DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS, NEW YORK, July 6, 1896. *The Honorable WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, etc.:*

SIR—In accordance with the requirements of section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, we make the following report of the "operations and action" of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the three months ending June 30, 1896:

Though nominally for the last quarter, this report is actually a statement of the transactions of the Department and a summary of its work for the official year, which commences with the assessment of property by the Deputy Tax Commissioners on the first Monday in September, and terminates with the delivery of the assessment-rolls to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, as required by law.

The following statement shows the assessed valuation of real and personal estate in the City of New York for the year 1896, as compared with such valuations for the year 1895:

The substitution of tax sections for the former ward boundaries makes difficult any extended comparison of the valuations of wards or sections with those in the previous years.

Sections 4 and 7 have been added this year, and sections 1 and 2 will be used in the year 1897, while in 1898 section 8 will be included. The whole of Manhattan Island will then be assessed by tax sections instead of by wards.

The increase of \$15,554,920 in the valuation of the Twenty-fourth Ward is explained by the inclusion in this year's tax lists of the recently annexed territory in Westchester County.

Since last year the following changes have occurred in the list of banks:

The Federal Bank, capital \$100,000; the Harlem River Bank, capital \$100,000, and the Madison Square Bank, capital \$500,000, have been erased by reason of the liquidation of their business.

The capital of the Bank of America has been reduced from \$3,000,000 to \$1,500,000, and that of the Eighth Avenue Bank from \$100,000 to \$37,600.

The Standard Bank, with a capital of \$200,000 has been organized, and the Bank of Westchester, capital \$50,000, in the recently annexed district, has been added to the list.

These changes have made a total net decrease of \$2,012,400 in the nominal capital of the banks of this city, held subject to taxation.

Although this change was anticipated when the plans and specifications were prepared, and, notwithstanding a special stipulation as to possible future changes in that part of the dam, the proposed modification is of such importance as to cause me to call your attention to it and to ask your approval of such steps as I may have to take in that direction. Some of the approximate quantities indicated in the contract would be increased, others would be diminished, and the maximum height of the earth embankment would be substantially decreased.

The ultimate excess of cost due to the proposed change would be, approximately, \$150,000. The time of construction would not be materially increased.

This change, in my judgment, should be made.
