COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the President, Borough of Brooklyn:

The City of New York,
Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn,
Brooklyn, November 17, 1906.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Upon recommendation of the Comptroller's office and with the consent of the Department of Street Cleaning, it has been decided to place the work of

removing the garbage from Wallabout Market in charge of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. In order to do this, it will be necessary to ask for an issue of \$3,500 Special Revenue Bonds, the proceeds to be used by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the purpose of removing the garbage from Wallabout Market. I hereby ask your Board to adopt a resolution providing for such an issue, the moneys to be used as follows:

To remove the garbage from the market to the Street Cleaning Department scows at the foot of Clinton street would necessitate the employment of two laborers at \$750 each per annum; three iron Street Cleaning Department carts at \$150 each, and the additional hiring of two horses and drivers at \$1,000 per annum, making a total of \$3,500.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In connection with the resolution authorizing the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding \$15,000, for the purpose of fitting up and equipping the offices occupied by the Bureau of Assessments and Arrears of this Department, in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Manhattan, which resolution was adopted by the Board of Aldermen at its meeting held on Tuesday, November 13, 1906, I beg to request the passage of an additional resolution, permitting the expenditure of this money without public letting.

The work to be performed is of such a character that an accurate estimate or specification cannot be prepared, for the reason that a great deal of the old office furniture can be taken apart and altered to suit the requirements of the new offices, and just how much of this old furniture can be used will only be determined as the work progresses.

In the letting of contracts on work of this description it has been the experience in nearly every case that extra-work arises which cannot be foreseen previous to the commencement of the work, but shows itself during its progress. These extra items always reach a considerable amount and can be avoided only by the work being performed without contract, so that the changes and additions can be made as the work goes on. Furthermore, if this work is let by contract it will necessarily cause a delay of at least six weeks; and for the reasons previously stated, and in view of the fact that I desire that the work shall commence at once, I most earnestly ask that your honorable Board give favorable consideration to my request.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred, on October 23, 1906 (Minutes, page 484), the annexed resolution, in favor of an issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$3,500, for repairs to building used for Second District Court, Borough of The Bronx, respectfully

REPORTS:

A peculiar state of affairs is shown through this application. About three years ago a site was acquired and Corporate Stock was authorized to the extent of over a half a million dollars for the construction of a municipal and police court house at One Hundred and Sixty-first street and Third avenue, The Bronx, to take the place of the old building at One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street. Investigation shows that the foundation of this large building has been built in all this time, and the Committee found one or two men working on the job, so that it will probably be completed some time in the far future. Pending this construction the old court house has been condemned as dangerous, and the two courts therefore have been compelled to look for temporary quarters. These were found through the Sinking Fund Commission authorizing the use of a certain building situated at One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Washington avenue, which had been taken for park purposes, and an appropriation of \$7,500 was made by this Board in May, 1906, for the purpose of fitting up the necessary rooms.

This present application is made to complete the work. In order to thoroughly understand this matter a sub-committee went over the building with Judge Tierney, and, as a result of this, feel that if this building is to be used permanently for court or other municipal purposes, that it will be well spent, but it is against it if it is to be torn down when the new court house is available. The building is a large, solidly-built brick structure, and the Committee fail to see the advisability of the City's having taken premises involving the purchase and destruction of this building for park purposes. Comptroller Metz has been spoken to and he has agreed to recommend that after the large court house is in use, this building be used for other municipal purposes, and for this, and also because the courts must have accommodation for several years, your Committee feel compelled to recommend the adoption of the annexed substitute resolution.

Reports of Committee on Bridges and Tunnels—

No. 376.

The Committee on Bridges and Tunnels, to whom was referred, on March 6, 1906 (Minutes, page 948), the annexed communication from the Bureau of Franchises in relation to the use of streets in the Borough of The Bronx by the Hudson River Railroad Company, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that said communication be placed on file.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York,
Bureau of Franchises, No. 280 Broadway,
March 5, 1906.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—There has been referred to this Bureau your resolution of February 20, 1906, as follows:

"Whereas, It is alleged that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company have taken possession or are about to take possession of several blocks at One Hundred and Fiftieth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, for the purpose of the construction of a conduit for transmitting power from the main line of said railroad to the Pocahontas branch of said railroad, and said work has already been commenced or is about to be commenced;

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is requested to cause its Bureau of Franchises to investigate the said matter and to report to the Board of Aldermen as well as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as to whether the said railroad company or any other corporation or individual has secured the legal right to the use of the City's streets for the purpose mentioned in the preamble hereof."

