

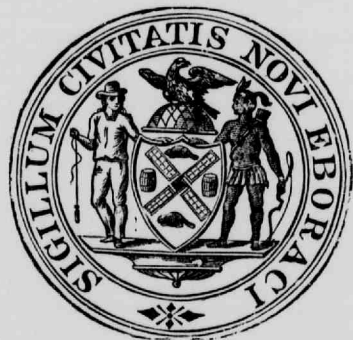

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, April 22, 1881.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

On the occasion of your special meeting, called in consequence of the decease of Alderman Mathew J. Coggey, it is unnecessary for the Mayor to announce his death to you or to eulogize the character of one who has served in a previous Board of Aldermen, and whose sterling and amiable qualities are well known to many of you through constant and intimate association with him.

It is, however, appropriate that I should express my deep sense of the loss which your Body has experienced through his death, and join with you in those tributes of respect for his memory which are due to so faithful a public servant.

Whereupon Alderman McClave offered the following preamble and resolutions :

Whereas, Death has visited this Board of Aldermen and struck down, in the prime of life and in the midst of his usefulness, one of its most prominent and efficient members, Mathew J. Coggey, a representative in this Board of the Eighth Senatorial District, as it existed previous to the year 1880, who died on Thursday, the 20th inst., at Lakewood, N. J., where he was sojourning, temporarily, in order to secure rest and relief from official cares and duties, and in the hope of improving his physical condition, which had become greatly improved ; and

Whereas, In the death of Alderman Mathew J. Coggey, this Board is called upon to mourn the death of one whom its members had learned to love and honor, who was serving his second term as a member of the Board, and was rightfully regarded by all as an able, honest, and conscientious public officer, a wise counsellor, a firm and true friend, and a congenial companion. As in public life he was honest and conscientious in the performance of every duty, so in private life he was an exemplar of the domestic virtues. Truly, "in the midst of life we are in death," and this admonition should be constantly present to our minds, as "no man knoweth when his time cometh," and

Whereas, It is the sad duty of this Board, in view of the death of our lamented associate, to take such action as will tend to show our appreciation of his many good qualities of head and heart, to manifest our profound sorrow for his death and our sympathy with his stricken family and bereaved relatives and friends ; be it therefore

Resolved, That the members of this Common Council deeply deplore the death of our associate and friend, Mathew J. Coggey, and we hereby tender those afflicted by his death, our heartfelt sympathy and condolence. In an especial manner, to his bereaved wife and fatherless children, do the sympathetic promptings of our hearts go forth in this, their hour of tribulation. We commend them to the protection of Him who has promised to be "a father to the fatherless" and a "comforter of the afflicted," with the full knowledge that He is Truth itself, and His promises are ever fulfilled, and we recall to their minds, in order to assuage the poignancy of their grief, the comforting assurance, that He "loveth whom He chasteneth ;" and be it further

Resolved, That out of sorrow for the death and respect for the memory of our deceased associate, the members of this Board of Aldermen will attend his funeral in a body, with their staves of office draped in mourning, and will wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty days ; that the chamber of the Board, and the chair therein lately occupied by the deceased, be draped in mourning for a like period ; that the flags on the City Hall, and the other public buildings, be displayed at half staff, from sun rise until sun set on the day for solemnizing the funeral rites and ceremonies, Saturday, April 23, 1881 ; that the owners or masters of vessels in the harbor, and the owners or occupants of private buildings in this city, be requested to display their flags in like manner, on that day, and that a Committee of five members of this Board be appointed to perfect the above, and make such other arrangements as it may deem necessary more fully to manifest our profound grief for the death and our respect for the memory of our lamented associate ; and, as an additional evidence of our feelings in this regard, be it further

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolutions be engrossed and framed, be duly authenticated, and transmitted to the family of the deceased.

In moving the adoption of the preamble and resolutions, Alderman McClave adverted in a feeling manner to the loss the Board has sustained in the death of Alderman Coggey, and paid a glowing tribute to the virtues and public services of the deceased.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt the preamble and resolutions.

Which was decided in the affirmative, unanimously, by a rising vote, all the members present voting in favor thereof.

The President here appointed as the Special Committee, Aldermen John McClave, Joseph J. McAvoy, William P. Kirk, Henry C. Perley, and Joseph P. Strack.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Finck moved that the Board do now adjourn.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the President announced that the Board stood adjourned until Tuesday next, the 26th instant, at 12 o'clock, M.

