avenue, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of the premises of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof.

Under date of July 7, 1905, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting authorized, in pursuance of the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$37,000 to provide means for the expense connected with the acquisition of the property. Contracts dated December 22, 1905, were entered into between Claus Doscher and the City for the acquisition of the property. The title was examined, and the title company certified that the title was good and marketable and was vested in Claus Doscher. The Corporation Counsel approved of the certificate and issued his own certificate thereon, and a warrant was prepared in the Finance Department dated March 14, 1906, for the sum of \$36,100 for the acquisition of this property. The difference between the purchase price, \$36,100 and the \$37,000 issue of Corporate Stock was for the purpose of a survey and the payment of the examination of title. Subsequently thereto, and for reasons probably known to the attorney for the owner of the property, he refused to give title to the City. The claim then set up was that the property had increased in value and that they could not be compelled to deliver title to the same after so long a lapse of time between the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the date of the warrant.

The matter was brought to your attention and you wrote to the Corporation Counsel asking him to commence an action for specific performance of contract. This action was begun by the Corporation Counsel, and, pending the action, the question arose as to the validity of the title. The Corporation Counsel states in his communication that Mr. Doscher had a favorable determination in the matter and that he now proposes to carry out his contract with the City, provided the City refunds to him the amount which he paid in taxes during the time. This matter is only fair and equitable. Mr. Doscher delivered his title to the City in 1905. He would not have been obligated to pay the taxes accrued and due thereon, because, being City property, it would have been exempt from taxation, and, therefore, he should not be charged with the carrying charge of the taxes, and inasmuch as the City has had the use of the money for a period of three years and four months, which amounts to over \$3,000 on a 3 per cent. basis, I do not see any reason why the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should not approve of the request of the Corporation Counsel for this additional sum of money and the additional issue of Corporate Stock, and also the approval of the Mayor to the stipulation, in accordance with the provisions of section 255 of the Charter. I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, approve of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York in an amount not exceeding \$924, to provide means for the expense connected with the acquisition of the property located on Dumont avenue, between Bradford and Miller avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as a site for a hospital under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities, and that when authority shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be authorized to issue the Corporate Stock of The City of New York. That the Board further adopt a resolution authorizing the payment to Claus Doscher, or his heirs or assigns, in accordance with the stipulation hereto annexed, the said sum of \$924, or so much thereof as may be necessary, on his production of either the original bills or on furnishing a certificate of the Deputy Collector of Taxes in the Borough of Brooklyn, showing the payment by the said Claus Doscher, his heirs or assigns, of the taxes on said property, which is mentioned and described in the contract dated December 22, 1905, between said Doscher and the Comptroller of The City of New York, for the years 1905, 1906 and 1907.

And further, that in accordance with the provisions of section 255 of the amended Greater New York Charter, his Honor the Mayor, be requested to append his signature to the stipulation entered into between the Corporation Counsel, acting for and on behalf of The City of New York, and Claus Doscher.

SIR—I inclose herewith stipulation for proposed settlement of the above entitled action. It has been executed and acknowledged by the defendant; and it provides that there shall be paid to him the sum of \$36,100, now represented by warrants in your custody, representing the purchase price of the property under the original contract, dated December 22, 1905; and in addition thereto the sum of \$924, representing taxes paid by the defendant for 1905, 1906 and 1907.

The action proposed to be settled by this stipulation is one brought by the City for the specific performance of the contract above mentioned; the defendant claiming in his answer that there had been upon the part of the City such a dilatory performance of its obligation to purchase as to excuse his refusal to perform when the City did finally tender him the warrant.

The proposed settlement is one which, in view of all the circumstances, I deem advantageous to the City's interest; especially as during the interval the City has had the use of the funds represented by these warrants. The contract is to be closed without the payment of any interest, as will be observed by the stipulation herewith inclosed.

The contract vendor has been a party to a litigation pending in the Supreme Court, affecting the tract of which the premises here involved originally formed a part. This action has been determined favorably to the vendor, but as an appeal has been taken, it is desirable that the City should have title insurance in addition to the purchase price sufficient to indemnify it for the cost of the buildings proposed to be erected. This insurance (which the title company is prepared to issue) should be arranged for by your Department, in the event that the proposed settlement meets your approval and the approval of his Honor the Mayor, to whom the stipulation should be submitted under the provisions of section 255 of the Charter.

I. Plaintiff shall pay to the defendant the sum of \$36,100 now represented by warrants in the safe of the Comptroller of The City of New York, representing the purchase price under the contract herein sued for, to wit, the sum of \$36,100.

II. The Comptroller of The City of New York shall upon authorization from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment cause to be paid to the defendant herein the sum of \$924 representing the amount paid by defendant herein to The City of New York for taxes for years 1905, 1906 and 1907; pursuant to the amount of such several bills of taxes established either by the original bills or by certificates of the Deputy Comptroller of Taxes of the Borough of Brooklyn to be produced at the closing of title.

III. Upon the completion of the above recited provisions of this stipulation either party may, without notice to the other, enter an order discontinuing the above entitled action without costs to either party.

