DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, February 1, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held January 25, 1901, were approved.

William Coverley appeared on behalf of the Anchor Line and asked the Board to take action on the application for a lease of the pier at the foot of West Twenty-fourth street, North river. He stated that the pier required strengthening and a new shed, and offered in behalf of the Anchor Line to repair the pier, re-shed same and to repaint the shed if the lease be granted.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Meyer, Commissioner Murphy voting in the negative, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Anchor Line (Henderson Brothers), Limited, all and singular the wharfe which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of Pier, new 54, North river, at the foot of West Twenty-fourth street, as extended to the pierhead-line of 1897, together with the shed now on said pier, for a period of ten years from January 1, 1902, at a rental of twenty-five thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department. The lessees to have the privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each, at an advance rental of five per cent. per annum on each renewal term. It being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Anchor Line (Henderson Brothers), Limited, shall file in this Department a written acceptance of the terms and conditions hereof, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used in this Department.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Anchor Line (Henderson Brothers), Limited, to erect a shed on the extension to Pier, new 54, North river, in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, said shed to revert to and become the property of The City of New York, free from all incumbrances whatsoever, upon the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of said pier.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Anchor Line to make necessary repairs to the pier and to the shed on same.

The communication from the New York Knickerbocker Real Estate Company offering to sell to the City the parcel of land at the northeast corner of the block between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues, for the sum of \$90,000, was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the New York Ice Company—Requesting permission to run a 10-inch salt water pipe through the bulkhead and under the pier at the foot of East Eighteenth street.

From the Dock Superintendent—In relation to the maintenance of a movable stand by Daniel J. O'Leary in front of the Christopher Street Ferry premises.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, to repair its water-front property on the North river during the ensuing six months, the work to be kept within existing lines, and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

Manhattan Railway Company, to repair its water-front property at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, Harlem river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, to dredge at its coal dock at St. George, Staten Island.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Rockland-Rockport Line Company, to erect a one-story shed with a two-story adjoining building on the property of James D. Leary, at the foot of Wallock street, Newtown creek, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

John N. Robins Company, to construct an additional story to the one-story building now situated in the Erie Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Department of Correction—Requesting that a small pier for the landing of flour be built on the east side of Blackwell's Island, near the Penitentiary. Engineer-in-Chief directed to construct an additional pier thereat, at a cost not to exceed \$1,000.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—

1st. Requesting that dredging be ordered underneath dumping-board at the foot of Canal street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat.

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:
