#### PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—The resolution recently adopted by the Board of Aldermen relative to the establishment by the Public Service Commission of a Bureau to examine gas and electric light matters, and to test the quality, purity and pressure of gas supplied, etc., has been considered by the Commission.

In reply, I beg to advise you that the Commission has maintained since its creation a Bureau for the testing of gas and electric light meters. In accordance with the orders of the Commission, every gas meter is tested before it is put in use, and another test is made whenever complaint is made, as provided by the statute. No electric light meter may be used which is not of an approved type, and the Commission has ordered that every meter not of these types be removed and an approved meter put in its place. All meters tested before being put in use are tested without charge to the consumer, but under the law a reasonable charge is to be made for tests upon complaint. If the meter is found to be fast beyond the limit prescribed by law, the fee is paid by the corporation. If the meter is slow, the complainant pays the fee.

The Commission is making an investigation into the other matters mentioned in your resolution, although tests are now being made by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. If it is found that further action should be taken by the Commission because of the broader powers which this Commission has, this will be done after our investigation is completed.

Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge receipt of a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 26, 1910, requesting the Public Service Commission for the First District to require subway trains to be equipped with electric storage batteries to prevent passengers from being left in darkness when trains become stalled, and the operating power is shut off or fuses blown out.

In reply I beg to inform you that on March 18, 1910, the Commission adopted an order, a portion of which relates to the subject covered by the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, and reads as follows:

“Ordered, That the Interborough Rapid Transit Company shall hereafter install and maintain in every subway passenger car operated by it, except those now or heretofore operated by it, a storage battery lighting appliance of sufficient capacity to operate two 12 candle power lamps at their rated candle power for at least three hours, such storage battery lamps to be instantly and automatically available whenever the other lamps in the car shall for any reason fail to furnish light.”

The extension of this order to apply to equipment already in service, will undoubtedly be a matter for further consideration.

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the matter of the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, under date of April 12, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and



Apportionment for the immediate allowance of a new corporate stock authorization to the amount of \$23,000 for completing and equipping the East Tuberculosis Pavilion of the Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwells Island, and \$50,000 for completing and equipping the West Tuberculosis Pavilion of the same institution, I report as follows:

These two items have been included in the mandatory column by the examiner of the Department of Finance in his report prepared for the use of your subcommittee on the Corporate Stock Budget.

The original authorization for the construction of the East Pavilion was \$180,000, of which there has already been expended or represented in contracts registered \$165,912.13, leaving a balance of \$14,087.87. This amount, together with the new authorization of \$23,000 now requested, is declared by the Commissioner to be absolutely necessary for the equipment of the pavilion.

The original authorization for the construction of the West Pavilion was \$300,000, of which \$284,200 is represented by actual expenditures or contracts registered, leaving a balance of \$15,800. This balance, together with the \$50,000 now requested, will likewise be wholly required for the completion and equipment of the West Pavilion.

I therefore recommend the approval by this Board of the resolutions attached hereto.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—A communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from the Board of Ambulance Service, dated February 14, 1910, requesting that means be provided for the efficient conduct of the work of said Board of Ambulance Service for the year 1910, and the establishment of certain positions therein, has been referred to the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen for consideration. We would report as follows:

On January 31, 1906, a commission was appointed by the Mayor to consider the problems involved in the methods of administering the public hospitals of The City of New York, for the purpose of proposing necessary changes to correct existing defects in methods, and to provide a comprehensive plan for the organization, extension and administration of these hospitals.

In a report made to the Mayor by the commission appears a chapter devoted to the discussion of the ambulance service of Greater New York, setting forth the results of an investigation made by a special agent under the direction of a standing committee on hospitals of the State Charities Aid Association, and in which the defects of the present system are pointed out.

It appears that the ambulance service system, the first of its kind in the world, was established at Bellevue Hospital in 1869 by the Metropolitan Board of Health. As the city grew the private hospitals installed an ambulance service.

The Police Department, from the fact that it was constantly in touch with the ambulance service through its patrolmen, gradually assumed authority to assign

definite districts to the various hospitals within which they were to answer calls. The districts in Manhattan and The Bronx vary in size, ranging in area from 475 acres in the Gouverneur district to 22,000 acres in the Fordham district, and in population from 70,000 in the House of Relief district, south of Canal street, to 350,000 in the J. Hood Wright Hospital district, in the northern section of the city.

In regard to the regulation of calls and a central control of the ambulance service, the special agent says in his report:

"Except for the control vested in the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for their four institutions, there is no such thing as a central control over the ambulance service. Each hospital operates as a unit independent of every other one, limited only by certain boundaries set by the police. Such ambulance law as we have is inadequate."

In Brooklyn there is more central control, but less real organization than in Manhattan. The distances which ambulances have to travel in Brooklyn are longer. The average time spent in answering calls throughout the Borough is about forty or fifty minutes, or about fifteen minutes for average time in reaching the scene of call. The special agent further says:

"One of the most serious defects in the ambulance service as now managed is that in some cases it has been impossible to get an ambulance within a reasonable time in a real emergency. This is especially so in Manhattan and The Bronx. If a man is injured on the street, he may get one ambulance, and he may get three, and he may get none at all. Such a condition could not exist under a well regulated system, where all calls were first sent through one headquarters."

Summing up the situation, the Hospital Commission notes that in Manhattan and The Bronx there are fourteen ambulance districts, with forty-four ambulances, of which twenty-eight are attached to private hospitals; that the districts are badly apportioned and the ambulances poorly distributed; that there is no central control over the system; that the medical service is supplied by hospital internes; that the system is a mixture of public and private independent units, and that the cost of maintenance is about \$59,000 annually; that in Brooklyn there are eighteen ambulances in service in sixteen different hospitals; that they are poorly distributed throughout the city; that the Police Department exercises some control through the sending in of all calls through the central exchange; that the surgeons are chosen with some care, and that the cost of the system, amounting to over \$20,000 annually, is borne by the City.

Part of Queens Borough is served by ambulances from Brooklyn hospitals. On account of the sparsity of population, the number of calls in the entire Borough is less than 3,000 in the year. The service has cost annually \$6,600 in the five hospitals.

The two ambulances in the Borough of Richmond answer about 1,200 calls a year. The cost of the service is borne by the City, which pays \$1,200 a year to each of the two hospitals in Richmond.

The total number of ambulance calls in Manhattan and The Bronx annually is about 55,000 and in Brooklyn 25,000.

