REPORTED MORTALITY * for the week ending July 4, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending June 27, 1885

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register : SIR—There were 809 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 4, 1885, which is an increase of 131, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 120 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending June 27, 1885, was 699, which is 139.6 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.02 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,397,061.
