



Col. EMMONS CLARK, Scoredary: SIR-It is often said that New York ought to be the healthiest city in the world. As a matter of fact, London is; the annual death-rate of London being about 20 in 1,000, and that of New York about 26 in 1,000. The following tables are the result of an attempt to find out whether the excess of mortality in New York is due to any particular diseases, and, if so, what they are, and whether the mortality from such diseases has increased or diminished since the organization of the Health Department. The following table shows the mortality in New York and London from the principal causes of death in 1886 (the London figures for 1887 not being at hand). These deaths form 80 or 90 per cent, of the total in each eity. In the second column of figures the number of deaths in New York has been increased in the same proportion that the population of London bears to that of New York had the same population as London, and the death-rate from the different diseases was the same as a present. The deaths from tabes mesenterica in New York include those from scrofula and maras-mus, and those from tubercular meningitis include hydrocephalus.

It will be noticed that in both of these tables the diseases, or groups of diseases, in which there is a very marked excess of mortality in New York are the following: Diphtheria and croup (taken together), diarrhocal diseases, phthisis and Bright's disease with nephritis (acute and chronic Bright's). In the table for 1880 the comparison is made between diseases of the urinary system in both cities, but as the deaths from Bright's and nephritis constitute about eighty-five per cent. of such diseases, the changes in mortality from urinary diseases are mainly due to the varying number of deaths from those diseases of the kidneys.

As these two years may be exceptional, the following table was prepared, which shows the average annual number of deaths in each city for twenty years, viz. : from 1867 to 1886, inclusive. The averages for typhus and enteric fevers are for only eighteen years, as they were not distinguished from each other in the London reports until 1869. The deaths from tabes mesenterica in New York include deaths from marasmus, and those from tubercular meningitis deaths from hydrocephalus. This, however, does not affect the result of the comparison.

It will be seen that the same rule holds good, viz. : that the excess of mortality in New York is mainly due to diphtheria and croup, diarrhoeal diseases, phthisis and diseases of the kidneys.

In all these tables there appears, besides the great excess of deaths from the kindeys. In all these tables there appears, besides the great excess of deaths from the above-named diseases, a great excess of deaths from bronchits in London, and from pneumonia in New York. They nearly balance each other, however, and the difference is probably due to the classification of broncho-pneumonia as bronchits in London, while it is classified as pneumonia in New York. This is clearly suggested by the following table, in which it will be noticed the deaths from pneumonia preponderate in each city between the ages of 5 and 45, while above and below those ages bronchits preponderates in London, pneumonia continuing to preponderate in New York. Now, in persons under 5 and over 45, pneumonia is generally of the type called broncho-pneumonia, originating in bronchits, and it might perhaps be classed as bronchitis on the theory that the pneumonia was a sequela and not the primary disease.

Having thus apparently fixed upon the chief causes of mortality in New York, a number of tables were prepared to test the truth of the supposition.

The following table shows the excess of deaths in New York in 1886, from the causes suspected, over what the deaths from the same causes would have been if the death-rate from those diseases had been the same in New York as in London :

Adding these numbers together, we find the total excess from the four groups of diseases to be 8,553, and if we subtract this sum from 37.351, the total number of deaths for 1886, the remainder will show what the mortality of New York would have been in 1886 if the death-rate from those four diseases or groups had been the same as in London, the death-rate from all other causes remaining the same. The remainder is 28,798, representing an annual death-rate of 20.01 in 1,000, or about the rate of London.

If now we subtract the deaths due to these four causes from the total number of deaths in each city, the remainder will, of course, show the number of deaths from all other causes.

These tables fairly demonstrate that the excess of mortality in New York as compared with London is due to diphtheria and croup, diarthceal diseases, phthisis and kidney diseases, and the increase or decrease of deaths from these causes from year to year will indicate, in some degree, improvement or deterioration in the sanitary condition of the city.

In provenient or deterioration in the samtary condition of the city. In dealing with vital statistics it is desirable to have numbers as large as possible for purposes of comparison, as in this way errors are to some extent eliminated. In order to judge of the samitary condition of New York, it is therefore better to compare successive periods of ten years than to make a comparison year by year. The following table shows the average annual number of deaths from the diseases under consideration from 1868 to 1877, and from 1878 to 1887, inclusive. This com-parison has the further advantage that the cholera year 1866 is not included (which would have swelled the deaths from diarrhocal diseases in the first period). Each period includes an unusually fatal year, viz. : 1872 and 1881.

It will be noticed that the death-rate from diarrhocal diseases and phthisis (diseases peculiarly sensitive to sanitary surroundings) has diminished appreciably, while that from diphtheria and croup and from kidney diseases has increased.

CONCLUSIONS.

CONCLUSIONS. I. That the excess of mortality in New York, as compared with London, is due chiefly to diphtheria and croup, diarrhocal diseases, phthisis and kidney diseases. 2. That if the death-rate from these diseases were the same in New York and London, the mortality from all other causes remaining as a tpresent in both cities, the general death-rate in the two cities would be almost precisely the same. 3. That the overcrowding in New York (16.37 persons to a dwelling in 1880, as compared with 7.8 in 1885 in London) and the trying climatic conditions render it very improbable that the death-rate of this city can ever be reduced as low as that of London.
