MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,
November 12, 1894.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

SIRS—I have the honor to herewith transmit to your Honorable Body, without my approval, the proposed ordinance to amend subdivision 21, section 107, article 8, chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880.

The amendment provides that "Any duly licensed hackney coach or cab may stand, while waiting for employment, at any of the following places, and for the periods of time hereafter provided."

Section I. "On all street corners, from 4 P. M. until sunrise."

As this would be an interference with public traffic, and would cause great inconvenience to the public because of its sweeping provisions, to occupy all corners of the streets of the city, I feel it to be my duty to veto the same.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 21 of section 107, article 8 of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Subdivision 21 of section 107 of article 8 of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section I. One public hack to each corner of any street or avenue in the City of New York.

Section II. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section III. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

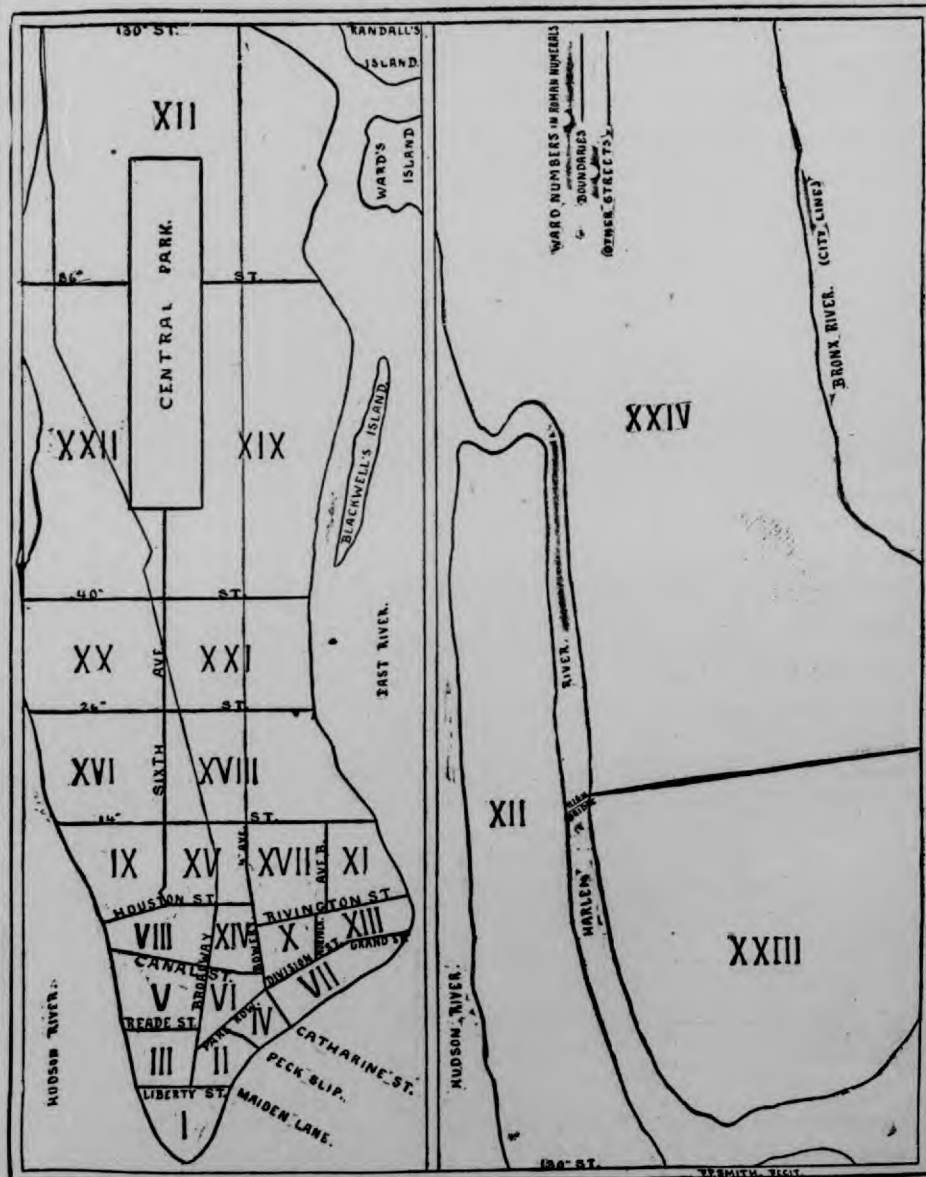

The 636 deaths represent a death-rate of 16.75, against 16.50 for the previous week and 18.40 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 94, 29, 50, 39 and 11, against 79, 10, 61, 23 and 7 for the previous week, a total of 223 against 180. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Thirteenth, Eighteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth and Eleventh Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Seventh and Twentieth Wards, there being no decrease in any ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eighth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh, Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. Seventeen of the 39 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 13 of the remaining 22 were below Fourteenth street, mostly east of the Bowery. Most of the cases of small-pox were above Thirty-fourth street, although 4 of the 11 were reported from Quarantine.

Bowery, Broadway, Carmine street, Catharine street, Chambers street, Christopher street, College place, Cortlandt street, Desbrosses street, Essex street, Exchange place, Fulton street, Hester street, Hudson street, Liberty street, Nassau street, New street, Park Row, Varick street, Wall street, West Broadway.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).

Or for any streets under the control of the Department of Parks, Docks and Public Works, except upon the consent of the heads of those Departments.

All existing permits for the occupancy by unharassed vehicles of any of the streets or portions of streets or places enumerated above are hereby revoked.

All unharassed wagons, trucks or other vehicles standing in the streets or public places, other than those for which permits have been issued and which are in compliance with the conditions of the same will be seized and removed to the Corporation Yards of the Department of Street Cleaning, in pursuance of the provisions of the law.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed, on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on

such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