This stipulation is made without prejudice to the rights of either party in the event that its terms are not approved by the Comptroller of The City of New York and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Resolved, That the sum of two thousand five hundred and twenty dollars (\$2,520) be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the President of the Borough of Manhattan for the year 1908, entitled Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices—Public Baths and Public Comfort Stations, Maintenance of: Salaries and Wages, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes thereof, to the appropriation made to said office for the year 1908, entitled Bureau of Highways—Boulevards, Roads and Avenues, Maintenance of: Hired Teams, Horses and Carts, etc., the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

Each bid or estimate must be verified by the oath in writing of the party making the same that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Each bid or estimate must be accompanied by the consent in writing of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, with their place of residence or business, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the persons making the bid or estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance, and that if he should omit or refuse to execute the same they will pay

Parties.

This agreement, made and entered into this _____ day of _____, in the year one thousand nine hundred and _____, by and between The City of New York, party of the first part, acting by and through the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, and _____ Contractor, party of the second part, pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, witnesseth:

Covenant.

The parties to these presents, each in consideration of the agreements on the part and behalf of the other herein contained, have mutually agreed and hereby mutually agree, the party of the first part for itself and its successors, and the party of the second part for himself, or itself, and his, or its, successors, executors, administrators, assigns and legal representatives, as follows:

Parties Described.

(A) Wherever in this contract the term "The City" is used it shall be taken to mean The City of New York, the party of the first part to this contract, and wherever the term "Commissioner" occurs, it shall be understood as applying to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, and to his authorized representative and representatives, and wherever the term "Contractor" or pronouns referring to the same occurs or occur, the same shall be taken to intend the party or parties, as the case may be, of the second part of this contract.

Nature of the Work.

(B) The purpose of this contract is to provide for the collection and removal of ashes, garbage and other light refuse and rubbish in all those built-up portions of the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan to which the regular service of the Department of Street Cleaning has not yet been extended, consisting of so much of the Borough of The Bronx as lies to the west of the Bronx River and north of the Harlem River Ship Canal, Fordham road and Pelham avenue, and of all of the Borough of The Bronx that lies to the east of the Bronx River, as well as of so much of the Borough of Manhattan as is comprised between Dyckman street (included) and the Harlem River Ship Canal and the Harlem River; which may be generally described as contained within the following localities:

Materials to be Handled (Charter, Sections 534, 544).

(C) The Contractor will collect and remove all the ashes, garbage and other light refuse and rubbish of the heretofore described portions of the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan, in accordance with the specifications herein set forth.

Contractor to Conform to the Law, etc. (Charter, Section 544).

(D) The Contractor will perform the work under this contract so as to comply with all the laws of the State of New York, the Sanitary Code of The City of New York, the orders, rules and regulations of the State Board of Health, and the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, so far as they are in force and relate to the work of this contract, and so as not to create any obligation, claim or demand, or to furnish any just ground for any action, suit or legal proceeding against The City of New York, or the Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York.

SPECIFICATIONS.

Definition of Ashes, etc. Charter, Section 534.

1. Wherever the words "ashes," "garbage or other light refuse and rubbish" or "garbage" are used in this contract, they shall be taken to mean the household wastes that shall be offered to the Contractor from any house, building, place or street within the specified districts, and the removal of which is within the cognizance and control of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

2. The Contractor shall collect and remove daily all the ashes, garbage and other light refuse and rubbish placed outside the limits of buildings in accordance with Sanitary Code and the rules and regulations of the Street Cleaning Department, and shall prepare and work on a schedule to be approved by the Commissioner, and subject to such changes as the exigencies of the work may require, such changes to be approved by the Commissioner. Householders will be informed by the Contractor by means of printed notices as to the hour when the said material will be called for daily, in accordance with the aforesaid schedule.

3. The Contractor shall furnish, at his own cost and expense, all the proper vehicles, horses and labor necessary for the collection and removal of the said materials and the places or methods for disposing of the same. In case the Contractor shall change the location of any of the said places or the said methods, he shall at once notify the Commissioner thereof in writing.

4. All vehicles used in the collection of the said materials must be water tight, neat in appearance, and must be kept at all times in a strictly sanitary condition; to be covered with a flexible cover so arranged as to prevent, as far as possible, the escape of noxious odors.

5. Each vehicle must be maintained in a water tight and closed condition, be cleaned daily and kept in perfect order and be legibly painted with the name of the Contractor, the Department initials, D. S. C., and the number of the vehicle conspicuously thereon.

6. The Contractor shall furnish proper supervision over all the vehicles and employees connected with the work under this contract and shall enforce such regulations and orders as may be given from time to time by the Commissioner or his authorized representative.

7. The receptacles containing the materials to be removed shall be carefully handled and any injury to or destruction of the same in excess of wear and tear shall be paid for by the Contractor, and The City of New York may, upon proof of damage which it may deem sufficient, pay for such receptacles or renew them and deduct the cost of the same from any amount which may be then due or may grow due to the Contractor, under this contract.

