Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Thursday, July 17, 1913. Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. O'Keeffe, Paulding, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused: Messrs. Drummond, Farley and Robbins. The minutes of the meeting of July 1 were approved.

Bills, amounting to \$19,022.02, were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

On the 15th inst. two awnings on the front of Gouverneur Hospital were burned, presumably some one having thrown a lighted cigarette from above.

A request has been received from the Board of Managers for permission to pay additional salaries, \$10 and \$5 per month, respectively, to the first and second Cooks in the Nurses' residence at Bellevue Hospital, owing to their inability to get qualified employees at the rate previously paid, which was \$60 for the first Cook and \$20 for the second.

The fumigator at Bellevue Hospital is no longer effective. It has been repaired repeatedly, and the Engineers now report that it is impossible to place it in a satisfactory condition. As it will probably be several years before the proposed equipment for the new hospital is available, it will be necessary to provide a new disinfectant. Several estimates have been received, the lowest of which is \$816, from the Kensington Engine Works of Philadelphia, who promise delivery and completion within ten days. This is the same equipment as is now in use in Harlem, Fordham and Gouverneur, which has given satisfaction. Approval is requested for this installation.

At the last meeting the Board approved of certain transfers of funds within the appropriations for 1913. It is necessary to modify this request by an additional

transfer of \$5,000 from No. 339, Coal, to No. 392, Medical and Surgical Apparatus.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to investigate into the cause and determine, if possible, who was responsible for the burning of the awnings at Gouverneur Hospital, and to caution the employees and members of the house staff in regard to the manner of disposing of lighted cigarettes.

It was resolved to direct the General Medical Superintendent to appoint to the Nurses' residence for the remainder of the year 1913, a first Cook at \$75 per month, and a second at \$25 per month, and it was further

Resolved, To include in the Departmental Estimate for 1914 the positions of first and second Cook for the Nurses' residence at Bellevue Hospital at \$75 and \$50 per month, respectively.

The installation of a fumigator at Bellevue Hospital, as recommended by the General Medical Superintendent, was approved.

It was resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve of the transfer of \$5,000 within the appropriations for 1913.

Reports of Committees.

The Special Committee, composed of Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Paulding, reported that they had conferred with the candidates for the position of Purchasing Agent, but that owing to the importance of the position, they were not ready to present a nomination. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was continued in the hands of the committee.

The Harlem Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Robert Francis McDonald as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients (gynecology), and Dr. George Sanders as Assistant Physician to Out Patients. This report was approved and appointments made accordingly.

Mr. Paulding, on behalf of the Special Committee appointed to confer with representatives of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Medical Board on the question of establishing night clinics in the Out Patient Departments, reported that, as a result of this conference, it had been decided to make an extensive investigation and present a comprehensive report within a few months. Mr. Paulding further reported that the only immediate question was the establishment of an evening genito-urinary clinic, which should include syphilis, at Harlem Hospital, and that the committee was of the opinion that such a clinic should be established if the Department of Health has not already one in that vicinity for the purpose. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to continue this matter with the committee, and to refer the question of the establishment of a genito-urinary clinic at Harlem Hospital to a committee composed of the President and Mr. Paulding.

Communications.

A communication was presented from Henry C. Wright, director of the investigation into the Departments of Health, Charities and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, suggesting a basis for estimating the amount of food needed in Municipal Hospitals, and transmitting a comparative statement of the amount of waste in the food in the hospitals of the Department. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent, with instructions to consider the adaptability of this method for this Department, and to make a thorough analysis of the question of waste of food, and report at a future meeting.

The minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board, held on July 9, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, Dr. Joseph Sweet Martin was appointed Interne on the Third Division

for six months, beginning July 1, 1913; the award of diplomas to the members of the house staff who have completed their service, was authorized, as recommended by the Medical Board; the recommendation that some sort of covering be provided to prevent rain from dripping through the floor to the balconies attached to Ward 26, was referred to the General Medical Superintendent; the recommendation that a separate ward be provided for female erysipelas patients was disapproved, inasmuch as the structural character of Ward 32 is such that no change can be made at present, and no other place is available; the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to assign, when necessary, an additional Nurse for night duty in the care of erysipelas patients, and the recommendation that a laboratory be established in connection with the Out Patient Department was disapproved on account of lack of funds.

A communication dated July 15, was presented from Louis C. Frees, together with a copy of a letter dated June 26, tendering his resignation as General Inspector of Construction at Bellevue Hospital, to be effective as of July 1, 1913.

Resolved, To accept this resignation.

