STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION—
DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

Resolutions Adopted.

Whereas, the Bureau of Inspection has sub-
mitted to this Commission the following requests
for variation of law as called for in orders
issued by the Division of Factory Inspection
against the premises noted by the appellants
stated in each case; and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspec-
tion has had a reinspection made of the pre-
mises in each case, and upon the reports submitted
gives the conditions existing and recommends as
follows:

1. Premises affected, Amsterdam, 23-41
Bridge st.; appellant, Chalmers Knitting Co.
23—Provide additional fire doors at horizontal
exit opening between knitting mill and cotton
mill, 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th floors. (April 22, 1918).
7-story factory building erected since Oct. 1,
1913; open lot; sprinkler installed; no com-
bustibles; fire alarm signal system; occupancy,
381; above 1st floor, 343; above 2d floor, 327;
exists, two interior fireproof enclosed stairways
extending from 1st to 7th floors; one interior
fireproof enclosed stairway from 4th to 7th
floors; horizontal exit on 4th, 3d, 2d and 1st
floors equipped with fire door on one side only;
horizontal exit 84 inches wide and is 30 inches
from side walls and stairway in 4-story building;
exit so large sliding doors are impracticable on
side toward 4-story building and swinging doors
would take up considerable space in workroom.
If openings were reduced in size it would ma-
terially interfere with transportation of ma-
terial from one building to another; stairways
as constructed and horizontal exit conforming
to section 79-f-9 were granted with the under-
standing that the occupancy of the 5th, 6th or 7th
floors would not at any time exceed 10 per
floor.
Recommendation: Waiver of order for addi-
tional fire doors while conditions and occupancy
remain unchanged.
2. Premises affected, Alden; appellant, August
Feine & Sons, Inc. Request for acceptance of
stairway with 8-inch rise and 8-inch tread, and
enclosed fire resisting instead of fireproof.
2-story building, nonfireproof construction;
erected since Oct. 1, 1913; no sprinkler; no com-
bustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy of
building, 18 of whom are on the 2d floor;
exists, one interior unenclosed stairway 28 inches
wide, located along sidewalk at center of build-
ing, and 36-inch outside stairway; no safe egress
from roof.
Recommendation: Accept as a means of exit
the stairway to be provided on southerly side of
building, with 8-inch rise and 8-inch tread and
enclosed as per Rule 504 (c).
3. Premises affected, Binghamton, 168 Water
st.; appellant, A. L. Willey. Enclose stairways
with fireproof partitions as per section 79-a.
This is a five-story building erected since Oct. 1,
1913; open lot; combustibles carried; fire alarm
signal system installed; sprinkler installed; 1st
floor used as theatre; exits, two fireproof en-
closed stairways extending from 1st to 5th
floors and a stairway extending from 1st to 2d
floors, enclosed fireproof to 2d floor level only;
exists remote; no egress from roof.
Recommendation: Inasmuch as this stairway
only extends to 2d floor and ample exits pro-
vided, accept same as an auxiliary exit enclosed
to 2d floor level only.
4. Premises affected, Vernon; appellant, Cur-
tice Brothers Co. Provide additional exit from
all floors of 4-story section. (July 23, 1917).
4-story building connected with 1-, 2- and 3-story
sections; no sprinkler; no fire alarm; no com-
bustibles; occupancy, 19; 1st floor, 10; 2d floor,
3; 3d floor, 5; 4th floor, 1. During season of
1917 4th floor was occupied for five days by
one man, during 1916 8 days by one man, dur-
ing 1915 10 days by one man. Building meas-
ures 25 by 30 feet; exits, interior wooden stair-
way from 3d to 4th floors, exterior wooden stair-
way 1st to 3d floors; at 2d floor a doorway to
"Pea Building," in which is located stairway
leading to street; from 3d floor outside stairway

over roof to roof of 1-story building, which is but 7 feet from ground.

Recommendation: Accept the exits from the different floors, and permit but one exit from 4th floor, owing to small area and small occupancy for such a short period of time, on condition that doors to exit stairs on 2d and 3d floors be made to swing outwardly.

5. Premises affected, Mayville; appellant, A. Herperger. 5—Provide enclosure at least 6 feet high on sides of elevator not used for loading. 8—Provide automatic self-closing gates not less than 5 feet 6 inches high. Electric power elevator used to take feed from sub-basement to 1st or main floor; on 1st floor enclosed on three sides with semi-automatic vertical sliding gates at sides used for loading; in basement enclosure raised on two sides and full on one side with vertical sliding gates similar to one on 1st floor; at side used for loading on 1st floor there is no enclosure but rail operated by action of car at opening in shaftway leading to storage shed adjoining building proper; railing arranged to remain up when car is at either terminal; same is down when car is in motion; this arrangement provided to allow use of shaftway as passageway from main building to storage shed; but one regularly employed, but sometimes two extra men are brought in to unload and transfer stock.

