

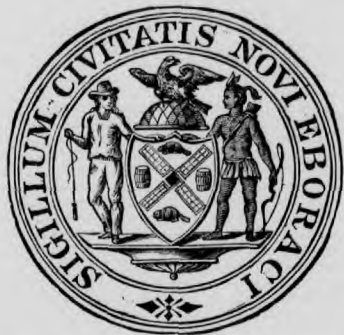

MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

THE COUNCIL. STATED MEETING.

TUESDAY, February 6, 1900,
2 o'clock P. M.

The Council met in Room 16, City Hall.

Whereas, This will be the first visit of the intrepid Admiral to the Borough of Brooklyn, a distinction and an honor greatly appreciated by the residents thereof, but not more so than by the City generally; therefore

Resolved, That the greetings of the Municipality be and they are hereby cordially extended to the Admiral and to Mrs. Dewey, and that in welcoming them to our city the freedom thereof be and it is most cordially bestowed.

To his Honor the Mayor and the Honorable the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to the provisions of section 195 of the Charter of The City of New York of 1897, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, the Commissioners of Accounts do hereby certify and report to the Mayor and Municipal Assembly that they have examined the accounts and vouchers of the City Chamberlain's office for the period commencing on the morning of December 1, 1898, and ending November 30, 1899 (with the exception of vouchers, viz.: Nos. 1116, 1117, 3923, 3930 "A," Borough of Queens, and No. 228, Borough of Richmond, amounting to \$168.37, which are missing), and find therefrom as follows:

The balance in the Treasury to the credit of the City Treasury Accounts on the morning of the 1st day of December, 1898, was.....

All of said payments were made by the Chamberlain from the Treasury upon warrants drawn in due form by the Comptroller and signed by the Mayor or his Chief Clerk, in accordance with the requirements of chapter 64, Laws of 1887, as amended by chapter 85, Laws of 1888. Such warrants were so drawn in payment of bills examined, audited and allowed by the Auditor of Accounts, and filed in the Finance Department.

The petition of The New York and Brooklyn Union Transportation Company respectfully shows:

I. That your petitioner is a railroad corporation, duly organized and incorporated under and in pursuance of the provisions of an act of the legislature of the State of New York entitled "The Railroad Law." That the said corporation proposes to build, construct, maintain and operate a railroad for public use in the conveyance for compensation of persons and property in cars and trains of cars, through tunnels, in The City of New York, and that, as stated in your petitioner's articles of incorporation, the termini of said railroad will be in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

That the proposed routes of said railroad tunnels pass under the surface of the following streets, avenues, highways, private property and of the East river, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, City of New York, to wit:

Commencing at a point under Canal street, Borough of Manhattan, at or near to the junction of Sullivan, Varick and Canal streets, thence under Canal, Watts, West and Vestry streets back to Canal street, thence under Canal street to East Broadway, under it to Grand street, under it to the East river, under it to Broadway, Brooklyn, under it, Wythe avenue, South Eighth street and Kent avenue, Brooklyn. At or near to the junction of Canal, East Broadway and Rutgers streets, Borough of Manhattan, branch tunnels go under Rutgers street and Rutgers slip to the East river, under it and Adams street, Brooklyn, to High street, under it, the Plaza and Sands street, back to Adams street. The tunnels will pass under the piers, docks and bulkheads upon said route, and under the crossings of the streets which intersect it, as shown by the map filed herewith.

II. The railroad proposed to be built, constructed, maintained and operated by your petitioner, as hereinbefore set forth, is intended to be operated by electricity, or such other power as may now or hereafter lawfully be used or employed upon its route. That the railroad shall be of standard gauge and provided with double tracks; constructed through a single tunnel or through two separate tunnels.

III. The fare for the transportation of each passenger, for a single journey, from any point of the railroad to any point thereof, shall be uniformly five cents. The charge for the conveyance of property shall be that allowed or provided by law.

