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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's

Office at 1. o'clock P. M., on Friday, March 19, 1897.

The reading of the minutes of the meeting held on March 12, 1897, was dispensed with.

The following communication was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, advising the Board that the election of Alderman of the Committee were in all respects regular, and that he is legally a member of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Law Department, Office of the Counsel to the Corporation, New York, March 19, 1897. To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sirs—I am in receipt of a communication bearing date 19th February, from Mr. Edgar J. Levey, Secretary of your Honorable Board, stating that at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held February 18, 1897, Mr. John T. Oakley appeared before the Board and presented a transcript, which Mr. Levey incloses, of the proceedings of the Common Council, and that, on motion, it was resolved to request the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to whether Mr. Oakley was a member of the Sinking Fund Commission.

The transcript of the proceedings of the Common Council referred to in Mr. Levey's communication, sets forth the proceedings of the Board, of the Finance Committee and the subsequent proceedings of the Common Council upon the report of the Finance Committee.

The general law of the State as regards the powers of a public body to transact business is to be found in the Statutory Construction Law, section 19, which is, so far as relevant, as follows:

"§ 19. Whenever three or more public officers are given any power or authority, or three or more persons are charged with any public duty to be performed or exercised by them jointly, or "as a board or similar body, a majority of all such persons or officers, at a meeting duly held at "the time fixed by law or by any by-law duly adopted by such board or body or at any duly adjourned meeting, or at any meeting duly held upon reasonable notice to all of them, may perform and exercise such po

However, the section just cited is qualified by the provisions of section 1 of the same statute, which are as follows:

which are as follows:

"SECTION I. This chapter shall be known as the Statutory Construction Law, and is applicable
to every statute unless its general object, or the context of the language construed, or other
tropicions of law indicate that a different meaning or application was intended from that
trequired to be given by this chapter."

This section is very sweeping in its effect, and it converts the Statutory Construction Law
from a general statute, intended to cover all cases, into a statute which merely provides for cases
omitted from other laws.

In other words, the Statutory Construction Law provides for the exception, not for the general

rule.

That this is the effect of the statute, has been held substantially by the courts in several cases, and with very great clearness in the most recent case, Matter of Bronson, 150 N. Y., I.

In the case mentioned, the definitions of "property" in the Statutory Construction Law were somewhat different from those of the Transfer Tax Act, and the question before the Court of Appeals was as to whether in determining the taxability of certain property under the Transfer Tax Act it was to be guided by the definitions contained in the Statutory Construction Law or those of the Transfer Tax Act.

And the court said upon this question:

"In the endeavor to ascertain the intention of the Legislature with respect to what should be assessable for the purposes of taxation as property under this act, we need go no further than the act itself; which, in imposing the tax, undertakes, in addition, to give a definition to property, the transfer of which by will, or by the intestate laws of the State, creates the liability to taxation. It seems unimportant to consider that section of the Statutory Construction Law which gives a definition to the term 'personal property' (chapter 677, Laws of 1892, § 4), if, indeed, applicable. The act contains within itself a complete system for the taxation of transfers of property in case of testacy and of intestacy, and also controlling definitions for such words "used in its sections as, in the judgment of the Legislature, might seem to require definition." The section of the Statutory Construction Act, in terms, is only applicable, as I think, to a "statute, where its general object, or the context of the language construed, or other provisions of law do not indicate that a different meaning is intended."

Matter of Bronson, 150 N. Y., 1-5.

The question then is, whether there is any statute other than the Statutory Construction Law which is applicable to the present case, because if there exists such a statute, then it must control. The answer is found in section 46 of the Consolidation Act, which provides as follows:

"§ 46. A majority of the members of a board in any department of the city government, and "also of the board for the revision and correction of assessments, shall constitute a quorum to "fully perform and discharge any act or duty authorized, possessed by or imposed upon any "department or any board aforesaid, and with the same legal effect as if every member of the Board were present, except as herein otherwise specially provided."

The last section which need be noticed on this question is section 74 of the Consolidation Act,

which provides:

"Sec. 74. Every legislative act of the common council shall be by resolution or ordinance.
"No ordinance or resolution shall be passed except by a vote of the majority of all the members "elected to the Board." Under the section last mentioned, it must be determined whether or not the election of an

Aldermen as a member of the Fin is not "an ordinance."

