OPINION OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION.

The reductions in the salaries of the officers mentioned in chapter 480 of the Laws of 1875, entitled "An act to fix the compensation of certain officers in the city and county of New York," do not take effect until the first of January, 1876.

SIR-Chapter 480 of the Laws of 1875, entitled "An act to fix the compensation of certain officers of the city and county of New York," is as follows :

"Section 1. The Recorder, the Surrogate, and the District Attorney of the city and county of New York, and the City Judge, and the additional City Judge of said city hereafter to be elected, shall receive for his services as such Recorder, Surrogate, District Attorney, and City Judge, a

yearly salary of \$12,000, which shall be paid in equal monthly payments." "Sec. 2. After the first day of January, 1876, each Assistant District Attorney in said county shall receive a yearly salary of \$7,500."

"Sec. 3. The District Court Justices, or Civil Justices of the District Courts in the city of New York, hereafter to be elected, shall receive for their services as said Justices the sum of \$6,000 per

annum, which sum shall be paid by the proper officers of said city in equal monthly installments." "Sec. 4. All laws and parts of laws inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby

repealed."

"Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately." Your letter of the 30th ultimo requests my opinion whether the first section of this law requires that the salaries provided therein shall take effect on its passage, or after the first day of January

next. This question primarily involves the inquiry whether the words "hereafter to be elected," occurring in the first section, applied only to the City Judge, or have a broader application to all the officers therein mentioned. It is obvious, as a matter of grammatical construction, that they admit of application to all the officers as well as to the one last mentioned. I have not the original act before me, nor has it yet been published in the regular serial of Session Laws. It, therefore, does not appear what the punctuation is ; but even assuming that the punctuation favors one construction rather than

the other, still construing the section itself, without reference to the other parts of the act, the question would seem to be doubtful so far as the section itself is concerned.

Following a familiar rule of construction when doubt exists as to the meaning of particular words in a statute, we must seek from the general purpose and purport of the act light to guide us to a right conclusion.

Looking at the second section, we find that the change in the salaries of the Assistant District Attorneys is expressly made to take effect after the first day of January, 1876. Looking onward to the third section, we find that the change in the salaries of the District Court Justices, or Civil Justices of the District Courts, is to take effect only upon those officers who shall hereafter be elected. From these two sections it is plain that the general object of the Legislature was to reduce the salaries of the officers contemplated in the title of the act, but that such reduction should not take place at the present time. Conforming the contemplation of the salaries of the sala present time. Conforming the construction of the first section to the general purpose obvious in reading the entire act, we are justified in interpreting the intention of the first section to be to reduce and fix the salaries of the five officers in this section mentioned when, by the election of the coming autumn, the future incumbents of the offices shall take their places. These offices are to be filled by the election of November next, and the persons chosen will accede to the duties on the 1st of January following.

In my opinion the true construction of the first section is that the five officers mentioned are each to receive a yearly salary of \$12,000, to be paid in equal monthly payments for the terms commencing on the 1st of January, 1876.

Another view of this subject leads to the same conclusion. Among the officers mentioned in the first section is the Surrogate, whose salary, according to the provisions of the Constitution, cannot be diminished during his term of office. It is not to be assumed that the Legislature intended to violate the fundamental law. (Constitution, article 6, section 15, 7 N. Y. Statutes at Large, Edmond's Edition, page 814.)
