DEAR SIR—In conformity with the requirements of section 119 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, we transmit herewith the results of our examination of the receipts and disbursements of the office of the Chamberlain for the third quarter of 1900.

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts on September 30, 1900, was \$6,425,54, which agrees with the balance, as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date.

Co. are on this street for the entire distance covered by the petition, located immediately next to the curb on the park side of the street, and the pavement between the tracks and rails and two feet outside thereof should be laid at the expense of the railroad company, and an assessment should be levied only for the paving of the remainder of the street, upon which the following estimate of the work and expense is based:

2,700 cubic yards of grading.
2,600 linear feet of new and old curb to be set.
9,146 square yards asphalt pavement on concrete foundation.
Total estimated cost, based on five years of maintenance for asphalt, \$31,500. The assessed value of the property within one-half block on each side of the street, exclusive of the Park, which extends for the entire distance on one side, is \$113,800.