The proceedings show that—
"Alderman Goodwin having been requested to reduce his motion to writing, handed up the 44 following :

"I move that John T. Oakley be and he hereby is appointed to and elected a member of the "Finance Committee, in place of Hon. William M. K. Olcott, resigned."

"The Vice-President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion

" of Alderman Goodwin."

Upon this question the affirmative votes were 14 in number and the negative were 13.

The Vice-President decided that the motion was lost, as a majority of all the members elected, sixteen in number, had failed to vote in the affirmative, but, there having been an appeal from the decision of the Chair, the question "Shall the decision of the Chair be sustained?" was decided

in the negative, by 14 votes in the negative to 12 in the affirmative.

It may be that the real effect of the action of the Board on a motion as that just mentioned is equivalent to that of a resolution, but, however that may be, it must be taken to be what it was in fact, namely, a simple motion, and, therefore, it is not governed by the provisions of section 74 of the Consolidation Act.

Another question is, whether or not such a motion is a "legislative act."

This must be clearly answered in the negative, it being merely a matter concerned with the internal economy and procedure of the Board itself, and having no relation to the legislative, i. e., the law-making power of the Common Council.

Therefore such an act need not be by resolution and is not within the provisions of section 74,

that no ordinance or resolution shall be passed except by a vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Board.

It would seem, therefore, that the election of Alderman Oakley as a member of the Finance Committee is governed by sections 46 and 70 of the Consolidation Act, and that as a quorum of the Board of Aldermen had the full powers of the entire Board, except so far as limited by the provisions of section 74; a majority vote of that quorum was sufficient to act upon the motion for the election of a member of the Finance Committee.

I do not discuss in this opinion the effect of the proceedings of the Finance Committee itself, which resulted in the election of Alderman Oakley as the Chairman of that Committee, as I understand the only question which has raised any doubt in your minds is, the effect of the proceedings of the Board itself, and not of those of the Finance Committee.

I am conscious of the importance of this question in view of its possible effect upon the validity of the acts of your Board, and, while I would have preferred that in a matter of such consequence the courts, and not myself, should have been called upon to express an opinion, which would furnish a guide to your Honorable Body, yet, as the question has been asked me officially, it is my duty to inform you that it is my opinion that the election of Alderman Oakley as a member of the Finance Committee and his subsequent election as the Chairman of that Committee were in all respects regular, and that he is therefore legally a member of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

DEAR SIR—I am informed that the new building for the use of this Department in Crotona Park will be ready for occupancy in a few days. There will be some small things, I understand, that the contractor will not have finished, owing to the new furniture not being in the building. understand he is willing to have a proper portion of his money withheld until he actually completes his contract.

My object in writing this letter is to ask you to take such steps as will permit the building to be accepted by the City at the earliest date possible. The lease of the present building expires on May I next, and it will take some little time, of course, to arrange, conveniently, the transfer of the office and its business from our present location. You can readily understand, of course, that it would not be advisable to wait until the last moment to move into the building.

Whereupon the Comptroller submitted report of Engineer McLean or the Finance Department, as follows:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT, March 19, 1897. Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioner of Public Works, in communication of March 12, 1897, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, states, on reports from the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, and the Architect, Mr. George B. Post, that the Crotona Park building is practically completed and ready for occupancy by the Department of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and recommends that the Commissioner of Street Improvements be authorized to take possession of and occupy the new building.

The report of the Architect, Mr. Post, says: "The mason-work is practically completed," also the carpenter-work. The plumbing-work is practically completed—a few brass tags for valves to be furnished, and, possibly, some minor matters. The iron-work is completed, the "steam-heating completed, the marble-work completed, the cabinet-work completed, the "electric-work completed, with the exception of lamps and shades, and telephones to furniture, "which cannot be placed until after the furniture is in position, and a few minor points."

\* \* Decorative work is completed except the ceiling of the entrance vestibule. The

miscellaneous work is completed with the exception of rear windows, which cannot be done

"until warm weather.

"You will see, therefore, that the work is so nearly completed, that a reserve of \$1,500 would
be ample to secure the completion of the building by the contractor, and upon this basis he would
be entitled to a payment of \$16,008.24."

