### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
WEDNESDAY, August 28, 1901.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—Randolph Guggenheimer, the Acting Mayor; Bird S. Coler, the Comptroller; George L. Sterling, the Acting Corporation Counsel; John T. Oakley, the Vice-President of the Council; Thomas L. Feitner, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.  
Absent—Robert A. Van Wyck, the Mayor.

The Comptroller moved that the minutes of the meeting held August 21, 1901, be approved.  
Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Acting Mayor, Comptroller, Acting Corporation Counsel, Vice-President of the Council and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—5.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, to whom the following communication was referred August 21, 1901, presented the following report:

THE TRUSTEES OF THE NEW YORK PUBLIC LIBRARY,  
ASTOR, LENOX AND TILDEN FOUNDATIONS,

CARNEGIE LIBRARY SITE NO. 1.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK:

SIR—By clause First of the agreement of July 17, 1901, between The City of New York and this corporation, it is provided that "any site now possessed or hereafter acquired by the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, may, with the approval of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be used as a site for the erection and maintenance of such branch public libraries as aforesaid."

I am instructed to ask the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the use as a site for a branch public library of the premises known as Nos. 222 and 224 East Seventy-ninth street, in this city, being a plot 40 feet in width, front and rear, by 102 feet and 2 inches in depth, situated 265 feet easterly from Third avenue. These premises were purchased by this library last Spring for the purpose of erecting thereon a branch library. At the present time this library maintains a branch on the ground floor of a building on the northwest corner of Seventy-ninth street and Second avenue. There is only one large room where the entire work of the library is done and the building is in very poor sanitary condition. Last year 155,684 books were circulated from this centre, and there were 14,889 volumes read in the crowded little space called the "reading room." The neighborhood is densely populated and there are many tenements and apartment houses in the immediate vicinity filled with people anxious to use the library. We are at present unable to supply the demand for books and it is impossible to do more than we are now doing in our crowded quarters.

It is hoped that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will give its approval to the use of the site referred to in view (1) of the necessity for adequate library accommodations in that part of the city, (2) the sufficiency of the plot for the purpose and (3) the fact that the plot has been obtained without cost to the City Treasury.

NEW YORK, August 27, 1901.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with your resolution of reference, in relation to the site for the free public library to be located at Nos. 222 and 224 East Seventy-ninth street, I respectfully report that, under the provisions of the agreement entered into by this Board and the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, I can see no objection to the adoption of the resolution presented by the Comptroller, unless it is deemed advisable by this Board, before the adoption of any particular site, to have submitted to it the proposed sites for the first ten branches to be erected in conformity with the second section of said agreement, and also, before anything further is done in connection with the erection and equipment of these free public libraries, to consider whether adequate representation for the amount contributed by the City for this purpose should not be obtained by it in the Board of Trustees of the New York Public Library.

The City has already contributed to this private corporation lands and buildings aggregating, when constructed, ten millions of dollars, an amount about equal to the endowment fund of the Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, and it is now provided, under the agreement entered into between this City and the New York Public Library, that a sum equal to at least 10 per cent. of the Carnegie gift shall be annually appropriated by the City for the support and maintenance of these free circulating libraries, while they are all to be under the care, supervision, control and operation of this private corporation, without any voice on the part of the City.

That such a vast system of public instruction—for such these libraries really are—should be entirely without direction or supervision by the people who support them, is to me quite incomprehensible, and a very dangerous educational innovation.

Before any further action is taken by this Board, I believe it to be its bounden duty to protect the City's interest in this respect.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 580 of the Laws of 1901, and the first clause of the agreement of July 17, 1901, between The City of New York and the New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the use as a site for the erection and maintenance of a branch public library of the premises known as Nos. 222 and 224 East Seventy-ninth street, Borough of Manhattan, being a plot forty (40) feet in width, front and rear, by one hundred and two (102) feet two (2) inches in depth, situated two hundred and sixty-five (265) feet easterly from Third avenue.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Acting Mayor, Comptroller, Acting Corporation Counsel, Vice-President of the Council and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—5.

