

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 14, 1885 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,701. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 667.

During the past week 247 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health

Officer of the Port, 29 permits. There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits. There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 14 miscellaneous permits. There were issued to scavengers, to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 94 permits. At premises where contagious diseases were reported 52 visits were made, and 16 disinfections, and 16 disinfections,

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 13. The number of vaccinations performed was 3,774, of which 1,766 were primary and 2,008

re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 19,849 pounds of meat and 1,430 pounds of fish. The number of specimens of milk examined was 53, and the amount of fines imposed was \$50.

The certificates of 601 births, 57 still-births, 351 marriages and 562 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 14, 1885. This shows an increase of 56 births, 156 marriages and 58 deaths, and a decrease of 7 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 21 births and 97 deaths, and an increase of 19 still-births and 166 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 4; erysipelas, 1 ; typhoid fever, 1 ; cerebro-spinal fever, 1 ; diarrhœal diseases, 7 ; cancer, 1 ; bronchitis, 8 ; heart diseases, 5 ; aneurism, 1 ; marasmus, tabes mesentenca and scrolula, 4 ; gastritis, enteritis and peretonitis, 6 ; while the deaths from measles increased 3 ; diphtheria, 1 ; croup, 1 ; whooping cough, 7 ; puerperal diseases, 3 ; manition, 1 ; alcoholism, 2 ; rheumatism and gout, 2 ; phthiss pulmonalis, 13 ; pneu-monia, 20 ; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4 ; meningitis and encephalitis, 1 ; convul-sions, 8 ; apoplexy, 2 ; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 17 ; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5 ; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8 ; surgical operations, 1 : suicide, 1 ; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from small-pox and malarial fevers was the same in the two successive weeks.