Wherefore, Your petitioner prays and makes application to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, for a grant of the franchise and right to use the certain streets, avenues, crossings, places, river and waterways, as above set forth, and for its consent and permission to be granted to your petitioner, its successors or successors, lessees and assigns, to construct, maintain and operate a tunnel railroad as afore described for compensation and for public use for the period of fifty years, and for a renewal or renewals of such franchise or right for a period of twenty-five years after the expiration of the said period of fifty years on a fair revaluation or revaluations of the said plant and property of your petitioner, underneath the said streets, avenues, crossings, places, river and waterways above set forth and described, together with room for all necessary terminals, connections, switches, sidings, turn-outs, turntables, cross-overs, signals, store, power and repair-houses and other facilities, stations and suitable stands underneath the said streets, avenues, street-crossings and places, river and waterways, as well as stations at the surface thereof required for the accommodation of passengers and for the convenient construction, maintenance, working and operation of said tunnel railroad and for the accommodation of the cars which may be used thereon by your petitioner, its successors, lessees or assigns.

DEAR SIR—Some weeks ago I wrote to the Boards of Supervisors throughout the State, calling attention to the fact that through lack of time I had been unable to hold the meeting in each county in relation to the improvement of highways required by the so-called "Good Roads Law," and suggesting that delegates be appointed by each board to attend a public meeting in Albany during the month of February with the view of obtaining statistics from the different sections of the State and full discussion of the subject by the delegates. It is my hope that a meeting of this description, bringing together representatives from all of the counties, will be the means of affording much instructive and valuable information regarding material for the construction of roads, including gravel, different qualities of stone, etc., and as to the sentiment of the citizens of the State in relation to this matter; it being desired to have delegates who will express the opinion of their localities whether favoring or opposed to State in road construction.

I have been notified that three or more delegates have been appointed from nearly every county, and have decided to hold the meeting in Albany on Wednesday and Thursday, February 7 and 8.

The delegates are requested to meet at the City Hall on Eagle street, in Albany, at 10.30 A. M., February 7, when the first meeting will be held. An afternoon session will be held at 2.30 P. M. of the same day. No morning session will be held on Thursday, the 8th, thus giving such of the delegates as desire an opportunity to visit the Capitol while the Legislature is in session; but an afternoon session will be held at 2 P. M. of the 8th, followed in the evening by a lecture accompanied by stereopticon views illustrating good roads work in this and foreign countries. The lecture will be held at 8 P. M. at the State Normal School Hall, on Willett street. It is expected that Governor Roosevelt and other speakers will make brief addresses at the evening session.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I have the honor to transmit herewith my estimate for New Stock (Bond Account) for the present year. In my opinion, the items enumerated will be necessary to supply and properly equip the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. I find that there is a sufficient surplus left over in the Bond Accounts for the other boroughs to suffice for 1900, and therefore the estimate is confined to the two boroughs named.

In submitting this estimate I earnestly desire that it may be allowed just as submitted, as I have gone over each of these items and find that the quantities and prices are both as low as the prevailing conditions will admit.

The sum total, as will be seen, amounts to \$144,649, and in this connection I desire to call attention to the fact that in my estimate for Bond Account for 1899, for the Borough of Queens, there was allowed four (4) crematories for the destruction of refuse at \$30,000 each, amounting to \$120,000, and for the Borough of Richmond three (3) crematories, also at \$30,000, amounting to \$90,000.

After these sums were allowed, it was for potent reasons considered unadvisable at the time to appropriate the money for the purpose indicated in these two boroughs, consequently the money so allowed has not been used. It is quite within the possibilities that a portion of these amounts for crematories in these two boroughs may be expended in the near future, but even if the contemplated amounts are expended, it will still leave a balance in those two accounts for the boroughs of Queens and Richmond sufficient for the needs of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the present year.

Therefore if the \$144,649 could be transferred from the \$220,000 appropriated for crematories in Queens and Richmond, to the Bond Account of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in the following manner—\$80,000 from the \$120,000 in the Bond Account for Queens, and \$64,649 from the \$90,000 in the Bond Account for Richmond—it would provide the necessary \$144,649 in the Bond Account for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, thus obviating the necessity for a bond issue for that purpose.

This request is made subject to the action of the Board of Public Improvements and consent of the Municipal Assembly, if such action and consent are legal requirements.