The Comptroller presented a communication from the Department of Highways, dated May 20, 1901, requesting an appropriation of \$35,072 for the restoration of that portion of Riverside Park destroyed during the construction of the Riverside Drive Viaduct, together with a report of the Engineer of the Finance Department relative thereto.

The Comptroller moved that they be referred to the Department of Highways.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I beg to submit plans and estimates for constructing two flights of steps as approaches to the Conservatory, Central Park, including the grading of the surrounding grounds, drainage of the platforms and walks and asphaltting the semi-circular walk west of the Conservatory.

The Conservatory has proved one of the most attractive and popular features of the park, but comparatively little has been done to improve its surroundings. All the grading and planting north, east and south of the Conservatory has been done from time to time by the gardening force. The Gardeners cannot, however, now perform the work in question and, owing to its urgency and importance, I would respectfully recommend your approval and authorization of an expenditure of twelve thousand one hundred dollars (\$12,100) for the purpose, to be provided by the issue of bonds, pursuant to the provisions of the Charter.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Honorable George C. Clausen, Commissioner of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in communication dated July 31, 1901, submits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, plans and estimates for constructing two flights of steps as approaches to the Conservatory, Central Park (near One Hundred and Fourth street and Fifth avenue); the work includes the grading of the surrounding grounds, drainage of the platform and walks, and asphaltting the semi-circular walk west of the Conservatory.

The Commissioner states that "the Conservatory has proved one of the most attractive and popular features of the park, but comparatively little has been done to improve its surroundings. All the grading and planting north, east and south of the Conservatory has been done, from time to time, by the gardening force. The gardeners cannot, however, now perform the work in question and, owing to its urgency and importance, I would respectfully recommend your approval and authorization of an expenditure of twelve thousand one hundred dollars (\$12,100) for the purpose, to be provided by the issue of bonds pursuant to the provisions of the Charter."

In reply, I would report that the work consists of  
First—Building new bluestone steps, opposite main entrance of Conservatory at One Hundred and Fourth street and Fifth avenue, to take the place of the present temporary wooden steps, and do all necessary grading, asphalt, etc.  
Second—Bluestone steps, platforms, etc., for rear approach to Conservatory, including drainage, grading, asphalt, etc.

The improvements suggested, I consider advantageous and the estimate reasonable; therefore, I would advise that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to the provisions of section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue corporate stock to the amount of \$12,100 for the purpose of making the above improvements.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the expenditure of an amount not exceeding twelve thousand one hundred dollars (\$12,100), for constructing two flights of steps as approaches to the Conservatory, Central Park, near One Hundred and Fourth street and Fifth avenue, including the grading of the surrounding grounds, drainage of the platform and walks and asphalt, the semi-circular walk west of the Conservatory, by the Department of Parks, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Municipal Assembly, the Comptroller be authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of twelve thousand one hundred dollars (\$12,100), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I have the honor, upon recommendation of the Chief of Department, to respectfully request that your Honorable Board please consent to the transfer of the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) from some available balance of appropriation in the City Treasury, for the purpose of reconstructing a portion of the underground electrical system of this Department along Broadway, from Sixty-fourth to One Hundred and Fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, damaged by the contractor for the Underground Rapid Transit Railroad Company in his work of constructing the road, said company having submitted a proposition to defray two-thirds of the cost of the work, which is estimated will amount to \$6,000, upon condition that the Department pay the other third, viz., \$2,000.

The Department not having available funds at its disposal the Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated the 31st ultimo, reciting the facts of the case (a copy of which is herewith inclosed), advises that the Fire Commissioner make application to your Honorable Board for a transfer of an amount sufficient to meet the necessary cost and expense in restoring the conduit and cable or in the construction of a new one.

In view of the urgency of the case, I respectfully ask favorable action upon this application.

Hon. JOHN J. SCANNELL, Fire Commissioner:

SIR—A communication from your Department, by its Secretary, dated May 23, was received, which reads as follows:

"Under date of November 27, 1900, a letter was forwarded from this office, bringing to your notice the fact that John B. McDonald, contractor for building the Underground Rapid Transit Railroad, during the progress of his work along Broadway, between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets, had not properly cared for the property of this Department, in that there were about twenty-five places where the underground cable of our fire-alarm system had become disjoined and the cable in danger of being broken. His attention had already been called to this condition of affairs but without result, and you were therefore requested to advise the Fire Commissioner whether the Department had the legal right to have the necessary repairs done by contract at public letting, at the expense of the contractor.