Chapter 395 of the Laws of 1909, an amendment to the Greater New York Charter, provides for the establishment of a Board of Ambulance Service, the Commissioner of Police, the Commissioner of Public Charities, the President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and two citizens appointed by the Mayor to constitute said Board.

The law provides that the Board of Ambulance Service shall exercise general control over and establish rules and regulations governing all ambulance service in The City of New York, except such ambulance service as shall be maintained by the Department of Health, and, further, establish and maintain an ambulance service in any district which, in the judgment of the Board, is inadequately provided with ambulance service, when means shall have been provided therefor by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Mr. R. S. Copeland and Mr. William Spiegelberg have been appointed by the Mayor as the two citizen members of the Board.

It is proposed to organize the Board of Ambulance Service by the appointment of a director at the salary of \$5,000 per annum. The director shall be the chief executive officer of the Bureau. He shall recommend to the Board from time to time such action as in his judgment it should take, in order to establish a well organized ambulance service in all parts of the City. The director shall inspect ambulance stations and every provision of the ambulance service, whether municipal or private, from time to time, and investigate complaints of inadequate service or neglect on the part of the ambulance authorities, and report thereon to his superiors. He shall devote his entire time to the duties of his position.

On March 8, 1910, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution requesting your Board to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$24,225 to meet the expenses of the Board of Ambulance Service from March 1 to December 31, 1910.

The Board of Ambulance Service estimates the requirements for the efficient conduct of its work during the seven months beginning June 1, 1910, as follows:

The estimated salary cost for seven months is \$11,112.50, or an annual salary cost of \$19,050.

The salaries requested for the various positions appear to be reasonable.

Accompanying this report is a communication from the Board of Ambulance Service defining the duties of the several employees, and requesting favorable recommendation of the request.

We therefore recommend that your Board concur in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen of March 8, 1910, to the extent that the Comptroller be authorized to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$18,129.16 to meet the expenses of the Board of Ambulance Service from June 1 to December 31, 1910.

We further recommend the adoption by the Board of Aldermen of the accompanying resolution providing for the establishment of positions and grades of positions in said Board of Ambulance Service.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—Your attention is called to the necessity of keeping accurate records of all subsurface constructions. The Bronx is growing so rapidly, and sewers, gas mains, water mains and conduits for telephone, telegraph and electric light and power lines are being constructed in such large numbers, that unless the work of preparing accurate maps is taken up at once, the opportunity will be lost.

The importance of such records can hardly be over estimated. The location, size and character of all existing subsurface work should be determined as soon as possible, in order that new work may be properly located, that street openings for connections may be as small and as few as possible, that corporations and contractors doing work in the streets may have accurate information as to the conditions which they may expect to find, and, in general, that the City may be in a position to know what subsurface structures have been built, when, and by whom, and may direct where new structures may be built to the best advantage.

Work of this character is being done with success elsewhere, notably in Brooklyn, Philadelphia and Boston. In Brooklyn the Bureau has been in satisfactory operation for three or four years. In Philadelphia a large force is kept busy making and maintaining the records. The information is sold to interested parties, and the revenue derived from that source is sufficient not only to support the Bureau, but also to return a very considerable profit.

It is believed that such a system could be devised for this Borough, and that the Bureau could be operated without cost to the City. In order to properly inaugurate this work and to secure the locations, etc., of all existing structures, it will be necessary to immediately organize a force whose entire time would be devoted to the work. An approximate estimate of the annual cost is as follows:

Dear Sir—After consultation with the heads of the different Bureaus under my jurisdiction, I have come to the conclusion that it is very essential for the proper performance of the duties imposed by law upon me, to have transportation facilities that will afford this office quick communication with the various sections of this Borough. The fact is well known that the public transportation facilities in the Borough of Queens are very meager as to the greater percentage of its vast territory, some parts of it being entirely inaccessible except by steam railroad, with trains hours apart. A walk of four or five miles is a common occurrence for the Superintendents and Inspectors to reach certain points after disembarking from the railroad trains. From the standpoint of economy this condition should be abolished.

Having under our jurisdiction the Topographical, Street Cleaning, Highways, Buildings, Public Buildings and Offices and Sewer Bureaus in this undeveloped territory of approximately 80,000 acres, or about 129 square miles, with one thousand miles of streets (not including the lately developed property), miles of sewers, and the vast territory yet to be surveyed for the purposes of official maps, surveying parties in connection with street opening proceedings, and other improvements for which there is a great and insistent demand from the growing population of this Borough, we hereby make application for an issue of special revenue bonds, to the amount of six thousand dollars (\$6,000), to purchase automobiles to be used for the purposes aforesaid.

The present officials of the Borough inherited from former administrations three old automobiles which were in such a state of disrepair that it cost more than they were worth to keep them in condition yearly. This fact became such a public nuisance, we were compelled to dispose of the same at public auction last January, since which time we have been very much handicapped in the performance of our duties for the reason that there are no automobiles attached to this office at the present time.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—In the Budget appropriations for this Department for the present year, 1910, provision is made for coal supply for the Municipal Ferry Service in the sum of \$360,000.

This amount has been estimated as being sufficient to meet requirements for the year 1910, but with the expenditure of this amount alone the Department would be left at the end of the year with no available coal contract for deliveries after January 1, 1911, and it would then be necessary to enter into new contracts in mid-winter, the most inopportune time of the year to enter into such contracts.

The Department is at present receiving its coal supply for the ferry service under contracts entered into in 1909 and it is estimated that on these contracts the sum of about \$150,000 will be charged against the 1910 Budget appropriations.

In order, therefore, that the Department may be placed in position to advertise and enter into new contracts for coal supply for the remainder of this year and for the first part of the year 1911, to take advantage of the low prices obtainable at this time of the year, it will be necessary to make available an additional sum of about \$150,000 to offset the amount expended and charged against the Budget appropriations for coal already contracted for, and I, therefore, hereby respectfully request that pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, a resolution be adopted by you, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$150,000 for the purpose of permitting the Department to enter into a contract this summer for a supply of coal for the Municipal Ferry service to meet the requirements of the ferry service until the summer of 1911.

As hereinbefore stated if this additional amount is not available the Department could only contract for deliveries for the remainder of the year 1910, much to the City's disadvantage.

The Department cannot advertise a contract for a year's supply at this time under the present appropriation, leaving a portion of the contract to be certified against the funds to be provided in the Budget for the year 1911, as such procedure would be contrary to the provisions of section 1542 of the Charter, which provides that expenditures shall not exceed appropriations and the only method therefore available is to provide the funds by the issuance of the special revenue bonds.

