A. Burr and Joseph Mattison assume the responsibility for any damage or in-

jury that may result during or subsequent to the construction of said passage-way; the work to be under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works, and that the permission hereby given shall continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent bears, and other noxious or dangerous animals, from going at large or being led through any streets, avenues, or public places in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Any person who shall permit any bear, or other noxious or dangerous animal, to run at large, or who shall lead any such animal, with a chain or rope or other appliance, whether such animal be muzzled or unmuzzled, in any street, avenue, lane, highway, or public place within the corporate limits of this city, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished pursuant to the provisions of sections 20 and 21, of an act relative to the powers of the Common Council of the City of New York and the Criminal Courts of said City, passed by the Legislature of the State of New York, January 23, 1833, and to the provisions of section 5, of article 4, of an act in rela-

tion to the Police Department of the City and County of New York, passed April 13, 1853.

SEC. 2. The Commissioners of Police are hereby required to enforce, rigidly, the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