The Commissioner of Public Works says: "Some small detail work, amounting in the aggregate
to less than \$1,500, remains to be done by the contractor for the building, but has to await
the placing of furniture and other conditions for which the contractor is not responsible, and the
occupancy of the building will not interfere with this work. In the meantime the City withholds
from the contractor fifteen per cent. of the total amount of his contract and his payments have
heretofore been delayed in consequence of interior changes of the original plans. The Architect,
Mr. Post, states that the retention of \$1,500 would fully secure the City in respect to the work
remaining to be done, and I respectfully submit to the Commissioners the question whether the
Architect should not be directed to make out his estimate and certificate for payment in full,

"with the retention of \$1,500 only."

The object in view, at present, is not especially to relieve the contractor, but, by authorizing 
the occupation of the building, immediately, to avoid the payment of another year's rent of the 
premises now occupied by the Department. In my view the formal and final acceptance of the 
contractor's work, to be evidenced by a final statement, which would consume some considerable 
time, is not necessary in this case, as a condition precedent to the occupation of the building.

I have carefully inspected the building, within the past week, and find it so nearly completed 
that the occupation could not, possibly, interfere with the few items enumerated by the Architect 
as yet to be done, nor cause the least injury to the contractor.

I have seen the contractor, and find him not only willing, but anxious that the building 
should be occupied, as it will save him some expense in taking care of it.

The lease of the premises now occupied by the Commissioner of Street Improvements, 
Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, will expire on the 1st of May next, and it will require at 
least two weeks to move, without hurry or confusion, into the new building.

In my opinion the authority for this occupation could properly and safely be given by only 
obtaining the consent of the contractor and his sureties to the same, and I would respectfully 
recommend that this authority be given.

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith a report made to me by the Engineer of the Finance Department relative to the request of the Superintendent of Buildings for a lease of the second and third floors of the building at the junction of Third and Courtland avenues, known as No. 2775 Third avenue.

From this report it appears that the rental demanded—\$1,860 per annum—is altogether too high, and that \$1,200 per annum would be a full and fair rental therefor.

The owner has refused to lease this property for less than the rent originally demanded, and I am therefore compelled to report against this proposed lease.

SIR—The Superintendent of Buildings, in communication of December 31, 1896, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, request "that a lease be obtained by the City of the second and "third floors of the building at the junction of Third and Courtlandt avenues, and known as No. "2775 Third avenue, as a branch office for the use of the Department of Buildings, from January 1, 1897, to December 31, 1897, at the rate of \$1,860 per annum. These premises have been cocupied by this Department as a branch office since June last, rent free."

On March 10, 1896, the Superintendent requested that the second floor of this building be leased at \$60 per month. I reported this rate reasonable. But no action was taken, except to lay it over.

On May 27, 1896, the Superintendent requested the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund "to the offer of Mr. Boehm to give the top floor of the building free of charge until "the 1st of January next."

This approval was accorded.

How far this "rent free" and "free of charge" enters into the proposed rent of these premises for the year 1897 I cannot tell, but I am quite sure that the sum proposed, \$1,860 per annum, is altogether too high.

annum, is altogether too high.

I think that \$1,200 per annum would be a full and fair rental.

January 21, 1897. The owner of this property, Mr. Boehm, having called upon me in relation to my report, states that he will not lease the property at less than the sum named, \$1,860 per annum. That he has made large improvements in the second story, which cost him about \$650.

These improvements consist in dividing the floor by partitions into three rooms, with necessary halls and corridors. He stated further that he receives \$1,500 per annum for the store, which includes the whole ground floor. halls and corridors. He stated further that he receives \$1,500 pc. annual includes the whole ground floor.

This property is valued on the tax books at \$17,000. This represents, at 60 per cent. a market value of \$28,333.

I estimate the value at \$30,000. At his estimated value, the rent which Mr. Boehm expects to receive would be \$1,500 + \$1,860 = \$3,360, which would be \$11 \frac{11}{10}\$ per cent. of the same.

With the rent which I name for the second and third stories, \$1,200, he would receive \$1,500 + \$1,200 = \$2,700, which is 9 per cent. of the whole value.

These same two floors were leased in 1890, for the Park Department, at the rental of \$780 per annum. Much of the time since they have been unoccupied, as I am informed.

