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TENEMENT HOUSE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Year 1904.

Tenement House Department of The City of New York,
No. 61 Irving Place, Southwest Corner Eighteenth Street,
New York City, December 31, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit the following as the report of the Tenement House Department for the year 1904.

The principles upon which this Department has acted since January 1, 1904, have been:

First—That the Tenement House Law in its entirety was to be enforced; that no provision of it was to be considered unenforceable or to be left outside of the activities of the Department; that the relative difficulty of enforcing any provision was only to be taken into account as a factor in determining the number of persons needed in its attempted enforcement.

Second—That where the meaning of the law was plain, as was the case in the great majority of matters coming before the Department, it was to be enforced according to such meaning and without any regard to what might be the opinion of the Department as to the wisdom or otherwise of the provision, leaving those, if any, feeling aggrieved to such remedy as might be afforded by the courts or Legislature.

Third—That in all cases where the Department was called upon to construe the law it was to be construed in a reasonable manner and so as to effectuate as far as possible the intent of the Legislature; that wherever the construction of any particular provision had become the subject of final judicial decision, such decision was to be followed; that where no such decision existed and the matter was one of moment, the opinion of the Corporation Counsel was to be sought and followed, and that to prevent discrimination and to secure uniformity of action the precedents and customs of the Department were to be adhered to.

Fourth—That in every case a reasonable time—dependent upon the character of the order and surrounding conditions—was to be given to the party required to comply with the law within which to do the thing required.

Fifth—That whenever by reason of inadequacy of force it became necessary for the Department to determine the relative urgency and importance of the enforcement of different provisions of the law these were to be regarded as urgent and important in the following order:

- Those relating to the public health in cases of contagious disease;
- Those relating to the maintenance of moral conditions in tenements;
- Those having for their object the security of life in the event of fires in a tenement;
- Those dealing with sanitary conditions in general;
- All falling under any other head.

Sixth—A further principle of action of the Department has been that no order properly made should be canceled or dismissed without literal or substantial compliance.

Governed by these principles of action, the Department has since January 1, 1904, enforced the Tenement House Law to the extent and in the manner shown by the annexed table. This table shows the work of this Department from January 1, 1904, to December 31, 1904. For purposes of comparison this table also shows the work done by this Department from January 1, 1903, to December 31, 1903. The table speaks for itself.

The public, however, in considering the table will remember that the appropriation made for this Department for the year 1904 was \$516,433.08, as against \$466,433.08 for the year 1903. In other words, this Department had during the year 1904 about 10 3/4 per cent. more money to spend than it had during the year 1903. The public, therefore, are entitled to require that the work of the Department show an increase at least proportionate to this increase in the appropriation. They are, moreover, entitled to require an additional increase in the activities of the Department based upon what should be the increased efficiency of the force due to larger and longer experience and the adoption from time to time of improved methods of procedure.

