STATEMENT OF WORK PERFORMED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS OF THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS DURING THE THREE MONTHS FROM JANUARY 1 TO MARCH 31, 1904.

Owing to the very severe weather the work consisted largely of maintenance, the construction work having been suspended, except contract work on Coney Island bulkhead, the retaining wall in Sunset Park and the coping and railing around Williamsburg Bridge Park.

Prospect Park.

The work in this park included the cleaning of various paths during the numerous snow storms in January and February, the leveling and spreading of snow on the drives during the sleighing season, and the cleaning and maintenance of the ice on the lake for skating purposes. The number of days on which skating was possible and permitted was forty-two (42), while sleighing was had for forty-seven (47) days, the largest number in the existence of Prospect Park. After the disappearance of the snow and ice it was necessary to fill in numerous washouts all over the park and to repair the roads quite extensively. Most of this work was accomplished during the month of March, and is now nearly completed.

Two pruning gangs were employed wherever possible, thinning out and pruning the plantations and removing over one hundred and fifty (150) dead trees.

In the shops the work of repairing and painting the rolling stock was carried on as usual, the men working on half-time.

The greenhouse men were employed in propagating, etc., getting ready for the annual flower show at Easter, which promises to be the most successful in years.

The animals in the menagerie were properly cared for, and despite the intense cold of the winter, I am gratified to report that we did not lose a single animal, while the bear family was augmented by two cubs. On the other hand, plant life was not so fortunate in escaping the ravages of a winter remarkable for its long continued cold weather. It is no exaggeration to say that fully twenty-five per cent. (25%) of our rhododendrons and other semi-hardy flowering shrubs have been destroyed, and it will take nearly ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to replace these plants.

The lawns were treated to a generous layer of fertilizer, about thirty-three hundred (3,300) cubic yards of old horse manure having been purchased for that purpose.

Fort Greene Park.

This park, always hard to keep in good condition on account of the peculiar formation of the grounds and the very large number of visitors it accommodates, has been given as thorough an overhauling as the weather permitted. Washouts of the slopes, which were numerous, were promptly filled and repaired, and nearly all the shrubbery was pruned.

Institute Park.

This park, only lately completed, required special care during the winter months. Owing to the still very porous and unsettled condition of the lawns and slopes, considerable damage was done in March by floods. All repairs, however, have been completed and the park is in a satisfactory condition, except the plantations, which have been considerably thinned out by the frost and will have to be replenished. The trees and shrubs required have been purchased and are ready for spring planting.

Seaside Park and Concourse, Coney Island.

This park was quite severely damaged during the winter; about seventy per cent. (70%) of the shrubbery was destroyed, and must be replaced. On the other hand, the trees have done remarkably well, and none have been lost.

The beach has been further encroached upon by the sea, and if some additional shore protection is not provided it may soon disappear entirely.

Land in the vicinity of Seaside Park is held at a figure approaching fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) per acre, and there are still left to this Department about thirty (30) acres; the remainder of the original seventy-five (75) acres is under the waters of the Atlantic ocean.

The bulkhead at the foot of Ocean parkway, although severely damaged by the terrific storm of last October, has undoubtedly saved the park and the lower end of the parkway from destruction.

A contract was let late last year to J. M. Briggs, for the repairing and partial reconstruction of this bulkhead and the stone wall marking the boundary of the Coney Island concourse, at a cost of nineteen thousand three hundred and eighty dollars and twenty-nine cents (\$19,380.29). Work on this contract was carried on all winter while the weather permitted, and is now completed.

The open shelter and the new comfort house on the beach were considerably damaged, the latter so much so that it will have to be taken up and removed to another part of the grounds.

The tiling laid last year and demolished by the sea has been collected and is ready for relaying.

Highland Park.

Active work on the construction of this park has been suspended during the winter months. The small force of men employed in the park were put on half time, and used in cleaning up the walks and gutters and thinning out the underbrush in the woods. The system of drives laid out through the park is practically completed, and it is the intention to begin the construction of the walks contemplated some time in April.

Forest Park.

Besides caring for the drives, bridges and buildings in this park little work was done during the winter months.

The construction of nine additional holes for the golfers was started early in March and was carried on as the weather permitted. The full eighteen-hole course will be completed and opened to the public by May 30. Considerable cleaning up and thinning out was done in the wooded portion of the park.

Sunset Park.

A contract was let last year for the construction of a rustic retaining wall around two sides of this park. The work was interrupted by the frost, but has been taken up again in March and is now practically completed. The contractor is Bart Dunn, and the consideration twenty-five thousand four hundred and forty-one dollars (\$25,441). The paths through the park were kept open and cleaned during the winter, and work on grading the slope on Forty-first street has been resumed as soon as the weather permitted. The lake in the centre of the property was used for skating during the season, and in January and February there were forty-five (45) days of skating.

Small Parks.

The usual winter work, such as cleaning paths, gutters and basins, was carried forward in all of the smaller parks of this system. The trees and shrubs were pruned by the men in charge of the various parks under the direction of the Arboriculturists.

In City Park quite a number of old, decayed trees, which were a menace to those frequenting it, were cut down and carted away. The walks of the park having been laid some twenty-five (25) years ago are in a deplorable condition, and it has become necessary to resurface the same.

The playgrounds, both for boys and girls, being part of the projected Williamsburg Park, were kept open all winter. The one for girls at Manhattan and Driggs avenues was flooded and converted into a skating pond. It was open for skating on forty-seven (47) days in January and February.

