The 833 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.37 against 22.84 for the previous week, and 30.31

The 333 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.37 against 22.84 for the previous week, and 30.31 for the corresponding week of 1893.

The decrease of 17 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 11 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 9 from measles, and of 39 from phthisis, partially offset by an increase of 10 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 8 from heart diseases, and of 16 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, and from measles and scarlet fever in the Nineteenth Ward.