During the year 1909, it came to the attention of the Borough authorities of this Borough that several illegal sewer connections were made by the Borough of Queens to the Brooklyn Sewer System. The Borough President at that time directed the Bureau of Sewers to cut off all illegal sewer connections from the Borough of Queens, at which time the Board of Health, in a communication, copy of which I enclose, requested that these sewer connections "be not disturbed for the present."

This matter has been taken up at various times this year with the Department of Health by the present administration, which Department was advised of the intention to cut off the illegal sewer connections coming from the Borough of Queens, and the following communication received from the Department of Health relative thereto:

"April 19, 1910.

"Hon. L. H. POUNDS, Commissioner, Department of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn:

"Sir—Your communication of the 8th inst., addressed to Ernst J. Lederle, Ph. D., President of the Board of Health, in which you express your intention of serving notice upon the residents of Queens, in the neighborhood of that portion of said Borough located just East of the Borough line, to cut off all sewer connection with the Brooklyn system coming from the Borough of Queens, at the expiration of sixty days, has been referred to this office for attention and reply.

"The Department will be better able to act in this matter if you will be good enough to cause copies of the orders that have been issued against those who have established illegal connection with the Brooklyn sewers along the line of Enfield street, to be forwarded to this office. If you will do this the Sanitary Superintendent will make a prompt investigation, and it can then be determined what unsanitary conditions, if any, the orders to cut off such connection will result in.

Sir—In making up the Budget for 1910, the last Administration practically cut off all the funds requested in certain Boroughs for additional lighting during the year 1910. This action leaves us in the Borough of Queens with none, and in Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond with almost no funds with which to put in additional lights. While all Boroughs are growing and need additional lighting to keep up with the population, the Borough of Queens is growing so fast that the lights now burning equal the entire appropriation for 1910.

In Manhattan and The Bronx, in order to add the minimum of lamps necessary to supply the demand, sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000) is required for additional arc lamps. The increase in gas and tungsten lamps can be taken care of by the number of these lamps replaced by arc lamps.

In the Borough of Manhattan the expenditures for high pressure fire service during the year 1909 were \$89,070. The amount allowed for 1910 is \$90,000.

For these reasons, therefore, I would request that revenue bonds to the following extent be issued for these Boroughs:

To the credit of account No. 513, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx—Street and Park Lighting.....	\$16,000 00
To the credit of account No. 516, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, High Pressure Fire Service, Reservation of Machinery and Current .....	2,500 00

In the Borough of Brooklyn three hundred (300) Municipal arc lamp-posts will be required to complete the work in Prospect Park on the same lines as in Central Park, Manhattan. The cost of these posts will not exceed \$20 per post, delivered, a total of six thousand dollars (\$6,000).

Also in the Borough of Brooklyn, the expenditures for High Pressure Fire Service Pumping Stations, Lamps and Lighting Division of this Department, for the year 1909, amounted to \$45,320.50. The appropriation for the year 1910 is \$45,000. The cost of these stations depends on the number of fires at which they are put in use. The Department has no way of telling this in advance. The stations seem to be increasing in use.

For these reasons, therefore, I would request that revenue bonds to the following extent be issued for this Borough:

To the credit of account No. 527, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Brooklyn—Street and Park Lighting .....	\$6,000 00
To the credit of account No. 530, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Brooklyn—High Pressure Fire Service, Reservation of Machinery and Current.....	2,500 00

In the Borough of Queens the requests for lighting on file which have been approved by the Local Board and by our own Department as necessary, amount to about 2,000 lamps of various kinds. In addition, owing to the opening of new transportation lines scheduled for this year, there will be about 500 additional lamps required to provide for this. If these lamps are installed it will also require the setting of a number of lamp-posts, to be paid for at contract rates.

It is estimated that, averaging the installation on the date of October 1, there will be required for all the above purposes, in Queens, twenty-four thousand five hundred dollars (\$24,500), which would provide for 150 additional arc lamps, 1,750 additional incandescent tungsten lamps, 600 additional gas lamps, 2,500 in all, as well as the change of 250 arc lamps from 325-watt type to the standard 450-watt type, with necessary lamp-post erections and repairs.

For these reasons, therefore, I would request that revenue bonds to the following extent be issued for this Borough:

To the credit of account No. 540, Heat, Light and Power, Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Queens—Street and Park Lighting .....	\$21,500 00

In the Borough of Richmond there is an appropriation for Street and Park Lighting of \$192,573.10, as against a cost of \$190,000 in lamps now burning. For the same reasons as advanced in the Borough of Queens, I would request that this appropriation be increased by the issuance of revenue bonds to the extent of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), which with the slight balance in the appropriation will provide for 50 additional arc lamps and 175 additional incandescent tungsten lamps, averaging on July 1 as the date of installation.

In the Borough of Richmond the expenditures during the year 1909, for Heat and Power for City Departments, were \$3,275.10. The appropriation for the present year is \$1,550. The increase in 1909 was due largely to the power accounts taken over by this Department for the Department of Education in supplying power to schools in Richmond. It is necessary that an additional amount of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200) be allowed to this account.

For these reasons, therefore, I would request that revenue bonds to the following extent be issued for this Borough:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary, the proceeds whereof to be applied by his Honor the Mayor and such committee of the Board of Aldermen as may be designated in the premises, to provide for the suitable entertainment of the Comptrollers, Auditors and accounting officials of various cities and States who will be in attendance at the annual Convention of the National Association of Comptrollers and Accounting Officers in The City of New York during the week ending June 11, 1910.

#### REPORTS:

That further consideration of these matters is unnecessary, action by the Legislature and by amendment to the Sanitary Code having disposed of some of them, and in consequence rendering the recommendations embraced in petitions supporting or opposing them nugatory. The Committee therefore recommends that the said papers be placed on file.

#### AN ORDINANCE regulating the use of motor vehicles.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. No person shall run a motor vehicle in the streets and highways of The City of New York, which emits from the exhaust or muffler thereof offensive quantities of smoke, gas or disagreeable odors.

