BROOKLYN LOOP LINES—ACQUISITION OF PROPERTY.

The Secretary presented a communication dated June 16, 1908, from William M. Lawrence, Assistant Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a certified copy of the following resolution adopted by that Board on June 12, 1908, which was ordered filed:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provision of section 10 of chapter 4 of the laws of 1891, as amended, and section 14 of chapter 429 of the laws of 1907, and a requisition of the Public Service Commission for the First District, duly made by the Chairman and Secretary thereof on October 16, 1907, for an appropriation of One Million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the acquisition of real estate or interest therein, necessary for the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad, known as the Brooklyn Loop Lines, Borough of Manhattan, and a supplemental requisition under date of June 5, 1908, for an issue of \$174,470 corporate stock for said purposes—the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue Corporate Stock of the City of New York, on account of said requisitions (and in addition to the amounts heretofore authorized, viz.: \$40,000, on December 20, 1907, and \$166,145 on June 5, 1908), to an amount not exceeding One Hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars (\$175,000), to provide means as follows:

The Corporation Counsel was advised that the Department is desirous of rebuilding pier foot of East Tenth street, East River, and was requested to state whether there exists any legal objection to the work.

Resolved, That the Board of Water Supply hereby approves the recommendation of the Committee of the Whole, that Contract 6 for the construction of an office building in the Town of Marbletown, Ulster County, N. Y., be awarded to John J. McLean at the prices bid by him in his bid received May 12, 1908, and that said bid is hereby accepted and said contract is hereby awarded to said McLean, said bid being the one the acceptance of which, in the judgment of this Board, will best secure the efficient performance of the work; provided, however, that the surety offered by said McLean shall be approved by Commissioner Shaw.

Real Estate, Suffolk County.

2500, May 21, 1908, reported in reference to the development of the underground water sources of Suffolk County, and forwarded map, plan and profile showing such development, for submission to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the State Water Supply Commission. On motion, said communication and map were referred to the Commissioners of the Board as a Committee of the Whole.

Commissioner Shaw reported in reference to the equipment for use of the Board of Water Supply police, and made recommendations as to cloth for uniforms, buttons, blouses, breeches, chevrons, leggings, shoes, hats, slickers, twisters, night sticks and whistles, and also made recommendations as to horse equipment.

On motion, these recommendations of Commissioner Shaw were approved.

Real Estate, Kensico, Section 13, Parcel 958.

A communication was received from Elisha P. Cronkhite, dated May 20, 1908, offering to sell this property or to grant a permanent easement through the same.

On motion, this matter was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

The Secretary reported that on May 22, 1908, he had written the Comptroller that this Board consented to the return of the checks deposited by MacArthur Brothers Company, Bradley Contracting Company and T. A. Gillespie Company, three of the bidders on Contract 14.

On motion, this action of the Secretary was confirmed.

Finance and Police.

Resolve, That the being or running loose and at large of dogs in the streets, avenues, highways or other public places in The City of New York is a public nuisance dangerous to life and detrimental to health by reason of many persons being bitten by dogs and the prevalence of rabies, the said Board hereby enters in its records the same as a nuisance and hereby orders the abatement thereof; and all persons are hereby forbidden to allow dogs owned, harbored, possessed or controlled by them to be or run loose and at large in the streets, avenues, highways or other public places in The City of New York; and no dog shall be allowed to run loose and at large as aforesaid in any of the places aforesaid unless muzzled in such a manner as to protect persons from being bitten, or unless held by a leash or chain not more than four feet in length; and it is further hereby

Resolved, That any and all dogs loose and at large in any of the public streets, avenues, highways or other public places in The City of New York, unless muzzled or held as aforesaid, shall be destroyed by Inspectors or other duly authorized agents and officers of the Department designated and as directed by the Sanitary Superintendent; further be it

Resolved, That this order and regulation be and the same shall remain in force and effect until the 31st day of October, 1908, and that public notice of the requirements hereof and of this order be printed in the City Record and posted and kept posted in each of the borough offices of the Department of Health for two days in succession beginning June 22, 1908.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