"Under date of December 14, 1900, a communication was received from you advising that the Department would be competent to proceed in such manner after due notification to the contractor, to protect its underground property, and the expense of the work would be then properly chargeable to him.

"You further stated that it was the Department's desire you would prepare the proper notice to serve on the contractor, but suggested that before taking such action the matter be again brought to his attention, with request that care be taken to preserve the Department's underground cable during the progress of the work of building the railroad, and the course suggested by you was followed by this office.

"On January 25, 1901, a further communication was sent you reciting these facts; also that the matter had again been brought to the attention of Contractor McDonald, in a letter reading as follows:

"FIRE DEPARTMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK—BUREAU, CHIEF OF DEPARTMENT,  
"FIRE ALARM TELEGRAPH BRANCH,  
"BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX,  
"NEW YORK, December 24, 1900.

"JOHN B. McDONALD, Esq., Rapid Transit Subway Company:

"DEAR SIR—A recent examination of this Department's subway pipe and cable on the line of the excavation at Broadway, between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Fourth streets, shows the same to be in extremely dangerous condition, due to damages received and to negligence in properly caring for the pipe. There are some 30 broken joints in the pipes, and at each such point our cable is subjected to strain. The work of providing alternative subway, as required by this Department, is not progressing below One Hundred and Fourth street, and measures must be adopted by January 1 to this end. Failing in this the matter will be referred to the Corporation Counsel for proper action.

—to which Mr. McDonald, under date of December 26, 1900, had replied as follows:

"RAPID TRANSIT CONSTRUCTION COMPANY,  
"NEW YORK, December 26, 1900.

"Hon. EDWARD F. CROKER, Chief of Fire Department, No. 157 East Sixty-seventh Street,  
"New York City:

"DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of December 24, relating to Fire Department subway pipe and cable on Broadway, between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Fourth streets.

"I shall investigate your complaint at once and have the damages repaired.

"Yours truly,

"—and that up to January 25, 1901, the only repairs made by Mr. McDonald consisted of a 'split clamp, placed around broken joints in the pipe, the construction remaining in as dangerous a condition as before,' and you were therefore requested to prepare the proper form of notice to be served upon him, as you had offered to do in your letter of December 14, 1900, which you accordingly did.

"This office is now in receipt of a report from the Chief of Department, under date of May 20, 1901, setting forth among other things the service of the notice upon Contractor McDonald, who, after having been granted a reasonable indulgence, had still failed to comply with the requirements of the notice, and which report concludes as follows:

"As the underground railroad will not be completed for some time, this Department should not be held responsible for loss of life or damage to property by reason of the failure of the contractor to properly protect our fire-alarm system on the line of its road, during such period of

time, and I am also informed that the danger herein detailed is imminent on upper Broadway and must have prompt attention, as an accident to a hoisting machine, or blasting, or a cave-in might destroy the system, and it will be seen at once that a remedy for the existing trouble is absolutely necessary to be applied forthwith.

"In view of the foregoing, which in my opinion does not exaggerate the dangerous condition of our fire-alarm telegraph system in the least, and that under the opinion of Hon. John Whalen, Corporation Counsel, that after a proper notice had been served on the contractor to make necessary repairs, etc., if such repairs were not properly made, this Department could make such repairs and employ such other persons to protect, preserve and readjust such cable in subways at the cost and expense of said contractor, as provided in his contract with The City of New York, I would respectfully recommend that an alternative subway be built on the east side of Broadway, according to the plans and specifications herewith submitted, said work to be advertised by you, and contract to be given to the lowest bidder, at the very earliest possible date, and the expense thereof charged to Mr. John B. McDonald, contractor."