Recommendation: Use of shaftway as passageway to be discontinued and door to storage shed be provided in partition between main building and storage shed; enclosure 6 feet high to be provided on two sides not used for loading, and vertical sliding gates similar to those provided on 1st floor to be installed on sides used for loading; railing in basement to be replaced with enclosure 6 feet high.

6. Premises affected, Niagara Falls, 312 Niagara st.; appellant, Niagara Falls Pub. Co. Provide fire alarm signal system. (Aug. 6, 1916.) 3-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; automatic sprinkler with one source of water supply; no combustibles; occupancy, 50; above 1st floor, 40; above 2d floor, 10; exits, one interior fireproof enclosed stairway from 1st to 3d floors; also one interior stairway from 1st to 2d floors continued to 3d floor by means of an outside iron stairway, which exits were accepted by the Commission by variation granted May 19, 1916; exits remote.

Recommendation: In view of the fact that the exits are sufficient for the number employed, and there are but 40 above the 1st floor, accept sprinkler system and waive order for fire alarm signal system.

7. Premises affected, Rochester, Division st.; appellant, J. Henry Walters for Edwards & Co. 2—Additional exit. 3—Prohibit occupancy. (Feb. 15, 1918.) 3-story building of fireproof construction; basement used for power-house; 1st floor for storage of wagons; 2d floor, horse stable; 3d floor, carpenter shop. From 1st to 2d floor at rear of building is a horse ramp; from 2d to 3d floor is stairway enclosed with wooden partitions; employees do not work continuously in carpenter shop; they get out whatever stock is necessary to make repairs throughout the mercantile establishment.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as but one man is employed occasionally in carpenter shop, waive orders while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

8. Premises affected, Rochester, Champney terrace; appellant, Art-in-Business Co. Associated Manufacturers & Merchants. Provide fire alarm system. 4-story concrete building with sprinkler having one source of water supply; the water main being fed by two reservoirs; no fire alarm signal system; occupancy, 590; above 1st floor, 572; above 2d floor, 243; exits, two fireproof enclosed stairways and three fire escapes, one of which conforms to Rule 4-b.

Recommendation: In view of the fact that the building is of fireproof construction with adequate exits, accept sprinkler system and waive order for fire alarm signal system.

9. Premises affected, Watertown, Sewalls Island; appellant, Excelsior Carriage Co. 13—Prohibit occupancy. 14—Additional exit. (May 12, 1918.) 4-story non-fireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open stairs; sprinkler installed with two sources of water supply; combustibles carried; no fire alarm signal system; occupancy, 29; above 1st floor, 20; above 2d floor, 2; exits, one interior stairway along easterly wall from 1st to 4th floors; wooden bridge in form of horizontal exit from 2d floor to office building; a similar bridge from 2d floor to "Kiln Building"; stairway along westerly wall from 2d to 3d floors; imperfect fire escape along the northerly side; wooden baskets are made; 3d floor used for upholstering carriages and covering carriage tops; in back of elevator shaft is a ladder extending from 3d to 4th floors.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as there are but two employees above the 2d floor, accept as second means of exit from 4th floor a stationary wooden ladder from 4th to 3d floors at a point near terminus of present stairway from 3d to 2d floors; accept as means of exit from 2d floor the wooden bridge from westerly corner leading to "Kiln Building."

10. Premises affected, Watertown, 556 State st.; appellant, Riggs & Burdick Co. Provide flush watercloset inside of building for use of employees. Salesroom and storage for supply are in front building at this number. In this building there is one watercloset for office help (1 female) and a watercloset for males; garage is about 30 feet from main building; four employees who use the watercloset in salesroom; in winter two men are employed in garage, who have to go to front building to get stock and parts for repairing autos.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as employees in garage are visiting the front building for stock, etc., waive order and accept use of watercloset in front building while occupancy remains unchanged.