Replying thereto I beg to advise you that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company is compelled by chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903 to use electricity as the motive power in Park avenue, south of the Harlem river, beginning July 1, 1908. Section 6 of that chapter provides that the City shall afford to said railroad company all such reasonable facilities as may be required to carry into effect the provisions of that act.

Chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903 provided for the abolition, discontinuance and avoidance of certain grade crossings in The City of New York of the Spuyten Duyvil

and Port Morris Railroad Company, and provided for the change in route from the Kingsbridge road to the Hudson river.

Chapter 424 of the Laws of 1903 authorized the City to grant a right of way in St. Mary's Park in the Borough of The Bronx, to the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, and to acquire part of the company's roadway for a street.

Pursuant to the provisions of the foregoing acts, and particularly chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company applied on August 24, 1905, to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a permit for the transmission of electric current for the operation of its railroad within The City of New York. The company proposes to transmit electric current by the use of ducts or subways and also by the use of aerial transmission lines, that is, wires strung upon steel poles.

The application, in part, reads as follows:

"The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company therefore requests your permission to construct ducts as follows:

"To construct a duct system underneath Railroad avenue on the east side of the railroad right of way, from the Harlem river, near East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, to One Hundred and Fiftieth street.

"To construct a duct system underneath Westchester avenue and One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from the point where the Port Morris Branch of the railroad company crosses said Westchester avenue to the point where One Hundred and Fiftieth street is intersected by the line of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company.

"To construct a duct system underneath Kingsbridge road and One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, between the Harlem Division of the railroad company and the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the said railroad company."

The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on October 13, 1905, addressed the Corporation Counsel advising him of the application of the company and asking whether the permits could be granted. The Corporation Counsel, under date of December 27, 1905, replied and advised the Commissioner that he could lawfully grant a permit to construct a duct system underneath Railroad (Park) avenue, from the Harlem river, near One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, to One Hundred and Fiftieth street.

As to the other streets referred to, namely, Westchester avenue and One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from the point where the Port Morris Branch of the railroad company crosses said Westchester avenue, to the point where One Hundred and Fiftieth street is intersected by the line of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company; and underneath Kingsbridge road and One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, between the Harlem Division of the railroad company and the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the said railroad company, the Corporation Counsel held that in neither of those cases has the railroad company any franchise of any nature whatsoever through the streets specified, and that the company cannot use the same without obtaining a franchise therefor.

In the Borough of The Bronx temporary permits were issued on January 16, 1906, to the railroad company to dig what is known as test pits in One Hundred and Fiftieth street. These permits grant no franchise rights and constitute mere temporary permits, and were issued by the Bureau of Highways.

The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has issued a permanent permit (which has not as yet been accepted by the company) for the construction of electrical subways along Park avenue, from the Harlem river, near One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, to One Hundred and Fiftieth street, in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel above cited.

The Secretary of the Department to-day informed my representative that in view of that opinion, no permanent permit whatsoever will be issued for the use of streets in which the Corporation Counsel advised that the company had no franchise, until such time as the Corporation Counsel stated that such permit could lawfully be issued.

The records of this office disclose no rights to use that part of One Hundred and Fiftieth street between Railroad avenue and Third avenue, by the railroad company, other than those indicated in the foregoing.

An examination which was made of the surface of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, between the limits stated, would indicate that the test pits had been made. It would therefore appear that for any further rights in One Hundred and Fiftieth street, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company would be obliged to apply to the proper local authorities for a franchise.

For similar reasons to those urged in the report of the Committee on Rules upon introductory No. 143, the said committee hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Bridges and Tunnels be and it is hereby requested to hold a public hearing upon introductory No. 193; and be it further

Resolved, That after such public hearing the Committee on Bridges and Tunnels shall report to the Board of Aldermen whether, in its opinion, the investigations proposed by introductory No. 193 shall be made by a special committee appointed for that purpose under the rules.