8. All the materials collected from the receptacles or otherwise removed from the premises aforesaid shall be placed in the Contractor's vehicles in as cleanly a manner as possible and without spilling any of the said materials upon the roadway, or sidewalk, and without causing any nuisance.

9. The Contractor shall be ready at any time to execute any order of the Commissioner to remove the said materials from any building whatever or whenever in the opinion of the Commissioner it is necessary for the public health and the use of the streets.

10. In case the Contractor shall neglect to collect or remove any of the said materials the Commissioner may cause such collection or removal to be made and the cost thereof shall be deducted from any money due or to grow due to the Contractor, under this contract.

11. Whenever the Commissioner shall deem it necessary that disinfectants be used, and shall so order, the Contractor shall, at his own cost and expense, furnish and use such disinfectants, in proper amounts, as may be required by the Commissioner, but this requirement shall not release the Contractor from the obligation to at all times keep the dumps and carts in proper sanitary condition.

12. No money, reward, gratuity, fee or other valuable consideration except the compensation agreed upon under this contract to be paid by the City shall be charged, received, or taken by the Contractor or any of his agents or employees, for doing or failing to do any part of the work required to be done under this agreement.

13. The entire work of this contract is to be at all times subject to inspection by the Commissioner and his authorized representatives and under his supervision.

CONTRACT PROVISIONS.

If Contractor Fails to Begin Work.

(E) If the Contractor shall delay or neglect to begin the work under this contract, or any portion thereof, the City may perform the same or any portion thereof for such period of neglect or delay, and charge that whole expense thereof to the Contractor, and deduct the same from any moneys retained, accruing, due or to grow due under this contract.

Price.

(F) The Contractor will collect, and remove and dispose of the ashes, garbage and other light refuse and rubbish, as hereinbefore defined and specified, in the said described portions of the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan, according to the terms and conditions of this contract, for the price or sum of _____ dollars (\$ _____) per calendar month, to be paid by the City to the Contractor.

No Other or Greater Compensation.

(G) The above mentioned price or sum shall be the sole compensation for all the work to be performed under this contract, and no claim shall be made by the Contractor for any greater or extra compensation, and he shall not ask, demand, sue for, or recover for the entire work any extra compensation beyond the amount payable as aforesaid for the work which shall actually be performed at the said price, nor have any claim for, nor ask, demand, sue for, or recover any extra or other compensation, in case the daily amount of ashes, garbage and other light refuse and rubbish delivered as aforesaid shall be materially or in any degree greater or less than the estimated quantity of cubic yards, of said materials, in the Borough of The Bronx for the year 1907, as stated in the proposal for this contract. Said price or sum shall cover all costs and expense of transportation and disposition of any and every nature in whatsoever way incurred in the course of the work under this contract.

Times of Payment. Ordinances, Section 353.

(H) The City will pay or cause to be paid to the Contractor monthly, the monthly price or sum aforesaid to be paid under this contract, on the 5th day of each month during the continuance thereof, provided, however, that the City may and shall deduct and retain from each of such amounts or payments as the same shall become due ten per centum thereof, the same conditioned upon the faithful performance by the Contractor of the terms and conditions of this contract on his part to be performed, to be paid to the Contractor within thirty days after the 31st day of December next ensuing.

Commissioner's Certificate.

(I) On or before the 5th day of each month during the continuance of this contract in which the Contractor shall have performed work hereunder, the Commissioner shall certify the amount payable to the Contractor therefor, in writing to the Comptroller of The City of New York for payment, and said certificate shall be a condition precedent to the right of the Contractor to receive payment for such work under this contract or otherwise, and the Contractor shall be bound and concluded thereby, and shall be bound and concluded by the action of the said Commissioner as evidenced thereby.

No Waiver.

(J) The fact that the Department of Street Cleaning may inspect the work or any part thereof shall not be held to be or constitute a waiver of the strict performance by the Contractor of all his obligations under this contract to perform the work in a good, efficient and expeditious manner.

Assignment. Chapter 444, Laws 1897.

(K) The Contractor will give his personal attention constantly to the faithful prosecution of the work; he will not assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of this contract, or his right, title or interest in or to the same, or any part hereof, without the previous consent in writing of the Commissioner indorsed hereon or hereto attached; and he will not assign, by power of attorney or otherwise, any of the moneys to become due and payable under this contract, unless by and with the like consent signified in like manner. If the Contractor shall, without such previous written consent, assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of this contract, or of his right, title or interest therein, or any of the moneys to become due under this contract, to any other person, company or other corporation, this contract may, at the option of the Commissioner, be revoked and annulled and the City shall thereupon be relieved and discharged from any and all liability and obligations growing out of the same to the Contractor, and to his assignee or transferee; provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to hinder, prevent or affect an assignment by the Contractor for the benefit of his creditors, made pursuant to the statutes of

the State of New York; and no right under this contract, or to any money to become due hereunder shall be asserted against the City in law or in equity, by reason of any so-called assignment of this contract, or any part thereof, or of any moneys to grow due hereunder, unless authorized as aforesaid by the written consent of the Commissioner.