The work of fencing and otherwise improving the park and playground under the Williamsburg Bridge was carried on when weather permitted. By the 1st of May all work of this nature will be completed, and the park will be seeded, sodded and planted and turned over to the public by May 30.

Parkways.

Very little work beyond care and maintenance could be done on the parkways in this borough during the past three months, owing to climatic conditions. The severe winter will necessitate extensive repairs all along the line, and the westerly traffic road of the Ocean parkway will have to be resurfaced its entire length. The material for this work is now being advertised for, and the work will be done by park labor. The same is true of portions of Pitkin avenue, where building operations were carried on all winter, and the parkway is now in a very dilapidated condition.

It was contemplated to make numerous improvements on the Eastern parkway during the coming season, but the fact that a large water main is to be laid on this thoroughfare during the coming spring and summer precludes any work beyond maintenance there.

The bridge path on the east side of the Ocean parkway was partly resurfaced with a layer of screened bank gravel.

The Speedway was kept in fair condition during the month of March and previous to that everything possible was done to facilitate sleighing on this popular drive, which was had during forty-seven (47) days in January and February.

Shore Road and Bay Ridge Parkway.

Very little work was done on these parkways during the winter, except the cleaning of paths and gutters. The Shore road suffered most severely from the winter storms, washouts occurring along the steep banks, and it will be necessary to take steps at once for the building up of the slopes or else the roads must be closed and traffic suspended thereon. Plans are now being formulated to this end, preparatory to action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which body has been asked for funds toward making safe the roadway and carrying out the contemplated improvements.

Slocum Statue.

At the intersection of Bedford avenue and Eastern parkway a statue to the memory of General Henry W. Slocum has been erected, and the same is now completed in every detail and may be unveiled at the pleasure of the City authorities.

Revenue from Parks and Parkways.

During the three months from January 1 to March 31, inclusive, the sum of two thousand nine hundred and eighty-six dollars and nineteen cents (\$2,986.19) was received from rents of houses and revenue from park privileges, which amount was turned over to Hon. Patrick Keenan, City Chamberlain, for deposit to the credit of the "Revenue Fund."

Appeal 63—F. S. C. 23 of 1904, No. 10 West Twenty-ninth street, Mortimer C. Merritt, appellant. Referred to Chief Croker for recommendations and report.

Appeal 64—N. B. 246 of 1904, Nos. 217 to 221 East Twenty-second street:

"Brick partition wall should be built where distance between bearing walls exceed 26 feet (section 31 of the Code).

"The method of supporting floor beams with steel girders being equally good.

"To allow the use of steel beams for wood floor beams supports in each tier except the first tier, and said girder to consist of 6-inch 18-pound steel I beam, set upon proper templates, etc.

"By erecting of brick walls, as called for in objection No. 8, would diminish size of rooms, which have successfully passed the Tenement House Commissioner." Dismissed for reasons stated in communication from Superintendent of Buildings.

Appeal 65—F. S. C. 24 of 1904, No. 54 East Eleventh street, William Pilgrim, appellant. Referred to Chief Croker for report and recommendations.

Appeal 66—N. B. 197 of 1904, Nos. 10 and 12 East Twenty-eighth street, C. F. Rogers, appellant:

"2. Pent-house constitutes the 13th story, that building should be constructed of incombustible materials throughout.

"10. All exterior walls of pent-house should be brick and the sizes of beams and columns supporting same increased when necessary to support the additional load.

"2. Pent-house being only 150 feet in height above the centre of curb, it should not be constructed of incombustible materials.

"10. Exterior walls of angle and T iron in this case would be better than brick.

"2. If he can be allowed to build the building without the use of incombustible materials throughout.

"10. If he can construct the walls of angle and T irons with terra cotta block filling instead of brick walls.

"2. As the pent-house is only 150 feet in height above curb and 50 per cent. of the roof area and being only used for storage, the appellant sees no reason why it should be considered a story.

"10. To construct the walls of pent-house of brick would be adding unnecessary weight to the columns and girders, and as the appellant thinks that an angle iron and T iron construction filled with terra cotta blocks would be a better construction in this case."

Adjourned for one week.

Appeal 67—Alterations 99 of 1904, Nos. 335 to 345 Rider avenue, Borough of The Bronx, C. F. Hoppe, appellant. Mr. Hoppe appeared before the Board.

"Skysign exceeding 9 feet in height not allowed (see section 144 of the Code).

"The drawings for this sign were prepared by the mechanical department of the New York Edison Company, and the draughtsman in charge of this work considered only the necessity of calculating the steel frames supporting the sign for the proper connections to the present building and also for wind pressure and not knowing of the existing requirements of the Code limiting the height of structures of this kind made no provision for same. The company has no intention of evading the requirements of the Building Code in any particular. But as this sign has already been erected at a cost of \$1,200, we would respectfully petition that section 144 of the Building Code be amended in this particular instance."

On motion, denied.

Appeal 68—Alteration 442 of 1904, Nos. 227 to 231 East Nineteenth street, Anthony Vendrasco, appellant. Mr. Vendrasco appeared before the Board.

"A building used as a hospital, over 35 feet in height, must be fireproof.

"The requirements of section 105 of the Building Code do not strictly apply in this case, as the building is more in the nature of a convent, to be used temporarily for hospital purposes.

"Whether in altering this building the same should be made fireproof.

"That to compel the fireproofing of the building for these alterations would defeat the charitable purposes contemplated.

"That the building is to be used for hospital purposes only as an overflow for the Columbus Hospital, and that in the near future it is intended to be replaced by a new and permanent building."

On motion, approved on condition that fireproof doors be provided to each of the openings through division walls on all stories.

Adjourned.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