A communication was presented from Dr. M. S. Gregory, Resident Alienist at Bellevue Hospital, transmitting a request from Dr. Harold W. Wright, Assistant Alienist, for permission to reside outside the hospital, with the understanding that he will give the same amount of time to the Department and will hold himself in readiness for night duty as heretofore.

Resolved, To grant this request on the conditions stated, and with the approval of the General Medical Superintendent.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Health, stating that the funds given to that Department for the purpose of making Wassermann tests, were under such conditions that workers could not be sent to other laboratories, but that they would be willing to make tests for Bellevue Hospital at their own laboratories. On motion, duly seconded

and carried, this communication was placed on file.

A communication was presented from the State Board of Charities, together with a report of a recent inspection of the Harlem Hospital dispensary, which had been placed in Class One, as showing practically no defects. The only criticisms contained in the report were, (1) that the separation of the sexes was not well maintained in the general waiting room, and (2) that the treatment rooms were small and limited in number.

Resolved, To direct the General Medical Superintendent to comply as far as is possible with the rule in regard to the separation of the sexes, and to inform the State Board of Charities in regard to the treatment rooms that this condition will be remedied by the construction of the new ward wing at Harlem Hospital.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, held on July 9, were presented. The award of diplomas to Drs. Jones, Forman and Schaeffer, who have completed their service on the house staff, was approved; the resignation of Dr. Stanley H. Steiner as Assistant Physician to Out Patients was accepted.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copies of four resolutions adopted on June 26, approving of the issue of corporate stock for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals in the amount of \$158,500, as follows: (1) \$8,500 for enclosing the ends of the balconies of Pavilions A and B, of the new Bellevue Hospital; (2) \$75,000 for the construction of an addition to the power house and ambulance station at Harlem Hospital; (3) \$45,000 for making alterations to the present hospital building at Harlem Hospital, and (4) \$30,000 in addition to corporate stock heretofore authorized for the construction of an additional ward wing at Harlem Hospital. The President stated that the Board of Aldermen had approved of the issuance of this stock on July 15, and suggested that the architects be authorized to proceed at once with the plans for the work for which appropriations have been granted. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these resolutions were ordered placed on file, and it was

Resolved, To instruct J. H. Freedlander to proceed with the plans for the extension and alterations at Harlem Hospital for which corporate stock had been issued, and to instruct McKim, Mead & White to prepare plans for enclosing the ends of the balconies of Pavilions A and B.

A communication dated July 14 was presented from J. M. Knopp, contractor for the additional balconies on Pavilions A and B, requesting an extension of time to complete his contract to June 7, 1913. It was moved, seconded and carried, to request the architects to present a recommendation thereon before the next meeting of the Board.

Copies of two resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on June 10, were presented, amending issues of corporate stock for the new Bellevue Hospital to make the amounts \$1,550,000 and \$400,000, respectively, to be available for construction and equipment. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these resolutions were ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copies of two resolutions adopted on July 3, (1) approving of the transfer of \$262.50 within the salary schedules for 1913, and (2) revising the salary schedules as of June 1, 1913. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

New Business.

The President referred to the method of treating fractures in the different hospitals of the Department, and stated that in some of the hospitals this work is done by the visiting surgeons, and in others it is left to members of the house staff. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To call the attention of the Medical Boards of the different hospitals of the Department to the lack of uniformity in the method of treating fractures, and to inform them that it is the desire of the Trustees that the treatment of these cases should be performed by the visiting or assistant visiting surgeons, and not by members of the house staff.

Mr. Paulding referred to a conversation he had had with Dr. Alexander Lambert in regard to the possibility of changing the classification of the social service Nurses, and thereby securing twenty-one additional Nurses for nursing purposes. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to appoint a special committee, composed of the President and Mr. Paulding, to accompany Dr. Lambert to see the Comptroller in regard to accomplishing this purpose.

The President referred to a petition to the Mayor, which was being circulated in the neighborhood of Gouverneur Hospital,

protesting against the transfer of the public dump, now situated at the foot of Clinton st., to South st., between Jackson and Gouverneur sts. As this is in the immediate vicinity of Gouverneur Hospital and would be obnoxious and detrimental to the physical welfare of the patients in that hospital, it was moved, seconded and carried to address a letter to his Honor the Mayor, protesting against the establishment of a public dump at this place, and endorsing the petition circulated by the residents of that vicinity, and to transmit copies of the letter and petition to the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries and to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

It was moved, seconded and carried to hold the next meeting on Thursday, July 31, 1913, at 10 a. m., in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