"I am directed by the Commissioner to notify you that he has approved the report and recommendation of the Chief of Department, and begs to inclose herewith specifications and drawings of the work necessary to be done to properly protect our fire-alarm system, with a request that you please cause to be prepared the necessary form of contract, which shall provide for charging the expense of the work to the contractor for the Under-ground Rapid Transit Railroad."

"Your attention is herewith called to the fact that the form of notice prepared by you and which was personally served upon the contractor (a copy of which is inclosed), specified territory between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Fourth streets, while the work to be performed under the specifications extends from Sixty-fourth to One Hundred and Tenth street."

The said specifications and drawings of the work necessary to be done to properly protect the fire-alarm system were examined, and it is observed that such plans and specifications provide for a new conduit and a new cable and, in the discretion of the Commissioner, of new lamp-posts, boxes, etc.

It is doubtful if the contractor, John B. McDonald, or his subcontractors, can be required to furnish to the Fire Department of the City a new conduit, inclosing a new cable with new connection boxes and lamp-posts. Indeed, it is doubtful if the said contractor or his subcontractors can be required to do anything further than to make good any injuries or damages that may have resulted, or may result, from the operations which they are conducting in Broadway, between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Fourth streets. The contract for the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad provides:

That he shall, at his own cost and expense make all necessary readjustments of the mains, pipes, tubes, conduits, subways or other subsurface structure; and protect and support during construction \* \* \* water-mains, gas-pipes, electric subways, pneumatic tubes, steam-pipes and other subsurface structures \* \* \* to move, alter, readjust or rebuild water-mains, gas-pipes, electric subways, pneumatic tubes, steam-pipes and other subsurface structures, together with their necessary connections. \* \* \* All such work of every description is part of the work of construction of the railroad included within this contract.

The contract also provides that the contractor shall at all times, by suitable bridging or other supports, maintain and support in an entirely safe condition for their usual service and to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners, all water and gas mains, steam-pipes, pneumatic tubes, electric subways, sewers, drains and all other surface or subsurface structures encountered during the progress of the work; that notice shall be given to all companies and the proper city officials owning or having charge of the surface or subsurface structures along any part of the work, of its intention to commence operations along such part of the route, at least one week in advance, and the contractor shall file with the Engineer at the same time a copy of said notice; and the contractor shall co-operate with the proper officers in charge of said structures and shall furnish them with all reasonable facilities to inspect the methods of caring for their property.

That whenever it becomes necessary to cut, move, change or reconstruct any such structures, as named above, or connections therewith, such work shall be done according to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners of such pipes or other structures, and should they so desire, by the owners themselves, at the expense of the contractor; such expense not to exceed the actual cost of labor, and materials used, together with a reasonable allowance for the use of plant and tools not exceeding seven and a half (7½) per cent.

All work of reconstruction or alteration, if performed by the City or owners shall be done with reasonable dispatch, and facilities are to be provided so that the said work will interfere as little as possible with the practical working and use of such structures. Failing to make such alterations within a reasonable time as shall be adjudged by the Board may be considered by the contractor as a waiver on part of said City or owners of the right to do the work.

That in the event of the companies or the City being required to make any alteration to their structures, as above provided, or in case they shall consider it necessary or desirable to make any further alterations in, or do any work to or in connection with subsurface structures owned by them, or if at the time the work under this contract is in progress, the contractor shall give said company or City all reasonable opportunity to perform such work, provided such work or alteration for the benefit solely of the owners of subsurface structures does not cause the contractor any serious loss or delay, as shall be determined by the Board.

Under these provisions of the contract it was the evident intention that the contractor should at all times maintain and support in a safe condition for their usual service and to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners the electric subways of the Fire Department. That when it became necessary to cut, move, change or reconstruct any such electric subways, that such work should be done to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners of such conduits, and that if the owners should desire, they could do it at their own expense and charge the contractor the actual cost of the labor and materials used, together with a reasonable allowance for the use of plant and tools, not exceeding seven and one-half (7½) per cent.

It is evident and practically admitted by the contractor that the electric conduit and cable of the Fire Department has not been maintained and supported in an entirely safe condition for its usual service, nor to the reasonable satisfaction of the owner, the Fire Department.