Of course, the owner has a right to charge what he pleases; but I give the above facts and figures to show that the rent I name is reasonable.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT, March 17, 1897. Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller:

SIR—I have examined the building No. 220 East Fifty-ninth street, formerly occupied by the Police Department, now assigned to the Volunteer Firemen's Association.

Vice-President Daniel Bradley of the association, in a communication to the Mayor of February 18, 1897, says, that a careful inspection of the building was made in compliance with the request of the Mayor, and that to place the building in good order for the use of the Volunteer Firemen's Association, an outlay of \$3,500 will be necessary.

The following are the alterations and additions to the building which the association wishes to to be made, and which it estimates will cost the sum named above, \$3,500, viz.:

BASEMENT.

Basement floor of the front building to be carried out to the front wall of the rear building on the same level as at present. Rear building to have wooden floor instead of the present flag floor. Two windows to be put in rear wall of rear building.

IN THE FIRST STORY.

The present front door to be made ten feet in height and to have sash in top panels.

The western window, in front, to be made into a door with sash in top panels.

Continue the present floor to the front of the rear building.

Take out the rear wall of the front building below the top of the first story, supporting the

Build up, and roof over, what is now the yard, placing a skylight in the top. The ceiling to be the same height as that of the front building, also take out the front wall of the rear building. Take out the flag floor of the rear building and put in new timbers and new floor at proper height from basement floor of same building. To take down the present stairways, from the first to the fourth stories, and replace them by new ones to be built along the west wall.

As will be seen by this enumeration, the first object to be obtained is a large room extending from the front to the rear of the lot, the continuity only being broken in the floor by a rise of three feet to the floor of the back building. To obtain as much clear space as possible in this room the present stairs are to be taken down and stairs next to and along the line of the west wall are to be built. The small extension in the yard is to be taken down and all the space between the front and rear building, about 15 feet, to be built up and roofed over.

I have examined the buildings carefully. The roof of the front building is in very bad condition and the present material should be removed and the whole surface tinned. The chimneys are out of shape and leaning, and ought to be rebuilt. The coping and cornice are also out of order and require resetting and repair. The roof of the rear building is also in very bad condition and the covering should be replaced by tin. The brick work above the roof and the coping should be attended to. This building is in such bad condition that it will require to make it habitable two entire new floors and thorough overhauling.

The other work enumerated is subsidiary to this and there is nothing called for which is unreasonable in itself.

unreasonable in itself.

It is almost impossible to make an exact estimate of such irregular work, but I have considered as closely as possible all the items necessary and think that the estimate given by the association, \$3,500, is close. The work may require three or four hundred dollars more.

The accompanying plans show in detail the work to be done.

The buildings not having been used for a number of years except as storeroom a very large portion of the above estimate is for putting the buildings in a habitable condition.

I am not aware of any source from which the funds for this work can be obtained except the appropriation made to the Commissioner of Public Works for repairs to public buildings.

If the work can be done the City will be relieved of a vexed question which has been a source of trouble for a considerable time, and the Board of Education can proceed with the execution of the contract which has been awarded for preparing the Essex Market Building for school purposes.

STATE OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF NEW YORK CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION, ALBANY, March 16, 1897. Hon. W. L. STRONG, Mayor, New York City:

DEAR SIR—The State Civil Service Commission has heretofore depended upon the use of the rooms of the New York City Commission for such examinations as it needed to hold in New York City. Owing to the increase of the City Commission's work they are compelled to use their examination room practically all the time and we, therefore, have great difficulty in finding suitable rooms for examination purposes. The funds at our disposal do not admit of our hiring rooms at any great expense, and section 3 of the Civil Service Law especially provides that local officers having the custody of public buildings shall offer us such use of them as is consistent with the use for other purposes. It would be a great convenience if this Commission could have some regular place for examinations in some public building in New York City, which we could be reasonably sure of obtaining when needed. In order to simplify this matter I should be willing to set all our examinations on the same day of the week, say Saturday, so as to interfere as little as possible with the other uses of the room. Can you tell me where, in any of the public buildings, there is a room suitable for use as an examination room, which we could be reasonably sure of obtaining for use on any Saturday on a few days' notice 40 the custodian? It occurs to me that possibly some room may be available in some of the school buildings of the City. Our holding examinations generally in New York City will depend largely on our ability to secure the necessary accommodations at small expense.
