

The pictures will be shown in the size of 20 or 30 feet, so that they would be seen by 50,000 people at once, if I had a space like Tompkins square or on the steps of City Hall.

Accompanying music and a platform would be necessary.

I painted the mentioned pictures all myself, and I would add some more for the special purpose, and I risk to pretend that New York would be the first city where, on a public festival, such an intellectual, instructive, and moral exhibition has been made.

I wish and hope that the Board of Aldermen will agree upon my proposition.

An Ordinance to amend section 7 of chapter XIII. of the Ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of the firing of fire-arms, cannons, and fireworks."
The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:
Section 1. Section 7 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by inserting after the

word "combustion" the words "except on the third and fourth days of July in each and every year,"

so that said section, when so amended, shall read as follows:

Section 7. No person shall fire, discharge, or set off, in the City of New York, any rocket, cracker, torpedo, squib, balloon, or other fire-works or thing containing any substance in a state of combustion, except on the third and fourth days of July in each and every year, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense. Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled an ordinance to amend section I of article V. of an ordinance to amend chapter XL. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, relative to hackney coaches and cabs, adopted December 20, 1876.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:
Section I. Section 2 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended, by changing the numbers of Stands Nos. 20 and 21 to Nos. 21 and 22, respectively, and by amending Stand No. 20, in the original ordinance, by adding thereto the following: "Except at the Grand Central Depot, where licensed owners or drivers may solicit passengers at the full front of said depot, outside the curb-stone, on Forty-second street, without their vehicles;" also by amending Stand No. 22, when so changed, by s'riking out the words "all street corners," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Broadway and Sixth avenue," so that said three subdivisions of said section, or stand numbers, when so amended, shall read as follows:

Stand No. 20, at all railroad depots, five minutes previous to the arrival of all passenger trains,

Stand No. 20, at all railroad depots, five minutes previous to the arrival of all passenger trains, except at the Grand Central Depot, where licensed owners or drivers may solicit passengers at the full front of said depot, outside the curb-stone, at Forty-second street, without their vehicles.

Stand No. 21, Broadway, opposite St. Paul's Church, from 5 P. M. until sunrise.

Stand No. 22, on Broadway and Sixth avenue, from 10 P. M. until sunrise.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 7 of chapter XV. of the Ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of flagging, and laying, and repairing sidewalks and curb and gutter stones.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows: Section 1. Section 7 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as

§ 7. No sidewalk, or any part of a sidewalk laid with brick or flagging shall hereafter be taken up, or the brick or flagging removed therefrom, for any purpose whatever, in the Twenty-third or Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, without the written permission of the President of the Department of Public Parks, or in any part of the City of New York without the written permission of the Commissioner of Public Works, under the penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense; but the provisions of this section (unless such work should come within the limits of an ordinance of the Commission Council) shall not apply to any person engaged in the processory repairs of any such side. but the provisions of this section (unless such work should come within the limits of an ordinance of the Common Council) shall not apply to any person engaged in the necessary repairs of any such sidewalk, the resetting, when necessary, of any curb or gutter stones that may have become displaced, broken or sunken, or the necessary repair or alteration of any coal-slide under any such sidewalk, nor shall a permit for any such purpose be necessary.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Railroads, to whom was recommitted a former report made by them, in favor of using steam, experimentally, as a motive power, for the traction of the cars of the Third Avenue Railroad Company, which was amended by your Honorable Body by extending a like privilege to the Second and Eighth Avenue Railroad Companies, respectfully REPORT:

REPORT:

That in again considering the subject, they belive the recommendation heretofore made to your Honorable Body should be adopted, and desire to reiterate the opinions contained in their former report on that subject. Your Committee are very decided in the opinion, also, that the amendments to the resolution reported by them at the last meeting were made by your Honorable Body without due consideration, and that, upon reflection, you will concur in the opinion of your Committee, that it will be ample time to grant this valuable privilege to the Second and Eighth Avenue Railroad Companies when it is asked for, or when it is officially known that they desire to use it. Had any application from either or both of these companies, or any other company, been made to your Honorable Body and been referred to your Committee previous to the presentation of their former report, they would most assuredly have recommended that it be granted, as they did that of the Third Avenue Company, but they fail to see how any privilege of this character, or, in fact, of any description, can with propriety be extended by the Common Council, to a company or individual, until it is asked for. Your Committee are confirmed in this view of the case by the fact, that although one week has elapsed since their former report was recommitted, no application has yet been made to have a like privilege accorded to any other of the many railroad companies using the streets of this city. Nor is it, in fact, necessary or even advisable that such applications be made, previous to a determination of the practicability of using steam as a motor, as proposed. Once determine this question affirmatively, and then the right to use steam can, and doubtless will be given to every railroad company in the city. It is only necessary to try the experiment on one city railroad at one time, at least, and no railroad presents better facilities for a practical trial of the experiment, second in importance only to that of the motive power used for the propulsion