It is also practically agreed between the said contractor and the Fire Department that it is quite necessary to cut, move, change or reconstruct the said electric conduit, but it is not admitted by the contractor that it is necessary to build a new conduit and supply a new cable, boxes, connections, etc., entirely outside and independent of the present location of the conduit.

In view of this contention, it is my opinion that the Fire Department will not be justified in advertising and awarding a contract to excavate a trench, lay a new conduit, provide and place a new cable, connections and boxes as is contemplated in the contract and specifications submitted by your Department to this office.

Whatever injuries the said electric conduit or cable has suffered in consequence of the operation of the contractor or his subcontractors he must make good, and if he does not properly support and repair the said conduit and cable, the Fire Department will be justified in cutting, moving, changing and reconstructing the said conduit and cable in such a manner as is necessary to preserve and protect it from irreparable injury; and it may charge the actual expense or cost of the labor and materials and a reasonable allowance for the use of the plant and tools not exceeding seven and a half (7½) per cent.

By the terms of the said contract, the contractor is required to deposit, in cash or securities, one million dollars (\$1,000,000) as security for the faithful performance of all the covenants, conditions and requirements specified and provided for in the agreement. In case of default on the part of the contractor or of his subcontractors, the City incurs or becomes liable for expenses and the Comptroller shall pay and apply to the use of the City, from such deposit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), the amount of such expenses; or the Comptroller may retain for a reasonable time, as security to the City, an amount sufficient to meet any pending claims for damages or loss caused by negligence, fault or default of the said contractor.

Whatever expense the said Fire Department is required to meet for the preservation and protection of the said electric conduit in the manner provided for and contemplated in the said contract, it may be reimbursed out of the said fund of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) in the hands of the Comptroller.

In view of the conflicting opinions of the officers of the Fire Department and of the officers of the contractor for the Rapid Transit Railroad, and of the many questions of fact that will arise, as to the injuries which the said conduit and cable have suffered, and of the proper and reasonable protection and support which it should have and receive, it is my opinion that some arrangement should be arrived at, between the Fire Department and the contractor, for the protection and support of the cable and conduit, or for the reconstruction of a new one, if, indeed, that is possible. It is, of course, the duty of yourself, as Commissioner of the Fire Department, to fully protect the interests of the City and to insist that the cable and conduit be left in practically as good and serviceable condition as it was when the contractor began operations for the construction of the Rapid Transit Railroad.

Mr. Wait, my assistant, who has had this matter in hand, and who has had several conferences with officers of your Department and those of the contractor, John B. McDonald, advises me that the said contractor estimates the total cost of building a new conduit, furnishing and laying a new cable and placing the necessary boxes, etc., at six thousand dollars (\$6,000), and that of that sum he will pay two-thirds, or four thousand dollars (\$4,000), if your Department will pay the balance of two thousand dollars (\$2,000). I am also advised that you have felt obliged to decline the proposition because you have no appropriation applicable to this work.

If this be the only reason why you have not come to an agreement with the said contractor, and if you deem the proposition recited above as fair and equitable and as securing the best results to your Department's service, you should, in my opinion, apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a transfer of an amount sufficient to meet the necessary cost and expense of your Department in restoring the said conduit and cable, or in the construction of a new one,



to the appropriation applicable thereto, the said amount so transferred to be made and appropriated to the purposes and uses recited.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—For a year past the Enginemen employed in this Department, particularly those in the Borough of Brooklyn, have made repeated applications to me to fix their salaries or wages at what they claim to be the prevailing rate for Enginemen, \$3.50 per day.

I have hesitated to do that for the reason that I had no authentic knowledge or information as to what is the prevailing rate of wages for Enginemen or Steam Engineers.

On the 31st ult. I received a letter from Mr. John Williams, State Factory Inspector, stating that complaints have been filed in his Department that Enginemen in the employ of this Department did not receive the prevailing rate of wages, as required by section 3, article 1 of the Labor Law. With this letter Mr. Williams presented a tabular statement, compiled on investigations made under his direction, showing that out of 1,763 Steam Engineers employed in Greater New York, 1,006 were paid at the rate of \$3.50 per day, leading to the conclusion that that is the prevailing rate in Greater New York.

