

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending July 25, 1885.

Resolved, That Friday, August 7, 1885, at eleven o'clock A. M., and the chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of "The Morris Avenue Railroad Company" to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent and permission for the construction, maintenance and operation of the street surface railroad proposed to be constructed by said company, as mentioned in their petition for such consent, will be first considered, and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board by publishing the same for fourteen days, excluding Sundays, in two newspapers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884; such advertising to be at the expense of the provisioners.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 17, 1885.

Approved by the Mayor, July 20, 1885, and the "New York Times" and the "Sun" were designated as the newspapers referred to.

Resolved, That the vacant lot on the northeast corner of Fourth avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resignation of Julius Levy as a Commissioner of Deeds.
Resolved, That Samuel M. Abrams is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds for and in the
City and County of New York, in place of Julius Levy, resigned.

Resignation accepted and resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 20, 1885.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in Ninety-fifth street, from Ninth to Tenth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner

An Ordinance to repeal sections 98 and 99 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, and ordain substitutes therefor.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:
Section 1. Section 98 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby repealed, and the following section, similarly numbered, ordained and substituted therefor, to wit:

"Sec. 98. Each and every licensed hackney coach or cab shall be provided with a suitable lamp on each side, and across the middle of the outside of each such lamp shall have a metal band not less than two inches in width, out of which the number of the license shall have been cut after the manner of a stencil plate, the component figures of such number to be not less than one and one-half inches in height, and the style of the whole to be approved by the Mayor or the Mayor's Marshal. And each and every such coach or cab shall also have the number of the license in raised metal figures not less than one and one-half inches in height, or legibly engraved upon a metal plate, affixed to the inside of the coach or cab in such conspicuous place as may be designated by the Mayor or Mayor's Marshal."

Sec. 2. Section 99 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby repealed, and the following section, similarly numbered, ordained and substituted therefor, to wit:

"Sec. 99. Each and every licensed hackney coach or cab, while waiting at night for employment at any public stand, shall have its lamps lighted as soon as it becomes dark, and thereafter kept trimmed and burning while at such stand and during employment."

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

SIR—There were 1,019 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 18, 1885, which is an increase of 99, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 149 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending July 11, 1885, was 998, which is 49.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 37.11 per 1,000 persons hving, the population estimated at 1,398,536.

A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 14th day of July, 1885, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, sections 56 and 184 of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 56. That the keeping and slaughtering of all cattle, and the preparation and keeping of all meat and fish, birds and fowl, shall be in that manner which is, or is generally reputed or known to be, best adapted to secure and continue their safety and wholesomeness as food. The slaughtering shall not be permitted or conducted at any place in the City of New York south of Thirty-ninth street, nor worth of said street without a special written permit from this Department; nor unless the same shall be done in buildings located upon the water-front.

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Section 184.