Sec. 2. Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed a minor offense, and, upon conviction thereof before a City Magistrate, shall be punished by a fine not more than \$10, or by imprisonment in the City Prison, or by both, but no such imprisonment, however, shall exceed a term of five days.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### AN ORDINANCE amending the general license ordinance.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 306 of Article I, of Title II, of chapter 7 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 306. No person shall engage in or carry on any such business without a license therefor under a penalty of not less than two dollars, nor more than twenty-five dollars for each offense, and for the purposes of this ordinance the term person shall include any human being or lawful association of such; but no church, religious or charitable corporation, or corporation organized for the mental, moral or spiritual improvement of men or women, or for library or educational purposes shall be required to be licensed for any of the purposes mentioned in this article.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### AN ORDINANCE to limit the use of fireworks, etc.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That section number 531 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York be and hereby is repealed and the following substituted in place of the present language of the section so numbered:

Sec. 531. That it shall be unlawful to discharge or explode or to have in possession for any such purpose, or to sell or offer for sale to any person under the age of twenty-one, within The City of New York, any toy pistol using a percussion cap, or any squib, rocket, firecracker, roman candle or other combustible fireworks designed to be exploded with a sudden report or detonation; provided, however, that the Police Commissioner may issue a permit to any person above the age of twenty-one years to set off and have in his possession for such purpose for a period not exceeding one day any such fireworks, provided such person shall first satisfy the Police Commissioner by proof satisfactory to him that he is familiar with the nature and operation of such fireworks; second, shall pay a license fee of five dollars (\$5) for such permit; and third, execute a bond or undertaking under seal in the sum of five thousand dollars with sureties satisfactory to the Commissioner, the condition of such bond or undertaking being that the licensee shall save the City harmless from all damage incurred by reason of his having in his possession or setting off such fireworks. Such permit shall have indorsed thereon the time and place at which it is proposed to set off such fireworks, and no such permit shall be valid as permission to set off any such fireworks within any of the public parks or playgrounds of The City of New York without having indorsed thereon the consent of the Park Commissioner of the Borough in which such park or playground is situated.

Any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a minor offense, punishable by a fine not exceeding \$50, or imprisonment in the city prison or penitentiary for a period not exceeding thirty days, or both.

#### AN ORDINANCE for the better protection of operators of and riders in motor vehicles in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Every person, firm, company or corporation operating motor vehicles for hire in The City of New York shall equip each such vehicle with an awning or shed, of permanent or temporary nature, for the protection of the chauffeur or operator

during a fall of rain or snow and as an added means of safety to riders, under a penalty of ten dollars for each violation, said penalty to be imposed by any City Magistrate before whom a conviction thereof may have been found.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on February 8, 1910 (Minutes, page 495), the annexed ordinance in favor of carrying into effect certain provisions of section 50 of the Greater New York Charter relative to the placing of signs, etc., respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it believes the proposed ordinance to be necessary, and therefore recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE carrying into effect certain provisions of section 50 of the Greater New York Charter relating particularly to the placing of signs other than electric signs, sign posts, awnings, awning posts, horse troughs or storm doors, and to the exhibiting of banners, placards or flags.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter erect, place, keep or maintain any sign other than an electric sign, sign post, awning or marquee, awning post, horse trough or storm door, or exhibit any banner, placard or flag in or across any street or thoroughfare, or from houses or other buildings, unless a license therefor shall have been granted as herein more specifically provided.

Sec. 2. All licenses shall be issued by the City Clerk for such terms as are hereinafter named, and shall be in force and effect for the time specified, unless sooner suspended or revoked. The City Clerk shall have power to hear and determine complaints against any of the licensees hereunder and for any violation of the regulations herein provided, subject to the approval of the Mayor, shall have power to suspend or revoke a license. Any person desiring to exercise any of the privileges regulated by this ordinance shall file in the office of the City Clerk an application endorsed by the Alderman of the district in which the applicant shall specify the kind of license desired.

Sec. 3. Signs and Sign Posts—Signs, showbills and showboards may be placed and maintained on the fronts of buildings, with the consent of the owner thereof, and shall be securely fastened. They shall not project more than one foot from the house wall, except that signs may be hung or attached at right angles to any building and extend not to exceed three feet therefrom in the space between the second floor (the ground floor being considered the first floor) and a point eight feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk in front of such building. Signs may be attached to the sides of stoops, but not to extend above the railing or beyond the stoop line of any stoop. No sign, showbill or showboard shall be placed, hung or maintained except as in this section prescribed, and for each sign, showbill or showboard so placed, hung or maintained a license fee of two dollars (\$2) shall be paid.

Transparencies may be placed on public lamp-posts, not to exceed the number of six, by any church, educational, charitable or beneficial association, upon the payment of a license fee of one dollar (\$1) and such permission shall continue only for a period of thirty days from the date of issue of such license.

Sec. 4. Awnings (or Marquises) and Awning Posts—Awnings (or marquises) of tin or other light metal, or of iron and glass, may be erected and maintained across the sidewalks of any of the streets of The City of New York, except Broadway, Fifth avenue, Madison avenue and the Bowery, and those parts of Lexington avenue which are distant two hundred feet from any intersecting cross street upon which a surface car is operated, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided any and every such awning shall not be higher than the floor of the second story of the building (the ground floor being considered the first floor), but in no case to be covered with wood, and every awning or water-shed of any kind covering one-half, or less, than the full width of the sidewalk, shall have connected therewith a gutter and leader of material and size sufficient for conducting the water from the same to the outer line of the curbstone. Drop awnings, without vertical supports, may be erected within the stoop lines, but in no case to extend beyond six feet from the house line, and to be at least eight feet in the clear above the sidewalk.

Sec. 5. All posts fixed in any street for the purpose of supporting any awning shall be of iron not exceeding six inches in diameter, and the rail crossing the same shall also be of iron; the said posts shall be placed next to and along the inside of the curbstone, and the cross-rail, which is intended to support the awning, shall not be less than eight, nor more than ten, feet in height above the sidewalk, and the said cross-rail shall be strongly secured to the upright posts. No portion or part of any canvas or cloth, or tin or other light metal, used as an awning, shall hang loosely or project upward or downward from the same over any sidewalk or footpath. Iron posts for awnings shall be well and securely braced from the building with wrought-iron rails or rods at least one inch in diameter, in the proportion of one brace for every post.

Sec. 6. The President of a Borough shall order and direct any awning, awning post or bracket which may be erected contrary to the provisions of this ordinance to be forthwith removed; and any person who shall neglect or refuse to comply with such direction and order shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of ten dollars.

Sec. 7. No awning shall be erected or maintained except as prescribed in sections 4 and 5, and for each awning so erected a license fee of five dollars (\$5) shall be paid.

