MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 27, 1885.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—It is my sad duty to announce to you, in order that you may take appropriate action, the death of Thomas A. Hendricks, late Vice-President of the United States.

For more than thirty-five years, Mr. Hendricks has been prominently and honorably identified with National politics. From his earliest manhood he devoted his best energies to the service of his adopted State of Indiana, and to the Nation, of which he was so distinguished an officer. During all this period his personal integrity has never been assailed; the purity of his motives has never been questioned. That he possessed the strong militant convictions and the elevation of character which are such indispensable prerequisites to success as a leader of men and parties has been fully recognized, even by those who differed with him most widely.

This much, it is a melancholy pleasure as well as a sad duty to say of Mr. Hendricks. To say more, is unnecessary, of one whose life is so well known. The Administration, to which his name lent so much of strength, will feel his loss no less than the Nation whose voice so lately called him to preside over one of the most dignified Parliamentary bodies in the world.

In connection therewith the President offered the following:

The sad intelligence of the death of the Honorable Thomas A. Hendricks, the honored Vice-President of the United States, awakens general sorrow among the people of the whole country; and it is eminently proper that the Common Council of the City of New York should by its official voice express the sympathy of its citizens at the loss of one of the most illustrious of the Nation's representatives.

He embodied the best attributes of manhood, and the purity of his domestic life was reflected in his conscientious discharge of public duties. Kindly and gentle in nature, he was unyielding in his fidelity to principle and loyal to his party convictions. However his opponents may have differed with him in political expediency, none ever questioned his honesty of purpose nor the sincerity of his motives.

He has made a distinguished record in the history of our nation, and he honored every station to which he had been exalted by the voice and the choice of the people.

Be it, therefore,

Resolved, That, as an expression of our respect for the memory of Vice-President Thomas A. Hendricks, the flags on the City Hall and other public buildings be displayed at half-staff from sunrise to sunset until after the day set apart for solemnizing the funeral rites, and that the City Hall be appropriately draped.

Resolved, That the heartfelt sympathy of the Common Council be and the same is hereby tendered to the sorrow-stricken widow of the honored and lamented deceased.

Resolved, That the foregoing preamble and resolutions be spread upon the minutes of this Board and that a copy thereof, suitably engrossed, be forwarded to the bereaved widow.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolutions.

Which was unanimously adopted, by a rising vote, every member present voting in the affirmative.

Alderman Hall moved that when the Board adjourns it do so to meet in regular session, on Wednesday next, the 2d day of December.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Hall moved that the Board, out of respect for the memory of the deceased Vice-President, do now adjourn.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the President announced that the Board stood adjourned until Monday, November 30, 1885, at 1 o'clock P. M., specially for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for 1886.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 123 were in institutions, 300 in tenement-houses, 125 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 110 on the first, 139 on the second, 85 on the third, 67 on the fourth, 21 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 562 were stated to be residents of New York City and 0 non-resident, 52 were stated to be single, 145 married, 66 widowed, and the condition of 299 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 562; still-births, 57; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 70 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 601 births, 351 marriages, 57 still-births, 562 deaths, 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 173 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage and 93 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 14, 1885, was 51.8 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.702; the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,553, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.12 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