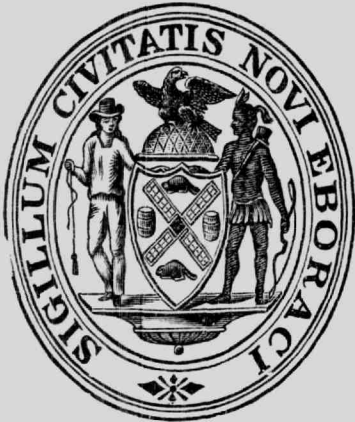

Amendment to Rules.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF

Health of the Department of Health, held July 30, 1913, the following rules and regulations for the sale of dipped milk and cream in stores in The City of New York were adopted, to take effect on and after August 26, 1913:

1. Milk and cream shall not be stored, handled or sold in any stable, or in any room used for cooking or domestic purposes, or in any room which communicates directly with any such stable or room, or in any room in which there is a water-closet apartment or with which a water-closet apartment communicates, unless such apartment be enclosed by a vestibule, and both apartment and vestibule be properly ventilated to the exterior air.

2. The term "domestic purposes" shall be held to apply to rooms used for sleeping purposes or for cooking purposes other than the preparation of the midday meal.

3. Milk or cream shall not be handled or sold in any room which is unduly crowded.

4. Milk or cream shall not be dipped from cans stored in a room in which butter or cheese is manufactured.

5. Milk or cream may be stored in a cooling or refrigerating room, or ice chest, the construction of which has been approved by the Department.

6. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in a milk booth.

7. Milk shall be kept at a temperature of 50 degrees F., or below, at all times.

Equipment.

1. Rooms in which milk or cream is handled or sold shall be well lighted.

2. The floors, walls and ceilings shall be smooth, and must be kept clean and sanitary.

3. All windows and doors shall be properly screened.

4. An adequate supply of hot water shall be provided for the washing of utensils.

5. A sufficient number of properly constructed ice tubs, or other adequate refrigerating facilities, for cans of milk or cream shall be provided.

6. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be of the seamless sanitary type, heavily tinned.

Methods.

1. No milk or cream shall be dipped from cans stored in any room in which rubbish or dirty material is allowed to accumulate, or in which there are offensive odors.

2. All cans or other receptacles used for milk or cream shall be cleaned thoroughly upon emptying.

3. The cans from which milk or cream is dipped shall be packed in ice, and shall be kept covered at all times, except when the milk or cream is being actually dipped therefrom.

4. After each day's use all utensils shall be thoroughly cleaned with hot water and soda, and then with boiling water.

5. All utensils used for dipped milk or cream shall be kept clean.

6. The ice tubs in which milk or cream is stored shall be painted inside and outside, and shall be kept clean at all times.

7. A separate dipper shall be provided for each can from which the supply is being served, and such dipper shall remain in the can between dippings until all the milk in the can has been disposed of.

8. All goods sold in milk stores must be either in unbroken packages, or must be so placed, protected and handled that no dust or odors therefrom can injuriously affect the milk.

9. Dry sweeping and dusting in rooms in which milk or cream is dispensed is prohibited.

10. The tags on cans of milk or cream must be kept on file in the store for at least two months, for inspection by the Department of Health.

11. The attendants shall wear clean, washable outer clothing.

12. Only such persons shall be employed as are free from infectious disease which may be transmitted in the handling of milk.

Failure to comply with any of the above rules and regulations will be cause for prosecution.

Definition.

Milk not conforming to the requirements of any of the subdivisions of Grade A or Grade B and which has been heated according to the rules and regulations of the Board of Health.

Requirements, Rules and Regulations.

Rules and regulations for the heating of Grade C milk:

No less than 160 degrees F. for at least 2 minutes; no less than 158 degrees F. for at least 3 minutes; no less than 155 degrees F. for at least 5 minutes; no less than 152 degrees F. for at least 10 minutes; no less than 148 degrees F. for at least 15 minutes; no less than 145 degrees F. for at least 18 minutes; no less than 140 degrees F. for at least 20 minutes.

1. The caps of all bottles containing milk of Grade C shall be white and shall contain in red the words "Grade C" in large type and "for cooking" in plainly visible type.

2. Cans containing milk of Grade C shall be painted red on necks or shall have properly sealed metal collar, painted red, on necks, and shall have affixed to them white tags with the words "Grade C, for cooking," printed thereon in red letters in large type.

All creameries handling milk of different grades will be required to demonstrate to the Department of Health that they are capable of keeping the grades separate, and must keep records satisfactory to the Department of Health concerning the amount of milk of each grade handled each day.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereunto shall be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