Abandonment of Contract.

(L) If this contract shall be abandoned, or if at any time the Contractor shall fail to perform the work hereunder at the time and in the manner specified herein with promptness and diligence, or shall omit to perform, fulfill, observe or keep any of the covenants, terms and conditions herein contained on his part to be kept, performed, fulfilled or observed, either the City may perform or procure to be performed, such and so much of said work as the Contractor shall have failed to perform, or this contract after three days' notice by the said Commissioner, in writing, to the Contractor, the said notice to be served upon the Contractor either personally or by leaving it at his residence or office, shall be forfeited at the option of the City, and the Commissioner shall thereupon have the power and is hereby authorized to procure, in the manner prescribed by law, such and so much of said work to be performed as may be necessary to fulfill this contract, and in either such case the City shall have the power to charge the costs and expenses of the same to the Contractor, and the costs and expenses so charged shall be deducted and paid by the City out of such moneys as may be then due or at any time thereafter may grow due to the Contractor under and by virtue of this contract, and in case such costs and expenses shall exceed the sum which would have been payable under this contract if the same had been completed by the Contractor, then the Contractor shall and will pay the amount of such excess to the City, and in case such costs and expenses shall be less than the sum which would have been payable under this contract if the same had been completed by the Contractor, then the Contractor shall forfeit all claim to the difference.

Damage to City Through Contractor's Delay.

(M) If the Contractor should fail to comply with the terms and conditions of this contract, in that he should fail to perform the work provided for hereunder, then and in such case, in addition to the right of the Commissioner to perform the said work and charge the expense therefor to the Contractor, the City may deduct and retain out of the moneys due or to become due to the Contractor under this contract, the sum of one dollar (\$1) for each and every cartload, or its equivalent, on which the Contractor shall fail to perform the said work, which said sum is hereby fixed and determined as the liquidated damages which will be suffered by the City by reason of such failure or refusal, and not by way of penalty; a "cartload" being estimated to contain 1.55 cubic yards, water measure.

No Estoppel.

(N) The City shall not, nor shall any Department or officer of The City of New York, be precluded or estopped by any return or certificate made or given by any Superintendent, Engineer, Inspector or other officer, agent or appointee of the Department of Street Cleaning or of the City under or in pursuance of anything in this agreement contained, from at any time showing the true and correct amount and character of the work that shall have been done by the Contractor, or any other person or persons under this agreement, and all differences that may arise between the parties hereto regarding the work to be done under this agreement, may be adjusted and finally determined by the Superintendent or Inspector designated by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning to supervise the work hereunder upon such facts as may be presented to him.

The Lien Law. Chapter 418, Laws of 1897; Chapter 169, Laws of 1898.

(O) If at any time before or within thirty days after the whole work herein agreed to be performed has been performed and properly completed in accordance with this contract and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning by the Contractor, any person or persons claiming to have performed any labor or furnished any machine, implement, appliance or material toward the performance or completion of this contract, shall file or cause to be filed with the Department of Street Cleaning and with the head of the Finance Department of The City of New York, any such notice as is provided for in any lien law of the State of New York, then, and in every such case the City shall retain, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding, from the moneys under its control and due or to grow due from it under this contract, so much of such moneys as shall be sufficient to pay off, satisfy and discharge the amount in such notice alleged or claimed to be due to the person or persons filing such notice, or causing the same to be filed, together with the reasonable costs of any action or actions brought to enforce such claim or the lien created by the filing of such notice. The moneys so retained shall be retained by the City until the lien thereon created by the said act and the filing of the said notice shall be discharged pursuant to the provision of the said act.

Accidents to be Prevented (Code of Ordinances, Section 519).

(P) The Contractor shall place proper guards for the prevention of accidents, and shall put up and keep at night suitable and sufficient lights where necessary, during the performance of the work to prevent accidents or injuries to the person or property of another, and he shall use all proper precautions to prevent nuisances and shall indemnify and save harmless the City from all suits or actions and damages or costs of every name and description to which the City may be subjected or put by reason of injury to the person or property of another resulting from negligence or carelessness on the part of the Contractor, his servants or agents, in the performance of the work, or on account of any nuisance, or by or on account of any act or omission of the Contractor, his servants or agents, and the whole or so much of the moneys due, or to grow due, to the Contractor under this agreement as shall or may be considered necessary by the Comptroller of the City shall or may be retained by the City until all such suits or claims for damages shall have been settled or otherwise disposed of, and evidence to that effect furnished to the satisfaction of the Comptroller.

Labor Law. (Chapter 415, Laws of 1897; Chapter 567, Laws of 1899; Chapter 506, Laws of 1906.)

(Q) The Contractor agrees that he will comply with the provisions of the Labor Law. He further agrees that no laborer, workman or mechanic in the employ of the Contractor, subcontractor or other person doing or contracting to do the whole or a part of the work contemplated by the contract shall be permitted or required to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency caused by fire, flood or danger to life or property. That the wages to be paid for a legal day's work to all classes of such laborers, workmen or mechanics upon public work or upon any material to be used thereon shall not be less than the prevailing rate for a day's work in the same trade or occupation in the locality where such public work is being constructed. Each such laborer, workman or mechanic shall receive the prevailing rate of wages. This contract shall be void and of no effect unless the person or corporation making or performing the same shall comply with the provisions of sections 3 and 13 of the Labor Law.

