Resolutions.

Resolved, That M. J. Dawson, contractor for crib-work at Hart's Island, be directed to begin work at once. Adopted.

Resolved, That the proposal of H. E. Bowns, to furnish 3,000 tons coal, for distribution to the out-door poor, at \$5.29 per ton, be accepted and the contract awarded to him, the sureties having been approved by the Comptroller. Adopted.

Resolved, That the proposals of H. K. and F. B. Thurber & Co., to furnish 1,500 barrels flour No. 1, at \$5.79 per barrel;

James C. Thompson, 1,500 barrels flour No. 2, at \$6.39 per barrel;—be accepted and the contracts awarded to them, the sureties having been approved by the Comptroller. Adopted.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,472, as follows: 1 public building, 544 tenement-houses, 84 private dwellings, 63 other dwellings, 5 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 29 stables, 44 slaughter-houses, 2 lodging-houses, 1 public sewer, 2 smoke houses, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 88 yards, courts, and areas, 105 cellars and basements, 178 waste-pipes and drains, 243 privies and water-closets, 35 street gutters and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, and 3 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 413.

During the past week 118 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 39 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

54 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 203 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 146 houses, 146 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

34 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 14, 1882:

Permits were issued to the consignees of 49 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

61 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 203 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 144 houses, 144 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

59 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 583 births, 57 still-births, 204 marriages, and 761 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 14, 1882; this shows an increase of 112 births, 12 still-births, and 3 deaths, and a decrease of 26 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 24 births, 6 still-births, 33 marriages, and 42 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 9; diphtheria, 14; croup, 8; erysipelas, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 6; malarial fevers, 4; inanition, 7; alcoholism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; premature and pretermatural births, 5; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; measles, 10; typhoid fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 11; heart disease, 7; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 16; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3; surgical operations, 2; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from whooping cough, marasmus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula, and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 146 were in institutions, 419 in tenement-houses, 185 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 156 on the first, 189 on the second, 127 on the third, 82 on the fourth, 34 on the fifth, 6 on the sixth. 753 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 8 non-residents; 83 were stated to be single, 188 married, 77 widowed, and the condition of 413 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 761; still-births, 57; bodies in transitu, 25; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 84 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 585 births; 204 marriages; 57 still-births; 761 deaths; 25 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 92 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 13 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 49 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Jan. 14, 1882, was 38.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.918, the mean humidity was 80, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,248, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.83 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

No. 27 CHAMBERS STREET,
TUESDAY, January 24, 1882—2.30 o'clock P. M. }

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Commissioners Edward Cooper (Chairman), Allan Campbell, George H. Andrews, and Daniel Lord, Jr.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register" of January 23 and 24, 1882, showing due publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meetings held on January 12 and 17, 1882, were read and approved.

The Clerk presented the following order of the Supreme Court extending the time in which the Commissioners may hear evidence and decide cases, viz.:

At a Special Term of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, held at the Court-house, in the City of New York, on the 21st day of January, 1882.

Present—Hon. Charles Donohue, Justice.

In the Matter

of

The Application for an Extension of Time in which the Commissioners appointed under chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, may hear evidence and decide cases.

It appearing to me by the petition of John C. Shaw, that there are upwards of two thousand cases still pending and undetermined before the Commissioners appointed by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880; that it will be impossible to complete the testimony in said cases within the time mentioned in the former order of this Court, dated June 27, 1881; that there are also other cases of assessments which fall within the terms of the said statute, which have not yet been confirmed, and some of which have been recently confirmed, in all of which cases the owners of property assessed have the privilege of applying to said Commissioners for relief;

Now, on motion of John C. Shaw and Charles E. Miller, attorneys for parties affected by said proceedings, and upon hearing John A. Beall, on behalf of the Counsel to the Corporation, appearing and submitting the question for the extension of time prayed for to the decision of the Court, and in and by virtue of the powers conferred upon the said Supreme Court by the terms of said statute,

It is ordered, that the time for the submission of evidence in the cases now pending before said Commissioners, or in any cases which may hereafter be legally brought before them under the provisions of said act, be and the same is hereby extended beyond the term specified in the former order of this court until the first day of August, 1882, and the time within which the said Commissioners shall make and render decisions in any such cases be and the same is hereby extended beyond the time specified in said former order, and until the 30th day of October, 1882.

(No. 1514), for relief in matter of assessment for Seventy-fifth street regulating, grading, etc., from Fifth avenue to East river, was amended so as to include the lots belonging to the petitioners known as Ward Numbers 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22, Block No. 38.

And, on his motion, the Corporation Counsel consenting, the decision of the Commissioners as to this assessment, in Matter of Reilly, rendered July 28, 1881, was made their decision in Matter of Matthews et al., and the Clerk was directed to prepare a certificate reducing the assessment on the petitioners' lots as of date of decision in Matter of Reilly.

At the request of the Corporation Counsel the hearing of the cases on the calendar was postponed until the meeting on Tuesday, January 31, 1882.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF UNPAID TAXES, ASSESSMENTS, AND CROTON WATER RENTS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, and upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice by advertisement for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and

by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 321 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz:

First—"The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