power used for the propulsion of city railroad cars. In granting the application of the Third Avenue Railroad Company to use steam, they believe the experiment of providing a seat for each passenger should be tried. If successful in both, much that is desirable in city travel will have been accomplished. With this object in view, your Committee respectfully offer for your adop-

tion the following resolutions:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to the Third Avenue Railroad Company to employ steam as a motive power, for the traction of its cars, not to exceed five in number, as an experiment, which shall be tried under the direction and supervision of the Mayor and the Commissioner of Public Works, who shall designate the times and places when such experiments shall be tried; and the said Mayor and Commissioner are hereby required to report to this Board as soon as practicable the results of the experiments so to be made, together with such suggestions or recommendations as they may find necessary to enable the Common Council to arrive at a conclusion as to the practicability of a permanent use of steam on said railroad, or that they may deem of interest to the public; and be it

Resolved, That all cars so used experimentally on said railroad shall contain a certain number of seats, separated one from the other, and when all are occupied, the said cars shall not stop or take up any passenger until one or more of said seats shall have been vacated. When all the seats are so any passenger until one or more of said seats shall have been vacated.

occupied, a placard shall be placed in a conspicuous position, on the outside of every such car, inscribed with the word "full." When vacancies occur, it shall be taken down by the conductor.

The Committee on Railroads, to whom was referred the annexed ordinance to protect the health, comfort, and property of persons traveling by the public vehicles in the City of New York, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That the provisions of the ordinance so referred to your Committee appear to be too stringent, as they exclude from the inside of all public vehicles any bundle, basket of soiled or other materials, as they exclude from the inside of all public vehicles any bundle, basket of soiled or other materials, beds, bed-clothes, parcels of merchandise, baggage, paints, oils, groceries, marketing, or any other substance whatever, the only exception being clean, inodorous parcels not exceeding one square foot in volume, to be borne in all cases upon the lap of the person having the same in charge. Your Committee are clearly of opinion, that the health and comfort of ordinary travelers by public vehicles in this city, requires the passage of some such ordinance, and its rigid enforcement; still, some exception should be made in favor of those (and they number a great many) who cannot afford to pay to express groceries and other articles from the lower part of the city, where they make purchases, to their homes in the upper part of the city. A positive restriction, such as is contained in the ordinance referred, would work great injury to many poor people by virtually preventing them from purchasing wherever they please, or where they fancy they can buy the cheapest, as the distance they would be required to convey their purchases would preclude the possibility of buying in the lower part of the city, and residing in the upper part. It would disturb, violently, the present business of our principal markets, and many other ways work injury, annoyance, and losses to a great many of our population, both buyers and sellers. Your Committee, however, propose a modification of the ordinance, which, they think, will meet the case exactly, as it will afford to all the needed facilities for travel—the one class without any interference with the other. It is simply to exempt one-fifth of all such public vehicles from the provisions of the ordinance, whereby one vehicle out of every five may be used by persons desiring to carry baskets, bundles, or other articles, as at present, and four of every five such vehicles may be used by travelers who conform to the restrictive provisions of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to protect the health, comfort, and property of persons traveling by the public vehicles in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section I. Henceforth it shall not be lawful to allow within or upon four-fifths of all the railroad cars and omnibuses upon each and every of the street railroads and omnibus lines of this city, elsewhere than upon the front platform and top of same, any bundle, basket of soiled or other materials, bed-clothes, parcels of merchandise, baggage, paints, oils, groceries, marketing or any other substance whatever.

Sec. 2. Exception to the foregoing is allowed for clear, inodorous parcels, not exceeding one cubic foot in volume, to be borne in all cases upon the lap of the person having the same in charge.

Sec. 3. The driver and conductor of any of said cars and omnibuses found violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be liable to arrest for so doing, and be taken before the nearest Police Magistrate, who, on hearing proof and being satisfied that an offense has been committed against the same, shall impose a fine of not less than five dollars on each offender, or one day's imprisonment in the City Prison for each dollar of fine so imposed, or both at his discretion.

Sec. 4. In order to give notice to the traveling public which of the vehicles are not subject to this ordinance, the different street railroad and omnibus lines shall cause to be placed upon their cars and omnibuses not so subject, in a conspicuous place upon the outside, a sign or signs which shall indicate in intelligible and appropriate language that such car and omnibus is not subject to this ordinance.

Sec. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