The President presented a report upon gas as used by the Municipal Gas Company, which was approved and ordered forwarded to the Board of Aldermen.

The Superintendent of the Shiloh Lodging House appeared before the Board and made a statement respecting the number of lodgers accommodated at the present time, and the progress made in repairing and cleansing the same.

Mr. Tiffany also appeared before the Board in respect to the prevalence of contagious diseases at the Shiloh Lodging House.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement houses were approved by the Board upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted:

Plan No. 927, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet 5 inches by 60 feet, on a lot 25 feet 5 inches by 60 feet, on the northeast corner of First Avenue and Fifty-fourth street, to be occupied by sixteen families.

Plan No. 934, for two four-story tenements, each 18 feet 9 inches by 64 feet, on lots 18 feet 9 inches by 100 feet 11 inches, on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-second street, 330 feet east of Third Avenue, each house to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 935, for two five-story tenements, each 25 feet by 60 feet, on lots 25 feet by 75 feet, at Nos. 197-201 East Houston street, each house to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 936, for one four-story tenement, 26 feet by 45 feet, on a lot 26 feet by 60 feet, at No. 197 Division street, to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 937, for one six-story tenement, 51 feet by 85 feet, on a lot 51 feet by 100 feet 8 inches, on the north side of Eighty-sixth street, 62 feet east of Madison avenue, to be occupied by seven families.

Plan No. 938, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 50 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 407 West Fortieth street, to be occupied by seven families.

Plan No. 939, for one four-story tenement, 22 feet by 40 feet, with one-story extension 9 feet by 9 feet, on a lot 22 feet by 100 feet, at No. 217 West Thirty-fifth street, to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 940, for one five-story tenement, 18 feet by 61 feet 9 inches, above the first story, on a lot 18 feet by 61 feet 9 inches, at No. 106 West Houston street; to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 942, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 49 feet, with an extension 6 feet by 6 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet 5 inches, at No. 347 West Forty-third street; to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 943, for eight five-story tenements, each 25 feet by 60 feet, on lots 25 feet by 80 feet, on the east side of First Avenue, from Sixty-third street to Sixty-fourth street; each house to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 944, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 87 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 109 feet, at No. 44 South Washington square; to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 945, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 68 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Eleventh street, and Lexington avenue; to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 946, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 46 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 513 West Twenty-ninth street; to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 947, for two four-story tenements, each 25 feet by 70 feet, on lots 25 feet by 102 feet, on the north side of Eightieth street, 152 feet west of Second avenue; each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 948, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 68 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 78 feet, on the southwest corner of Seventieth street and First Avenue; to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 949, for three four-story tenements, each 25 feet by 62 feet, on lots 25 feet by 78 feet, on the west side of First Avenue, 25 feet south of Seventieth street; each house to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 950, for one four-story tenement, 28 feet by 70 feet, on a lot 28 feet by 100 feet 4 inches, on the south side of Seventieth street, 78 feet west of First Avenue; to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 951, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 69 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of Eighty-second street, 106 feet west of Avenue A, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 952, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 74 feet, on a lot of the same dimensions, at No. 99 East First street, extending through the block; said house to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 953, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 80 feet 5 inches, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet 5 inches, at No. 529 West Fifty-first street; to be occupied by nine families.

Plan No. 954, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 58 feet 8 inches, on a lot 25 feet by 93 feet 3 inches, at No. 128 Leonard street; to be occupied by twelve families.

Plan No. 955, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 92 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the southeast corner of Seventh Avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street; to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 956, for two four-story tenements, 30 feet by 60 feet and 20 feet by 70 feet, respectively, on lots of the same width respectively, and each 80 feet deep, at Nos. 500 and 502 Grand street; each house to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 957, for one five-story tenement 25 feet by 62 feet, with an extension 11 feet by 9 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet 11 inches, on the south side of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, 410 feet west of Fifth Avenue, to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 958-2, for two five-story tenements, each 30 feet by 75 feet, with extensions 7 feet by 22 feet, on lots 30 feet by 92 feet, at Nos. 334 to 338 West Eighteenth street, each house to be occupied by eleven families.

