



NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-fective plumbing and worm out services are built of the fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and

Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore given to all householders that in all inther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waster may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. Mosse-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
