

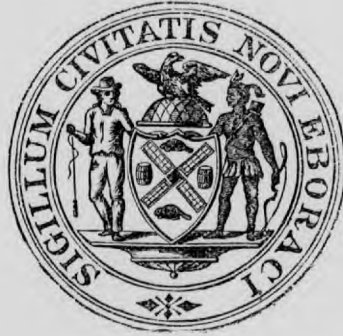

SIR—The Mayor directs me to send to you herewith a communication from Mr. Ernest Hall, No. 177 Broadway, protesting against the lighting of streets and avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards by electric lights, to be maintained by wires strung upon poles in the street. The Mayor desires that this matter be brought to the attention of the Gas Commission at its next meeting.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, and Member Ex-officio of the Gas Commission:

MY DEAR SIR—I learn through the public press that it is proposed to light certain streets and avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards by electric lights, to be maintained by wires strung upon poles in the streets.

I desire, as a resident and owner of real estate in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, to place before you my most earnest and solemn protest against such lighting, if it cannot be done by underground wires.

The residents of that district are anxious for all improvements, but they will not countenance the ruining of their highways or the danger to human life necessarily involved in the erection of poles for stringing electric-light wires.

Large sums of money have lately been expended in the lower part of the city in removing the poles and placing the wires in the subways, and if the wires cannot be so placed in our district at present, we can well afford to wait for electric lights until such subways are constructed.

Again, I protest against the price of forty-five cents per lamp per night, which I understand is the price asked by the company offering to supply the lights. If the companies in the lower part of the city, who have to pay large rents to the subway companies, can afford to furnish electric lights for forty cents per night, it seems outrageous to allow forty-five cents to a company not having such charges to pay.

I am informed that your Commission has no power in the matter, and I recognize the fact that you have no authority as to the manner of placing wires, but you have the power to refuse to make a contract until the wires are buried.

If the posts are put up and the wires strung upon them it will delay the making of the subways, unless some human life happens to be sacrificed in the meantime, and the poles and wires will remain as an unsightly obstruction in our streets for years to come.

One of the main reasons, as I understand it, for removing the poles and wires in the lower part of the city was the great sacrifice of human life which had been caused by such wires, and the injury to property caused by the poles and wires in the streets. It cannot be possible that the public officers of the City of New York will regard the lives of persons north of the Harlem river as any less important than those who are fortunate enough to live in the lower part of the city, where the subways are constructed.

I ask that no contract for electric lighting be awarded by your Commission until the subways are constructed, or at least, until an opportunity is given to me to present to your Commission the protest of residents and property-owners of that district who, I believe, are almost unanimous in their opposition to the stringing of electric wires on poles in the streets.

That the said street is continually frequented and is the resort, every night, up to a late hour, of a large concourse of people on their way from the Sixth and Ninth avenue elevated stations, corner of Fifty-ninth street and Ninth avenue to the Central Park, and back from the Central Park to said stations.

That your petitioners have found by experience that, on account of the large concourse of people so frequenting said street, the present gas lights are wholly inadequate to give proper light to the same.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that electric lights be substituted in the place and stead of the gas lights now therein.

And your petitioners will ever pray, etc., etc.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited with the Commissioner of Public Works of the City of New York, at his office, No. 31 Chambers street, in the said city, there to remain until the twenty-third day of February, 1891.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by the centre line of the block between One Hundred and Eighteenth street and One Hundred and Nineteenth street; easterly by the westerly line of Morningside avenue, West; southerly by the centre line of the block between One Hundred and Seventeenth street and One Hundred and Eighteenth street; and westerly by the easterly line of Tenth avenue; excepting from said area all the streets, avenues and roads, or portions thereof, heretofore legally opened, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the sixth day of March, 1891, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