Sec. 8. Horse Troughs—Horse troughs may be placed and maintained on sidewalks, adjacent to the curb, provided they be of a size and pattern approved by the President of the Borough in which they are to be located, and shall in no way prove an impediment to pedestrians. For each horse trough located in The City of New York the licensee therefor shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to pay as compensation such an amount as shall be deemed an equivalent or as may be provided by the scale of water rents for the water supplied.

Sec. 9. No horse trough shall be placed except as prescribed in section 8, and for each horse trough so placed or maintained a license fee of five dollars (\$5) shall be paid.

Sec. 10. Storm Doors—Storm doors, not exceeding ten feet in height, nor more than two feet wider than the doorway or entrance of any building, may be erected or maintained within the stoop-lines, but in no case to extend more than six feet outside the house line. No structure under the name of "storm door" shall be lawful which shall practically be an extension of the building front or house front within the stoop line, or an enlargement of the ground floor of any premises.

Sec. 11. No storm door shall be erected or maintained except as prescribed in section 10, and for each storm door so erected or maintained a license fee of five dollars (\$5) shall be paid.

Sec. 12. Banners, Placards and Flags—No banner, placard or flag shall be hung or suspended from houses or poles, or attached thereto in or across any street (except that it shall be lawful to display the national or state colors or emblems at any or all times), unless it be by and with the consent of the owner or owners of the property from which any banner, placard or flag shall be hung or suspended.

Sec. 13. For every banner, placard or flag hung or suspended as allowed under section 12 a license fee of one dollar shall be paid, and such permission shall continue only for a period thirty days from the date of issue of such license.

Sec. 14. Any person, firm or corporation engaging in or attempting the exercise of any of the provisions of this ordinance without having procured a license therefor, shall, upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession of the party or competent testimony, be fined in a sum not less than two dollars (\$2) nor more than ten dollars (\$10) for each offense, and in default of the payment of such fine may be committed to the city prison by such magistrate until the same be paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed a

Sec. 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby rescinded and repealed.

Sec. 16. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Would it not be proper to tax each vehicle in accordance to its capacity and every pleasure craft, so as to enable the City the compensation to keep up the highways. Your board will no doubt object, as it may bring a result different from the intention, but nevertheless the public eventually would see.

I consider you the proper source, although some prefer the papers for their suggestions, but as we are now having a business administration and hope to continue to have it, I make this a private communication, being a resident of the city since 1850.

First United Citizens Peddlers' Association of New York,

Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—A meeting of the executive committee of the First United Citizens Peddlers' Association of The City of New York, was held on Wednesday, February 23, 1910, and the following resolutions were adopted by the members for the purpose of preventing the evil of vending in the streets of New York City with false or fraudulent licenses:

1. In every license shall be a picture of the vender and his own signature, this being for the purpose of preventing peddlers from trading their licenses.
2. The following persons shall not be eligible for license:
  - (a) Persons not being citizens of the United States.
  - (b) Persons being storekeepers, standkeepers and owners of pushcart stables.
  - (c) Persons holding positions in the City's service.
  - (d) Workingmen possessing a trade, and physically at their work.
  - (e) Women not being the widows of citizens.
3. The special privilege usually given to the peddlers before the holidays, permitting them to peddle in the streets with the cards given them by Aldermen, shall be done away with, because persons not usually in the business of vending can obtain these cards and thereby take away the only means of livelihood of the legitimate peddlers.
4. It shall be the duty of the police from the different precincts when on post to ask to see the licenses of the venders.
5. That special badges shall issue to the different peddler organizations for the purpose of aiding the police in ridding the city of unlicensed peddlers.

I do not believe any one will question the desirability of such an ordinance, except the ones who have the smoking automobiles. In every way the public weal seems to demand them. Will you not kindly tell me what the present situation is in regard to this matter, and what we may expect?

On behalf of this association, I may express in advance my appreciation of any trouble and interest you may take to further this reform measure.

Whereas, Thousands of drivers of vehicles are arrested each year in this city for violations of the ordinances regulating the traffic; and

Whereas, By reason of these arrests, and the subsequent proceedings growing out of the arrests, innocent persons are made to suffer delay and inconvenience; and

Whereas, This system, in a city of the size and importance of The City of Greater New York, is obsolete and a hardship to the general public; be it

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested by the Board of Aldermen to cause to be introduced in the Legislature a bill which will authorize the creation of a system of summonses for violation of the traffic ordinances. This bill to have a clause therein which will give power to the Policeman to hand a violator a summons demanding his presence in a Magistrate's Court at a reasonable time thereafter. That the bill make failure to answer the summons a misdemeanor punishable by a severe fine, and that it also contain therein a clause making it mandatory for all drivers of all vehicles to register with the Police Department, and that the said Police Department furnish him with a certificate upon which will appear the name, address and a description of the holder thereof. That upon the serving of a summons by a Policeman upon an alleged violator of the law, that the driver shall surrender to the said officer his license certificate, the same to be returned to him in the Magistrate's Court upon the arraignment of the prisoner. That nothing in the bill shall apply to the drivers of automobiles.

Whereas, The Court House Commission has reported to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment plans for a new County Court House to be situated in City Hall Park in the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, The same is on the calendar of the Board of Estimate for next Friday, March 18; and

Whereas, The plans proposed will occupy the entire front block on the south side of Chambers street, between Broadway and Centre street, overshadowing the City Hall, and will tower above it many stories in height; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York respectfully request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to refer the said plans to a sub-committee of the said Board so that an opportunity for a free and fair discussion may be given to the people of the city interested in its improvement and in the preservation of the City Hall and City Hall Park.

Hon. J. PURROY MITCHEL, New York City:

Dear Sir—I see in to-day's paper that the Board of Aldermen, over which you have the distinction of presiding, is contemplating the passing of an ordinance to the effect as follows:

"Be it ordered, That no person shall run a motor vehicle in the streets or highways of The City of New York, which emits from the exhaust or muffler therefrom, offensive quantities of smoke, gas or other disagreeable odors."

The foregoing is all right and should be vigorously enforced, but it will be like a great many more orders that are on the calendar; they are never enforced, and, as far as I can see, there is no provision in the wording of above order as to how and by whom the offenders are to be apprehended.

There should be passed with the order such instructions to the Police Force, also the officers of the Board of Health, or, in fact, two or more reputable citizens to make an affidavit of complaint against the driver of a vehicle who is so careless and ignorant as to permit the lubricating oil to run in the cylinders to such an extent that it ignites with the firing of the gas explosions, and causes the sickening and injurious smoke to be emitted from the exhaust.