The features of the Department's work during the year have been the establishment of relations of friendly co-operation between the Department and those engaged in settlement-house work and organized charitable work among the tenements; the establishment of like relations between the Department and the various property owners' associations and associations of builders and architects; the establishment of a more perfect system of co-operation between this Department and the Police and Health Departments and between this Department and the Bureau of Buildings in the various boroughs; the opening of offices in The Bronx—conveniencing the public generally and tenement dwellers and owners, builders and architects in The Bronx in particular; the enlargement without increasing the rental of the offices of the Department in Manhattan—affording the public having occasion to visit such offices improved accommodations; the adoption of rules facilitating and expediting action on all plans filed with the Department, resulting in saving of expense to owners and builders and conveniencing them and architects; the establishment in the Brooklyn office of the method of office procedure at all times in force in Manhattan, thus securing uniformity of Departmental procedure in all the boroughs; the establishment of trials and hearings in all cases involving the possible vacation of tenements by the Department, save only where dangerous structural conditions necessitated action without notice; the personal inspection of tenement houses by the Tenement House Commissioner; the institution and prosecution of a block, avenue and street house-to-house tenement-house inspection for the enforcement of all provisions of the law having for their object the security of the occupants of such houses in the event of fire; the adoption and enforcement of rules of inspection for the diminishment of fire dangers where tenements were undergoing alterations and, with like end in view, the insertion of proper questions in all blanks for permits to make such alterations necessary to elicit information as to whether the granting of such applications should be conditioned upon the vacation of the premises described in them; the systematic ordering out of school-sinks, privy vaults and latrines; the enforcement of the night lighting provisions of the law through a division of inspectors specifically organized for this purpose and through the secured co-operation of the Police Department; the improvement in the work of inspection by the adoption of a system of monthly rotation in inspection districts, thereby taking the property owner in any locality out of the power of any prejudiced or unjust Inspector, securing a practical review of some of each Inspector's work by the Inspector following, equalizing the work of different Inspectors, educating Inspectors respecting all varieties of tenement-house conditions, promoting a more general interest by them in their work, and making the system of marks in use in the Department for estimating the quantity and quality of an Inspector's work a more accurate index; the establishment of friendly relations between the officers and force in the Department through social organizations of inspectors and other employees of the Department in which the officers of the Department are members; the providing of suitable uniforms for the uniformed force so made as to be appropriate to the Department and its work—distinctive in character with lettering showing to what force the wearer belongs and his position and number in that force. For the preservation of the self-respect of the force care was taken to remove from the uniform anything unnecessary for identification calculated to humiliate. The position of Chief Examiner has been created for Departmental purposes, through whose hands all violations pass prior to dismissal and whose careful scrutiny prevents the improvident dismissal of violations. A system was adopted by which during the progress of each day the work done each day by the Department is classified so as to show each provision of the law enforced and the origin of the Department's action—whether on complaint or its own initiative—thus enabling the officers of the Department at all times to know what work is being done by the Department and to what extent it is being done. As the outcome of the adoption of this system, the submission of this report, including the entire year's work, not later than the close of business on the last day of the year is made possible.

During the year the Department through appropriate models, diagrams, plans and books, made exhibit of its work at the St. Louis Exposition and as the result of such exhibit was awarded the first prize as between it and departments in other cities.

The purity of the home is by none more highly valued or zealously safeguarded than by those who live in tenement houses. In the enforcement of those provisions of the law relating to morality in the tenements, as well as in the enforcement of the Tenement House Law in general, the Department first and beyond all else acknowledges its indebtedness to those who live in such houses. Without their assistance the work as prosecuted by the Department during the year would have been difficult if not impossible.

In the enforcement of the law during the past year the Department also acknowledges, with gratitude, its indebtedness to the Hon. Robert W. de Forest, former Commissioner, and Mr. Lawrence Veiller, former First Deputy Commissioner, both of whom, whenever appealed to, have given their opinion and advice to those in charge of the Department. The Department further acknowledges its indebtedness to a body of public-spirited men and women, too numerous to mention, whose high character, excellent judgment, sound and disinterested advice have been of incalculable assistance to those endeavoring to enforce the law. The Department likewise acknowledges its indebtedness to gentlemen representing associations of property-owners, to the owners of tenement houses in general, and to the architects and builders of such houses for their co-operation in the enforcement of the law.

The officers of the Department cannot speak in too high terms of the intelligence, industry, faithfulness, and zeal of the force. Personally, I record my indebtedness to the force, to my Deputies, and to the gentlemen in charge of the various bureaus and their associates for whatever I may have been able to accomplish, and I bespeak for them and for the force, at the hands of the public, that appreciation which is their due.

"Sec. 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York, forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all time thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

"And it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee or agent of any such building or place of business, to cause to be separated and put into their respective receptacles, all such materials and substances, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof. And such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal and shall then be placed in the area, or within the stoop-line only and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance. All light refuse or rubbish, likely to be scattered or blown about, shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured."

An estimate for certain changes in the marble and plumbing work of the building in course of erection at the Willard Parker Hospital, foot of East Sixteenth street, amounting to \$580, was received from John R. Sheehan & Co., contractors for the erection of same, and upon recommendation of Smith, Westervelt & Austin, architects, it was

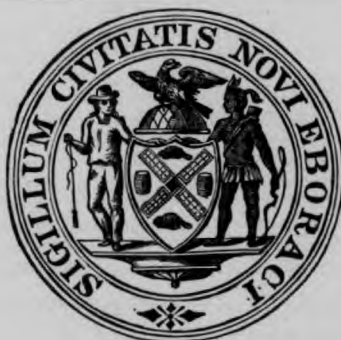

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