(Charter, Section 149.)

(R) This contract shall not be binding or of any force unless the Comptroller of The City of New York shall endorse hereon his certificate that there remains unexpended and unapplied, as provided in the Greater New York Charter, a balance of the appropriation or fund applicable thereto sufficient to pay the estimated expense of executing this contract, as certified by the officer making the same.

Period of Contract Subject to Appropriation Therefor.

(S) The period during which this contract shall be in force shall be for one (1) year beginning with the date of the indorsement as aforesaid by the Comptroller of his certificate hereon, provided, always, however, that the continuance of this contract beyond the year 1908 shall be conditioned upon the act of the proper authorities of The City of New York, in making the necessary appropriation therefor.

(T) The proposal for bids or estimates, the advertisement of this contract in the CITY RECORD, the Contractor's bid or estimate on which this contract was awarded, and the specifications herein contained shall be, and shall be deemed to be, a part of this contract.

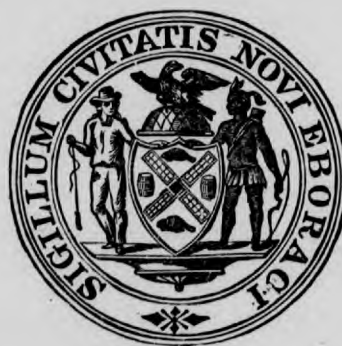

To the Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The petition of the New York City Interborough Railway Company respectfully shows:

1. Your petitioner is a street surface railway corporation, duly organized on or about the 24th day of March, 1902, under the laws of the State of New York.

2. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York has heretofore, to wit, on the 16th day of March, 1903, granted to the said New York City Interborough Railway Company the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double track surface railway with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers and stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of the said railroad by an overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in and upon and along certain streets, avenues, parkways, highways, public places, bridges and viaducts, all situated in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, and more particularly specified in the said ordinance of the Board of Aldermen adopted March 16, 1903, a copy of which is hereto annexed, the total mileage authorized by said resolution being about 22.8 miles.

3. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, by a resolution adopted the 25th day of June, 1907, a copy of which is hereto annexed, granted the franchise or right to use certain streets, roads, avenues, highways or public grounds within or belonging to The City of New York for the construction and operation in and upon the surface thereof of a double or single track surface railway as alterations or changes of the route granted to it by virtue of the aforesaid ordinance of the Board of Aldermen approved by the Mayor.

4. Pursuant to the franchise and right granted by virtue of the said ordinance of the Board of Aldermen and resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, your petitioner promptly commenced and diligently constructed and completed its road upon the following streets: One Hundred and Eighty-first street, from St. Nicholas avenue to Amsterdam avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, across Washington Bridge to the Borough of The Bronx; on Aqueduct avenue, from the east end of Washington Bridge to Kingsbridge road; Kingsbridge road, from Aqueduct avenue to Creston avenue; One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, from Third avenue to the Southern boulevard; Southern boulevard, from One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to One Hundred and Eightieth street; One Hundred and Eightieth street, from Southern boulevard to Third avenue. This construction is four and eighty-six one-hundredths (4.86) miles in length, and was operated as a system until on or about September 1, 1907, when there was added one and fifteen one-hundredths (1.15) miles in length of operation on Ogden avenue, from Aqueduct avenue to Jerome avenue. These routes continued to be operated on or about February 15, 1908, when there was added thereto additional routes operated on the following streets: Tremont avenue, from Aqueduct avenue to Webster avenue; One Hundred and Eightieth street, from Webster avenue to Third avenue; One Hundred and Eightieth street, from the Southern boulevard to Boston road; Boston road, from One Hundred and Eightieth street to One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, of one and seventy-three one-hundredths (1.73) miles in length, making a total system at as present operated of seven and seventy-four one-hundredths (7.74) miles in length. The portions of the routes of your petitioner upon which its road is partially or wholly constructed but not operated are: Kingsbridge road, from Aqueduct avenue to Heath avenue; Sedgwick avenue, from Kingsbridge road to Fort Independence street; Fort Independence street to Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street; Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Broadway; Kingsbridge road, from Valentine avenue to Fordham road; One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from Gerard avenue to St. Ann's avenue; One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Eagle avenue to Westchester avenue; Wilkins place, from Boston road to Intervale avenue; Intervale avenue to Dongan street; Dongan street to Southern boulevard, making a total mileage, partially or wholly constructed, but not operated of four and twenty-five one-hundredths (4.25) miles.

The routes embraced within the franchise of your petitioner are shown upon a map hereto annexed, upon which the portions of said route which are operated appear in red, and those upon which the road is wholly or partially constructed, but not operated, are shown in blue.