Plan No. 958, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 30 feet, on the rear of a lot 25 feet by 113 feet, at No. 23 Pike street, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 961, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 76 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 93 feet, at No. 27 West Sixteenth street, to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 962, for one five-story tenement, 24 feet by 62 feet, on a lot 24 feet by 74 feet and 95 feet, at No. 230 Division street, to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 963, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 60 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of One Hundred and Eighth street, 78 feet west of Third Avenue, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 964, for three four-story tenements, each 25 feet by 60 feet, on lots 25 feet by 78 feet, on the west side of Third Avenue, beginning on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Eighth street, to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 965, for one seven-story tenement, 56 feet 7 1/2 inches by 53 feet 4 inches, with an extension 32 feet 5 inches by 100 feet 5 inches, at Nos. 226 and 228 West Forty-fourth street, to be occupied by fifteen families.

Plan No. 966, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 69 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 73 feet on the southwest corner of Seventh Avenue and Fifteenth street, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 967, for one four-story tenement, 17 feet by 62 feet, with an extension 12 feet 6 inches by 23 feet, on a lot 17 feet by 98 feet 9 inches, at No. 212 West Forty-second street, to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 968, for two six-story tenements, respectively 50 feet by 70 feet, with an extension 19 feet 4 inches by 27 feet 8 inches, and 25 feet by 70 feet, with an extension 18 feet by 20 feet 4 inches, on lots of the same width respectively and 100 feet 10 inches deep, on the south side of Sixtieth street 250 feet west of Broadway, the double house to be occupied by thirteen and the single house by five families.

Plan No. 969, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet 4 inches by 65 feet, on a lot 25 feet 4 inches by 106 feet, at No. 48 Eighth street, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 970, for one eight-story tenement, on a lot 75 feet 10 inches by 95 feet, on the northwest corner of Fifty-second street and Madison Avenue, to be occupied by seventeen families.

Plan No. 971, for one four-story tenement, 24 feet by 42 feet, with an extension 12 feet by 22 feet, irregular, on a lot 24 feet by 86 feet, at No. 709 Greenwich street, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 972, for two four-story tenements, each 28 feet by 68 feet, on lots 28 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of Seventieth street, 156 feet east of Third Avenue, each house to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 974-2 for two four-story tenements, 25 feet and 26 feet respectively by 70 feet deep, on lots of the same width respectively and 80 feet deep, on the east side of First Avenue, beginning on the southeast corner of Eighty-fifth street, each house to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 975, for two four-story tenements, each 27 feet 6 inches by 72 feet, on lots 27 feet 6 inches by 100 feet 5 inches, on the south side of Seventieth street, 105 feet west of First Avenue, each house to be occupied by eight families.

Plans Disapproved.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement houses were disapproved by the Board:

Plan No. 928-2, for four four-story tenements proposed to be built on Seventy-second street, north side beginning on the northeast corner of Second Avenue.

Plan No. 941, for one five-story tenement proposed to be built at No. 106 Seventh street.

Plan No. 958, for two five-story tenements proposed to be built at Nos. 334 to 338 West Eighteenth street.

Plan No. 960, for one four-story tenement proposed to be built at Nos. 521 and 523 West Twenty-sixth street; and

Plan No. 973, for one five-story tenement proposed to be built at Nos. 8 and 10 Bethune street.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 9, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,555, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 593 tenement-houses, 105 private dwellings, 63 other nuisances, 7 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 7 slaughter-houses, 1 railroad culvert, 1 public drive, 11 lodging-houses, 2 smoke-houses, 2 lard-rendering establishments, 22 sunken and vacant lots, 89 yards, courts, and areas, 111 cellars and basements, 212 waste-pipes and drains, 215 privies and water-closets, 38 street gutters and sinks, 8 dangerous stairways, 5 cesspools, 2 smoky chimneys, 11 other nuisances and 9 visits to cases of contagious diseases, 75 carcasses of bob veal and 362 quarters were seized, condemned and sent to the offal dock.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 573.

