Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

DEAR SIR—I herewith respectfully transmit quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor during the quarter ending September 30, 1899, to wit:

CARPENTER'S WORK.

At Fourth District Prison—Putting in two panes of glass in hall window; putting in new sash cord in windows of male prison and prison kitchen; putting up two new shelves in office; putting up six gas balls, also six new shades on gas fixtures; carpenter's utensils, one small smoothing plane and one carpenter's try square.

PLUMBING AND TINSMITHING.

At Second District Prison—By paid labor: repair of hot water boiler to supply hot water throughout the building.

At Third District Prison—By paid labor: cleaning exhaust pipes and overhauling furnaces situated in cellar of prison.

At Fourth District Prison—By unpaid labor: putting 7 new brass water faucets in cells on first and second tiers, also 10 new rubber washers in closets of male prison; repairing locks on cells of first and third tier.

At Fifth District Prison—By paid labor: Constructing in laundry new hot water supply pipe, and putting in six new faucets to wash trays and repairing leak on bathtub, material used: 6 five-eighth-inch comp. wash tray cocks, 62 pounds lead pipe, 8 pounds solder, 5 pounds putty, $\frac{1}{2}$ pound charcoal, 1 three-eighth inch plug, 1 pound nails, 2 candles and 1 pound lampwick. Putting in new front piece on Mott Defiance Range, No. 9 (36 pounds castings); also 1 set of grate bars and 1 front grate.

At Seventh District Prison—Putting in 1 set of rings on Richardson & Boynton Range Perfect, No. 14; masons and plasterers' work.

At Third District Prison—By prison labor: Scraping and pointing walls of 52 cells, preparatory for painting same.

At Fifth District Prison—Scraping walls in carriage-house and whitewashing same, material used $\frac{1}{2}$ barrel lime, 5 pounds com. glue, 5 U. M. Blue.

PAINTER'S WORK.

At Second District Prison—Painting interior of prison cells and walls, finishing throughout the male and female department, material used: 6 (pound) paint brushes, 6 sash tools, 3,000 pounds white lead, 40 gallons raw oil, 30 gallons boiled oil, 20 gallons turpentine, 25 pounds paid. driers, 50 pounds chrome green and 25 pound of Indian red.

At Third District Prison—Painting 52 cells (3 coats of paint), also painting exterior walls and ceiling of male and female prison, retouching cell numbers and repainting sub-bases, material used, 1223 pounds white lead, $3\frac{1}{2}$ pounds U. M. blue, 13 pounds emerald green, 11 pounds burnt umber, $4\frac{1}{2}$ pounds engl patent driers, 2 pounds Indian red, 10 pounds putty, $3\frac{1}{2}$ gallons liquid driers, 6 gallons spar varnish, 38 gallons boiled oil, 41 gallons turpentine, 2 flat paint brushes, 4 one-pound paint brushes, 4 sash tools, 3 long-handled steel scrapers and 4 short-handled painter scrapers.

At Fourth District Prison—Painting roof of vegetable house, painting bases of male and female prison, material used 25 pounds Prince's metallic, 3 pounds burnt sienna, 5 pounds Indian red and 5 pounds chrome green.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Sec. 134. That the owners, lessees, tenants and managers of every blacksmith or other shop, forge, coal yard, foundry, manufactory and premises where any business is done, or in or upon which an engine or boilers are used, shall cause all ashes, cinders, rubbish, dirt and refuse to be removed to some proper place, so that the same shall not accumulate at any of the above-mentioned premises or in the appurtenances thereof, nor the same become filthy or offensive. Nor shall any owner, lessee, tenant, manager, engineer, fireman or any other person cause or allow any smoke, cinders, dust, gas, steam or offensive odor to escape or be discharged from any such building, place or premises; and every furnace employed in the working of engines by steam, or in any mill, factory, printing house, dye factory, iron foundry, glass house, distillery, brew house, sugar refinery, bake house, gas works or in any other buildings used for the purposes of trade or manufacture shall be so constructed as to consume or burn the smoke arising therefrom.

Third—That we propose to assess for benefit, which assessment will appear in our last partial and separate abstract of estimate and assessment, and will be contained in our last partial and separate report, all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Seventy-first street and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom with a line drawn parallel to the westerly side of Washington avenue and distant 100 feet westerly therefrom; running thence northerly along the last-mentioned parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street and distant 100 feet northerly therefrom; thence easterly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the easterly side of Lorillard place and distant 100 feet easterly therefrom; thence southerly along said parallel line to the northwesterly side of Belmont place, near its junction with Third avenue; thence southerly on a straight line to the intersection of the southwesterly side of Belmont place with a line drawn parallel to the easterly side of Third avenue and distant 100 feet easterly therefrom; thence southerly along said parallel line to its intersection with a line drawn parallel to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Seventy-first street and distant 100 feet southerly therefrom; thence westerly along said parallel line to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That our first partial and separate report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III., to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 18th day of December, 1899, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