Whereas, It has recently come to light that the New York and Long Island Railroad has attempted to take by stealth a franchise worth to the City not less than ten million dollars, and with no pretence of a right, save some expired permits granted a generation ago to one John Steinway, the said company has secretly constructed a subway a half a mile or more in extent beneath the City streets; and

Whereas, For several months past it has been repeatedly asserted at the office of August Belmont & Co. that work on the tunnel was being confined to private property, and was publicly announced by the Mayor and the President of the Borough of Manhattan that all permits to said company for excavation under the streets had been revoked, pending the establishment of the validity of the said Steinway permits; therefore be it

Resolved, That a Special Committee of five be appointed by the Board to inquire if any official of the City administration, or of any of the boroughs, has given any consent or permit of any nature for this unlawful seizure of the streets; and said Committee is further directed to report to this Board, in case it should develop that no such permits have been issued, who was negligent in not enforcing the law against blasting without the consent of the Fire Department, and who allowed the erection of sheds and other obstructions in Forty-second street for the use of said railroads in its unlawful purpose.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred, on July 31, 1906 (Minutes, page 698), the annexed ordinance in favor of regulating uniform of telephone employees, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee has given this subject careful consideration, realizing that the proposed ordinance would afford some protection against imposition on the part of those impersonating employees of the telephone companies, who thus gain access to premises for criminal purposes.

Your Committee, however, is of opinion that it is not within the power of the Board to provide the remedy as suggested; but that it is rather a matter for action by the State Legislature, to which, if necessary, application should be made.

It therefore recommends that the proposed ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the uniforming of employees of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company, of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

First—Hereafter all male employees of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company whose duties require them to construct, erect, place, repair or inspect the wires or instruments of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company that have been placed or shall be placed or removed, inspected or repaired in the public streets and avenues in The City of New York, or in any dwelling house, apartment house, flat house, stores or other public places, such employees shall wear a uniform and cap and shield for the purpose of identification of such employee, said uniform, cap and shield shall be provided and selected in color and design by the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company.

Second—Each and every employee of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company who violates section 1 of this Ordinance while in the performance of his duty shall be guilty of misdemeanor and on his conviction by a Court of competent jurisdiction he shall be fined the sum of ten (\$10) dollars.

Third—Any person who wears the uniform, cap and shield, or either portion of said uniform, cap or shield, without authority of the New York Telephone Company and New York and New Jersey Telephone Company shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction by a Court of competent jurisdiction shall be fined the sum of fifty dollars (\$50); in default of the payment of said fine they shall be committed to jail for the period of fifty (50) days.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on October 16, 1906 (Minutes, page 427), the annexed ordinance in favor of regulating the removal of buildings in the Borough of The Bronx, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee has given this matter the careful consideration which its importance deserves.

The attention of your Committee has been called to a practice which prevails, particularly in the Borough of The Bronx, and which is seriously detrimental to the interests of the City. It consists in buying buildings on property acquired by the City for new streets or other developments, and transferring them to other sites known to be required for City purposes. Upon acquiring such new site the City pays for the building; it is bought in again by its owner and again transferred to a new site to be acquired by the City, and this process is repeated so long as the structure can resist the strain of constant removals.

The practice is an expensive one for the City, and should be condemned.

President Haffen is emphatic in his desire to put an end to such a situation, and Corporation Counsel Ellison, in an opinion rendered upon the subject, advises an amendment to the ordinance affecting the question which will provide that the permission to be given by a Borough President for the removal of a building along or across a highway may be granted or withheld, in his discretion.

Section 269 of the City Ordinances relates to this matter, and your Committee can see no good reason why the ordinance so amended should not prevail throughout the entire City, as there are other boroughs to which the practice alluded to may be extended with like injurious effect.

Your Committee therefore recommends the annexed substitute Ordinance:

(SUBSTITUTE.)

AN ORDINANCE providing for the removal of buildings along and across the highways of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 269 of the Ordinances of The City of New York, adopted October 30, 1906, and approved November 8, 1906, is hereby amended by adding thereto at the end thereof the following:

"Such permit of the President of said Borough may be granted or refused by him in his discretion.

"No person shall remove or cause or permit to be removed, or shall aid or assist in removing, any building into, along or across any street, avenue, lane, alley or public place in The City of New York without the permit of the President of the Borough in which such street, avenue, lane, alley or public place may be situated, under the penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for each offence."

Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

(ORIGINAL.)

AN ORDINANCE to amend "An Ordinance to provide for the removal of buildings into, along or across any lane or avenue or any public place in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York."

"Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

"No person shall remove, or cause or permit to be removed, or shall aid or assist in removing any building into, along or across any street, avenue, lane, alley or public place in the Borough of The Bronx in The City of New York, without permission of the President of said Borough, under the penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) for each offence."

The permission of the President of the said Borough may be granted or refused by him in his discretion.

West end of the triangular park at the junction of Duane street and Hudson street.

East side of West street, about fifty (50) feet north of Hubert street.

At the junction of Greenwich street and Dey street, fifty (50) feet north of the south side of Dey street.

In the centre of Crotona avenue, at its junction with Boston road.

South of the Public Comfort Station in Hanover square.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