Any man who has the slightest practical knowledge of the subject knows that any gas engine is made inefficient and eventually worthless by the burning and caking of the cylinder oil within the portholes and outlets of the cylinder. Unfortunately, the experience of the majority of the cheap chauffeurs who are permitted to run machines in the city has been gained at bootblack stands or washing dishes in a restaurant.

I would suggest the following clause in the ordinance: "That all motor cars, etc., licensed to traverse the streets of New York shall be compelled, within sixty days, to have the outlet from the exhaust pipe or muffler placed so as to shoot the explosions, smoke, etc., up in front of the car instead of behind."

This will positively, in my opinion, be more effective as a cure for the smoke nuisance than a fine or a threat of a fine or imprisonment.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the sale, use and possession of firearms.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That article 4, title 4, chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York be and is hereby amended by the addition of a new section, to be entitled section 434A, as follows:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to purchase, own or have in his possession any gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm without a license, but license shall not authorize the carrying thereof.

Sec. 2. The Mayor of The City of New York shall grant licenses to persons of good character and reputation to own and have in their possession a gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm.

Sec. 3. No such license shall be granted unless the applicant shall in the written application for such license state:

First—The full name of applicant.

Second—The place of business of applicant.

Third—The residence of applicant.

Fourth—The nature of applicant's business.

Fifth—The purpose for which any such gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm is kept by applicant.

Sixth—The style, pattern, make and number of the gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm so kept by applicant.

Seventh—The date of the purchase of the same; the name and place of business of the person, firm and corporation selling the same.

Eighth—The purchase price of such gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm.

Ninth—In addition to the foregoing, said applicant shall in said written application state and agree that during the term of such license the applicant will not sell, loan, barter or give away the gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm owned by him to any minor or to any person not personally known to applicant to be a person of good character and reputation, and that said applicant will report to the Commissioner of Police, immediately after selling, loaning, bartering or giving away any gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm to any person, the full name of such person; the date of selling, loaning, bartering or giving away such firearm; if sold, the price for which the same was sold; or if loaned, the time for which the same was loaned; the purpose for which same was to be used by the person buying or borrowing the same, and a full description of the style, pattern, make and number of the gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm so sold, loaned or given away, and shall further agree that if the Mayor of The City of New York shall be satisfied that the applicant has violated any of the foregoing statements or agreements or any of the provisions of this ordinance, that said Mayor may and shall revoke the license of such person to own and keep a gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm, and that the money paid for such license shall be forfeited to said City of New York, and that the Mayor upon being so satisfied shall revoke such license and declare forfeited to said City of New York all money paid for such license, and that for the period of one year thereafter no license shall be granted to such applicant.

Sec. 4. Every person on compliance with the aforesaid requirements and the payment in advance to the City Clerk of the sum of five dollars (\$5) per annum, shall receive a license under the corporate seal of The City of New York, signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Clerk, which license shall authorize the person therein named, until the 30th day of April next following, to own and have in his possession, a gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm, at the place designated in the license, which license shall be kept in the possession of the person so licensed, ready to be exhibited when required by the proper authorities.

Sec. 5. Any license granted under this ordinance may be revoked by the Mayor whenever it shall appear to his satisfaction that the person so licensed shall have violated any provision of this ordinance, or that such person is or has become a person of bad reputation or has been indicted or convicted of any misdemeanor or crime involving moral turpitude, or that the place designated in such license at which the licensee is authorized to keep any such gun, revolver, pistol, fowling piece or other firearm is a resort of disreputable persons.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall not apply to Sheriffs, Coroners, Constables, Policemen or other peace officers, while engaged in the discharge of their official duties, or to any person summoned by any of such officers to assist in making an arrest, or preserving the peace, while such person so summoned is engaged in assisting the officers. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, in addition to suffering the revocation of the license shall be subject to a penalty of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200), and a separate offense shall be regarded as committed each day during which such person shall continue such violation.

Sec. 8. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby annulled, rescinded and repealed.

Sec. 9. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after approval thereof by his Honor the Mayor of The City of New York.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, City:

Dear Sir—At the closing meeting of the Board of Aldermen last year a resolution was passed, authorizing the Commissioner of this Department to purchase on open orders 225 high pressure hydrants from the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company. The resolution, however, failed to receive the approval of the former Mayor.

It is a matter of much importance to the Department that the hydrants for the system be of a standard pattern and, as the hydrants manufactured by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company are the only ones which stood the test prescribed in the original contract for the furnishing of hydrants, I beg to renew the application for authority to expend the sum of \$24,412.50 for the purchase of these hydrants without the formality of advertising for competitive bids.

On several occasions the Department has obtained authority from the Board of Aldermen to purchase, on open orders, the hydrants of this pattern. Contracts have already been awarded for the furnishing, delivering and laying of water mains in the new districts to which the high pressure service will be extended. No other part of the high pressure system deserved or has received more attention from the Engineering Bureau than the proper selection of a hydrant well adapted for the extraordinarily severe service for which it is intended, and on the unfailing record of which the efficiency of the whole system depends. Under the trying conditions of operation the requirements in this case are necessarily much more exacting than in that of the common and much simpler hydrant in use on our distribution system, and can only be made by high, technical skill in the design and excellence of its material and workmanship.

On the Department's invitation for bids for a suitable hydrant for this service in November, 1904, five (5) of the leading manufacturers submitted hydrants for test and the only hydrant to comply with all the requirements was the one submitted by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company. The contract was not awarded until June 27, 1905. This delay was due, principally, to the claim made by several of the unsuccessful bidders, who requested sufficient time to readjust their hydrants and to have same retested. All the bids were rejected and on the second bidding several hydrants were submitted, but the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company's hydrant was the only one which successfully passed the test. An injunction was issued, restraining

the Commissioner from awarding the contract to the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company, and two years elapsed before the final decision of the Court.

Taking these facts into consideration, as well as the obvious advantage of uniformity in hydrants, and the agreement by the company to furnish these hydrants at the same rate which governed their bid which was submitted in competitive bidding, I would respectfully ask authority from the Board of Aldermen to purchase these hydrants on open order.

New York, May 3, 1910.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—There has been transmitted to me the following resolution of your Board:

"That the Corporation Counsel be and hereby is requested to give an opinion on the proposed ordinance, Introductory No. 425 (Minutes of March 1, 1910), before the next meeting of the Board of Aldermen on Tuesday, May 3, 1910."

