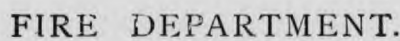

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held October 21, 1886.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Koch.

The minutes of the meeting held October 20, 1886, were read and approved.

The Board then went into Executive Session.

The application of Henry Steers, President Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company, for permission to extend their tracks across West street, at or near the foot of Chambers street, North river, so as to connect with the Erie Railroad Ferry, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5899, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Chambers Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company be, and hereby are, permitted to place and lay tracks and switches upon the newly-made land in front of the Pavonia Ferry, as shown in red lines upon the plan of the premises submitted this day by the Engineer-in-Chief, which plan is hereby approved by this Board, upon the express condition, clearly understood, that said tracks are to remain only during the pleasure of the Board governing the Department of Docks, and provided the said Company shall lay a good and satisfactory stone block pavement, and maintain the same in good order and condition during the continuance of this permit, continuous except as to the rails from eighteen inches southerly of the southerly rail of said tracks to eighteen inches northerly of the northerly rail of said tracks, and between a line seventy feet westerly of the easterly building-line of West street, and a line on the westerly end of said tracks, covering the area colored blue on said plan above referred to; and further provided that it is distinctly understood that this permit is revocable at any time, and that the said company shall, before proceeding to do any work under this permit, file in this Department a written agreement, satisfactory as to form, that they will at any time within twenty days of the receipt of a written notice from the Department of Docks so to do, remove all tracks, or other structures built or placed under this permit, from the premises, and restore the premises to their present condition. All the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The application of C. H. Mallory & Co., for permission to put tin roof on shed on Pier 21 East river, and to cover sides with corrugated galvanized iron was,

On motion, taken from the table, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, that permission be and hereby is granted to C. H. Mallory and Co., lessees, to put a tin roof on shed on Pier 21 East river, and to cover sides with corrugated galvanized iron, provided the same shall be done in accordance with the building laws applying to the City of New York, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, recommending an increase in the pay of painters employed by the Department, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that the pay of painters employed in this Department be and hereby is fixed at the rate of 35 cents per hour; to take effect on and after the 21st day of October 1886.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief requesting the appointment of a Clerk to the "General Repairs Force" Assistant Engineer and Draughtsman, was,

On motion, laid on the table, and Commissioner Koch authorized to confer with the Civil Service Supervisory and Examining Board, respecting the appointment of a Clerk.

A communication from the Comptroller of the City in reference to the Long Island Ferry Company was ordered to be placed on file and the action of Commissioner Koch in replying thereto was approved.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, requesting the appointment of a Pile-Driver Engineer, was received and ordered to be placed on file, and,

On motion, Dennis F. Eagan, Engineer, who was suspended July 23, 1886, was restored to duty in the service of the Department.

Commissioners Koch and Matthews, who were authorized to negotiate for the purchase of 100 feet of wharf or bulkhead property on West street, next north of Beach street, North river, presented a report thereon, which was accepted and adopted and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

OCTOBER 21, 1886.

To the Board of Docks:

The undersigned having been, by resolution of the Board adopted October 8, 1886, appointed to investigate and report in relation to the purchase of certain property between Beach and Hubert streets, bordering on the North or Hudson river, do respectfully

REPORT:

That we have examined the said property, ascertained at what price it can be purchased and from whom; that the following is a description thereof, viz.:

The bulkhead, wharf, or dock property on West street, in the City of New York, between Beach and Hubert streets. Beginning at a point on the westerly side of West street at the point of intersection of said westerly side of West street with a line drawn in prolongation of the northerly line of Beach street, and extending northerly along West street to property now belonging to the City of New York, late the property of Elizabeth Ogden Brower, deceased, one hundred feet, more or less, together with the water-rights, benefits, advantages and emoluments thereto belonging, including land under water being part of the same premises described in and conveyed by certain deeds from Gideon Lee and others and Sheppard Knapp and wife to William Chamberlain and George A. Phelps, bearing date March 13, 1865, and recorded in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, in Liber 930 of Conveyances, pages 583 and 585, May 3, 1865, claimed as the property of Phelps Brothers and others, for the sum of \$65,000, to be more particularly described; that the price at which it can be bought is the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000); that the names of the parties in interest and alleged owners are as follows: Theodore Timpon and Frank Phelps, as executors and trustees, and Mary B. Chamberlain, as executrix and trustee of the last will and testament of William S. Chamberlain, deceased, and George A. Phelps, Charles H. Phelps, Howard Phelps, Harriet B. Brooke and Julia M. Winter, heirs of George A. Phelps, deceased; that the City is the owner of the property immediately adjoining on the south and on the north, and is also the owner of the Pier (new 26) recently immediately fronting on said property; that annexed hereto is a diagram of said property adjoining it on the north and south, including the pier on the west of it; that the owners of said property propose to release the City from all claims for damages alleged to have been done to the property by reason of this Department having some years ago partially filled in front thereof.

Considering the situation and location of the said property and of the ownership by the City of the property adjoining it on the north, south and west, we are of the opinion that it would be for the best interest of the City to purchase it and accordingly recommend that the Department of Docks enter into an agreement with the owners of said property for the purchase of the same at said price (\$65,000), provided a good title can be obtained, and certify said agreement to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to be by them disposed of according to law.

Commissioners Koch and Matthews, who were authorized to examine and report respecting the contract formerly entered into with the private owners of four hundred and six feet six inches of wharf or bulkhead property on South street, between Old Slip and Wall street, and Piers 12, 13 and 14, East river, presented a report thereon, which was accepted and adopted and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

NEW YORK, October 21, 1886.

To the Board of Docks:

The undersigned having been by resolution of the Board, adopted October 8, 1886, appointed a committee to investigate and report in relation to the purchase of certain wharf property between Old Slip and Wall street, on East river, respectfully

REPORT:

That we have examined the said property, ascertained at what price it can be purchased, and from whom. That the following is a description thereof, viz.: All the bulkhead or wharf rights or property on the easterly side of South street (not now owned by the People of the State of New York or the Corporation of the City of New York), together with their respective interests in Piers 12, 13 and 14, East river, commencing at a point on the bulkhead where, if the line of the northerly side of Old Slip were extended, it would intersect the said easterly side of South street; and running thence northerly along said bulkhead, in front of and opposite to stores, with street numbers 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54 and 55 South street, and in front of Gouverneur lane and Jones lane, a total length of four hundred four feet six and a half inches, together with the water rights, benefits, advantages and emoluments thereto belonging, being the same premises more particularly described and referred to in two several agreements entered into by the Department of Docks on the 20th day of November, 1882, with the executors of the estate of Moses Taylor and others, and on the 19th day of December, 1882, with Edmund H. Schermerhorn, Harriet D. Potter and others (see pages 308, 309, 310, 311, 312 and 313, and pages 343 to 351, inclusive, of the Annual Report of 1883), for the sum or price of \$1,000 per lineal foot, front of bulkhead, including their respective interests in Piers 12, 13 and 14, East river, or for the total sum of \$404,541.66. That the diagrams of said property, fairly representing its position on South street, were printed in the official report of the Dock Department, with the contracts or agreement above referred to. Considering the situation and location of the said property, we are of the opinion that it would be for the best interests of the City to purchase it, and accordingly recommend that the Department of Docks enter into an agreement with the owners of said property for the purchase of the same at said price of \$404,541.66, provided a good title can be obtained, and certify said agreement to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to be by them disposed of according to law.