5. The routes of the New York City Interborough Railway Company are almost entirely located in the Borough of The Bronx, and the streets in that Borough upon which the further construction of your petitioner's lines must be effected are in the course of reconstruction, the

City being engaged in opening and grading streets and constructing sewers therein, all of which work it was necessary to complete before the lines of the Company could be laid in place and cars operated thereover. Among the public works which have interfered with the construction or operation of the Company's roads are the construction of the Grand Concourse across the Company's lines at Tremont avenue and at Kingsbridge road. This large public work absolutely prevented the operation and connection of the Company's lines between the east and west sides of the City through these streets, and the franchise during such time of operation was without any earning power whatsoever. This work was completed during the month of February, 1908, which permitted the partial operation of one of the Company's cross-town lines. One of the lines in your petitioner's franchise is a road upon the new Tremont avenue, or East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, east of the Bronx River. This street is being opened and the Company is unable to make any construction thereon. The streets and highways in the so-called Hunts Point section, in the southeastern part of the Borough of The Bronx, are in course of construction, and it is now impossible for the Company to complete its railroad thereon sufficiently to enable the operation of cars over the same.

The portions of the Company's roads not operated are wholly disconnected from the portions which are in operation, and have been made so by the character of the City construction above referred to. Such disconnected portions have been wholly valueless and worthless to the Company, as they have not produced any income whatsoever, and have not been of any value to the public, as the Company has been unable to operate any cars over the same.

The income of your petitioner from the operation of its street surface railway or railways is wholly inadequate to meet the necessary expenses of operating said railways and make the payments to the City required by its franchises aforesaid, as more fully appears by the statement of the receipts and expenditures of your petitioner during the year ending on the 31st day of December, 1907, a copy of which is hereto annexed, and by its current quarterly report to the Public Service Commission, a copy of which is annexed hereto.

10. Your petitioner has been and is wholly unable to discharge its obligations under a certain mortgage to the United States Mortgage and Trust Company, dated the first day of May, 1905, and there is now due and unpaid, as of the first day of May, 1908, as accrued interest upon the outstanding bonds issued under said mortgage, the sum of \$117,000, and your petitioner is further unable to discharge its obligations under and by virtue of certain contracts heretofore entered into by it for the power necessary to its operation, and for the further construction of its said railways.

11. The financial condition of your petitioner is such that it is and will in an increasing measure be embarrassed and crippled in its desire and effort to afford satisfactory and efficient service to the public; and unless it be materially relieved in respect to its financial obligations, it will be difficult, if not impossible, to discharge its obligations to the City and to the public within the intent and purpose of its said franchise.

12. The portions of the routes embraced within the franchise granted to your petitioner as aforesaid which command relatively the greatest volume of traffic per mile of operation, are those upon which the railway of your petitioner is now constructed and in operation, and in respect to which there has resulted from said operation a large and increasing deficit. A large portion of the route or routes granted as aforesaid to your petitioner, and more especially the routes in the so-called Hunts Point section in the southeastern part of the Borough of The Bronx, cannot, as your petitioner is advised and believes, in the light of its experience in the operation of its present system, be constructed and operated without incurring not only a present deficit and a continuing loss during the term of your petitioner's franchise, but possible jeopardy of all or the greater part of any of the capital expenditures necessary to the completion of said routes.

Your petitioner, although unable, as aforesaid, to meet its contract and other obligations, is earnestly endeavoring to effect such arrangements as will enable it to continue not only the operation, but the further construction of its road,

6. In and by said franchise, and more particularly by the fourth paragraph of section two of said ordinance, adopted by the Board of Aldermen March 16, 1903, your petitioner is obligated to make certain payments to the City, to wit, as follows: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$15,000, and which shall be equal to 3 per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$15,000; during the remaining twenty years of the term an annual sum which shall not be less than \$30,000, and which shall be equal to 5 per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$30,000; and for the use of four bridges described in the said ordinance of the Board of Aldermen constituting the franchise of your petitioner, during the first term of five years the annual sum of \$4,000 for each bridge; during the second term of five years, the annual sum of \$4,500 for each bridge; during the third term of five years, the annual sum of \$5,000 for each bridge; during the fourth term of five years the annual sum of \$5,500 for each bridge, and during the last term of five years, the annual sum of \$6,000 for each bridge.

Wherefore, Your petitioner prays that it be relieved from each and every of its said obligations to make the payments in and for the use of the bridges specified in its franchise, and more particularly in the fourth paragraph of section 2 of the ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor as aforesaid, March 31, 1903, and from the payments for the aforesaid franchises specified in said fourth paragraph of section 2 of said ordinance, except such annual sums which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts during the first term of five years specified in said paragraph fourth, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts thereafter. And your petitioner prays that public notice be given of the time and place when and where this application shall be held, and that the desired consent or grant herein applied for be embodied in the form of a contract, and otherwise in accordance with the provisions of the Greater New York Charter. Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company has, under date of July 28, 1908, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Clasons Point road, from Westchester avenue to Long Island Sound, in the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on October 2, 1908, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as October 30, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the "New York Sun" and the "New York Tribune," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly had on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Bronx Traction Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Bronx Traction Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Bronx Traction Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

BRONX TRACTION COMPANY.

