

To the Department of Finance, City of New York :

I am still without any reply to my letters to you of July 14th and 28th, requesting informa tion as to the appropriation for printing and sta-

Am I to understand that you decline to furnish this Department with the information asked for?

You are aware of the law which requires the Comptroller to furnish to each of the Heads of Departments weekly a statement of unexpended balances of the appropriations of his Department, and of the further law which prohibits Heads of the Departments from authorizing expenditures in excess of appropriations.

Several of the Departments are in great need of the ordinary and necessary supplies of stationery and printing. It is my duty to furnish such supplies to all Departments except Finance and Law, but I am prevented from discharging this duty by your failure to inform the Department as to the appropriation made for the purpose and the present condition of the same.

If you still persist in refusing me the information, I shall with the greatest reluctance feel it to be my duty to determine what means are open to me to compel compliance with my most proper,
