

Improvements and Repairs at City Prison from January 1 to March 31, 1889.

Carpenters -Built a storm-house, sashes for windows in ten-day house and female prison; 2,365 feet yellow pine flooring on second, third and fourth ters, male prison. Blacksmiths-Placed iron gates on carpenter shop, wash-house, store-room, and in hall at entrance to yard and placed two iron gates on cellar; repaired 13 cell-locks on male prison. Tinsmiths-Placed tin leaders at gate on Franklin street and at storm-house, male prison; made 12 tin boilers for stores; repaired 21 tin boilers for cook-house. Plumbing-Repaired 7 water-closets.

A large number of analyses of supplies purchased in the market have been made to insure good quality; and the daily examination of cows' and condensed milk delivered by the contractor has been continued. Periodical analyses of the soap contracted for in the beginning of this year have also been made; in fact, every separate delivery has been subjected to analysis, and none has been accepted that would not meet the requirements of the contract.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste

of water. The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-

railway cars or other vehicles or horse, cannot oe per-mitted. No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be leit running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed. Taps at wash-basms, water-closets, baths and urnnals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Fountams or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about to ble is prohibited.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-iess.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for

To the nearth and combined and the entrems, and the value of the nearth and combined by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all turther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the buildings. Mouse-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