11. Premises affected, Adams Center, N. Y.; appellant, Libby, McNeil & Libby. 19—Provide two legal means of exit from 2d floor of building, same to conform to section 79-a. (June 26, 1918.) Building 2 stories high, erected since Oct. 1, 1913; of concrete and hollow tile construction with a floor area of 9,769 square feet; no sprinkler; no fire alarm signal system; no combustibles carried; occupancy of building, 41; above 1st floor, 8; exits, a 24-inch and 36-inch interior or unenclosed wooden stairway extending from 1st to 2d floor and a 36-inch exterior iron stairway extending from 1st to 2d floors and two imperfect horizontal exits. As required means of exit from this building it is desired to construct a 7-foot ramp along the westerly wall and provide a stairway conforming to section 79-a, southwest corner.

Recommendation: As required means of exit from this building the Department will accept a 7-foot ramp constructed along the westerly wall and extending from ground to 2d floor, same to be provided with a 42-inch railing and the openings, if any, underneath said ramp in the westerly wall to be fireproofed in accordance with Rule 503 of the Industrial Code. Inasmuch as the stairway shown on plan is located in the southwest corner, not remote from the ramp, the Department will accept a stairway conforming to section 79-a of the Labor Law, located in the northeast corner of the building. Any other means of exit from this building are to be maintained as auxiliary exits. The exits herein described are to be considered the required means of exit and so designated.

12. Premises affected, Utica, N. Y., 3-9 Blandina st.; appellant, Wald & Sinnott Realty Co. 1—Properly enclose on all sides both stairways and the landings, platforms and passageways

connected therewith in partitions of fire-resisting material, all floors. 2—Prohibit the operation of factory above 2d floor. (Jan. 11, 1918.) Building erected after Oct. 1, 1913. 5-story non-fireproof tenant factory building with undivided lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles carried; no fire alarm system; occupancy of building approximately 61, 41 of whom are factory employees; 61 above the 1st floor, 41 above the 2d floor; exits, two interior stairs, 1st to 5th floors, not properly enclosed; doors open out and are self-closing; one fire escape on the side of building, not perfect; 1st floor used for stores, 2d for offices, 3d for packing candy by Wald-Carber Co., with 8 factory employees; 4th floor, Walcott Knitting Co. with 22 employees; 5th, same, with 11 employees. Stairway No. 1 extends from Church lane on west side of building to roof, and is enclosed in wood its entire length; escape from roof can be had by pent house and stairway in adjoining building. Stairway No. 2 extends from Blandina street to 5th floor. The fire escape is in conformity with law. It is noted on diagram there is a dead end of about 40 feet on east end of building. Practically all of the employees, mostly females, are located at this point on 4th and 5th floors. If both stairways were fireproofed it would still leave a hazardous condition at this end. The company owns the 3-story building on the east end, which at present is used as a retail store. It is the purpose of the company sometime in the future to raze this building and erect a 5-story building to be a part of their present building, and include in it a fireproof stairway. The company has let a contract for sprinkler system, but on account of scarcity of sprinkler heads the contractor is unable to secure material. The factory building is used by one Walcott Knitting Co. as an annex to their main factory, which is located at Liberty and Washington sts., the building being leased. It is the intention of the company when present war contracts are completed to meet their needs, and this will include the addition of 3-story building as noted above.

Recommendation: That orders No. 1 and No. 2 be waived, provided an iron stairway, properly railed, be erected with door leading to balcony at floor level from 5th floor of main building to roof of 3-story building; that a window at 4th floor be cut down to floor level and door installed, with three iron steps to reach roof of 3-story building; that window at 3d floor be cut to floor level, with door to reach 2-story addition to 3-story building; that iron stairs be erected to reach 2-story addition from 3-story building; that balcony be established at roof level of 2-story addition, with stairs to another balcony midway between roof and ground, with stairs to ground; that this latter balcony be extended far enough on the main building to provide escape from 2d floor of main building; that a passageway 3 feet wide be established from the main hall, 2d floor, to meet a doorway to lead to the proposed fire escape balcony. It is understood that all openings under balconies or that are crossed by fire escape stairs are to be fireproofed.

13. Premises affected, Binghamton, N. Y., 6-10 Wall st.; appellant, American Cigar Co. 3—Provide an approved fire alarm signal system conforming to Rule 375, Class "C." (Jan. 16, 1918.) Building is 4 stories high, of non-fireproof construction, with automatic sprinkler system installed, having one source of water supply; no combustibles carried. Occupancy of building at time of inspection was 234, 236 of whom were above the 1st floor. On a reinspection the occupancy was 236, 173 above the 1st floor and 106 above the 2d floor. The exits are two interior stairways enclosed by the brick side walls of the building and fire-resisting partitions and a fire escape conforming to Rule 4 "B." Fire drills are maintained by the installation of a fire alarm signal system, consisting of push buttons and a bell.