I have also received a letter from Alderman Courtlandt Nicoll calling my attention to the resolution and requesting an opinion as to the legality of the proposed ordinance.

The proposed ordinance reads as follows:

"AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to the 'Rules of the Road,' particularly affecting 'Lights.'"

"Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

"That the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York be amended by the insertion of a new section, to be known as section 458a, to follow section 458 of Part 1 of said code, and to read as follows:

"Section 458a. In addition to the lights required under the provisions of the preceding section, each and every motor vehicle, however propelled, except motor cycles, shall have affixed and displayed on the rear thereof, at least eighteen inches from the ground, during the hours between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise of each day, the registration number assigned to it by the Secretary of State of the State of New York, within an illuminated frame, transparency or lamp, which said number shall consist of Arabic numerals, each not less than three inches in height and each stroke to be of a width not less than one-half inch; also the State letters N. Y. to be not less than one and one-half inches in height, and with a stroke not less than one-quarter inch.

"Such frame, transparency or lamp to carry a red bull's-eye in addition to the numbers and State letters, to avoid the necessity of carrying more than one lamp on the rear of a motor vehicle.



"Such frame, transparency or lamp to be illuminated from the rear of such registration number by a light of at least six candle power, so placed that it shall be distributed as nearly as possible equally upon all numerals and letters. Two distinct ways of lighting should be provided in such frame, transparency or lamp.

"This amendment to take effect ninety days after its approval by the Mayor of The City of New York."

The Highway Law, chapter 25 of the Consolidated Laws, article 11, governs the use of motor vehicles on the public highways.

Section 286 thereof provides as follows:

"Sec. 286. Display of Registration Number—Every motor vehicle shall also at all times have the number assigned to it by the secretary of state displayed on the back of such vehicle in such manner as to be plainly visible, the numbers to be in Arabic numerals, black on white ground, each not less than three inches in height, and each stroke to be of a width not less than half an inch, and also as a part of such number the initial letters of the state in black on white ground, such letters to be not less than one inch in height."

Section 290 thereof provides as follows:

"Sec. 290. Exemption of Non-Resident Owners—The provisions of sections two hundred and eighty-two to two hundred and eighty-nine, inclusive, of this article shall not apply to motor vehicles owned by non-residents of this state, provided the owners thereof have complied with any law requiring the registration of owners of motor vehicles in force in the state, territory or federal district of their residence, and the registration number showing the initial of such state, territory or federal district shall be displayed on such vehicle substantially as in the preceding sections provided."

Section 299 thereof provides as follows:

"Sec. 299. Local Ordinances Prohibited—Subject to the provisions of this article, local authorities shall have no power to pass, enforce or maintain any ordinance, rule or regulation requiring of any owner or operator of a motor vehicle any license or permit to use the public highways, or excluding or prohibiting any motor vehicle whose owner has complied with sections two hundred and eighty-two to two hundred and ninety, both inclusive, of this article from the free use of such highways except such driveway, speedway or road as has been or may be expressly set apart by law for the exclusive use of horses and light carriages, or except as herein provided, in any way affecting the registration or numbering of motor vehicles or prescribing a slower rate of speed than herein specified at which such vehicles may be operated, or the use of the public highways, contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this article; and all such ordinances, rules or regulations now in force are hereby declared to be of no validity or effect; \* \* \*

The law of the State provides therefore as to resident owners that their motor vehicle shall have the number assigned to it by the Secretary of State displayed on the back of such vehicle in such manner as to be plainly visible, the numbers to be in Arabic numerals, each not less than three inches in height and each stroke to be of a width not less than one-half an inch, and also as a part of such number the initial letters of the State to be in black on white ground, such letters to be not less than one inch in height.

The proposed ordinance imposes an additional burden in that it directs "the State letters N. Y. to be not less than one and one-half inches in height, and with a stroke not less than one-quarter inch."

Section 290 of the act quoted above, provides that section 286 (which regulates the display of the registration number) "shall not apply to motor vehicles owned by non-residents of this State, provided the owners thereof have complied with any law requiring the registration of owners of motor vehicles in force in the State, territory or federal district of their residence, and the registration number showing the initial of such State, territory or federal district shall be displayed on such vehicle substantially as in the preceding sections provided."

The proposed ordinance is not limited to motor vehicles of residents of the State, but provides that "each and every motor vehicle" \* \* \* "shall have affixed and displayed" \* \* \* "the registration number assigned to it by the Secretary of State of the State of New York."

It may be argued that this provision does not conflict with the statute in that it is intended to apply only to such motor vehicles as have had a registration number assigned to them by the Secretary of State of the State of New York, but the wording of the ordinance renders this interpretation at least doubtful.

Section 299 of the act quoted above provides that "subject to the provisions of this article, local authorities shall have no power to pass, enforce or maintain any ordinance, rule or regulation requiring of any owner or operator of a motor vehicle any license or permit to use the public highways, or excluding or prohibiting any motor vehicle whose owner has complied with sections 282 to 290, both inclusive, of this article, from the free use of such highways, \* \* \* or except as herein provided in any way affecting the registration or numbering of motor vehicles \* \* \* or the use of the public highways, contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this article; and all such ordinances, rules or regulations now in force are hereby declared to be of no validity or effect."

Section 286 provides that the "initial letters of the State" shall be "not less than one inch in height." The ordinance provides that said letters shall be "not less than one and one-half inches in height, and with a stroke not less than one-quarter inch."

As hereinbefore pointed out an additional burden is, by this ordinance, imposed upon owners or operators of motor vehicles.

Under the statute such owner or operator has complied with the law when the registration number displayed by him contains the initial letters of the State in size "not less than one inch in height."

To compel such persons to increase the size of the letters one-half inch would clearly be inconsistent with and even repugnant to the provisions of the statute.

The Appellate Division of the First Department in the case of People ex rel. Hainer vs. Keeper of Prisons, 121 App. Div., at page 650, said:

"The Motor Vehicle Law was passed really in the interests of automobilists. The various rules, regulations and ordinances in the many villages and cities of the State upon the various subjects of licenses, speed and penalty were so numerous, conflicting and confusing that the persons interested in the subject appealed to and succeeded in having passed by the Legislature a general act under which an automobilist in any part of the State would know exactly what his restrictions and his liabilities were, and the act expressly repealed all ordinances, rules or regulations theretofore in effect."