During the past week 173 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 65 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

149 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 141 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 117 houses, 117 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

55 cases of contagious diseases were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a comparative statement of cases of contagious disease reported at this Bureau for the two weeks ending April 9, 1881:

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 523 births, 46 still-births, 170 marriages, and 722 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 9, 1881; this shows an increase of 66 births, 19 still-births, 7 marriages, and 25 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 7 births, and 162 deaths, and a decrease of 2 still-births, and 1 marriage. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 4; diphtheria, 5 whooping cough, 3; typhus fever, 1; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; inanition, 4; rheumatism and gout, 2; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 2; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 7; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; convulsions, 6; premature and preterm births, 4; surgical operations, 1; suicides, 3; and drowning, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 6; croup, 5; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; alcoholism, 3; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 17; heart diseases, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 9; Bright's disease and nephritis, 21; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1. The number of deaths from measles, and cirrhosis and hepatitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 154 were in institutions, 376 in tenement-houses, 171 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 118 on the first, 200 on the second, 138 on the third, 73 on the fourth, 19 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 714 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 8 non-residents. 87 were stated to be single, 182 married, 88 widowed, and the condition of 365 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 722; still-births, 46; bodies in transit, 20. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 81 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 523 births, 170 marriages, 46 still-births, 722 deaths, 20 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 118 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 13 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 26 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 9, 1881, was 34.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.655, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,971, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

CHAPTER 58.

AN ACT to amend chapter five hundred and thirty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-one, entitled "An act to extend the operation and effect of the act passed February seventeenth, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, entitled 'An act to authorize the formation of corporations for manufacturing, mining, mechanical, or chemical purposes.'"

Passed March 24, 1881.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section one of chapter five hundred and thirty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-one, entitled "An act to extend the operation and effect of the act passed February seventeenth, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, entitled 'An act to authorize the formation of corporations for manufacturing, mining, mechanical, or chemical purposes,'" is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 1. Any three or more persons may organize themselves into a corporation in the manner specified and required in and by the act entitled "An act to authorize the formation of corporations for manufacturing, mining, mechanical, or chemical purposes," passed February seventeenth, eighteen hundred and forty-eight, for the purposes of purchasing, acquiring, and improving real

estate for residences, homesteads, and apartment houses, to be leased and conducted by the corporation so formed, and occupied by the stockholders thereof, and others, and apportioning and distributing the same among the stockholders and members of such corporation. The corporation so formed shall be subject to all the provisions and obligations of the act aforesaid, and the acts amendatory thereof, and it shall have power to take and hold by purchase, contract, or lease, and convey such real estate as shall be necessary to carry out the objects of said corporation; and it may distribute and apportion the same among its members and stockholders in such manner as shall be determined by its by-laws; provided, however, that it shall not be lawful for said corporation to hold at any one time real estate, the market value of which shall exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 61.

AN ACT to amend chapter sixty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act further to amend chapter one hundred and forty-seven of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, entitled 'An act granting to the United States the right to acquire the right of way necessary for the improvement of the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek, from the North river to the East river, through the Harlem kills, and ceding jurisdiction over the same, as amended by chapter three hundred and forty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, and to authorize the city of New York to issue stock or bonds in aid of said improvement.'"

Passed March 28, 1881; by a two-third vote.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two of chapter sixty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act further to amend chapter one hundred and forty-seven of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, entitled 'An act granting to the United States the right to acquire the right of way necessary for the improvement of the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek, from the North river to the East river, through the Harlem kills, and ceding jurisdiction over the same, as amended by chapter three hundred and forty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine,' is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 2. The commissioners of estimate and assessment appointed pursuant to the provisions of chapter one hundred and forty-seven of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, and chapter three hundred and forty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, by the several orders of the supreme court made and entered upon the petition of John Newton, the engineer in charge of said improvement, in the name of the United States, at a special term of the first judicial district held in the city of New York on the twenty-fourth, twenty-seventh and thirty-first days of October, eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, or in the event of the death, resignation or removal of such commissioners, or either of them, such other commissioners as may be appointed by the supreme court in the place and stead of such commissioner or commissioners so dying, resigning or removed, are hereby authorized and directed to lay out and determine upon an area of assessment embracing such lands and premises on each side of the exterior lines of said improvement, or as nearly adjacent thereto as said commissioners shall deem to be benefited thereby, and to assess upon such lands and premises, and the persons and parties in interest owning the same, within such area of assessment for the value of such benefit, the sum required to pay the compensation awarded to, or to be awarded by them under the acts hereby amended, and as hereby amended, and the order or orders of the supreme court heretofore made or hereafter to be made upon such petition, and the cost and expenses of estimate, assessment and other proceedings necessarily taken or to be taken under and authorized by said acts, and by said acts as hereby amended. Said commissioners, before they enter upon the performance of the duties hereinafter prescribed, shall severally take and subscribe the oath prescribed by the twelfth section of the constitution of this state, which oath shall be filed in the clerk's office of the City of New York.