Recommendation: Accept automatic sprinkler system with one source of supply in lieu of providing fire alarm signal system called for in order.

And it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardships in complying with the strict provisions of law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises noted and that in granting the variations herein set forth the spirit of the law will be observed and public safety secured; and

It further appearing that each of the appellants herein has been notified that he would have an opportunity to appear at this time and date and be heard by the Commission, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard, therefore be it

Resolved, by the State Industrial Commission, That the variations herein set forth be and the same hereby are granted to the appellants for the premises noted, with the understanding that same become effective in so long as the conditions remain as of this date.

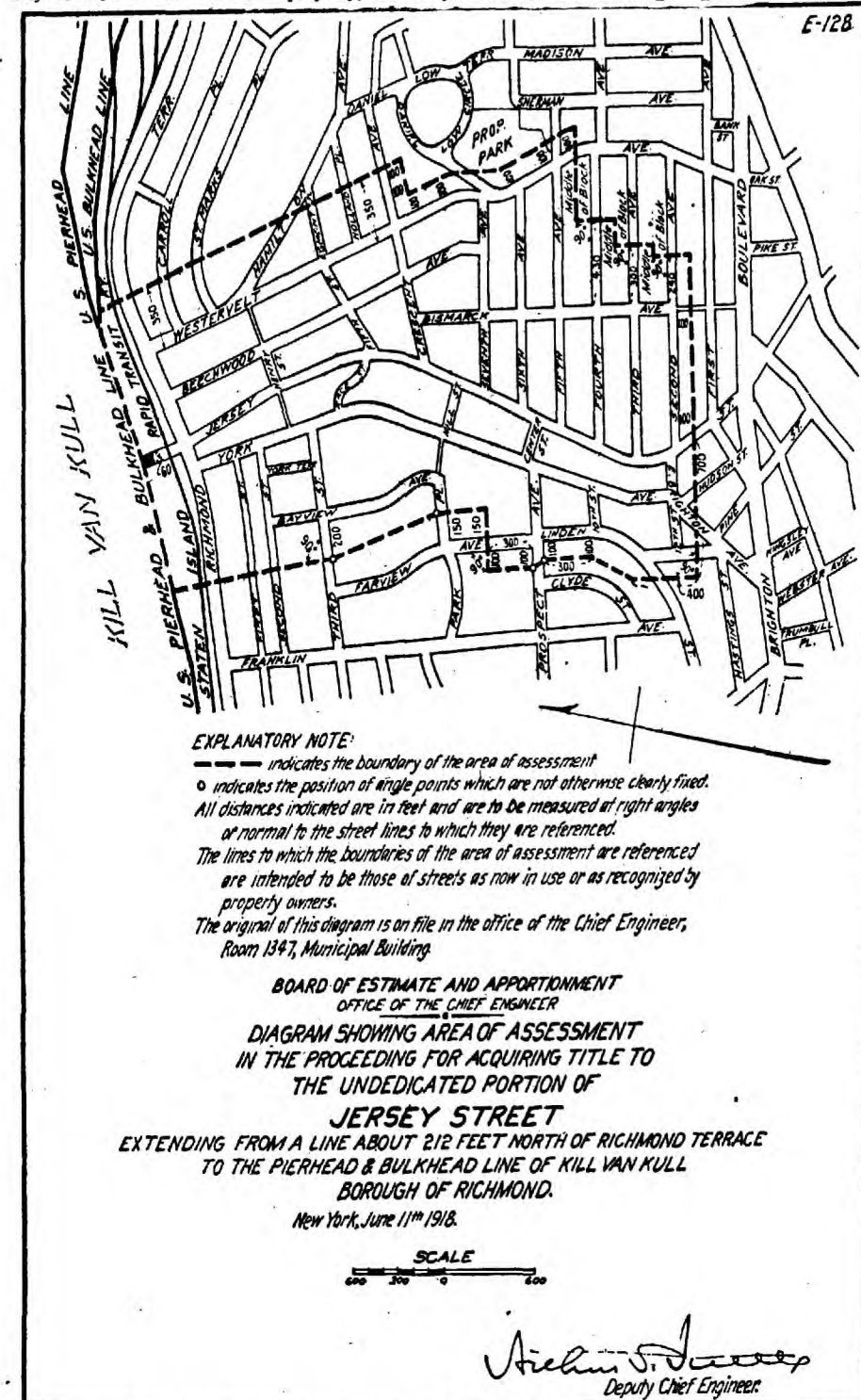

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all openings in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five percentum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