Any ordinance of the Board of Aldermen inconsistent with or repugnant to the law of the State is void.

Mayor vs. Nichols, 4 Hill, 209.

It is my opinion therefore that the provision in the proposed ordinance requiring the display of registration numbers containing the State letters "N. Y. to be not less than one and one-half inches in height and with a stroke not less than one-quarter inch" is repugnant to sections 286 and 299 of article 11 of the Highway Law and that the whole ordinance may be thereby invalidated.

I am also of the opinion that the provision to the effect that "each and every motor vehicle, however propelled, \* \* \* shall have affixed and displayed on the rear thereof \* \* \* the registration number assigned to it by the Secretary of State of the State of New York," is repugnant to section 290 of the Highway Law, in that such language might be interpreted to cover all motor vehicles, both those of residents and non-residents.

This last objection might be removed by inserting in the proposed ordinance, after the words "every motor vehicle, however propelled," "except motor vehicles owned by non-residents of this State, provided the owners thereof have complied with any law requiring the registration of owners of motor vehicles in force in the State, territory or federal district of their residence, and the registration number showing the initial of such State, territory or federal district shall be displayed on such vehicle, substantially as provided by the Highway Law, being Laws of 1909, chapter 30, constituting chapter 25 of the Consolidated Laws," or some other form of words which will render the ordinance consistent with the law of this State.

Such frame, transparency or lamp to be illuminated from the rear of such registration number by a light of at least six candle power, so placed that it shall be distributed, as nearly as possible, equally upon all numerals and letters. Two distinct ways of lighting should be provided in such frame, transparency or lamp.

This amendment to take effect ninety days after its approval by the Mayor of The City of New York.

Sir—Request is hereby made that your Honorable Board request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds, under the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, to the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), in order that I may purchase a runabout automobile for the use of the Superintendent of Parks, Borough of The Bronx.

It is utterly impossible for the Superintendent, at the present time, to cover the vast area of the park system of The Bronx, comprising upwards of 4,142 acres, with a horse and wagon. The distance to be covered daily being from twenty-five (25) to (30) miles, requiring the use of two (2) horses daily. It is necessary, in order to make his work more efficient, and that proper supervision might be given, that the Superintendent get over the ground quickly so that he may cover the entire system each day.

Permission is also requested to purchase the above runabout automobile without public letting, at a cost not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on March 1, 1910 (Minutes, page 676), the annexed ordinance in favor of requiring the name and address of the owner or owners of every building in The City of New York to be placed thereon, respectfully

REPORTS:

That as an aid to the Police, fixing responsibility for proper use of premises, objectionable only to such persons as may be willing to profit by illdoing, if such profit may be secured without notoriety, the Committee believes the ordinance to be admirably useful and recommends its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE requiring that a plate or sign with name and address of owner shall be placed in or on each building in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Every person, firm, association or corporation owning a building or buildings in The City of New York shall place in conspicuous manner in the front entrance or vestibule of said building or buildings, or in the absence of a vestibule or entrance ready of access, some other place which will hold the same to public view, a plate or sign giving the name and address of such person, firm, association or corporation, which shall at all reasonable times be subject to the inspection of the public. In the event of a building or buildings being owned by one or a number of persons living



a distance removed from the City and such building or buildings are in the hands of or managed by an agent or agents, the name or names of such agent or agents and address shall also be placed in like conspicuous manner and subject to inspection as in the case of the owner or owners.

Sec. 2. Any person, firm, association or corporation failing to comply with the requirements of section 1 of this ordinance shall be subject to a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100), to be recoverable in an action to be brought by the Corporation Counsel in the name of The City of New York. Any caretaker, keeper, janitor or other person in charge of a building or buildings, the owner or owners of which have complied with the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance, who shall deny any reasonable demand for inspection of, or access to, a plate or a sign as herein provided, shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5) and not more than ten dollars (\$10) for each offense, and in default of payment thereof may be committed to the City Prison for a term equal to one day for each one dollar of fine imposed and unpaid.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 89 of part 16 of chapter 15 of the Building Code of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, in relation to gas and water pipes, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 89. Gas and Water Pipes and Shut-off Valves—Every building within this City in which gas is used for illuminating, heating or other purposes shall be equipped with a mechanical device or devices that will enable any person to shut off or turn on the supply of gas to such building from the outside or vestibule of said building by breaking the glass cover of the shut-off or turn-on keys which operate the gas valves in basement. Such device or devices shall be placed at such point or points in or on such building as may be designated by the Chief of the Fire Department of this City, and shall be of such design and construction as to be easily operated by manual power and with reasonable certainty and safety and to do the work required to be done thereby. The device or devices installed under the provisions of this section shall be approved by the Chief of the Fire Department and shall be so installed as to operate automatically in case of heat from fire. All pull rods or chains must be enclosed in conduits and at all angles run over axle pulleys and operate with ease. After the installation of such device or devices the control thereof shall be under the supervision of the Chief of the Fire Department; provided, however, that the buildings used exclusively for residence purposes, where but one meter is used, and outbuildings, sheds or barns attached to or appurtenant to buildings used exclusively for residence purposes shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.

Immediately after the taking effect of this ordinance it shall be the duty of the Chief of the Fire Department to notify in writing the owner, agent, lessee or person having control or charge of each and every existing building subject to the provisions of this section to install such device or devices at once; and he shall give similar notice to the owner, agent or person having control or charge of buildings hereafter erected whenever he may deem such notice necessary. Any owner, agent, lessee or person in charge or control who shall fail, neglect or refuse to install such device or devices as are required and described herein within ten days from the date of said notice shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and each day's continuance of said failure, neglect or refusal shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. Any person who, without written authority from the Chief of the Fire Department, shall meddle or tamper with any such device or devices installed upon any building or buildings under the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

Here continue as in present ordinance, from the words "No gas, water," etc., in line 8.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after the approval thereof by his Honor the Mayor.

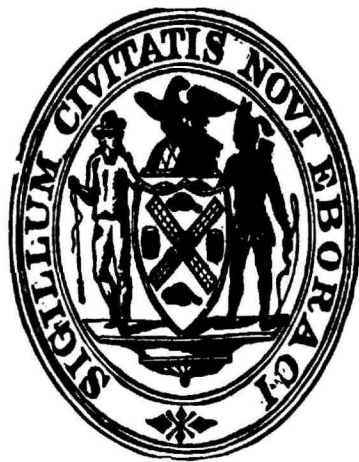

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion, fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