§ 2. Section seven of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 7. The sheriff of the city and county of New York shall thereupon, by virtue of said warrant and the authority hereby given, collect the several amounts so directed to be collected from the several persons or parties named therein, and from the several lands and premises numbered and described therein, as belonging to such persons or parties, and he shall have the same power to enforce the collection of the same, or any renewal thereof, as if said warrant, or any renewal thereof, were an execution issued in due form of law upon a judgment of a court of record of this state, against the persons and parties named therein as against the several parcels of land and premises numbered and described in said warrant. If any of the parcels numbered and described in said warrant shall be assessed to unknown owners and the amount so assessed shall not be paid to said sheriff within twenty days after said warrant shall have come into his hands, said sheriff is hereby authorized and directed, immediately after the expiration of said twenty days, to advertise the several parcels so assessed to unknown owners in the same manner and for the same period of time as in the case of known owners, except that for the name or names of the persons or parties as set forth in the notice of sale, and other proceedings subsequent thereto, taken by him, the description of "unknown owners" may be inserted therein. Upon the return by the said sheriff of the warrant first issued by said comptroller, as hereinbefore directed, if there shall be due and uncollected any of the sums assessed in said warrant directed to be collected, the said comptroller is hereby authorized, on the security of said assessments so returned unpaid, to raise on the assessments bonds of the city in the manner now provided by law, a sum not exceeding fifty thousand dollars, to be applied as in the following section directed. All the collections of such assessments to the extent of the assessment bonds issued, and all proceedings taken for the enforcement and collection of the same shall be for the benefit of the said city of New York.

§ 3. Section eight of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 8. From the moneys so collected by said comptroller, and from the proceeds of said bonds, in case any have been issued pursuant to the provisions of the last section, he shall pay all sums which have been awarded to the persons and parties as owners, or interested in the lands and premises taken or to be taken for the purpose of said improvement, as the same shall appear by the report of the commissioners of estimate, made in pursuance of the provisions of the acts hereby amended, and as amended, when confirmed, and the expenses, charges and disbursements of the proceedings taken under said acts and under the same as hereby amended, as taxed and certified by a justice of the supreme court; and whenever it shall appear by the report of the commissioners of estimate, as provided in the acts hereby amended, and as hereby amended, and by the report of the commissioners of assessment, as provided by this act, that an award for compensation for the lands taken or to be taken for the purpose of said improvement has been made to the same owners or parties in interest, upon whom and upon whose lands and premises an assessment for benefit has been made in which the award for compensation is greater than the assessment for benefit, said comptroller shall pay to said owners or parties in interest the excess only of such compensation so awarded over the amount assessed upon such owners or parties in interest: and whenever an assessment for benefit, upon the owners or parties in interest, of lands and premises within said area of assessment is made against the same owners or parties in interest to whom compensation is awarded for lands and premises taken or to be taken for said improvement, and such assessment for benefit exceeds such award for compensation, such owners or parties in interest shall be liable to pay only such excess, and upon receipt of the amount of such excess, with interest, as above provided, said comptroller is hereby authorized and required to discharge such assessment and the lien created thereby.

§ 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 62.

AN ACT relative to the continuance of compensation to judges and justices of courts in certain cases, after removal pursuant to the provisions of the constitution.

Passed March 29, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Any judge or justice of any court who shall be removed pursuant to section eleven of article six of the constitution, for any cause not involving moral delinquency, shall continue to receive, until the expiration of the term for which he was elected, a sum equal to one-half of the salary of his office as fixed by law at the time of such removal, to be paid to him at the same times and in the same manner as said salary was payable when he was so removed.

Sec. 2. If said sum would exceed three thousand dollars no greater sum shall be annually paid to said judge or justice than three thousand dollars. The payment of any sum pursuant to the provisions of this act shall cease at the death of such judge or justice notwithstanding the term for which he was elected shall not then have expired. No person shall be entitled to the benefit of this act unless the resolution of removal shall state that he is removed for a cause not involving moral delinquency, and shall recommend the continuance of such compensation.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvement, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the

amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "The Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
