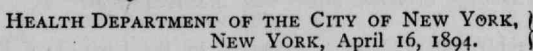

Work Performed by the Sanitary Bureau for Week ending April 14, 1894.

There were 16,600 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 466 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.

There were 252 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 27 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 1 permit.

There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 42 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 25 permits.

The 833 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.37 against 22.84 for the previous week, and 30.31 for the corresponding week of 1893.

The decrease of 17 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 11 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 9 from measles, and of 39 from phthisis, partially offset by an increase of 10 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 8 from heart diseases, and of 16 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, and from measles and scarlet fever in the Nineteenth Ward.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.