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 190 , by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Bronx Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment for the purpose of conveying passengers in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, upon the following route:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track street surface railway on Westchester avenue, at the intersection of said avenue with Clasons Point road, and running thence easterly in, upon and along said Clasons Point road to the public place at the easterly terminus thereof, and running thence, with a loop, in, upon and along said public place. The said route, with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed railway of Bronx Traction Co. in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908."

—and signed by Edward A. Maher, President, and T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed; provided, that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossover which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within one month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this con-

tract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty (20) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty (20) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money: The sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), in cash, within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

During the first term of five years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than three hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$375), and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$375).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than six hundred and eighty-seven dollars (\$687), and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of six hundred and eighty-seven dollars (\$687).

During the third term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven hundred and fifty-six dollars (\$756), and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven hundred and fifty-six dollars (\$756).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the line in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the said Comptroller on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract, shall be strictly complied with.

The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the Company, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchises hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the Company, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1902.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then, at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets, avenues and highways shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the rights mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets, avenues or highways herein above described in section 1.

The use of said railway which shall be constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures in public streets and avenues owned by the Company and used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways herein above described in section 1, for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall be equal to the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railway and structures and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railway so used. Provided, however, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest on the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to pay for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage of the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if in its opinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Eighth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission of the First District of the State of New York.

Ninth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within six months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within one year from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon such railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride

from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

The rate for the carrying of property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Thirteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway; and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars.

Fourteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the terms of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Seventeenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered, at least three times every twenty-four hours when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Eighteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues or highways upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of 2 feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—The Company shall cause to be paved that portion of the street between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks upon and along the streets, avenues and highways of the routes hereby authorized, which are now either unpaved or paved with macadam. The work of such paving shall be done under the supervision of the Municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters. Such authorities shall designate the character of the pavement to be laid.

As long as the said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in the street, avenue or highway, the Company shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue or highway, and in that event the Company, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewal or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route, written permits shall be obtained from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which those officials may impose, as a condition upon which such permit is granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which those officials have jurisdiction.

Twenty-third—The Company agrees to comply with any and all of the rules which may be made by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of preventing the destruction of the pipes or structures in the street by electrolysis, which may be caused by the electric current used by the Company, whether such rules affect the method of the original construction of said railway or any reconstruction, maintenance or repairs upon such railway at any time during the term of this contract.

Twenty-fourth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in a manner as directed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Twenty-fifth—Should the grades or lines of the streets in which franchises are herein granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the track at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Twenty-sixth—Upon one year's notice from the Board, the Company shall make application

to said Board for the right or privilege to lay its tracks upon other streets hereafter to be opened adjacent to the public place at the easterly terminus of Clason's Point road, the same to be in substitution for the loop terminal hereby authorized in the public place, and within six months after such right or privilege is obtained, shall, at its own expense, remove all of its tracks and appurtenances from said public place.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding or at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.

11. The total amount expended for same.

12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.

13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.

14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.

15. Number of passengers carried during the year.

16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross earnings from all railway lines owned or operated by the Company, the total miles owned by the Company and in operation and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-ninth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirtieth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

Thirty-first—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-second—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the same with interest, from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its President, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing

provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of six thousand dollars (\$6,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-third—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Thirty-fourth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-fifth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This contract is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The Union Railway Company of New York City has under date of July 28, 1908, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Fordham road and West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, and over and along the University Heights Bridge and the approaches thereto, and upon and along West Two Hundred and Seventh street and other streets and avenues in the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on October 2, 1908, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as October 30, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the "New York Sun" and the "New York Tribune," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Union Railway Company of New York City, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Union Railway Company of New York City, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced, and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

UNION RAILWAY COMPANY OF NEW YORK CITY.

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract made this _____ day of _____ 1908 by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double-track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan, in The City of New York, upon the following route:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at or near the intersection of Sedgwick avenue and Fordham road, in the Borough of The Bronx, and running thence southwesterly in, upon and along said Fordham road and Hempden place to West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, and thence southwesterly and westerly in, upon and along said West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street to its intersection with the easterly approach to the University Heights Bridge; thence westerly upon and over said bridge, and the easterly and westerly approaches thereto, to West Two Hundred and Seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and thence westerly in, upon and along said West Two Hundred and Seventh street to Amsterdam or Tenth avenue; thence southerly in, upon and along said Amsterdam or Tenth avenue to Emerson street; thence westerly in, upon and along said Emerson street to Broadway, and connecting with the existing double-track railway in said Broadway. The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed railway of the Union Railway Company in the Boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908," and signed by F. W. Whitridge, Receiver; T. F. Mullane, Chief Engineer, and Edward A. Maher, President, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained, the Company shall, within two months thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of the Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railroad ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and terminate.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty (20) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than that sum required to be paid during the last year of this original contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such an agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty (20) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amounts as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate, and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last

year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400).