On the 4th instant I received a letter from the Comptroller, transmitting a copy of a letter received by him from the State Factory Inspector to the same purport as the one received by me. In respect to this the Comptroller said in his letter:

"It appears to me from the investigation made by this Department, copy of report of which was transmitted to you, that the prevailing rate of wages of Engineers is \$3.50 per diem, and that while it is not within my province to fix the rate of wages in other Departments, there is no doubt that unless the provisions of the Labor Law are complied with serious complications may arise."

Under these circumstances I feel that it is my duty to fix the uniform rate of \$3.50 per day for Enginemen in the employ of this Department. Hitherto all these Enginemen have been paid annual or monthly salaries, and the rate of \$3.50 per day for every day in the year, which is the service rendered by Enginemen, amounts to \$1,277.50 per annum, and therefore affects the pay of every Engineman whose monthly or annual salary has been less.

I attach hereto a statement showing the number of Enginemen in each borough who are affected by the new rate, giving the present rate of salaries and the aggregate increase in each borough, and under each appropriation, caused by the new rate of \$3.50 per day.

The Departmental, Provisional and Final Estimate for the several appropriations have been made to pay exactly the present rates of salaries and no more; consequently the payment of the new rate of \$3.50 per day will require additions to the appropriations as follows:

To the appropriation "Salaries, Croton Water System, boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx," \$1,152.50.

To the appropriation "Salaries, Pumping Stations, Borough of Queens," \$4,907.50.

To the appropriation "Pumping Stations, Salaries and Supplies, Borough of Richmond," \$377.50.

In the Borough of Brooklyn the salaries or wages of 90 Enginemen are affected by the new rate, and the aggregate increase is \$17,315; but, inasmuch as the salaries or wages of Enginemen in the Brooklyn water system are paid from "Water Revenue Fund," the action of your Board is not necessary in that case.

I respectfully ask that your Board will as speedily as possible grant the additions to the appropriations, as above stated, to enable me to comply with the provisions of the Labor Law.

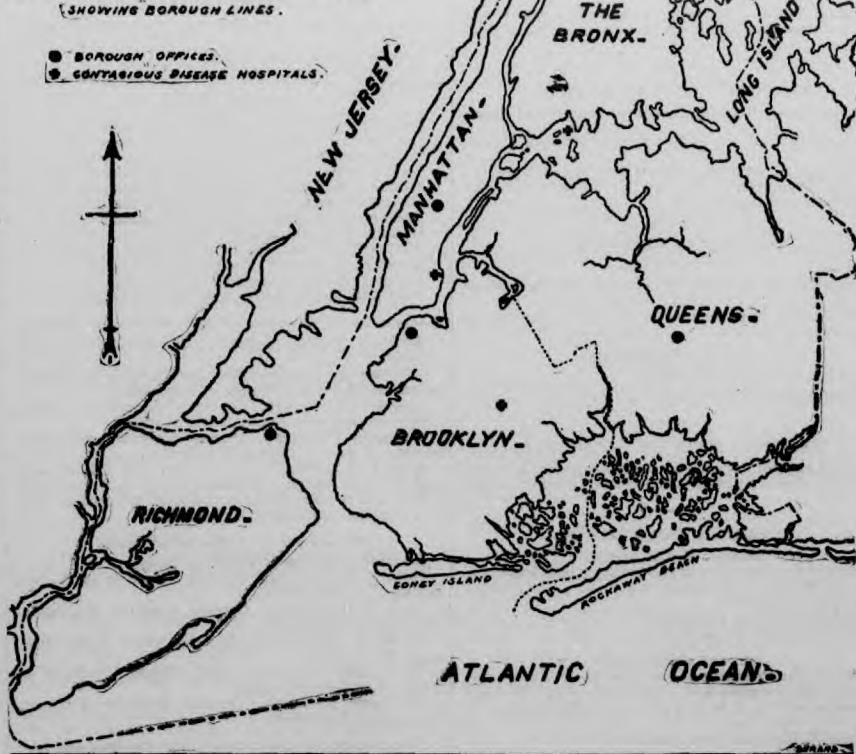
