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BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Thursday, May 25, 1905, at 11.17 o'clock A. M.
Present—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Sterling, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel.

The reading of the minutes of meeting of May 11, 1905, was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating and paving the roadway of Spring place, from Third avenue to Fulton avenue, and from Franklin avenue to Boston road, with asphalt blocks on a concrete foundation, also setting curbstones and flagging where necessary, and objections filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, in behalf of Helen Richardson, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 12, 1905.

Mr. Flannery, attorney, appeared by representative, and requested that the consideration of the assessment be postponed.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer in West Fifteenth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, and objections of Henry Eggers, filed by Michael J. Mulqueen, attorney, and of James S. Herman, owner, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 12, 1905.

Mr. Herman was heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that his property and that of others connect with a private sewer and that the sewer in question is therefore unnecessary and of no benefit.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for alteration and improvement to sewer in One Hundred and Twentieth street, between Amsterdam avenue and Morningside avenue, West, and objections filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, in behalf of Mary G. Pinkney, and testimony introduced before the Board of Assessors in said matter, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 18, 1905. The objections of D. Willis James, filed with the Clerk of the Board of Revision of Assessments on May 24, 1905, by Isidor Grayhead, attorney, were also presented.

The Board of Assessors reported that it had made a reduction in the assessment of 20 per cent., as determined by it at meeting held May 9, 1905.

Mr. Shaw, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment as reduced, for the reason alleged that the original sewer was ample for all purposes of the property, and that the construction of the present sewer was due to the reregulating, regrading, etc., of the street, thereby lowering the grade thereof and bringing the original sewer near the surface; and also that no proper petition had been filed for the work.

Mr. Grayhead, attorney, appeared.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to make an additional pro rata reduction in the present assessment of 10 per cent., and that the assessment as so reduced be confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging West One Hundred and Ninety-second street, from Audubon avenue to Wadsworth avenue, and objections of Henry Morgenthau, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 18, 1905.

Mr. Flannery, attorney, appeared by representative, and asked that the consideration of the assessment be postponed.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewers in Second avenue, east and west sides, between One Hundred and Ninth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, with alteration and improvement to curves at the southeast and southwest corners of One Hundred and Tenth street and Second avenue, and objections of F. W. Beinhaur, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney; A. Pinkowitz and others, by Edward W. Murphy, attorney, and of Albert Mede, by Michael J. Mulqueen, attorney, with testimony introduced before the Board of Assessors in said matter, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of May 12, 1905.

Mr. Murphy, attorney, appeared in opposition to the assessment, and also as representative of Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, on the ground that two sewers were built, while that but for the railroad in the centre of the avenue, one sewer would have been ample for the needs of the property; also that the railroad had not been assessed for the benefit derived by it; and further that no petition had been filed for the work in question.

No others appearing, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to make a pro rata reduction of 10 per cent. in the assessment, and that the assessment list, as so reduced, be confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

At 11.40 o'clock A. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