During the third term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fifteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the line of the company in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the day on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(c) For the use of the University Heights Bridge during the first term of five years the annual sum of \$2,000, during the second term of five years the annual sum of \$2,250, and during the third term of five years the annual sum of \$2,500. The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date of the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the said Comptroller on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the matter of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract, shall be strictly complied with.

The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the Company, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchises hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the Company, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company, and within three (3) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to The City of New York the sum of twenty thousand three hundred and eighty-five dollars and eight cents (\$20,385.08) and within three (3) months thereafter the further sum of thirty-one thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$31,758.87); said amounts being due under the franchise of the Company granted to it by the Legislature by chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same is renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets, avenues and highways and upon the bridge, shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual. If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board or its successors in authority) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of the tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways and the bridge shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the rights of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the same streets, avenues, highways or bridge, hereinabove described in section 1.

The use of said railway, which shall be constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures in public streets and avenues owned by the Company and used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways, hereinabove described in section 1 for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall not exceed the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railway and structures and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railway so used. Provided, however, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest of the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to pay for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage of the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if in its opinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Eighth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Ninth—The Company shall commence construction of the extension herein authorized within six (6) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained for such extension, or from the date of the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such extension ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction of the same within six (6) months from the same date, otherwise this grant shall cease and terminate, and all sums which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall be forfeited to the City. Provided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided further that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided in the Charter of the City.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the written direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and terminate.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon such railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract, all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City when such employees are in full uniform.

The rate for the carrying of property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Thirteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway; and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars.

Fourteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as

are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Seventeenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets, avenues or bridge, in or upon which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three times every twenty-four hours when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets, avenues and bridge, except when the width of such streets, avenues or bridge shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets, avenues and bridge in a satisfactory manner.

Eighteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues or highways and bridge upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—The Company shall cause to be paved that portion of the street between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, upon and along the streets, avenues and highways of the routes hereby authorized, which are now unpaved. The work of such paving shall be done under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, and such authorities shall designate the character of the pavement to be laid.

As long as the said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in the streets, avenues, highways or upon the bridge, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue, highway or bridge in which said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue, highway or upon the bridge, and in that event the Company, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavements in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route, written permits shall be obtained from the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and the Commissioners of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and Bridges, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which those officials may impose as a condition upon which such permit is granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which those officials have jurisdiction.

Twenty-third—The Company agrees to comply with any and all the rules which may be made by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of preventing the destruction of the pipes or structures in the street by electrolysis, which may be caused by the electric current used by the Company, whether such rules affect the method of the original construction of said railway or any reconstruction, maintenance or repairs upon such railway at any time during the term of this contract.

Twenty-fourth—It is agreed that the right hereby given to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets, or upon the bridge, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall at its own expense protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in a manner as directed by the President of the Borough in which said tracks are situated, or by the Commissioner of Bridges.

Twenty-fifth—Should the grades or lines of the streets in which franchises are herein granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets the Company shall take care of and protect the track and appurtenances at its own expense; all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough in which such change is made or work done.

Twenty-sixth—The Board may at any time require the Company to remove one track from the University Heights Bridge and approaches thereto, and to place the remaining track in the centre of the roadway of said bridge and operate the railway by means of said single track upon said bridge and its approaches.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, or at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-ninth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirtieth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets or of the bridge shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund herein-after provided.

Thirty-first—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-second—This grant upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City of New York the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street and bridge pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railroad; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same with interest from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its president, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-third—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Thirty-fourth—The word "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-fifth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This contract is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The Union Railway Company of New York City has, under date of July 28, 1908, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Pelham avenue, from Third avenue to the Southern boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance to such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on October 2, 1908, fixing the date for public hearings thereon as October 30, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the "New York Sun" and the "New York Tribune," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the CITY RECORD for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Union Railway Company of New York City, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Union Railway Company of New York City, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced, and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

UNION RAILWAY COMPANY OF NEW YORK CITY.

Proposed Form of Contract.

This Contract made this day of 190 .., by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions herein-after set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track road of the Company in Third avenue at the intersection of said avenue with Pelham avenue, and running thence easterly in,

upon and along said Pelham avenue to the Southern boulevard. The said route, with turnouts, switches and crossovers, hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed railway of the Union Railway Company, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 28, 1908."

—and signed by F. W. Whitridge, Receiver, T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, and Edward A. Maher, President, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this right or privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within one month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty (20) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year of this original contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty (20) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate, and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than nine hundred dollars (\$900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby granted shall bear to the entire length of the line of the company in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the day on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the said Comptroller on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the matter of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract shall be strictly complied with.

The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the Company, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchises hereby granted, and

it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the Company, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company, and within three (3) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to The City of New York the sum of twenty thousand three hundred and eighty-five dollars and eight cents (\$20,385.08) and within three (3) months thereafter the further sum of thirty-one thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$31,758.87), said amounts being due under the franchise of the Company granted to it by the Legislature by chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same is renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets, avenues and highways shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of the tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual, for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
